Report of the Board of Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2010

Organisational Information

PhotoVoice is an award-winning international charity in its 10th year of operation. Its projects empower some of the most disadvantaged groups in the world with photographic skills to enable them to transform their lives and bring about positive social change.

PhotoVoice projects span four continents, working with refugees, street and working children, people with disabilities and other vulnerable and marginalised groups. PhotoVoice always works in partnership with local community organisations and other international organisations.

OBJECT

The promotion of education through the teaching of photography and writing skills to persons residing mainly in developing countries and of low income so as to improve their education generally and better enable such persons to express themselves in visual and documentary form

VISION

PhotoVoice's **vision** is for a world in which no one is denied the opportunity to speak out and be heard

MISSION

PhotoVoice's **mission** is to build skills within disadvantaged and marginalised communities using innovative participatory photography and digital storytelling methods so that they have the opportunity to represent themselves and create tools for advocacy and communications to achieve positive social change

KEY AIMS

- To work with marginalised groups using participatory photographic methods which enable self-expression and development, raise awareness and provide tools for advocacy
- Promote appropriate use of participatory photography by international development and local grassroots organisations by promoting knowledge sharing, setting standards, providing best practices, training and related consultancy services
- Promote the images and words produced in participatory photography projects through targeted newsletters, publications, events, exhibitions as well as traditional mass media and new media to raise awareness and on occasion enable income generation for the participants



Performance against Plan

PhotoVoice continued to consolidate its change from a small Founder-led charity to a robust organisation

- 1 Completion of a new three year organisational strategy focussing on increasing its overall impact by increasing programme quality,
- 2 Strengthening the new organisational structure, providing continuity with the departure of cofounder/Projects Director with the creation of a new post of Programme manager,
- 3 New trustees were recruited adding further skills to the board in the fields of photography, digital media and the web as well as business management,
- 4 Developed new programmes and partnerships (see below),
- 5 The Friends Scheme was restructured to provide improved event and publication discounts and continues to provide a committed and steady revenue stream,
- 6 Cultivating individual donors to help counteract the serious decline of corporate sponsorship for events. This successfully avoided a severe shortfall in covering the costs of the Auction

Key achievements during the year

- 1 16 projects implemented five ongoing, and 11 new ones across three continents training 52 facilitators and of direct benefit to approximately 1,000 participants and many more indirect beneficiaries in the same communities
- 2 Exhibitions in the UK and overseas Youth as Agents for Change in St Petersburg & Sarajevo, Liverpool My City My World at the Blue Coat Gallery, Liverpool
- 3 New addition to Methodology Series Sensory photography photography for bind and visually impaired people
- 4 885 tickets sold for four PhotoVoice Lectures at the Conway Hall and Kings Place in London
- 5 Remitting royalties to participants from their print sales
- 6 Streamlining procedures for new projects
- 7 Creating links with local authorities in Hackney and Liverpool
- 8 Creating a pilot training scheme and successfully delivering 1x one day and 2 x three day training sessions to 36 participants from the arts and development sectors which will form the basis of a training programme in 2010-11

ORGANISATIONAL

- 1 Maintaining levels of voluntary income and increasing restricted income, with the welcome addition of statutory funding in an inhospitable economic climate
- 2 Upgrading and overhauling the PhotoVoice database and website has provided the organisation and its beneficiaries with important new tools to increase its impact and improve its communications

COMMUNICATIONS

- 1 Integrating social networking into the communications strategy notably Facebook and Twitter
- 2 Highly successful exhibition of Sights Unseen photography by blind and partially sighted photographers. An audio visual slideshow was posted to the BBC website and the project was featured on BBC Radio 4's In Vision programme, bringing exceptional interest and enquiries from the press and public
- 3 New promotional short film created with donated time and facilities
- 4 10th anniversary logo created with donated design and studio time



Future plans

During 2010/11 PhotoVoice will continue to develop the organisation to withstand the continuing financial uncertainties and to build on its position as a leader in the field of participatory photography by:

- 1 Reviewing its three-year strategy and its monitoring and evaluation practices with a focus on increasing its overall impact as well as the longer-term stability and sustainability of its programmes and funding.
- 2 Expanding the Board of Trustees to bolster legal and management skills,
- 3 Continuing to developing a greater number of programmes across the world, focusing on longer-term interventions with stronger local partnerships,
- 4 Reviewing the fundraising structure to be less dependent on a single annual event (The Auction),
- 5 Strengthening the organisational structure by reviewing and streamlining all activities and administrative systems, and reviewing staff tasks and areas of responsibility
- 6 Continue to develop and deliver a programme of three-day and one-day workshops in participatory photography for arts and development practitioners and professionals

Project strategy for 2010/11

Focus on four key client groups:

- Young people aged 15 24,
- People affected by migration, including refugees and asylum seekers,
- · People with disabilities,
- · People with mental health issues

Programmatic Threads:

- Mental health and the therapeutic benefits of photography,
- Innovation in participatory photography new media and methods, new ways of working, new groups to work with For example, work with the blind and visually impaired, poetry, digital stories, and mobile communications.
- Heightening impact and the case for participatory photography for driving social change.
 For example, building in stronger M&E to projects and acting on the results of it, developing partnerships with organisations who can support the development of the evidence base and the application of participatory photography.

Review of Activities during the year

PHOTOVOICE PROJECTS

Children's Forum

A founding project of PhotoVoice, established in 1998, that created a programme of photography, self-advocacy and vocational training with Bhutanese refugee youth living in Jhapa and Morang districts, East Nepal. The final phase of the project allowed for the re-printing of the booklet of their work and a budget for the ongoing web hosting and maintenance costs of the Bhutanese refugee website and a freelancer to maintain and update it. The project ended in 2010 with the closure of the camp

Financial Review

PhotoVoice's annual income increased by over 25% from £409,578 to £514,452 with expenditure also increasing from £393,208 to £518,864, resulting in a deficit of £4,412

A successful, and repeated, contract with Liverpool City Council accounts for the single biggest increase in charitable activity (Vulnerable/Disadvantaged Youth increasing income from £19,360 to £185,000) although it must be noted that the nature of the work undertaken by PhotoVoice and its partners/funders is highly variable and can vary significantly from year to year. Also, the increased expenditure was due in part to the completion of longstanding projects. Staff salaries and overheads actually decreased. There was a marked drop in investment income due to the collapse of bank interest rates.

Unrestricted reserves increased by almost 38% to £133,084 which will cover almost six months staff costs and overhead expenditure based on the 2010/11 budget approved by the Trustee board. This is within the three to six months range outlined in PhotoVoice's reserves policy. Restricted reserves decreased by 31% to £92,060 due to the completion of longstanding projects and staff costs decreased by 3% to £180,275, reflecting the freeze on hiring and restricting salary increases.

Voluntary income decreased by £21,551 to £231,756 The PhotoVoice Auction of Photography hosted by Reuters raised £12,000 less than the previous year and PV had to cover some of the expenses of the auction due to the collapse of corporate sponsorship. However the net result was considerably better than had been anticipated as a result of an emergency fundraising campaign and stringent cost controls. PhotoVoice continues to raise funds and increase its profile with its everpopular Lecture Series, which attracted over 800 supporters.

Structure, Governance and Management

GOVERNING DOCUMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on March 2nd 2000 with Companies House and registered as a charity with the Charity Commissioner on March 19th 2003. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

RECRUITMENT AND APPOINTMENT OF TRUSTEES

PhotoVoice has highlighted key areas of expertise that it looks to have represented on its board in order to work, as a charity, to its maximum capacity. These areas of expertise include the following

- · Photography/Digital media
- Finance/Charity Accounting
- Law
- Fundraising
- Media/PR
- Business skills
- International development and programme management

A skills audit of the trustee board is carried out on an annual basis and gaps in expertise are highlighted. According to the skills gap highlighted, new trustees are recruited through the existing trustees and through the contacts and supporters of PhotoVoice. At times PhotoVoice is approached by individuals wanting to become trustees who are assessed according to the skills and experience they can bring to the trustee board and with reference to the most recent skills audit

One third of the trustees, in rotation, put themselves up for reappointment each year at the AGM Directors of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The total number of such guarantees at March 31st 2010 was 9 (2009 - 6)

TRUSTEE INDUCTION AND TRAINING


Most trustees are already familiar with the work of PhotoVoice having attended PhotoVoice events and exhibitions, and in some cases, having had involvement with PhotoVoice projects. When a trustee first joins the PhotoVoice board, an assessment is made as to the level of their knowledge of the organisation. An induction programme is then designed according to their specific needs induction may include short in-house training sessions to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context in which it operates. These are organised jointly by the Chair of the trustees and the Managing Director. If deemed appropriate, new trustees are encouraged to take external training



ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE

The Trustee Board holds scheduled quarterly meetings and emergency ones as required, to make major decisions affecting strategy and longer-term direction of PhotoVoice, and to set tasks and responsibilities for further activities and goals. The Managing Director attends the meetings to provide reports and recommendations for the trustees and is joined by the Programme Manager and other staff as required.

Operational decisions are made on a day-to-day basis by the Managing Director, and other key staff in line with the strategy and direction set by the Trustees



RISK STATEMENT

The board has examined the major strategic, business and operational risks that the organisation faces and confirms that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees have considered the reserves required to operate the charity and have concluded that it would be prudent to maintain unrestricted funds at a level sufficient to fund three to six months' normal expenditure on staff salaries and basic services



STATEMENT OF RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the net income or expenditure of the charity for the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006 The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditors are aware of such information

PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, 'charities and public benefit'

PhotoVoice's charitable purpose is enshrined in its objects - the education and training of disadvantaged people throughout the world in the field of photography. The Trustees ensure that this is carried out for the public benefit by delivering programmes and services that are of value to the participants of the projects. The participants are members of the public known to and/or identified by Partner organisations (e.g. NGO's, Local Authorities, Aid Agencies) with whom and for whom PhotoVoice develops the projects
The partners have the specialised working knowledge of the target groups (e.g. Refugees, vulnerable youth, people with disabilities) and these partnerships ensure that PhotoVoice's activities reach the right recipients and thus fulfil the charity's core objectives

AUDITORS

GMAK were reappointed as the charitable company's auditors during the year and have expressed their willingness to continue in that capacity This report has been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small entities

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF PHOTOVOICE

We have audited the financial statements of PhotoVoice for the year ended March 31st 2010, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes
The financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein

Respective responsibilities of the trustees and auditors

The trustees' (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) responsibilities for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) and for being satisfied that the financial statements give a true and fair view are set out in the Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland)

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view, have been properly prepared in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice and have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 We also report to you whether, in our opinion, the information given in the Trustees' Annual Report is consistent with those financial statements

In addition we report to you if, in our opinion, the charity has not kept adequate accounting records, if the charity's financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns, if we have not received all the information and explanations required for our audit, or if certain disclosures of trustees' remuneration specified by law are not made

We read the Trustees' Annual Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it

Basis of Audit Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charity's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion, we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

- the financial statements give a true and fair view of the charity's affairs at March 31st 2010 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure for the year then ended,
- the financial statements have been properly prepared in accordance with part 15 of the Companies Act 2006, and

1. Accounting policies

- a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standards for Small Entities (April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006. They follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).
- b) Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Donated services and facilities are recognized as an incoming resource at the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received. Volunteer time is not included in the financial statements.
- Grants are recognized in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they
 are receivable
- d) Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are credited to restricted incoming resources when receivable. Depreciation of fixed assets purchased with such grants is charged against the restricted fund. Where a fixed asset is donated to the charity for its own use, it is treated in a similar way to a restricted grant.
- e) Resources expended are recognized in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned on the following basis which are an estimate of the amount attributable to each activity, based on the number of staff members as per note 6

f) The Charity is partially dependent on periodic programme grants to ensure its continuation as a going concern. These accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. Since although there is uncertainty, there is no reason to assume that funding will not continue.

Accounting policies (continued)

- g) Governance costs include the corporate management, strategic planning, restructuring and one-off consultancy to develop the organisation, as well as audit and legal costs
- h) Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows.

Computer equipment and software

3 years

(straight line)

Items of equipment are capitalized where the purchase price exceeds £2,000. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

- Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure
 which meets these criteria is charged to the fund together with a fair allocation of management
 and support costs.
- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity
- k) Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the directors for particular purposes

Where expenditure on a project or programme area exceeds the restricted funds available for that project or area, then the 'overspend' is met by transfers from unrestricted funds during the year. Should sufficient appropriate restricted funds subsequently become available these transfers will be reclaimed.

- The costs of generating funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in raising funds for the charitable work
- m) Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remain with the lessor, are charged to the statement of financial activities in the year in which they fall due
