# Structure, governance and management

The charity is an incorporated charity governed by memorandum and articles of association.

The charity is constituted as a Company limited by guarantee

#### **Trustee selection methods**

- Not more than ten persons elected by and from the membership at the Annual General Meeting
- Not more than five persons, who must be members of the Company, co-opted by the Management Committee
- At every Annual General Meeting one third of the elected members of the Management Committee shall retire from office.
- The members to retire shall be those longest in office since their last election.
- A retiring member shall be eligible for re-election provided that no person shall serve for more than six consecutive years.
- Persons co-opted on the Board shall retire at the first Annual General Meeting following their appointment but shall be eligible for further co-option or election.

 Under no circumstances shall employees of the Company; persons aged under eighteen years; persons who are bankrupt; persons who have an unspent conviction involving dishonesty; or persons otherwise disqualified by law from serving as charity trustees, serve as Management Committee members.

# The charity's organisational structure and wider network within which the charity works

LASSN is represented on the steering group of the Volunteering and Asylum Project and on the Board of Directors of SOLACE Surviving Exile and Persecution.

### Relationship with related parties

Grants shown in the accounts are payments made from funds given to LASSN for the specific purpose of onward transmission to the recipients and are not grants in the generally accepted sense.

# Trustees' consideration of major risks and the system and procedures to manage them

The trustees identify the major risks to which the charity is exposed as circumstances arise, prepare and update a strategic plan, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity. The trustees then review any major risks which have been identified and establish systems to mitigate these risks.

The charity is dependent upon grants, gifts and donations and there is the risk that such items may not be received. There are particular risks of changes to government policy on asylum and immigration. In order to mitigate these risks, the Manager prepares funding applications and senior representatives of other key agencies are called upon to give reference on our viability and effectiveness.

There are risks associated with working with children and vulnerable adults and for volunteers working in the community and in asylum seekers' homes. To mitigate these risks, LASSN has policies on: Volunteer Guidelines; Health and Safety; Equal Opportunities; Child Protection; Disciplinary and Grievance Procedures for staff; appropriate insurance; training volunteers on personal safety; references for volunteers and regular supervision.

# **Objectives and activities**

#### Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

To relieve asylum seekers and refugees in the Leeds Metropolitan District who are in conditions of need, hardship and distress by reasons of their social and economic circumstances by such charitable means as the trustees shall determine including the advancement of education, relief of poverty and the preservation and protection of good health.

#### The objects of the charity are met through:

- One to one volunteer Befriending;
- English at Home tuition for those who can not access English classes;
- Organising community initiatives and supporting refugee community organisations through our Refugee Involvement Worker;
- Providing short-term emergency accommodation and evening meals by volunteer ShortStop hosts:
- Raising money for the Hardship Fund through donations for destitute asylum seekers;
- Giving formal talks;
- Contributing to training on asylum to agencies in Leeds and organising seminars;
- Training LASSN volunteers;

- A quarterly newsletter;
- Networking with refugee agencies, both locally and regionally.

## **Policy on grantmaking**

Money raised by LASSN for the hardship fund is given to:

- St Vincent Support Centre who has the responsibility for distributing funds to destitute individuals, couples and occasionally families
- Refugee Council, to pay for travel to Liverpool to make an application for asylum

# **Contribution made by Volunteers**

Volunteers are key to the success of the charity. LASSN and its clients have benefited from the commitment and effort of one hundred and thirty one volunteers in the last year.

LASSN has sixty one members including Person to Person Listening Service, Home-Start Leeds, Tandem, West Leeds Healthy Living Network, St. Vincent Support Centre, Leeds Bereavement Forum, Christ Church Upper Armley, Refugee Education and Training Advisory Service, Leeds Sudanese Community Association, East Leeds Health for All, Refugee Legal Centre, Northern Refugee Centre, St. George's Crypt, Positive Action for Refugees, St. Agnes United Church, Citizens Advice Bureau, Park Lane College, British Red Cross, St. Matthias Church Burley, Diocese of Leeds and Councillor Ralph Pryke.

#### Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

Leeds is a major dispersal city for asylum seekers and the rise in the numbers of people whose asylum claim has been refused has lead to many hundreds of people living in the city without any means of statutory support. They face either destitution here or returning to their home country which they fled from danger and persecution. As a local charity, LASSN has played a vital role in providing social support to isolated and struggling asylum seekers and an increasing role in providing practical support to destitute asylum seekers. Many failed asylum seekers are prevented by law from accessing public resources and it is left up to charities and faith communities to provide the care for this highly vulnerable group.

LASSN's work is highly valued and respected within the city by refugee agencies, refugee communities and statutory bodies. The charity continues to have a good reputation and support within the local community. Work with asylum seekers suffering from hardship and destitution are LASSN's priorities, however, support for people who have gained refugee status continues. The charity continues to be an essential service that Social Services, NHS, Education and refugee agencies refer to and benefit from its services.

- With the appointment of a second staff member for the Befriending project, the number of asylum seekers and refugees befriended increased by 75% to one hundred and five last year.
- Fifty four asylum seekers and refugees received tuition, many of whom are illiterate in their native language.
- Sixteen refugee community organisations have been assisted through the Leeds Refugee Forum, the collective voice of refugees and refugee organisations in Leeds.
- Twenty eight refugees and asylum seekers benefited from the Counselling service using interpreters.
- Fourteen seminars and training sessions on asylum issues were delivered.
- Over five hundred enquiries for advice and information were received.
- Circulation of the quarterly Newsletter has increased to five hundred individuals and organisations.
- One hundred and sixteen destitute asylum seekers benefited from the ShortStop project.
- One hundred and forty one received Hardship Fund payments for subsistence and travel to Immigration offices.
- LASSN continued to work in partnership with St. Vincent's Support Centre, St. George's Crypt,
  PAFRAS, No Fixed Abode team, the Refugee Council, Assisi House Project and NHS Health Access
  Team, by facilitating the Leeds Destitution and Asylum Steering group and meeting with and
  informing local MP's.

#### **Financial review**

# Statement of the charity's policy on reserves

The trustees have resolved to establish reserves of £40,000 within two years, to provide for future activities which would enable LASSN to meet its financial commitments for three months.

## Principal sources of funds that supported the key objectives of the charity

- Funding from the Big Lottery was secured for three years from 1 April 2006 for Befriending, half
  of English at Home and associated core costs. This represents about one third of LASSN's
  running costs.

- Allen Lane Foundation newsletter;
- Community Chest refugee involvement;
- Network for Social Change training;
- Church Urban Fund Befriending project

#### 1. Accounting policies

## Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective June 2002, and all other applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, effective April 2005. The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Charities Act and the Companies Act.

Advantage has been taken of paragraph 3(3) of Schedule 4 of the Companies Act 1985 to allow the format of the financial statements to be adapted to reflect the special nature of the company's operation.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement.

The charity is entirely dependent on continuing grant aid and as a consequence the going concern basis is also dependent on the continuing grant aid.

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention. These financial statements are for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March 2006. The comparative figures are for the year ended 31<sup>st</sup> March 2005.

## **Incoming Resources**

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis deferred as described below where appropriate.

#### Investment Income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on a receivable basis.

# **Deferred Income**

In accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales grants received in advance and specified by the donor as relating to specific accounting periods or alternatively which are subject to conditions which are still to be met are deferred on an accruals basis to the period to which they relate. Such deferrals are shown in the notes to the accounts and the sums involved are shown as creditors on the accounts.

#### Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles, modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales.

#### Charitable expenditure

Charitable expenditure includes all expenditure directly related to the objects of the charity and comprises the following:-

Activities in furtherance of the charity's objectives

The costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objectives represents the cost of goods and services and ancillary trading costs that have been incurred in charitable activities.

Support costs of activities

Support costs of activities for charitable purposes include a part of the salary costs of the Manager and the Administrator as they are involved with project development and other project costs. There are a number of costs, including staffing costs, where it is impracticable to allocate these costs between administration and charitable expenditure and the trustees have allocated such costs to management and administration costs.

Management and administration of the charity

Management and administration costs represent expenditure incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.

#### Allocation of costs within types of resources expended

The charity's operating costs include staff costs, rent and other related costs. Such costs are allocated between types of resources expended and between charitable expenditure and management and administration on the basis of estimates made by the directors.

Administration expenditure includes all expenditure not directly related to charitable activity. In respect of certain items of expenditure it is a matter of judgement as to whether such items are direct charitable expenditure or are administrative, and the directors have applied what they consider to be reasonable judgements in apportioning such costs.

#### Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Items of less than £100 are not capitalised.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets (less their expected residual value) over their estimated useful economic lives.

A regular annual review of the likelihood of asset impairment is undertaken.

Plant and machinery

25% straight line

#### Capital grants

The board of trustees consider that, in order to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales (effective April 2005), grants of a capital nature given for specific purposes and fully utilised in the furtherance of the objects of the charity should be credited to the fixed asset funds after the sums have been properly expended on the restricted purpose. The related asset is shown in the balance sheet at the cost of acquisition or subsequent revaluation.

The related assets are subject to restrictions by the grant making organisation on their use and disposal, and these restrictions are noted in the fixed asset section of these accounts. The fixed asset fund so created is treated as a restricted fund, but as the relevant asset is depreciated, then the funds represented by the reduction in the value of the asset are released to general funds. In this accounting period a sum of £1,738 (2005 - £1,738) has been transferred from restricted fixed asset funds to unrestricted revenue reserves in accordance with this policy.

Insofar as this policy relates to Government grants then this is a departure from the Statement of Standard Accounting Practice Number 4 in order to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales.

#### Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, as is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

#### Finance and operating leases

Rentals payable in respect of operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

#### Funds structure policy

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

There is no formal policy on the allocation of funds to designated funds.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds, other than that described under the Capital Grants policy above. Any proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

#### 2. Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
