

#### Leeds Asylum Seekers Support Network The Report of the Trustees

The trustees present their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31st March 2005

#### Name, registered office and constitution of the charity

The full name of the charity is Leeds Asylum Seekers' Support Network. The charity is also known as LASSN.

The company was incorporated on 5th June 2001 under the Companies Act 1985 with company number 04228876.

The registered charity number is 1092647.

The registered office is 233 - 237 Roundhay Road, Leeds, LS8 4HS

#### The objects of the charity and how it is attempting to achieve the objectives

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association. The directors of the company are also trustees of the charity.

The objects of the charity shall be to promote the benefit of asylum seekers and refugees in the Leeds Metropolitan District who are in need by virtue of their social circumstances, by raising awareness of issues surrounding asylum seekers and refugees. In particular but not exclusively through the provision of education and facilities for recreation or leisure time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life for said persons.

The restrictions in the charity's activities imposed by its memorandum and articles are that any ancillary activities should be restricted to those that support the furtherance of the above objects.

#### The charity's principal activities

The charity's principal activities are as set out below.

Raising awareness on issues relating to asylum seekers and refugees, particularly concerning destitution, by giving formal talks, contributing to training on asylum to agencies in Leeds, organising seminars, providing training to LASSN volunteers, producing a quarterly newsletter and being involved with refugee networks.

Assisting asylum seekers and refugees experiencing isolation and difficulties coping with UK way of life through one to one befriending scheme.

Offering English tuition at home to asylum seekers and refugees who cannot access English classes because of health problems, caring responsibilities or gender constraints.

Organising community initiatives which involve and benefit asylum seekers and refugees, as well as supporting emerging refugee community organisations.

Providing emergency accommodation to destitute asylum seekers through ShortStop, where hosts offer a bed and evening meal in their homes on a night-by-night basis.

Managing a Hardship Fund for payments to destitute asylum seekers.

## Objectives achieved in the year: a review of activities and significant changes, development and plans for the future

#### Introduction

The board of trustees are very satisfied with the increased performance of the charity during the year and consider that at 31 March 2005, although LASSN has strong support for its work within the local community, evidenced by the quality and availability of volunteers and financial support for its work with destitute asylum seekers in particular, the key role it plays in Leeds is uncertain as short term funding contracts come to an end and new funding contracts need to be renewed or established in order to continue with its activities.

The particular ways in which objectives have been achieved are described below.

#### Achievement of objectives and review of activities

Social Services, Housing, NHS, Education and Refugee Agencies have all made referrals for refugees and asylum seekers to benefit from LASSN's projects. 60 asylum seekers and refugees have been supported through the befriending scheme, enabling them to overcome isolation, build their confidence and become more self-reliant. Befriending volunteers and staff have responded to the increased demand placed upon them due to a wider range of needs arising from developments in asylum legislation and reduced level of support services available to asylum seekers.

67 asylum seekers and refugees have received English tuition at home enabling them to integrate more successfully within British society. All are unable to attend mainstream classes, most learners being women with young children and a few being men with health problems which prevent them attending mainstream classes. A number are illiterate in their native language. 13 have moved on to further learning opportunities.

The Refugee Involvement Worker has supported 28 refugee community organisations by helping to facilitate the Leeds Refugee Forum, given assistance with The Allotments Project and Home and Away women's group which between them benefited 50 individuals, facilitated social gatherings of refugees in the form of international cultural evenings attended by 305 refugees and UK citizens, and encouraged the development of cultural arts among interested individuals from asylum communities.

The Refugee Counsellor has counselled a further 12 clients with mental health and emotional difficulties as a result of persecution and exile who have needed an interpreter to access counselling support.

The Project Manager has given 11 talks on asylum issues to West Yorkshire Police, churches and the faith sector, and statutory sector. 4 training events have been delivered to Yorkshire and Humberside Consortium Regional Training events.

The Project Administrator received 600 enquiries seeking information and advice. The Quarterly newsletter has been expanded and increased circulation to 400 and is delivered to members, volunteers, refugee and statutory agencies, MPs and councillors focussing on the impact of asylum legislation on individuals within the Leeds district.

Leeds City Council benefited by commissioning the update of the directory of services in Leeds for refugees and asylum seekers for its own purposes.

The volunteer ShortStop Co-ordinator has facilitated the charitable accommodation of 150 destitute asylum seekers in the homes of ShortStop hosts. 142 people have received Hardship payments funded by donations.

LASSN is a lead agency in Leeds that is addressing the increased problem of destitution amongst asylum seekers. LASSN has addressed this by working in partnership with St. Vincent Support Centre, St. Georges Crypt and others. LASSN facilitates the Leeds Destitution and Asylum Steering Group to look at how to respond and raise awareness on issues of asylum and destitution in Leeds and liaises with local MP's and policy makers.

LASSN continues to be on the steering group of the Volunteering and Asylum project, a project that promotes good practice on running volunteering services for refugees and asylum seekers and involving refugees and asylum seekers as volunteers.

LASSN continues to play a leading role in establishing Solace, Surviving Exile and Persecution (formerly the Yorkshire and Humberside Refugee Support Centre), a regional service which will offer therapeutic counselling to refugees and asylum seekers who experience mental health problems as a result of persecution and exile.

#### Significant changes and developments, and plans for the future

On 6 July 2004, a meeting of LASSN trustees and staff met to review its work in the context of recent changes in legislation and the consequent changing needs of asylum

seekers. LASSN's objects were reaffirmed and a decision was made to prioritise LASSN's work with asylum seekers, to tackle issues of destitution and hardship amongst asylum seekers but also to continue to support people who have gained refugee status.

Grants from the Adult Community Learning Theme Chest and The Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust's West Yorkshire Racial Justice Programme have allowed the English at Home scheme to continue through to 31 March 2006.

The Counselling project has expanded to utilise the skills of 2 volunteer counsellors. Solace is due to take over full management of the project from LASSN in April 2006.

It is planned to employ a Short Stop Co-ordinator in Autumn 2005, funded by Lankelly Foundation. The purpose being to improve the project's management and expand the number of Short Stop hosts in order to increase the level of service to destitute asylum seekers.

HomeStart Leeds has agreed for one of their staff to be employed for 10 hours a week with LASSN to help with the befriending scheme.

#### Contributions from volunteers

LASSN and its clients have benefited from the commitment and efforts of 91 volunteer befrienders and tutors, 9 befriending supervisors and 38 ShortStop hosts. An unknown number of others have provided support through donations, fundraising and other means.

#### Details of intangible income

There were no employees seconded from other organisations and there are no donations in kind.

#### The method of electing trustees, organisation structures and how decisions are made

The organisation has a board of trustees, known as the management committee elected annually from members at its Annual General Meeting. The management committee is responsible for the development of the organisation, approving the budget and fundraising strategy, and for the policies and procedures of the organisation.

#### Relationship with other groups, charities and individuals

LASSN is represented on the steering group of the Volunteering and Asylum Project along with Tandem Communications and Research, the National Centre for Volunteering, the Home Office, the Refugee Council, The Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust, Kirklees

Refugees and Friends Together, Bradford Action for Refugees, Shipley and Baildon Volunteer Bureau, Barnado's Castle Project and Wakefield Asylum Support Team.

LASSN is on the Board of Directors of Solace along with NHS Health Access Team, LCC Refugee and Asylum Support Service, and various medical practitioners and therapists.

The Refugee Involvement Worker has links with St George's Crypt, Women's Health Matters, Refugee Action, Refugee Council, NHS Health Access Team, Refugee Education Training and Advice Service, refugee community organisations in Leeds, Yorkshire Sculpture Park, as well as a number of other community projects in Leeds.

The English at Home scheme has links with and receives referrals from all the main FE colleges providing English classes, asylum accommodation providers, health workers, LCC Refugee and Asylum Support Service, and Hillside Induction Centre.

The Befriending scheme receives referrals from asylum accommodation providers, health workers, Leeds Social Services, LCC Refugee and Asylum Support Service and Hillside Induction Centre.

Short Stop receives referrals in the main from Refugee Council, the NHS run Health Access Team and St George's Crypt

The Hardship Fund is promoted and raised by LASSN, administered by St Vincent's Support Centre, and referral agencies are Refugee Council, Refugee Action, RETAS, Health Access Team and Fast Leeds Health For All.

#### Details of related parties and transactions with related parties

There have been no transactions with related parties.

#### Transactions and financial position

The financial accounts are set out on pages 11 to 25. The financial statements have been prepared implementing the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued by the Charity Commission for England and Wales (effective October 2000) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002). The trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year has been satisfactory.

The Statement of Financial Activities show net incoming resources for the year of a revenue nature of £ 1593. (prior period – incoming resources of £ 5275.) and net realised incoming resources of a capital nature of £ nil (prior period – £ 2995.), making net overall realised incoming resources of £ 1593. (prior period incoming resources - £ 8270). The total reserves at the year end after depreciation of equipment & furniture charged to fixed assets funds stand at £20892. (prior period £20428.)

A majority of the expenditure is spent on supporting the activities of the charity.

#### Specific changes in fixed assets

Changes in fixed assets are shown in detail in the notes to the accounts.

#### Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations.

#### Policies on reserves, investment policies and investment performance

The trustees have resolved to establish reserves of £40,000 within 3 years, to provide for future activities which would enable LASSN to meet its financial commitments for 3 months. The policy on reserves is that the existing assets are retained to support existing activities. This policy is justified in that it is necessary to preserve income at the present levels in order to maintain the activities of the charity.

#### Share capital

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital.

#### Effectiveness of fundraising policies

The charity relies on grant aid from the donors identified in the accounts, whose support is greatly valued. Work to support destitute asylum seekers has been funded by donations.

#### The charity's grant making policies

This is not applicable to activities of the charity as no grants are made. The grants shown in the accounts are payments made from funds given to LASSN for the specific purpose of onward transmission to the recipients, and are not grants in the generally accepted sense. The payments to individuals are Hardship Fund distributions.

## The major risks to which the charity is exposed and reviews and systems to mitigate risks

The trustees identify the major risks to which the charity is exposed each financial year when preparing and updating a strategic plan, in particular those related to the operations

and finances of the charity. The trustees then review any major risks which have been identified, and establish systems to mitigate those risks. The charity is satisfied that the systems are in place to mitigate their exposure to the major risks which have been so identified and reviewed.

#### 1. Financial

The charity is open to the usual financial risks of any organisation, and the charity has introduced controls to minimise these risks. As the organisation is dependent on grants, gifts and donations, there is always the risk that such items may not be received. There are particular risks of changes of government policy to asylum and immigration.

The following procedures have been implemented to mitigate these risks:

The Project Manager prepares funding applications with the guidance of a Fundraising sub committee of Trustees. LASSN has a number of senior representatives of other key agencies that are called upon to give reference on our viability and effectiveness in the field.

#### 2. Other

Work with children and vulnerable adults are open to risks. There are also risks to volunteers working in the community and in asylum seekers' homes.

The following procedures have been implemented to mitigate these risks:

LASSN has adopted the following policies - Volunteer Guidelines, Health and Safety, Equal Opportunities, Child Protection, Disciplinary and Grievance Procedures for staff; having appropriate insurance; training to volunteers which includes issues on personal safety; taking up references on volunteers; and regular supervision of all volunteer befrienders and tutors.

#### Legal Status

The charity is an incorporated charity governed by memorandum and articles of association.

At the Annual General Meeting, three members shall retire from office. The members to retire shall be those longest in office since their last election. A retiring member shall be eligible for re-election provided no person shall serve for more than six consecutive years without a break of one year.

All directors are members of the company.

1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective June 2002, and all other applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, effective October 2000. The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Charities Act and the Companies Act.

Advantage has been taken of paragraph 3(3) of Schedule 4 of the Companies Act 1985 to allow the format of the financial statements to be adapted to reflect the special nature of the company's operation.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement.

The charity is entirely dependent on continuing grant aid and as a consequence the going concern basis is also dependent on the continuing grant aid.

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention. These financial statements are for the year ended 31st March 2005. The comparative figures are for a period of nine months to 31st March 200st.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis deferred as described below where appropriate.

Investment Income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on a receivable basis.

Deferred Income

In accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales grants received in advance and specified by the donor as relating to specific accounting periods or alternatively which are subject to conditions which are still to be met are deferred on an accruals basis to the period to which they relate. Such deferrals are shown in the notes to the accounts and the sums involved are shown as creditors on the accounts.

Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles, modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales.

#### Charitable expenditure

Charitable expenditure includes all expenditure directly related to the objects of the charity and comprises the following:-

Activities in furtherance of the charity's objectives

The costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objectives represents the cost of goods and services and ancillary trading costs that have been incurred in charitable activities.

Support costs of activities

Support costs of activities for charitable purposes include a part of the salary costs of the Manager and the Administrator as they are involved with project development and other project costs. There are a number of costs, including staffing costs, where it is impracticable to allocate these costs between administration and charitable expenditure and the trustees have allocated such costs to management and administration costs.

Management and administration of the charity

Management and administration costs represent expenditure incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.

#### Allocation of costs within types of resources expended

The charity's operating costs include staff costs, rent and other related costs. Such costs are allocated between types of resources expended and between charitable expenditure and management and administration on the basis of estimates made by the directors.

Administration expenditure includes all expenditure not directly related to charitable activity. In respect of certain items of expenditure it is a matter of judgement as to whether such items are direct charitable expenditure or are administrative, and the directors have applied what they consider to be reasonable judgements in apportioning such costs.

#### Fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Items of less than £100 are not capitalised.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets (less their expected residual value) over their estimated useful economic lives.

A regular annual review of the likelihood of asset impairment is undertaken.

Plant and machinery

25% straight line

Capital grants

The board of trustees consider that, in order to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales (effective October 2000), grants of a capital nature given for specific purposes and fully utilised in the furtherance of the objects of the charity should be credited to the fixed asset funds after the sums have been properly expended on the restricted purpose. The related asset is shown in the balance sheet at the cost of acquisition or subsequent revaluation.

The related assets are subject to restrictions by the grant making organisation on their use and disposal, and these restrictions are noted in the fixed asset section of these accounts. The fixed asset fund so created is treated as a restricted fund, but as the relevant asset is depreciated, then the funds represented by the reduction in the value of the asset are released to general funds. In this accounting period a sum of £1,738 (2004 - £4,263) has been transferred from restricted fixed asset funds to unrestricted revenue reserves in accordance with this policy.

Insofar as this policy relates to Government grants then this is a departure from the Statement of Standard Accounting Practice Number 4 in order to comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales.

#### **Taxation**

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, as is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Finance and operating leases

Rentals payable in respect of operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

Funds structure policy

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully the monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

There is no formal policy on the allocation of funds to designated funds.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds, other than that described under the Capital Grants policy above. Any proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

#### 2. Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
