Report of the Management Committee for the year ended 31 March 2008

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Leeds Asylum Seekers Support Network is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is governed by its memorandum and articles of association

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

Not more than ten persons elected by and from the membership at the Annual General Meeting, not more than five persons, who must be members of the Company, co-opted by the Management Committee

At every Annual General Meeting one third of the elected members of the Management Committee shall retire from office. The members to retire shall be those longest in office since their last election. A retiring member shall be eligible for re-election provided that no person shall serve for more than six consecutive years.

Persons co-opted on the Board shall retire at the first Annual General Meeting following their appointment but shall be eligible for further co-option or election

Under no circumstances shall employees of the Company, persons aged under eighteen years, persons who are bankrupt, persons who have an unspent conviction involving dishonesty, or persons otherwise disqualified by law from serving as charity trustees, serve as Management Committee members

Relationship with related parties

LASSN is represented on the Leeds multi-agency task group, Abigail Housing committee, RETAS and on the committee of Jantela a regional umbrella organisation for those working with asylum seekers and refugees. Hardship fund distribution is made through St. Vincent's support centre, the Refugee Council and PAFRAS with referrals to the fund coming from RETAS, Refugee Action, the Health Access Team, East Leeds Health for All, Refugee Council and PAFRAS

Risk review

The trustees identify the major risks to which the charity is exposed as circumstances arise, prepare and update a strategic plan, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity. The trustees then review any major risks which have been identified and establish systems to mitigate these risks.

The charity is dependent on grants, gifts and donations and there is the risk that such items may not be received. There are particular risks of changes to government policy on asylum and immigration. In order to mitigate these risks, the Manager prepares funding applications and senior representatives of other key agencies are called upon to give reference on our viability and effectiveness.

There are risks associated with working with children and vulnerable adults and for volunteers working in the community and in asylum seekers' homes. To mitigate these risks, LASSN has policies on. Volunteer Guidelines, Health and Safety, Equal Opportunities, Child Protection, Disciplinary and Grievance Procedures for staff, appropriate insurance, training volunteers on personal safety, references for volunteers, appropriate CRB checks and regular supervision.

Report of the Management Committee for the year ended 31 March 2008

Objectives and activities

Objects

To relieve asylum seekers and refugees in the Leeds Metropolitan District who are in conditions of need, hardship and distress by reasons of their social and economic circumstances by such charitable means as the trustees shall determine including the advancement of education, relief of poverty and the preservation and protection of good health

Activities

The objects of the charity are met through one to one volunteer Befriending, English at Home tuition for those who can not access English classes, organising community initiatives and supporting refugee community organisations, providing short-term emergency accommodation and evening meals by volunteer ShortStop hosts, raising a Hardship Fund through donations for destitute asytum seekers, giving formal talks, contributing to training on asylum to agencies in Leeds, organising seminars, training LASSN volunteers, a quarterly newsletter and networking with other refugee agencies

Use of volunteers

Volunteers are key to the success of the charity LASSN and its clients have benefited from the commitment and effort of 190 volunteers in the last year In 2007 LASSN had 58 members

Achievements and performance

The charity continues to have a good reputation and support within the local community. Work with asylum seekers suffering from hardship and destitution are LASSN's priorities, however, support for people who have gained refugee status continues. The charity continues to be an essential service that Social Services, NHS, Education and refugee agencies refer to and benefit from

- 394 destitute asylum seekers and refugees benefited from the ShortStop project
- 112 asylum seekers and refugees were befriended last year through the Befriending project
- 45 asylum seekers and refugees received tuition, many of whom are illiterate in their native language
- 24 refugee community organisations have been assisted through the Leeds Refugee Forum which is the key means by which this community is enabled a voice within the city of Leeds
- 132 asylum seekers and refugees received Hardship Fund payments for subsistence and travel to Immigration offices
- 16 seminars, talks and training sessions on asylum issues were delivered
- About 700 enquiries for advice and information were received
- Over 700 copies of the LASSN newsletters were circulated to individuals and organisations
- One Community Centre opened for refugee community organisations with 1,446 people using for meetings, workshops, socialising, events, elections and training in the first three months of 2008

LASSN continued to work in partnership with St Vincent's Support Centre, St George's Crypt, PAFRAS, RETAS, Solace, Leeds No Borders, the Refugee Council, Refugee Action, Health Access Team and other teams within the NHS

We have also continued to be active with our campaigning and awareness raising through talks, events and networking with other organisations. This year we were on the steering group of the Joseph Rowntree Charitable trust inquiry into destitution and had one of the commissioners to our AGM and conference. We have continued to chair the Destitution Steering Group and have been instrumental in bringing together agencies and individuals into the Leeds Asylum Campaign Alliance.

Financial review

Reserves policy

The trustees have resolved to aim to build up reserves over the next three years to reach an amount equivalent to three months running costs or the cost of closing down the organisation in an orderly manner. The target is to have £38,000 by 31 March 2009. The current level of reserves are £28,679.

Principal sources of funding

Funding from the Big Lottery was secured for three years from 1 April 2006 to pay for one third of the charity's running costs. Other grant giving bodies include. The Allen Lane Foundation, Capacity Builders, Church Urban Fund, Henry Smith Foundation, Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust, Lankelly Foundation, Lloyds TSB, Network for Social Change and the Sir Halley Stewart. Trust. The Hardship Fund and general reserves were raised through donations from over 114 individuals and groups.

Statement of Management Committee responsibilities

Company Law requires the Management Committee to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period In preparing the accounts the Management Committee are required to

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The Management Committee is responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Company status

The company is limited by guarantee and all members have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding-up. The number of guarantees at 31st March 2008 was 11

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2008

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. They have been applied consistently during the year, and in the preceding year.

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 1985 and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005), and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (ieffective January 2007)

b Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

c Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement
 of Financial activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a
 specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to
 the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The
 value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- · Incoming resources from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance

d Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis when a liability is incurred Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is included as part of the expenditure to which it relates

 Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2008 (continued)

 Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both the direct costs and support costs relating to such activities.

e Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remains with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due

f Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Individual fixed assets costing £100 or more are capitalised at cost.

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows
