# Rural Arts North Yorkshire Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2004

The Trustees are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2004.

Legal and administrative information set out on pages 1 and 2 form part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

### Objects of the Charity

The object of the Charity is to promote the Rural Arts, in all their forms, principally in the area of North Yorkshire. During the year the Charity proposed a change in the area served by the Charity to enable it to work in outside the boundary of North Yorkshire. The Charity Commission agreed the amendment to the Memorandum and Articles of Association on 1 December 2003.

The charity enhances the quality of life of the people in the local authorities making up the county of North Yorkshire through the provision of challenging programmes of community workshops, exhibitions and - through 'ON Tour' - live performances in local rural venues.

#### **Trustees**

There have been some minor changes to the Council of Members during the year. The Trustees wish to thank Mrs Bloom, on her resignation from the Council of Members, for the support she and her late husband has given to the charity.

North Yorkshire County Council have chosen to send, on a rotating basis, representatives from the North Yorkshire Cultural Officers Group (NYCOG).

#### Organisation

The Council of Management, made up of a minimum of three members, meet at regular intervals through out the year to administer the charity. There are three subcommittees to streamline and focus the management of the charity during the year. These are noted in the legal and administrative information on pages 1 and 2.

The Arts Director continues to manage the day today operations of the charity.

#### **Investment Powers**

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment that the Trustees see fit.

#### **Related Parties**

During the financial year the charity let the first floor of the Courthouse to Shirtcliffe and Co., Solicitors, of which Mr C Shirtcliffe, a member of the Council of Management, is the Senior Partner. This arrangement came to an end in August 2003 when Shirtcliffe and Co., Solicitors moved to new premises in Thirsk. The arrangement was an arm's length transaction with

the rent being set at an open market rate. Permission and approval for this arrangement was sought from the Charity Commission and this was given in November 2000.

Review of the Activities and Future Developments

It has been another busy and memorable year for Rural Arts. Our development workers and artists have delivered more than seven hundred activities across North Yorkshire reaching over twenty five thousand people. The work has taken Rural Arts to opposite ends of the region – from the north east coast to the Craven Villages, both areas having poor resources and limited access to services.

The charity has continued with its learning and training programmes initially established with the Learning and Skills Contract. Rural Arts, working in partnership with North Yorkshire colleges, has played a crucial role in establishing a network of Rural Learning Communities in Hambleton and Ryedale, which has, in turn, maintained good links with the Learning and Skills Council in North Yorkshire.

The 'On Tour' programme continues to go from strength to strength offering high quality performance theatre in local rural venues. With a good number of new promoters joining the scheme, On Tour selection was again over subscribed, leaving some of the more established promoters disappointed. The success of the 'On Tour' scheme has been so encouraging, Rural Arts now has most of the funding in place to develop a programme of mobile cinema to take, not only blockbusters but also 'art house' film, to rural venues.

The focus for Rural Arts for the coming year will be the development of the Courthouse in Thirsk. Rural Arts is in the position of having the funding in place for the first phase of transforming the Courtroom into a performance and exhibition space with a new reception area and disabled access.

#### Reserves

The Council of Management has established the policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets are held as general funds at such a level that there are free reserves to provide financial flexibility over the next financial period.

**Risk Management** 

The Council of Management has conducted its own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed during the drawing up of a new Business Plan incorporating and focussing on the redevelopment of the Courthouse. Risks to external funding have also been identified and the company continues to seek sources of funding to support and develop its artistic and training programmes. Internal risks continue to be minimised by the close involvement of the Council of Management and the introduction of the 'Investors in People' programme.

# 1). Accounting Policies

#### a) Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002); the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2000) issued in October 2000. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

#### b) Donations, legacies and similar incoming resources

Donations, legacies and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

#### c) Grants receivable

Grants receivable, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) in the year in which they are received. Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods and is released to incoming resources in the period for which it has been received.

#### d)Rental income

Rental income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is receivable.

#### e) Interest receivable

Interest is included when received by the charity.

#### f) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis. The company is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure is shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

All expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities has been included in those cost categories.

Salary and wages are apportioned according to the time spent on the various activities of the charity.

#### g) Pension costs

The charity participates in a defined contribution scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the charity to the fund in respect of the year.

#### h) Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred over the period of the lease.

#### i) Tangible Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing more than £500 or more are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over the estimated useful lives as follows:-

# j) Leasing and Hire Purchase Commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts and finance leases are capitalised as tangible assets and depreciated over the shorter of the lease term and their useful economic lives. Obligations under such agreements are included in creditors net of the finance charge allocated to future periods. The finance element of the rental payment is charged to the Income and Expenditure Account so as to produce constant periodic rates of charge on the net obligations outstanding in each period.

# k) Restatement of Corresponding Figures

The accounts for the year ended March 2004 have been prepared to comply with the Charities SORP (2000) for larger entities as the income has exceeded £250,000. This has meant that the expense headings for cost of generating funds; costs of activities in furtherance of the objects of the charity; and resources expended on managing and administrating the charity have been included on the SOFA. These headings were not used last year. Therefore last year's comparatives have been presented under the new format.

# 20. Countryside Agency - Local Heritage Initiative

This is a project funded by the Countryside Agency to support the production of 'Upshoots' – an exhibition of photographic images and imaginative text by two artists documenting the people that make their living from the soil of the Howardian Hills. The grant also funds the touring of the exhibition and the costs of any supporting workshops that may accompany the work.

During the financial year the project was substantially completed and the application for the final portion of the grant is due for completion in July 2004.

Arts Centre Development was a donation from the Thirsk Infants School Trustees for developing the Courthouse as an Arts Centre for Thirsk. Courthouse Redevelopment was a grant received from Hambleton District Council to support redeveloping the Old Courthouse. It is expected that both of these grants will be spent in the next financial year.

TargIT grant was a grant from the DfES for the provision of a mobile classroom of 10 laptops for use in the outreach environment. The laptops were purchased in January 2002. The balance outstanding represents the cost of the classroom less the depreciation incurred to date.

The Lloyds TSB Foundation awarded a grant of £5,200 for office computer equipment which was purchased n November 2001. The balance outstanding represents the cost of the equipment less depreciation incurred to date.

Rural Learning Communities was a grant towards purchasing equipment to support the running of outreach courses during the period of the contract. The balance outstanding represents the cost of the equipment less depreciation incurred to date.

#### Project Management Funds

It's My Life funding represents a grant from the Arts Council England (Yorkshire) to support a regeneration and community reengagement project based in Whitby. The expenditure is the cost of employing a part time development worker and running workshops with community groups in the Whitby Pact area.

Forward together funding represents a grant under the ERDF scheme. The expenditure is the cost of employing a part time Lead Artist and Development

worker and running workshops in Staithes, North Yorkshire. The debit balance outstanding represents the funds due to the charity from Government Office. This balance is due has arisen due to timing differences in receiving matched funding.

#### 24. Related Parties

Mr C. Shirtcliffe, a member of the Council of Management is also the senior partner in Shirtcliffe & Co., Solicitors to whom the charity let office space under normal commercial terms and at arm's length. Shirtcliffe & Co., Solicitors vacated the premises in August 2003. There were no monies outstanding at this point or at the year end.

During the year £2,127 (2003 £4,254) was received in rent from Shirtcliffe & Co, Solicitors at an 'open market' rate as established by Joplings, Estate Agents and Valuers, Thirsk.

Thirsk Infant School Charitable Trust

Dr B Theide, who is Chair and Director of Rural Arts North Yorkshire, also serves as a Trustee for the Thirsk Infant School Charitable Trust. Rural Arts North Yorkshire has an outstanding loan with Thirsk Infant School Charitable Trust of £40,000 which is secured on the Courthouse. The loan is interest free and repayable in February 2010.

#### 25. Comparative Figures

The company took advantage of the exemption conferred by Section 249A(1) of the Companies Act 1985 for the year ended 31 March 2003 and hence the comparative figures have not been audited.

#### 26. Prior Year Adjustment
