Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2005

The trustees present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2005.

Legal and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Objects of the charity

The Charity's objects are to advance education in photography and writing skills for persons resident mainly in developing countries and of low income and thereby to relieve poverty.

Organisational structure

- The Charity is registered both as a charity with the Charity Commission and Inland Revenue, and as a company with Companies House
- Decisions are made on a day-to-day basis by the principal staff, in close contact with Trustee board members. Scheduled and emergency meetings of the Trustee Board reviews and discusses major decisions and sets tasks and responsibilities for further activities and goals. The principal staff attend such meetings, with full speaking but with no voting rights. A steering panel acts in an advisory capacity to the board and principal staff.

Appointment of the trustees

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at 31 March 2005 was 5 (2004 - 5). The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights.

Risk statement

The board has examined the major strategic, business and operational risks that the organisation faces and confirms that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

Reserves policy

The trustees have considered the reserves required to operate the charity and have concluded that it would be prudent to maintain unrestricted funds at a level sufficient to fund six months normal expenditure on staff salaries and basic services. The level of unrestricted funds at 31st March is less than that required to support current levels of expenditure. This shortfall is being addressed by the Trustees with proposals to secure additional funding for core expenditure.

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Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2005

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in October 2000).
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Gifts in kind are included at their value to the charity and in the care of the cameras recognised at the time of distribution. Volunteer time is not included in the financial statements.
- c) Grants are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.
- e) Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity.

f) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rate in use is:

Office furniture and equipment

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £500. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

- g) Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.
- h) Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity.
- i) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.
- j) The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work.
