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

Report of the Board of Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2011

Organisational Information

PhotoVoice is an award-winning international charity in its 11th year of operation

PhotoVoice projects span five regions, working with refugees, homeless and landless people and people with disabilities. PhotoVoice always works in partnership with local community organisations and other international organisations.

OBJECT

The Charity's objects are to advance education and community development in the UK and internationally working using participatory photography methods and training in photography and communication skills in order for the participating individuals and communities to express themselves, raise public awareness of the issues and experiences they encounter to improve their quality of life

The Charity runs training courses and advises other charities, groups and institutions carrying out development projects in the use of photography to advance the education of and/or to relieve poverty or other hardships

VISION

PhotoVoice's vision is for a world in which no one is denied the opportunity to speak out and be heard

MISSION

PhotoVoice's **mission** is to build skills within disadvantaged and marginalised communities using innovative participatory photography and digital storytelling methods so that they have the opportunity to represent themselves and create tools for advocacy and communications to achieve positive social change

KEY AIMS

- To work with marginalised groups using participatory photographic methods which enable selfexpression and development, raise awareness and provide tools for advocacy
- Promote appropriate use of participatory photography by international development and local grassroots organisations by promoting knowledge sharing, setting standards, providing best practices, training and related consultancy services
- Promote the images and words produced in participatory photography projects through targeted newsletters, publications, events, exhibitions as well as traditional mass media and new media to raise awareness and on occasion enable income generation for the participants



Performance against Plan

- 1 The charity has reviewed its objects and strategy and continues to develop its monitoring and evaluation practices with a focus on increasing its overall impact as well as the longer-term stability and sustainability of its programmes and funding
- 2 The Board of Trustees now provides expanded legal and management skills
- 3 Continuing to develop a greater number of programmes across the world, focusing on longerterm interventions with stronger local partnerships
- 4 The addition of an exclusive limited edition print sales event created a new fundraising stream, which was successful in raising new unrestricted funds for the charity
- 5 The organisational review and streamlining of activities and administrative systems, was completed and whilst there will always be improvements to be made the systems are now robust
- 6 The programme of workshops in participatory photography for arts and development practitioners and professionals has proved to be a resounding success

Key achievements during the year

- 1 Seven out of a total of 10 projects have been completed in three regions training new partner organisation staff in Europe, Asia and South America and an estimated 226 participants with many more indirect beneficiaries in the same communities and beyond
- Exhibitions in the UK and overseas. An exceptional year for the reach of our Exhibitions with 'Visible Rights' touring schools in Kabul and 'Images of What is Ours' touring in Paraguay. A 'Waiting' poster campaign on the Glasgow underground and exhibition in Braehead shopping Center are estimated to have had footfall figures of 280,000 and 220,000 respectively.
- 3 New addition to Methodology Series See it our Way Participatory photography as a tool for advocacy
- 4 1,136 tickets sold for five PhotoVoice Lectures at the Conway Hall and Kings Place in London
- 5 Research for the innovative 'Depicting Injustice' project commissioned by Save The Children Fund in association with Panos London
- 6 Expanding the training programme from one and three day courses in London to on-site training for institutions in the UK

Future plans

The continuing financial uncertainties and the changes in personnel (notably the departure of the Chief Executive and Programme Manager early in the 2011-12 financial year) has created an opportunity to restructure the staffing with a view to increasing the project output and building on the charity's position as a leader in the field of participatory photography by

- 1 Looking to select a new Chief Executive with substantial programme and project management experience
- 2 Increasing the project management capacity
- 3 Favouring an increase of scale and duration of projects rather than number of projects
- 4 Decreasing fixed 'support' staff salaries and restructuring fundraising staffing



Review of Activities during the year

Projects, be they originated by PhotoVoice or commissioned by partners, are designed with a number of different aims and objectives that vary according the issues, communities, beneficiaries and the project partners' long term objectives. However the participatory photography methodology itself provides insights into the beneficiary's thoughts, hopes, aspirations and understanding which is undoubtedly important but at times can be difficult to quantify. To this end, in addition to the monitoring and evaluation of each project, PhotoVoice commissioned an independent Outcome Evidence Report of projects in this financial year (available on request) which is quoted from below in grey italics.

"The majority of respondents believed that the venture they had been involved in with PhotoVoice had definitely provided them, or their organisation with a new way of thinking"

"For some, using participatory photography was a new way of working, and they had been overwhelmed at how the images were so empowering"

"The main impact PhotoVoice ventures were felt to have had on partners, bursary recipients and training clients, often depended on the nature of the work. A few of a long list mentioned - were having access to a new methodology for young people a voice, providing individuals with more confidence in running projects and groups, and allowing people to think outside the box."

PHOTOVOICE PROJECTS

PhotoVoice Bursary Scheme

The PhotoVoice bursary scheme founded in 2008 is now in its third year and at present six recipients have received funds from the 2010-11 programme and are working on projects for completion by the end of the calendar year. Recipients include a disabled photographer who is producing portraits of SEN students to combat their under-representation in the mainstream art and media world, and a participant from our project with mental health service users, UR in the Picture, who has run his own course with members of Mind's Activ8 project in Hastings. The two recipients of the 2009-10 bursary scheme both completed excellent projects and photo books, and their work has been showcased on the PhotoVoice website and promoted to PhotoVoice's supporters. Gary Waite, a blind photographer who produced work documenting the Caribbean music scene in South London, was chosen by Nokia to be the focus of an advertising campaign for a new camera phone. He was paid to appear in a TV advert, an online short film, and his photos were used on a billboard campaign up and down the country in February — March 2011. PhotoVoice received increased interest in its work, and especially its sensory photography projects, as a result.




Financial Review

A challenging financial environment saw PhotoVoice's annual income decrease by 13% from £514, 452 to £448,711 Expenditure decreased by 7% from £518,864 to £481,389, which resulted in a deficit of £32,678. The number of projects implemented has fallen from thirteen to nine, however a further two projects were fully developed which will only appear in the next financial year. The range of project funding continues to be diverse but it must be noted that the nature of the work undertaken by PhotoVoice and its partners/funders is highly variable and can vary significantly from year to year. Unrestricted income continues to contribute to the true costs of projects but the impact of low bank interest rates on both restricted and unrestricted reserves is noticeable.

Unrestricted reserves reduced by about 8% to £122,754 at year end, which will cover just over seven months' of staff costs and overhead expenditure based on the 2011/12 budget approved by the Trustee board. This exceeds the three to six months range outlined in PhotoVoice's reserves policy Restricted reserves decreased by 24% to £69,712 due to the completion of projects carried forward from the previous year and staff costs decreased by 2% to £176,456.

Voluntary income increased by £40,538 to £272,294 with the return of corporate sponsorship for the auction and the cultivation of major donors (It is worth noting that the exceptionally high value of the Gifts in Kind has impacted on the income and expenditure figures this year). Revenue from the Annual Auction of Exceptional Photography, hosted by Thomson Reuters, decreased by £11,765 reflecting the general economic climate but was to some extent offset by the success of the training programme and the creation of a new fundraising event -a limited edition print sale, which proved to be a great success without a significant increase in costs. PhotoVoice continues to increase its profile and raise funds with its popular Lecture Series, which achieved a record 1,136 ticket sales.

The Trustees expect the financial climate for PhotoVoice to continue to be challenging throughout 2011-12





Structure, Governance and Management

GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on March 2nd 2000 with Companies House and registered as a charity with the Charity Commissioner on March 19th 2003. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

A skills audit of the trustee board, reviewed on an annual basis has highlighted key areas of expertise that PhotoVoice wishes to have represented on its board in order to maximise its impact as a charity These areas of expertise include the following

- Photography/Digital media
- Finance/Charity Accounting
- Law
- Fundraising
- Media/PR
- Business skills
- International development and programme management

New trustees are recruited through the existing trustees, supporters of PhotoVoice, professional resources and targeted advertising. A new treasurer was appointed during 2010-2011 with the assistance of Arts & Business.

One third of the trustees, in rotation, put themselves up for reappointment each year at the AGM Directors of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at March 31st 2011 was 9 (2010 - 9)

TRUSTEE INDUCTION AND TRAINING


When a trustee first joins the PhotoVoice board an induction programme is designed according to their specific needs. Induction will include child protection training and individual sessions with staff, as required, to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context in which it operates. These are organised jointly by the Chair of the trustees and the Chief Executive. If deemed appropriate, new trustees are encouraged to take external training.



ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Trustee Board holds scheduled quarterly meetings and emergency ones as required, to make major decisions affecting strategy and longer-term direction of PhotoVoice, and to set tasks and responsibilities for further activities and goals. The Chief Executive attends the meetings to provide reports and recommendations for the trustees and is joined by her staff as required.

Operational decisions are made on a day-to-day basis by the Chief Executive, and other key staff in line with the strategy and direction set by the Trustees



RISK STATEMENT

The board has examined the major strategic, business and operational risks that the organisation faces and confirms that systems have been established to enable risks to be assessed as they arise and that an annual Risk Register is produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks and review the reserves policy

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have considered the reserves required to operate the charity and have concluded that it would be prudent to increase the reserve of unrestricted funds from its current level (sufficient to fund three to six months' normal expenditure on staff salaries and basic services) to include the risks identified on the annual Risk Register which includes business and operational risks. A time frame of 3 years has been allocated to achieve this increased level.



STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the net income or expenditure of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- · make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information.

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, 'charities and public benefit'

PhotoVoice's charitable purpose is enshrined in its objects - the education and training of disadvantaged people throughout the world in the field of photography. The Trustees ensure that this is carried out for the public benefit by delivering programmes and services that are of value to the participants of the projects. The participants are members of the public known to and/or identified by Partner organisations (e.g. NGO's, Local Authorities, Aid Agencies) with whom and for whom PhotoVoice develops the projects. The partners have the specialised working knowledge of the target groups (e.g. Refugees, vulnerable youth, people with disabilities) and these partnerships ensure that PhotoVoice's activities reach the right recipients and thus fulfil the charity's core objectives.

AUDITORS

GMAK were reappointed as the chantable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small entities

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF PHOTOVOICE FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2011

We have audited the financial statements of PhotoVoice for the year ended March 31st 2011, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities(effective April 2008) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to smaller entities)

This report is made solely to the charity's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 495 of the Companies Act 2006. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed

Respective responsibilities of the trustees and auditors

As stated in the statement of responsibilities of the trustees, the trustees' (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the financial statements and for being satisfied they give a true and fair view. Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's (APB's) Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the Audit of the Financial Statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charitable company circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed, the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees, and the overall presentation of the financial statements. In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Report of the Board of Trustees to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatement or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

Opinion on the Financial Statements

- give a true and fair view of the charity's affairs at March 31st 2011 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended,
- · have been properly prepared in accordance with part 15 of the Companies Act 2006, and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to smaller entities

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006 They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005)
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Donated services and facilities are recognized as an incoming resource at the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received. Volunteer time is not included in the financial statements.
- c) Grants are recognized in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable
- d) Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to restricted incoming resources when receivable. Depreciation of fixed assets purchased with such grants is charged against the restricted fund. Where a fixed asset is donated to the charity for its own use, it is treated in a similar way to a restricted grant.
- e) Resources expended are recognized in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned by an estimate of the amount attributable to each activity, based on the number of staff members as per note 6

f) The Charity is partially dependent on periodic programme grants to ensure its continuation as a going concern. These accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis, since although there is uncertainty, there is no reason to assume that funding will not continue.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

- g) Governance costs include the corporate management, strategic planning, restructuring and oneoff consultancy to develop the organisation, as well as audit and legal costs
- h) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Computer equipment and software

3 years

(straight line)

Items of equipment are capitalized where the purchase price exceeds £2,000 Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

- Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure
 which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management
 and support costs
- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity
- k) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular purposes

Where expenditure on a project or programme area exceeds the restricted funds available for that project or area, then the 'overspend' is met by transfers from unrestricted funds during the year Should sufficient appropriate restricted funds subsequently become available these transfers will be reclaimed

- The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work
- m) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they fall due
