The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 December 2017.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

York City Church is a company limited by guarantee and not having any share capital, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 3rd November 2000 as amended by special resolution dated 11th January 2009. It is also a charity registered with the Charity Commission. The members of the charitable company gaurantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 to the assets of the company in the event of winding up during their period of membership and within one year of their ceasing to be a member.

The trustees meet regularly throughout the year and all the major decisions of the charity are made with them in consultation with the Church Elders. The trustees are also provided with a detailed monthly financial summary to facilitate the financial management of the charity. The day to day running of the charity is delegated to the Church Elders, one of whom currently works full time for the charity.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

New trustees are appointed from time to time at the discretion of the existing trustees, such that the number of trustees is not less than three. Potential new trustees are recommended by the Elders of the church and are appointed if considered suitable following interview by the existing trustees.

Induction and training of trustees

The induction process for trustees involves supplying them with copies of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, recent Accounts, Policies and Procedures documents and Minutes of Trustees' Meetings. New trustees are also provided with the latest guidance for trustees as published by the charities comission, and talked through the 'Hallmarks of an Effective Charity' document to ensure a thorough understanding of their responsibilities. When required, a training session is also set up with an experienced trustee from another charity with similar aims and objectives.

Major risks and management of those risks

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The principal objectives of the charity, as set out in its governing document, are:

- 1. To advance the Christian faith.
- 2. To proclaim and promote the Christian faith and worship of God.
- 3. To relieve people in need, hardship or distress.
- 4. To educate and assist young people through their leisure time activities, so as to develop their physical, mental, social and spiritual capabilities.

When planning activities for the year, the trustees and senior leaders of the church have considered the Charities Commission's guidance on public benefit. In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of the local community, through worship, prayer and furthering their understanding of the Bible. We put on outreach activities and encourage people to serve the local community, particularly those in need, hardship or distress. We also support other charities or activities outside of the local area whose aims are aligned with our own, in particular the advancement of the Christian faith and the relief of need, hardship or distress.

Achievements and performance

Throughout the year, the charity continued to operate and run a local church with weekly meetings on Sunday mornings and prayer meetings every other Sunday evening. The other main areas of progress and achievement in terms of the charity's objectives that continued thoughout the year was as follows:

- 1. To advance the Christian faith
- Continued support for Christ Central Churches, the church plant in Gothenburg and the training of 15 leaders and pastors in Zambia.
- Holding an equipping series covering the subjects of marriage, singleness and parenting for members of the
- 2. To proclaim and promote the Christian faith and worship of God
- Hosting a concert by the popular Christian musician, Lou Fellingham and Band in June, attended by 259 people, many from outside of the church.
- Free Christmas carol event at the Citadel, a family fun afternoon with a retelling of the Christmas story, carols and refreshments.
- · Baby blessing services to celebrate new life and help members share their faith with their friends and family
- Baptismal services for church members wanting to publicly affirm their commitment to God
- 3. To relieve people in need, hardship or distress
- The continuation of a Food bank centre to relieve local people in crisis, and 'City Chat', providing a community space which welcomes people who want a safe, positive and accepting place to come and meet with others.
- 'Give Days' in March and July, providing the opportunity for church members to meet the practical and emotional needs of individuals, families and communities. Activities included free family photo sessions, building a shed, decorating, provision of bunk beds, laying a carpet, providing hampers, entertaining residents at a local elderly persons home
- 3ft Foot Project, delivered the with the support of the City of York Council, to provide skills and training to members of the Syrian refugee community

- 4. To educate and assist young people, through their leisure time activities, so as to develop their physical, mental, social and spiritual capacities
- Continuation of the youth group for 11-18 year olds
- Running regular children's work activities for a variety of ages during the main Sunday meetings to provide age appropriate support and teaching

Public benefit

The trustees are grateful for the support from all the volunteers and are delighted with the overall outcome of the above in terms of meeting the charity's stated objectives. All the events and activities put on by the Church over the year under review have been open to all members of the public, free of charge. A large number of unpaid volunteers have given significant amounts of time, effort and money to ensure the smooth running of these events, all of which have provided significant public benefit in accordance with the charities aims and objectives.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

The Citadel

2017 was our second full year as owners of The Citadel, following its purchase in 2015, a year that has seen further growth in membership and activities. Particular highlights include:

- Significant increase in the use of the building by outside organisations for the benefit and wellbeing of the city, including by the City of York Council for full council meetings and Refugee Council drop-in service.
- Income from building hire increased by £7,300 from 2016 figure
- Investment in new tables, funded through increased hire revenue, to attract further hires going forward
- Investment in access control/door security measures at The Citadel to improve accessibility and enhance building security
- Making two existing members of staff permanent
- Repayment of a £15,000 member loan, originally received in connection with the purchase of The Citadel in 2015.

Financial review

The continuing generous support from the church members throughout the year along with careful financial management meant that the charity maintained a healthy financial status throughout. This resulted in a surplus of £33,347 in the year under review, which has increased the unrestricted reserves to £402,903.

There was no additional season of giving in 2017 for specific projects, and as a result the expenditure in the 'Nations' catregory was reduced from 2016. However, some of the surplus monies on hand from 2016 was used to repay part of the member loan.

Policy on reserves

The stated intention of the trustees continues to be to maintain unrestricted reserve funds which are the free reserves of the charity of at least the greater of £18,000 or one month's average gross running costs and two months mortgage payments. The reserves were maintained significantly above this level throughout the year in question. At the year end, there were free reserves of £61,924 before members loans had to be accounted for.

As the plans for the ongoing use of the building mature, there will be additional building related projects which will require capital investment over and above the routine running costs, and it is the intention of the trustees that this surplus will contribute towards such projects, along with ongoing repayment of the members' loans.

1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £10 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

The address of its registered office is: The Citadel Gillygate York North Yorkshire YO31 7EA

These financial statements were authorised for issue by the trustees on 17 September 2018.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

Basis of preparation

York City Church meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity. For this reason, the financial statements abve been prepated on a going concern basis.

The trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties relating to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2017

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Gift aid reclaimed is recognised against the donations to which it is related.

Gift aid

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the Statement of Financial Activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and trustees's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Taxation

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £250.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Borrowings

Interest-bearing borrowings are initially recorded at fair value, net of transaction costs. Interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost, with the difference between the proceeds, net of transaction costs, and the amount due on redemption being recognised as a charge to the Statement of Financial Activities over the periof of the relevant borrowing.

Concessionary loans with interest at below the prevailing market rate are initially recognised and measured at the amount received with the carrying amount adjusted in subsequent years to reflect repayments and accrued interest payable.

Interest expense is recognised on the basis of the effective interest method and is included in interest payable and similar charges.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the charity has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date.

Foreign exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance sheet date are reported at the rates of exchange prevailing at that date.

Fund structure

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside for specific purposes at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

Pensions and other post retirement obligations

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the statement of financial activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

Classification

The Charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

Recognition and measurement

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exeption of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.
