### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives aims and significant activities

The Charity was founded in 2000 to provide conductive education and therapy to children suffering with cerebral palsy and other motor disorders. The Charity seeks to ensure that these aims are reflected in the diversity of the trustees. The objectives and principal activities are to:

- a) To develop and maintain a facility where children with cerebral palsy and other motor disorders can develop, grow and learn to be independent.
- b) To provide access to conductive education in its fullest form for children with cerebral palsy and other motor disorders.
- c) To advise and teach 'hands on' parents, carers, teachers and support assistants how to enable children to access their environment more independently.

#### Significant activities

The Trustees have complied with their duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 and have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission. Whoopsadaisy aims to develop the independence, confidence and self-esteem of children with cerebral palsy and other motor disorders. We are the only charity in East Sussex offering Conductive Education, a system of learning which, building upon children's existing abilities and skills, helps prepare them for tackling the challenges of everyday life more independently.

Most of the children at Whoopsadaisy are affected by cerebral palsy. If a baby's brain is starved of oxygen during or prior to birth, the resulting brain damage can lead to motor impairment. This affects children's posture, co-ordination, balance and mobility, and the situation is often complicated by additional problems such as speech, communication and learning difficulties.

Babies and young children attend Whoopsadaisy under-fives' sessions once or twice a week throughout the academic year, accompanied by a parent or carer. This enables the adults to acquire new skills and form supportive friendships. Programmes are individually tailored to each child and can be repeated to help the child at home, thereby increasing the benefits of each session through repetition. It is crucial that the progress the children make is not lost once they start school, so for 5 to 12-year-olds we run 'Saturday School' sessions and Holiday Clubs, which also enable parents to take a break.

#### **Volunteers**

Volunteers make an important contribution to our work, helping during the week-day and Saturday sessions, and at our Holiday Clubs. They also help at social and fundraising events. All volunteers are DBS (Disclosure and Barring Service) checked and receive training relevant to their role. We remain deeply indebted to all our volunteers. Whoopsadaisy benefitted from an estimated 2,200 hours of voluntary support during 2016.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

#### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Achievements this year

At the start of 2016 we were working with 23 pre-school children every week, of whom seven attended twice a week, 14 once a week, and two once a month. By the end of the year this had increased to 27 children, of whom five were attending twice a week, 18 once a week and four once a month.

We ran two Saturday sessions every week during term time. Fifteen children were registered for 'Saturday School', with four children attending each session. There were 20 children registered for our Easter and summer Holiday clubs, with six children attending each day.

Credit needs to be paid to all our dedicated staff and volunteers who have continued to maintain a consistently high standard of service throughout the year. In 2016 the Whoopsadaisy team consisted of two qualified Conductors (one part-time Head of Conductive Education and one full-time Conductor), a part-time Assistant Conductor (from June 2016) and three other part-time staff (two administrators and one freelance grants fundraiser) together with one part-time volunteer finance officer and our team of volunteers helping in Whoopsadaisy sessions and at holiday clubs. A freelance Conductor from Hungary came to help deliver our holiday clubs at Easter and in the summer.

Employing an Assistant Conductor has enabled us to help more children and improve our services. We continue to receive positive feedback from parents and carers, for example:

"Huge thanks to everyone! Asher had such a brilliant time this week. He loved attending summer Holiday Club and we are massively grateful to you all for your hard work and positivity"

"Our son is learning to walk, to talk, to 'mark-make', to stand, to step, to kneel up, to crouch down, to sing, to climb, to explore, to use the toilet, to bake a pat-a-cake, to shake, to return things, to listen, to laugh and to have fun!"

"It's helped us as a family to have support and help so close by in our neighbourhood and meet people in the same situation as ourselves. Whoopsadaisy has helped our son develop further along his path with support and assistance. It has filled a gap between what the NHS can provide and our support at home. He is making wonderful friends and loves every minute of it at Whoopsadaisy."

"While Lola and Mummy are at Saturday school, Daddy gets a lie-in, the importance of which cannot be underestimated. Lola is becoming more independent from Mummy. She gets exercise that is different to what she has at school, and gets to meet other friends."

"It is extremely reassuring and satisfying to know that our son has weekly access to such a great positive experience."

"We don't know where we would be without Whoopsadaisy. Ernie has developed so much since he started coming to your groups, there are no words to express how much we appreciate the help we get from the teachers. With the improvement we have already seen, we can't wait for next year to see how much Ernie can move forward and become a more independent, happier little boy. All we can say is thank you from the bottom of our hearts."

"Our son's progress is brilliant, and the mobility he has achieved means we no longer have to carry him everywhere. It has been amazing to see him progressing to the tripod sticks via the walker. He is so close to independent steps. Without a doubt, he would not have the level of independence he has if he didn't come to Whoopsadaisy."

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Principal funding sources

Our commitment to maintaining the level and quality of our services to help the children at Whoopsadaisy must be matched by our fundraising endeavours. It cost £144,411 to run Whoopsadaisy in 2016 and we are very grateful to all the local individuals, groups and companies who helped us raise essential funds during the year.

We are also very grateful to a wide range of charitable trusts, foundations and grant-makers for their support. We were thrilled to be awarded a two-year grant from Global's Make Some Noise appeal, which brought valuable publicity for Whoopsadaisy as well as funds to help run our Under-fives groups. Ongoing grants from BBC Children in Need and the Barbara Ward Children's Foundation continue to make a major contribution. Other notable grants were received from the Henry Smith Charity, Wellesley Charitable Foundation, George John & Sheilah Livanos Charitable Trust, Brighton District Nursing Association Trust, John Horniman's Children's Trust, Kelsey Trust, Cheyne Charity, the Lord's Taverners, Santander Foundation and the Hilton Brighton Metropole (D M Thomas Foundation).

Whoopsadaisy trustees, volunteers, parents and friends led or participated in a number of successful initiatives and events including the Brighton Marathon and Brighton Race Day, both of which have raised over £10,000 annually in recent years. Our community fundraising continued to grow: one of the highlights was the significant amount raised by local running group, The Run Squad.

Whoopsadaisy's services are provided free to families, and we are grateful to the many parents who support us through fundraising and regular donations. A huge thank you to everyone who has contributed to Whoopsadaisy this year.

#### **Investment and Reserves policy**

The trustees consider that the unrestricted funds at the year end will be needed to cover the running expenses for the coming year and have designated them for this purpose.

The key focus of the trustees is to have adequate funding to safeguard its mainstream daily activities. The Charity has commitments to the children and parents, and to its staff, and it aims to have sufficient reserves to keep it running until the end of the next school year.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

Our priorities are to ensure that all the children who could benefit from Conductive Education at Whoopsadaisy know about us, to gradually increase the number of children we work with and to develop our services in response to the needs of children and families. Our long-term focus is on organisational sustainability. Our fundraising strategy reflects this and we will be looking particularly to increase corporate and community involvement in Whoopsadaisy.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The constitution was dated 23rd August 2000, the company was incorporated on 23 August 2000 and the liability of each member, in the case of the company being wound up, is limited to £10.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Understanding of cerebral palsy and other motor disorders, the Conductive Education method of teaching, children's therapy, along with business experience, are well represented within the Charity. In the event of particular skills being lost through retirement, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election to the Board of Trustees.

#### **Organisational Structure and Appointment of Trustees**

The directors of the Company are also the Charity's trustees for the purpose of charity law. Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association the trustees have control for the Charity and its property and funds. One third of the Trustees must retire at each AGM, the longest in office retiring first and the choice between any of equal service being made by drawing lots.

#### Induction and training of new trustees

The Company Secretary advises new trustees about their duties as trustees. Whenever possible they will work alongside the retiring trustee to experience the duties required and to become familiar with the range of work undertaken by the Charity.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'EFA, the and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Tangible fixed assets**

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.
