CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2007

The year ended 31 August 2007 was Richard Egarr's first as music director of the AAM. His performances won glowing praise from audiences and critics alike. The Pittsburgh Post-Gazette wrote, "with Richard Egarr's brilliance as its music director, this orchestra is playing better than ever".

During the year Egarr's first CD directing the orchestra, Handel Op 3 Concerti Grossi, was released "The Academy of Ancient Music is in world-beating form" wrote Gramophone Magazine in April 2007 The CD was subsequently awarded the Gramophone Award for baroque instrumental music

Our emeritus director Christopher Hogwood, who continues to have a close affiliation with the orchestra, presented concert performances of Amadigi, Re di Gaula in May 2007. This was the first of three Handel operas which he will direct leading up to Arianna, which will be performed on a major European tour marking the 250th anniversary of Handel's death in 2009.

The orchestra also worked during the year with Paul Goodwin, our associate director, and guest directors including Pavlo Beznosiuk, Giuliano Carmignola, Stephen Cleobury, Federico Guglielmo, Edward Higginbottom, Robert Hollingworth and Stephen Layton

Over the last year we were delighted to receive over £100,000 from individual supporters for the first time. In addition we received important grants from a number of trusts and foundations, and worked with corporate partners including Alix Partners, Cambridge University Press and XL Insurance. I would like to thank all our donors, without whom our work would not be able to continue. Notwithstanding this support, the AAM recorded a loss for the year of £39,694. Plans are being made not only to attract further members of the AAM Society but also to increase the number of engagements which make a positive contribution to our overhead.

During the year we welcomed John Grieves to the board. A development board, consisting of several trustees plus other committed supporters of the orchestra, was set up to assist with fundraising

In March 2007 Christopher Lawrence, who had managed the AAM for ten years, resigned in order to take up the position of bursar of Wolfson College, Cambridge I would like to thank him for his leadership during an important period of development for the orchestra. The board appointed Peter Ansell as the new chief executive. I am grateful to him and our small team in Cambridge for managing the orchestra so efficiently

With Richard Egarr now firmly established as our music director, with the orchestra playing as well as ever and with our management team making exciting plans for the 2008-9 season and beyond, I am confident that the future prospects for the orchestra are very bright

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 17th November 2000 (company no 4109942 and charity no 1085485) and governed by a memorandum and articles of association

Background

This is the seventh annual report for The Academy of Ancient Music ('the company'), which was incorporated in 2000. The company was formed to continue the work of the ensemble the Academy of Ancient Music ('AAM'), which was founded by Christopher Hogwood in 1973.

Organisational structure

The AAM is overseen by a board of trustees who meet at regular intervals to provide strategic direction and monitor and review the work of the orchestra. During the year the board met five times, once for an "awayday" at which longer term strategic issues were considered. Board meetings include members of staff as appropriate. The day-to-day running of the orchestra is carried out by the permanent staff of the organisation under the leadership of the chief executive, Peter Ansell, who regularly reports to the chairman and the board

Trustees

Trustees are elected by the members at the annual general meeting and casual vacancies may be filled by the existing trustees. During the year John Grieves was appointed to the board

There is a nominations committee, chaired by Adam Broadbent. This committee reviews the tenure of board members, the skills that are required on the board from time to time and the succession policy, and it makes recommendations to the board on possible future appointments.

The development board which met five times during the year is responsible for raising approximately £150,000 annually in contributed income. In addition to trustees the development board includes Matthew Ferrey, Madelaine Gunders, Elizabeth Hartley-Brewer, Annie Norton and Peter Thomson.

Risk management

The audit and risk assessment committee is chaired by John Everett. The whole board reviews financial performance and risks at each board meeting. They are satisfied that all major risks have been identified, that awareness of these risks is the most effective way of identifying them and that systems are in place to manage the charity's exposure

Staff

During the year Christopher Lawrence resigned The board appointed a new chief executive, Peter Ansell In addition to Peter Ansell there are three full-time staff positions orchestra manager (Karen Foster), marketing and development manager (Simon Fairclough) and administrator (Rosemary Taylor)

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charity objectives

The objects of the charity are to advance the education of the public in the art of baroque and early classical music and allied arts

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

In the 12 months September 2006 to August 2007, the AAM appointed Richard Egarr as the new Music Director and performed 54 concerts, of which 69% were in the United Kingdom and 31% were abroad, in Germany, Netherlands, Poland, Spain and the USA Among the UK concerts 13 were in London (including the Barbican, Wigmore Hall and St John's, Smith Square) and 11 were in Cambridge UK touring has been a strength of the AAM in recent years and in 2006-2007 the towns and cities the orchestra visited included Aldeburgh, Bristol, Canterbury, Chelmsford, Holyhead, Leicester, Oxford, Poole, Reading, Shrewsbury and Thaxted

Two concerts were broadcast by BBC Radio 3, and three CD recordings were made Handel's Organ Concertos Op 4 & Op 7 with Richard Egarr for Harmonia Mundi, and Handel's Te Deum de Dettingen, Zadok the Priest and Organ Concerto No 14 HWV296a with Stephen Layton and the Choir of Trinity College, Cambridge for Hyperion The AAM premiered one work - Winter Chorale by Adrian Williams, commissioned by I Fagiolini

As well as Richard Egarr (Music Director), Paul Goodwin (Associate Conductor) and Christopher Hogwood (Emeritus Director), the orchestra was directed/conducted by Pavlo Beznosiuk, Giuliano Carmignola, Stephen Cleobury, Federico Guglielmo, Edward Higginbottom, Robert Hollingworth, Stephen Layton and Jan Lukaszewski. Choirs with whom the AAM worked in the course of the year included I Fagiolini, King's College, Cambridge, New College, Oxford, Polish Chamber Choir and Polyphony

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The net loss for the year was £39,694

Total income was £811,490, comprising trading income of £662,705 (82%) and non-trading income of £148,785 (18%), almost exactly the same ratio as the previous year. The non-trading income included (i) grant income of £45,668 from various trusts and foundations, and (ii) private donations of £101,412 (including Gift Aid) from members of the AAM Society and other donors, a 31% increase on the total for individual donations the previous year. We are grateful for this financial support, without which the orchestra would have been unable to support its varied programme.

Reserves and investment policy

At the end of the year the company had reserves of £81,570. The reserves policy is to retain a level of funds in cash on deposit and to invest a proportion of reserves in bond and equity funds designed for charities, sufficient to provide security against the high degree of volatility in fee income

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

With Richard Egarr now firmly in place as Music Director, the AAM stands at an exciting point in its history. The 2007-08 season will see Richard Egarr continuing to stamp his artistic personality on the orchestra and his association with it will be strengthened through touring both in the UK and across the globe. The season includes a residency at Handel House in London. Plans include performances of works by Finzi and Britten as well as the usual baroque and classical repertoire. The orchestra will continue its strategy to perform to the highest standards at leading venues throughout the world. Having expanded its UK presence through establishing bases in London and Cambridge and extensive regional touring, the organisation continues to build up its foreign touring to its previous high levels. In 2007-08, the AAM performs in Cyprus, Germany, The Netherlands, Spain and the USA, as well as 40 concerts in the UK Guest directors in the season include Pavlo Beznosiuk, Giuliano Carmignola, Stephen Cleobury, Stephen Layton and Masaaki Suzuki In addition to its regular choral collaborators (King's College and Trinity College Cambridge, Holst Singers and Polyphony) the AAM will tour with the Choir of the AAM, newly auditioned by Richard Egarr.

A number of recordings - and associated concerts - are planned with Harmonia Mundi USA completing the Handel set of opus-numbered works. The first of these is the sonatas Op 1 & 2 and thereafter the Op 5 sonatas, both recordings of which are due for release in the 2007-08 season. The AAM directed by Richard Egarr will also record all six of JS Bach's Brandenburg Concertos for release in the 2008-09 season.

The season 2007-08 will continue to see the AAM perform the larger works of Handel, with performances of Messiah as well as the second of three Handel operas in concert, Flavio, Re de'Langobardi, leading up to the 250th anniversary of the composer's death in 2009. The AAM will also work with some of the world's best known vocal soloists such as Carolyn Sampson, Ian Bostridge and Sandrine Piau, reaffirming its position in the market as one of the world's greatest period instrument orchestras.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report, the Chairman's statement and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for that period

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2007

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 1985

Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

Grants, donations and gifts

These comprise amounts receivable during the period, provided that there are no donor imposed restrictions as to the timing of the related expenditure, in which case recognition is deferred until the precondition is met

Charitable trading activities

This relates to income receivable from concerts, recordings, CD sales and royalties in the year

Fundraising costs

Fundraising costs include the direct costs of fundraising and other related publicity costs

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are recorded at cost at the time of acquisition

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Office equipment - 25% straight line

Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. The Statement of Financial Activities includes a gain arising on revaluation

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

Investment income

Investment income is recognised in the accounts when it is received

Recording production costs

Recording production costs are carried forward as a prepayment at the lower of cost (net of donations) and estimated net realisable value, until the recording is released at which point the CDs become stock

Taxation

No provision has been made for corporation tax or deferred tax as the company is a registered charity and is therefore exempt

Foreign exchange

Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at year end exchange rates. Exchange differences are included in the Statement of Financial Activities.
