Strategic Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

The directors present their strategic report for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Principal activities and business review

The company is engaged under a 28 year contract, signed 29 March 2001 with the Council of the City of Manchester, for the provision of the design, construction and management services, including related financing arrangements, for serviced accommodation for magistrates' courts in Manchester, together with associated development and facilities and the provision of maintenance and operation of the same. Its registered number is 04164167. The company is a private company limited by shares.

The company commenced the full operation of the new magistrates' court buildings in May 2005 following the completion of construction and decant.

The directors consider the performance of the company during the year and the financial position at the end of the year to be in line with the long term expectations of the project, and its prospects for the future to be satisfactory.

The profit for the year under review as set out in the statement of comprehensive income relates to the activities undertaken in respect of the project.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The company has taken on the activity, as detailed above, and is risk averse in its trading relationships with its customer, funders and sub-contractors as determined by the terms of their respective detailed PFI contracts. In extreme circumstances, the company could be exposed to subcontractor failure to perform their obligations. The Board monitors the financial stability of its subcontractor and has contingency plans in place to ensure the continuity of service provision to its client, should the subcontractor become unable to perform its obligations. The financial risks and the measures taken to mitigate them are as detailed in the Directors' report.

Key performance indicators (KPIs)

The company's operations are managed under the supervision of its shareholders and funders and are largely determined by the detailed terms of the PFI contract which stipulates key performance criteria on operational activities, including performance and availability, which are managed by a subcontractor. The Board monitor these on a regular basis. For this reason, the company's directors believe that further key performance indicators for the company are not necessary or appropriate for an understanding of the performance or position of the business. In addition the directors monitor compliance with debt covenant ratios as specified in the senior loan agreement and no non-compliance has been noted.

Strategic Report for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Section 172 statement

The following disclosure describes how the Board regards the matters set out in section 172 (1) (a) to (f) and forms the directors' statement required under section 414CZA of the Companies Act 2006.

The purpose of the company is to design, build, finance and operate the Manchester Magistrates Court over a concession period of 28 years under an agreement with our client, Her Majesty's Courts and Tribunals Service. The company's aim is to work in partnership with our client to provide suitable accommodation and maintain that accommodation to meet relevant legislation and agreed service levels. This shapes the company's values and objectives and defines long term success. Decisions are taken in the context of working in partnership with the client and other stakeholder groups. The company has long term funding in place, as described in the Report of the Directors. A set of contracts set out the relationships with the client, debt funders, maintenance and operations contractors. These parties are the company's main stakeholders. The company also works with community groups to enable both their support for the client and the full use of the accommodation asset. The environmental impact of the accommodation is considered to support statutory and other reporting. Where changes to the accommodation impact the community, these are considered with the client. Debt funders are provided with operational and financial performance reports on a quarterly basis

The operational management team work closely with the client and the maintenance and operations contractor, in order to programme lifecycle and major maintenance works to minimise disruption. The client receives regular updates on programmed works and access requests to enable those works.

The company does not have any employees but works with the maintenance and operations contractors to ensure that health and safety reporting is transparent, and the contractors provide a suitably skilled and sustainable workforce.

The Board of Directors is an experienced team which is appointed by the shareholders to represent their interests and ensure their instructions are considered and implemented for the long-term success of the company. The board members have experience of working with the other key stakeholders, which assists them in identifying and considering the long-term consequences of principal decisions. The board meet on a six monthly basis and reports are provided at these meetings by the operational and financial management teams. These reports will have regard to health and safety matters, the operational and financial performance of the project, planned lifecycle and major maintenance work and relationships with the client, and the main subcontractor. The operational and financial management team make recommendations to the board of directors. These recommendations and reports are considered at the board meetings and actions arising are monitored. Decisions made by the directors that have a financial impact are accounted for in a concession length forecast of financial performance.

Principal decisions of the company are those that are key to the company's success, these include but are not limited to: decisions impacting the relationships between the parties, decisions impacting the availability and safety of the accommodation, and decisions impacting the return to the shareholders.

The principal decisions made by the Board of Directors during the year ended 31 March 2023 were:

- o Lifecycle and major maintenance expenditure
- o Re configuration of courtrooms for high profile hearing
- o Payment of dividends

Life cycle and major maintenance expenditure is planned following asset condition surveys to maintain the accommodation at the required statutory and contractual standards. It is also to ensure the asset will meet the required contractual standards at the end of the concession. The delivery of these works is carefully planned with the maintenance and operations contractors and client, to ensure minimum disruption to the users of the accommodation and the safety of the contractor's employees. In agreeing to the extension of the operation and maintenance contract, the Board had regard to the excellent relationship between the contractor, the company and the client. The contractor's performance to date has been considered and it was noted the contractors record and focus on health and safety met expectations

The above decisions ensured the relationships between the parties that work together in partnership continue and the accommodation is maintained with minimum disruption to users. The safety performance of the accommodation is maintained both in terms of users and the health and safety of the contractor's staff. These decisions ensure the long-term success of the project, which protects shareholder returns.

Dividends are declared only after having had regard to the company's ability to meet its debt payments and covenant ratios both now and in the future. This ensures the stability of the company to allow it to continue providing the accommodation to its client, for use by the public.

The directors present their report with the audited financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 March 2023.

Dividends

The profit for the financial year amounted to £1,032,538 (2022: loss (£65,539)). Net assets at year end were £3,932,374 (2022: £3,205,836).

Dividends of £306,000, £102.00 per share (2022: £523,336, £174.45 per share) have been paid during the year. No final dividends are proposed at the year end (2022: £nil).

Future developments

No significant changes are expected to the company's activities in the foreseeable future.

Director's liabilities

The company has purchased and maintained Directors' and Officers' liability insurance in respect of itself and its Directors. The indemnity was in force throughout the tenure of each Director during the last financial year, and is currently in force. This is a qualifying third-party indemnity as defined by Section 234 of the Companies Act 2006.

Report of the Directors for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

Going concern

The directors are of the opinion that the company has adequate resources to continue in operation for the foreseeable future and accordingly the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Financial risk management

The company has exposures to a variety of financial risks which are managed with the purpose of minimising any potential adverse effect on the company's performance, these are summarised below. The company also reviews the performance of the subcontractors on a monthly basis and takes action if the performance levels fall below the required standard.

Interest rate risk

The company is exposed to interest rate risk on the mezzanine loan and to RPI risk on the senior bond. The RPI risk is largely mitigated as it is a natural hedge of the RPI indexation on income. The mezzanine debt interest was linked to LIBOR rates, plus a margin, as set out in note 12.

As described in note 2, the Company has negotiated consistent terms, rates and transition dates, with the respective counterparties. The transition to SONIA plus CAS completed on 29 March 2022 for the LIBOR linked debt. There is no change to the entity's overall risk management strategy as a result of the benchmark rate replacement.

Inflation risk

The company's project revenue and most of its costs were linked to inflation at the inception of the project, resulting in the project being largely insensitive to movements in inflation.

Liquidity risk

The company adopts a prudent approach to liquidity management by endeavouring to maintain sufficient cash and liquid resources to meet its obligations as they fall due.

Credit risk

The company receives the bulk of its revenue from a government body and therefore is not exposed to significant credit risk. Cash investments are with institutions of a suitable credit quality and are regularly reviewed by the directors.

Major maintenance risk

The company is responsible for managing the ongoing major maintenance and replacement expenditure on the building fabric, plant and equipment. The company has passed operational responsibility of life expired service assets (furniture, fittings and equipment) to its operating sub-contractor, for which it pays a fixed fee within the sub-contractor's contractual remuneration. The company bears the risk associated with the capital replacement cost of other life expired building fabric, plant and equipment over the contract term.

Statement of directors' responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulation.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the directors have prepared the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards, comprising FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland", and applicable law). Under company law the directors must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the company and of the profit or loss of the company for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- state whether applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards, comprising FRS 102, have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The directors are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

Opinion

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

1. General information

The company is engaged under a 28 year contract, signed 29 March 2001 with the Council of the City of Manchester, for the provision of the design, construction and management services, including related financing arrangements, for serviced accommodation for magistrates' courts in Manchester, together with associated development and facilities and the provision of maintenance and operation of the same. Its registered number is 04164167.

2. Accounting policies

Basis of preparing the financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis and under the historical cost convention. These accounting policies have been applied consistently, other than where new policies have been adopted. In assessing the company's ability to continue as a going concern the directors have considered the impact of Covid-19, as described in the Report of the Directors.

Interest rate benchmark rate replacement

SONIA (Sterling Overnight Index Average) has replaced GBP LIBOR, with effect from 1 January 2022. GBP LIBOR is a 'term rate', which means that it is published for a borrowing period (such as 1-, 3-, and 6-months) and is 'forward looking', because it is published at the beginning of the borrowing period. SONIA is a 'backward-looking' rate, based on a compound rate from observed overnight rates.

Furthermore, GBP LIBOR includes a credit spread over the risk-free rate (RFR), which SONIA does not. To transition existing contracts and agreements that reference GBP LIBOR to SONIA, adjustments for term differences and credit differences a 'Credit Adjustment Spread' ('CAS') is applied to SONIA, to enable the two benchmark rates to be economically equivalent on transition. The CAS is agreed by the Lenders' Market Association ('LMA') and International Swaps and Derivative Association ('ISDA'). The CAS was published by Bloomberg, 5 March 2021, when the Financial Conduct Authority ('FCA') declared the cessation of GBP LIBOR, it is the 5-year historic median between GBP LIBOR and SONIA.

The FCA has confirmed it will allow the use of "Synthetic LIBOR" rates for all legacy contracts except cleared derivatives, to allow a wider time window for transitions to be completed. Synthetic LIBOR has however not been guaranteed beyond 31 December 2022. In addition, The Critical Benchmarks (References and Administrators' Liability) Act 2021 has been passed to amend the defined term of LIBOR to 'synthetic LIBOR', such that "LIBOR" references are by law "synthetic LIBOR".

The entity's LIBOR linked loan transitioned to SONIA on 31 January 2022 and has therefore not been subject to the application of Synthetic LIBOR.

The entity has floating rate debt which was subject to LIBOR, as disclosed in note 12. The transition to SONIA plus CAS completed on 29 March 2022 for the LIBOR linked debt.

There is no change to the entity's overall risk management strategy as a result of the benchmark rate replacement.

Financial Reporting Standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements to disclose related party transactions, for transactions with companies that are wholly owned within the same group; and
- certain financial instrument disclosures, provided such disclosures are included in the financial statements of a group that includes the company.

2. Accounting policies - continued

Turnover

Turnover represents the value of work done and services rendered, excluding sales related taxes. The company is engaged in only one class of business and operates solely within the UK.

The company recognises income when it has fully fulfilled its contractual obligations. In accordance with FRS 102 s23.3, the company includes sales and purchase transactions related to variations under the original contract where the benefits and risks are retained by the company, within the financial statements as turnover and operating costs.

Transactions to which the company does not have access to all the significant benefits and risks are excluded from the financial statements.

Accrued income relates to services in the year for which no sales invoice was raised until after year end.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date, where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax is measured at the average tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences are expected to reverse, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax is measured on a non-discounted basis.

Deferred tax assets are only recognised when it is considered more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of underlying timing differences can be deducted.

Dividend policy

Final dividends and other distributions to the company's shareholders are recognised as a liability in the financial statements in the period in which the dividends and other distributions are approved by the company's shareholders. Interim dividends are recognised when paid. These amounts are recognised in the statement of changes in equity.

Leased assets

Payments under operating leases are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Financial instruments

Measurement and recognition of financial instruments is in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 s11 and s12

Financial asset - contract debtor

In accordance with FRS 102 s34.12, the costs incurred in building the asset have been treated as a contract debtor, however, as the company entered into this concession prior to transition to FRS 102, under FRS 102 s35.10 (i), it is permitted to, and continues to account for the contract debtor using the same accounting policies being applied at the date of the transition.

The amounts receivable (which represents the cost of construction of related assets) are treated as a long-term contract debtor from the commencement of the operating contract, with a constant proportion of the planned net revenue arising from the project being allocated to remunerate the contract debtor. Imputed interest receivable is allocated to the contract debtor using a property specific rate to generate an index linked rate of return over the life of the contract. Over the course of the contract term the contract debtor is expected to be fully repaid.

Financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including trade and other payables, bank loans and loans from fellow group companies, are initially recognised at transaction price.

2. Accounting policies - continued

Trade payables are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade payables are recognised at transaction price.

Debt issue costs

Debt issue costs incurred have been offset against the related debt and will be charged to the profit and loss account at a constant rate on the carrying value of the debt.

Major maintenance replacement

As noted in the Report of the Directors, the Company is responsible for the major maintenance replacement activity associated with its principal activity, however the principal operating risk of this activity lies with a third party. Where appropriate, revenue is deferred to future periods, based on a forecast of the future major maintenance expenditure, in order to match that element of income with the costs to which it relates. The turnover and costs of sales are recorded, in the profit and loss account, in the period in which the costs of major maintenance replacement are incurred.

Restricted cash

Cash at bank and in hand includes restricted cash of £4,097,000 (2022: £2,892,000) relating to contractual requirement to set aside funds for future major maintenance obligations.

3. Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Judgements, estimates and associated assumptions are based upon historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances, the results of which form the basis of making judgements about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily available from other sources. Actual results may subsequently differ from these estimates.

The judgements, estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to the accounting estimates made are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised, if the revision affects both current and future periods.

Certain critical accounting judgements, adopted my management, in applying the company's accounting policies are described below:

Judgements

There are no critical accounting judgements adopted by management applicable to this company.

Estimates

Finance debtor

The company has elected to continue to apply its previous accounting treatment in respect of service concession arrangements entered into prior to the date of transition to FRS 102. This has resulted in the measurement of the finance debtor being different from that which would have resulted had the requirements of FRS 102 s34 been fully adopted. The accounting for service concession contracts and finance debtors requires estimation of service margins, finance debtor interest rates and associated amortisation profile which are based on the forecast results of the PFI contracts over the respective concession length. See note 10 for the carrying value of the finance debtor.

Taxation

The assessment of the tax charge may include uncertain tax positions where the tax treatment may not have been agreed with taxation authorities. Management make an estimate of the taxation charge for the period and the value of balances, with reference to legislation, discussion with taxation authorities, advice from taxation advisers, and the determination similar taxation cases.

Deferred tax is recognised at tax rates that are expected to be applicable when the timing differences reverse, to the extent that such rates have been substantially enacted. Given the phased reduction in future tax rates in the UK, the deferred tax asset or liability recognised is therefore dependent upon an estimate of the timing of such reversals.

4. Employees and directors

There were no employees and no staff costs for the year ended 31 March 2023 nor for the year ended 31 March 2022. The emoluments of the directors are paid by the controlling parties. The directors' services to this company and a number of fellow group companies are primarily of a non-executive nature and their emoluments are deemed to be wholly attributable to the controlling parties.

5. Operating profit

The audit fee in respect of the company was £14,009 (2022: £11,305) for the year. In addition, the company bore £2,212 (2022: £1,785) in respect of the audit fee for its immediate parent company during the year which was not recharged. There were no fees for non audit services during the year (2022 £nil).

The company has incurred significant expenditure in the construction of the magistrates' court on which it has claimed tax relief through capital allowances and claims for interest and loan related expenditure during the construction period. It has used these claims to offset its current liabilities and retains tax losses to offset liabilities in future years. As amounts are recovered to remunerate these costs they will be brought into current taxation in the period in which they are received. As a result of these claims there exist significant timing differences, which are expected to reverse over the contract period.

The current tax charge will continue to be affected by timing differences, although these timing differences will have an opposite impact on the deferred tax charge so there should be no overall impact on the tax charge.

Future tax rate reductions

The main rate of UK corporation tax for the year commencing 1 April 2022 was 19%.

On 14 October 2022, the Government confirmed that from 1 April 2023 the corporation tax rate will be increasing to 25%. Deferred tax in the accounts has been provided for at the increased rate of 25%.

The company has in issue £33,180,000 3.82% secured index linked bonds due 2027. Interest is payable on these bonds and indexation accumulates to the bond values at six-monthly intervals which commenced on 30 September 2002. Scheduled redemption by way of principal repayments commenced on 30 September 2004. These bonds were issued under a private placement.

The company has an additional mezzanine term loan facility of £1,300,000 granted by Société Générale, of which £438,274 had been drawn at 31 March 2023 (2022: £475,900). Scheduled interest payments and redemption by way of principal repayments commenced on 30 September 2004. Interest is charged at SONIA plus 4.5%.

Bond and loan issue costs have been offset against bond liabilities and are amortised over the term of the appropriate instrument in accordance with the provisions of FRS 102 s11.

The bond liabilities rank in seniority to the bank loan. The bond liabilities and bank loan are secured by a fixed charge over all leasehold interests, book debts, project accounts and intellectual property of the company and by a floating charge over the company's undertakings and assets.

The value of capital and interest elements of the index linked bonds is linked to movements in the Retail Price Index. The increase in capital value during the year of £1,743,044 (2022 £598,815) has been taken to the profit and loss account as part of the interest payable.

UK Court Services (Manchester) Holdings Limited holds £2,123,061 (2022: £2,123,061) of 13.5% coupon loan notes due 2028 in the company.

17. Commitments

Under the terms of an operating agreement dated 29 March 2003 between the company and G4S Facilities Management (UK) Limited (formerly G4S Integrated Services (UK) Limited), the company is committed to pay fixed and variable fees based on the availability of the courts. The contract also covers capital replacement of life expired service equipment over the contract term. Payments commenced in 2004 and are subject to market testing at fixed intervals during the contract term which runs until 2029. Charges in the year ended 2023 were £2,084,299 (2022: £2,609,059).
