2. Structure, governance and management Constitution

The Roald Dahl Museum and Story Centre is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital company number 4178505. It is also a registered charity governed by its memorandum and articles of association charity number 1085853. The charity has a trading company, The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Ltd, to deal with the non-primary purpose trading activities. It is a wholly owned subsidiary and the attached financial statements consolidate the results of the subsidiary.

Organisational structure

During 2009 to 2010 there were four formal trustee meetings. These are the main way in which the trustees direct and oversee the work of the charity. The meetings are always held on the same day as meetings of The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Ltd to ensure a holistic approach to monitoring the charity's work. The day-to-day running of the Museum is managed by the Museum director and the staff. They also formulate strategy and policy documents which are approved by the trustees.

Appointment and training of trustees

During the year the board has continued to assess the skills needed at board level

If any vacancies arise on the board, or there is a perceived need to add to the skills base of the board, then an exercise is undertaken to identify the key strengths required in a new director. New trustees are then appointed according to the identified selection criteria.

One third of trustees (those who are longest serving) retire at each AGM, but may be re-elected

Related parties

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS8 from disclosing transactions with its subsidiary as consolidated financial statements are prepared

In the current year the charity received a donation of £175,000 (2009 £151,500) from The Roald Dahl Charitable Trust of which Felicity Dahl is a trustee Felicity Dahl made no donations to the charity this year (2009 £9,028)

The charity leased offices to Dahl and Dahl Limited of which Felicity Dahl and Amanda Conquy are directors and Felicity Dahl has a beneficial interest. Rent (at a market rate) of £19,523 was received in the year (2009 £19,479)

Risk management

The trustees have taken care to address the main financial, operational and health and safety risks facing the charity. The risks facing the charity are now regular items on the agenda at trustees' meetings. We continue to review our risk register and risk assessments in order to manage these risks and have added new assessments as necessary. Where changes to procedure could be made to mitigate risks, these have been implemented.

3. Objectives and activities

Objects of the charity

The objects of the charity are to further the education of the public in the art of literature by the provision and maintenance of a museum and story centre based on the Roald Dahl Archive, his stories and his life. To achieve this, the charity has powers that include the following

- Organise, preserve and provide suitable accommodation for the literary archives of Roald Dahl and related items.
- Employ a writer and/or illustrator in residence,
- · Promote and carry out research,
- Provide advice, and
- Publish and distribute information

Our vision: To be an inspirational Museum that encourages children and adults to unlock their imaginations, engage with reading and have a go at creative writing

Our mission: To inspire in everyone a love of stories and creativity, particularly creative writing, using the Roald Dahl Archive, his stories and life

Our organisational values:

- We are an inspirational, developing, can-do organisation
- We are a hands-on interactive museum that works to engage visitors of all ages and backgrounds and are truly family friendly
- We challenge and exceed visitors' expectations
- We are a unique place that houses and cares for Roald Dahl's archive

The key objectives set out in the 2007 to 2010 Forward Plan are

- 1 Get the Museum on a stable financial footing
- 2 Continue to improve the visitor experience
- 3 Establish ourselves as a centre of Dahl excellence

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities

4. Achievement and performance

a. Development of the Museum venue

In the year ended 31 March 2010 we welcomed 55,383 (2009 49,627) visitors. During the year we were judged to have passed the Visitor Assured Quality Attraction Status awarded by Visit England for the second year running, and were awarded a Silver badge in the Green Tourism Business scheme. We also achieved the Learning Outside the Classroom badge. In February, we were successful in our application for full Museum Accreditation awarded by the Museums, Libraries and Archives Council (MLA).

We have continued to develop the Museum in order to enhance the visitor experience, constantly responding to visitor feedback and working to our strategic plan

Developments have included

- Carrying out an audit of the lighting in the galleries and replacing the bulbs with lower wattage bulbs and LEDs to reduce our electricity bill
- Installing infra-red sensors in the galleries to switch lights off at quiet times
- Further developing the website to include video content, including a specially commissioned video of what you can do at the Museum
- Achieving a 233% rise in unique visitors to the website
- Undertaking visitor analysis and using this to target marketing
- Creating a countryside activity trail for visitors, available in leaflet form and on our website
- Creating an activity pack for visually impaired visitors and beginning the process of producing Braille signage for the whole Museum
- Replacing worn-out touch-screen monitors and updating the galleries
- Hosting the press junket for the very high profile launch of Wes Anderson's film version of Fantastic Mr Fox.
- Displaying two film sets from Fantastic Mr Fox film at the museum
- Running a project with The Reading Agency and Sophie Dahl, bringing celebrity reading role models to library-based teenage reading groups
- Holding storytelling and craft sessions in children's hospitals and wards

Positive feedback is running at around 98% Feedback, both positive and very occasionally negative, is taken very seriously and visitor suggestions are implemented where possible and practical

b. Learning / education work

During 2009 to 2010, the main achievements in this area have been as follows

- Schools and education visits For the year ended 31 March 2010 we welcomed 10,571 school
 visitors to the Museum, an increase of 504 visits on the previous year. We have also hosted visits
 from
 - Students from French schools
 - Children's Literature students from Georgia University
 - o Students from the University of Michigan
 - o Pupils at local schools studying Business studies and Travel and Tourism
 - Architecture students
 - Children from the Australian Outback (later featured on Newsround)
 - Elder Hostel

In addition, we hosted two Post Graduate Certificate of Education students as part of their alternative teaching experience in association with the Pilgrim Partnership

Workshops and events As well as running our excellent and varied programme of in-house and freelancer-led workshops, encompassing everything from cookery and science experiments to puppetry and poetry and writers' workshops including authors such as Guy Bass and James Carter

- Disseminating good practice Throughout the year we have had visits from other museums and archives as well as those interested in developing new museums. We were filmed by Tourism South East for a training video about accessibility. The Museum director and Finance manager undertook consultancy work for the Story Museum in Oxford.
- Residencies We used the funding from the Roald Dahl Charitable Trust to recruit a Storyteller in
 residence, Sarah Mooney During the year she worked with schools selected by Buckinghamshire
 Schools Improvement Service, spent two mornings at Aylesbury Young Offenders Institute working
 with young dads on storytelling skills to share with their children and worked with children
 attending a play scheme at a women's refuge in Aylesbury

In addition, she ran a five day animation workshop in the summer holidays and storytelling sessions for families. The Museum hosted 'Bringing the book to life' sessions, lead by Sarah, aimed at giving adults the confidence to enjoy sharing stories with their children and worked with teachers at Buckinghamshire's Literacy Coordinators' Conference

Our Visitor Services Supervisor undertook a residency at the Misbourne school and an exhibition of the work produced by students under her tutelage was held at the Museum as part of Village Visit Day (where local residents are invited to visit the Museum for free)

- External events We have participated in many external arts events and festivals, including the Wychwood Music Festival, the Althorp Literary Festival, Aylesbury Roald Dahl Festival, the Larmer Tree Festival, MAD about Waddesdon, Marylebone Station Travel Fair and have also delivered storytelling at Bicester Village
- Participation in national events We ran successful events for a number of national initiatives
 including The Big Draw and World Book Day

• **Roald Dahl Day** (13 September 2009) The fourth annual Roald Dahl Day was based on *Fantastic Mr Fox* in celebration of Wes Anderson's film version of the book. As well as actors playing the farmers, there were fox themed activities, workshops and games

c. Fundraising

We received a donation of £175,000 from The Roald Dahl Charitable Trust ("RDCT"), charity number 1119330

This donation enables us to deliver our charitable aims, through the core work of the Museum as well as through funding our projects. The RDCT funding enables us to inspire our visitors to read for pleasure and develop their creative writing skills, thereby contributing to the cultural and educational health of our society, as well as helping us to reach out to non-Museum visitors, whether they are in hospitals, prisons or are simply those who might not consider visiting a museum

5. Financial review

We are very pleased to report that the number of general visitors to the Museum increased this year, which meant that admission income was 18% higher than the previous year. Demand from schools for visits is high and extra sessions have been scheduled to meet the demand. Income from school visits has therefore increased to £35,302 (2009 £31,060). However, income from cash reserves was reduced due to lower interest rates in the banking market. This year, some storytelling events have been performed at commercial venues and the income is included within Education income. Costs continued to be reviewed for savings. Low energy lighting and infra red sensors have been installed and from the beginning of the year later opening hours were introduced at the weekends in order to reduce staff costs. A one-off refund of £17,000 with regard to energy supplies helped reduce premises costs. At the end of the year, a donation was received which was allocated to cover expenditure in the next year, so £109,500 (2009 £85,500) was put into a designated reserve. A consolidated surplus of £30,796 was added to the general fund. Total income of £664,692 (2009 £603,156) was received and total expenditure amounted to £736,794 (2009 £717,969).

The charity's wholly owned subsidiary, The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Ltd, operates a shop within the Museum and a website to sell Roald Dahl related goods on-line. It also provides a café which is managed by a catering contractor. The shop performed well, increasing overall sales by 15%. This included internet sales which amounted to £26,797 (2009 £18,447), while margins improved slightly from 54% to 55%. The subsidiary's taxable profits are gifted to the charity and £21,604 was donated this year. The profits generated help the charity meet its objectives.

Reserves policy

Reserves are required to fund the operations of the Museum in the event of a temporary but significant drop in income, whether due to variations in donor funding or a damaging event. The trustees believe that the level of reserves should at least cover the equivalent of six months of operating costs. For the coming year, operating costs are budgeted to be £602,000 so a reserve of approximately £301,000 is required. The balance of the general fund at the end of the year amounts to approximately £341,000. However, the Museum will require further funds for renewal of exhibits and repairs to the premises and facilities and it is therefore intended to keep the reserves at a higher level for this purpose

The total group funds at the end of the financial year were £4.63 million of which £341,025 represented the general fund available to the group. These figures include the results of the trading subsidiary (The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Ltd) which is responsible for the shop and the café.

Investment powers

The trustees have the power to make any investment they see fit, but only after obtaining advice from a financial expert and having regard to the suitability of investments and the need for diversification

Going concern

The charity's forecasts show that it is well able to meet its financial obligations. Included in the forecast for the coming year is donation income of £109,500 which has already been received and ring fenced in a designated fund. The charity holds reserves in excess of six month's budgeted operating costs, in the form of available cash funds, in order to mitigate the effects of any potential damaging event or significant drop in income. The trustees have reasonable expectations that the charity will continue to operate for the foreseeable future and have therefore adopted the going concern basis of accounting

6. Plans for future periods

The priorities for the remainder of 2010 are set out in 3 above. In addition, we intend to agree the Forward plan for 2010 to 2013, with the following objectives

- Increase the appeal and freshness of the Museum through planned and appropriate development work
- Consolidate and maintain the excellent reputation of the Museum
- Establish an appropriate fundraising strategy for the Museum
- Develop the outreach and education programme
- Generate and investigate new opportunities to increase revenue from non-visitors

7. Statement of directors' responsibilities

The directors (who are also trustees of The Roald Dahl Museum and Story Centre for the purposes of charity law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Directors and the financial statements in

accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company and charity law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the group, and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company and the group for that year. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to

Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 31 March 2010

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, *Accounting and Reporting by Charities* (SORP 2005), issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements comprise those of the charity and its wholly–owned subsidiary undertaking, The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Limited — The results of the subsidiary are consolidated on a line-by-line basis

Incoming resources

Donations

Income from donations is included in incoming resources when it is receivable, except as follows

When donors specify that donations given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods

When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met

When donors specify that donations are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to preconditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in incoming resources of restricted funds when receivable

Grants

Grant income is not recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities until the conditions for its receipt have been met and there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received

Investment income

Investment income is included when receivable by the charity

Admissions, courses and events

Income is deferred when admission or event fees are received in advance of the date or event to which they relate and are included in creditors

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis

Expenditure which is directly attributable to specific activities is included in the appropriate cost categories. Where expenditure is attributable to more than one activity it is apportioned across cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Costs of generating funds comprise fundraising expenditure and, in the consolidated financial statements, the expenditure incurred by The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Limited

Charitable activities expenditure includes services identifiable as wholly or mainly in the support of the charity's objectives and are the costs of operating the museum, providing educational services and maintaining the archive

Governance costs are those costs relating to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing £100 or more are capitalised at cost and depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows

Freehold buildings	1%
Galleries	10%
Software, furniture, fixtures and equipment	20-33%
Shop and café fittings	10%

Tangible fixed assets are not depreciated until they are brought into use

Heritage asset- inalienable

The heritage asset represents the archive of Roald Dahl works. The charity is preserving the archive in the Museum, is referencing compilations and producing databases of the archive, and using the archive to educate the public and promote/inspire a love of creative writing. The archive cannot be disposed of by trustees and is therefore considered to be an inalienable asset. The asset is deemed to have an indefinitely useful life and therefore depreciation is deemed to be immaterial.

Stock

Stock is stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either

- Unrestricted general funds these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees
- Designated funds these are funds set aside by the trustees out of unrestricted general funds for specific future purposes or projects and for fixed assets which cannot be disposed of
- Restricted income funds these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes
 within the objects of the charity Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are
 raised for particular restricted purposes
- Restricted endowment fund these funds represent the permanent endowment of the archive and land donated to the charity and cannot be disposed of

Pension contributions

The company makes employer's contributions to defined contribution pension schemes, the assets of which are held separately from those of the charity, and are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable

Cash flow statement

The charitable company and group have taken advantage of the exemptions available and not produced a cash flow statement on the grounds of their size

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding-up is limited to £1. The number of members (who are also the Trustees) at 31 March 2010 is 7 (2009. 7).

12 Investment in subsidiary

The charity has a wholly owned subsidiary company, The Roald Dahl Centre (Trading) Limited, registered in England The subsidiary is used for non-primary purpose trading activities. Its activities for the year ended 31 March 2010 have been consolidated on a line-by-line basis. Its turnover for the year was £207,335 (2009 £181,159) and, after gift aid, its retained loss was £162 (2009 loss of £1,405). The net assets at 31 March 2010 are £2,417 (2009 £2,579).

13 Pension contributions

The charity contributes to defined contribution pension schemes for its permanent staff. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the charity in independently administered funds set up by individual members of staff. Contributions to the schemes are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable and amounted to £14,561 (2009 £11,428). Employer contributions of £4,804 (2009 £4,180) were paid during the year. There were outstanding employer contributions at the year end of £27,998 (2009 £18,240) relating to employees who have not joined a scheme. From 1 April 2010, the charity became a member of the Flexible Retirement Plan, administered by The Pensions Trust, a not-for-profit organisation. This is a non-contributory defined contributions scheme, available to those employees who have yet to join a pension scheme.

14 Related party transactions

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in FRS8 from disclosing transactions with its subsidiary as consolidated financial statements are prepared

In the current year the charity received a donation of £175,000 (2009 £151,500) from The Roald Dahl Charitable Trust of which Felicity Dahl is a trustee Felicity Dahl made no donations to the charity this year (2009 £9,028)

The charity leased offices to Dahl and Dahl Limited of which Felicity Dahl and Amanda Conquy are directors and Felicity Dahl has a beneficial interest. Rent (at a market rate) of £19,523 was received in the year (2009 £19,479)

Endowment fund

This fund represents the permanent endowment of the archive (£300,000) and the land (£700,000) donated to the charity and cannot be disposed of

Designated funds

Fixed asset reserve

The charity has established a reserve to reflect the investment in the Museum's fixed assets. The expenditure for the year represents the depreciation of these assets and the transfer represents the funds set aside from the general fund to cover the costs of fixed asset additions.

Deferred income fund

Income has been designated from the current year's donations received and this will be allocated against the budgeted shortfall in income of the following year

Gallery fund

These are funds set aside for the purpose of maintaining the quality of the exhibits and the galleries and will be partially used for the redevelopment of the Solo gallery

16 Taxation

The Roald Dahl Museum and Story Centre is exempt from corporation tax as all its income is charitable and is applied for charitable purposes
