Governing document

The Langham Partnership (UK & Ireland) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE 2008

Risk management

The directors have examined the major strategic, business and operational risk which the charity faces and confirmed that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to reduce those risks.

Organisational structure

The directors meet quarterly, whilst the day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Directors of Langham Scholars, Langham Literature and Langham Preaching who are in turn are also supported by the Executive Director and the International Director.

Objectives and Activities

The charity's objects and principal activities are to:

- The charity's objects are the advancement of the Christian religion which is based on the belief set forth in the Bible in particular [i] The writing, printing, publication and distribution of Christian literature [ii] Preaching and teaching [iii] Provision of education and training.

Langham Scholars

Since its establishment, Langham Partnership has assisted 322 students from 67 different countries. Of these, 98 students are currently still studying. 186 scholars have successfully finished their studies and returned home, ten returned home without finishing, and 28 have stayed in the West. Most Langham scholars have studied in PhD programs in the United States or the United Kingdom, although several did their studies in Switzerland, Canada or Australia. 24 of the current Langham scholars are studying in majority world training contexts (University of Kwa-Zulu Natal and Stellenbosch University in South Africa; Nairobi Evangelical Graduate School of Theology in Kenya; Acrofi-Christaller Memorial Centre in Ghana; ISEDET in Argentina; IBTS in Prague, Czech Republic; and SAIACS in India). The scholars program is managed by the International Programme Director for Scholars along with five national Scholar Directors in the UK, US, Hong Kong, Australia, and Canada. Significant input into scholar selection and scholar care comes from the various Langham Partnership Regional Councils, which also give Langham Partnership International (LPI) wisdom and feedback on global issues and the emergence of quality upper-level training programmes. Encouraging the development of institutions where Langham scholars can serve as primary mentors to a new generation of scholars is part of what is driving LPI to co-sponsor a consultation of majority-world doctoral programmes, scheduled for March 23-27 2009 at NEGST in Nairobi.

Langham Literature

In 2007-2008, our Literature Distribution Programme served 438 libraries (90 of which were French) in 62 countries, providing Library Grants. The Graduate Book Programme supplied over 40,000 books to students, alumni and faculty members of 172 colleges – 8,000 at Certificate Level, 13,000 at Diploma Level and 19,000 at Graduate Level. 45 members of the Langham Partnership Regional Councils took up their grants and 223 Langham Scholars were supplied with a total of 532 books as well as receiving a copy of Chris Wright's 'The Mission of God'.

1,400 copies of the Africa Bible Commentary were distributed, 712 of these were sent directly to Preachers. The French edition of the ABC will be launched in November 2008 whilst the translation of the Kiswahili and Portuguese editions are on target for publication in 2009 and 2010 respectively.

Our Creative programmes supported 17 publishers in the Majority World with local publishing projects. Six Langham writers were supported and the Editor training has seen our first three African editors being trained.

Hippo has seen the publication of its first two titles by African Christian scholars with two further titles expected for publication in 2009. The first contributions have now been received for the South Asia Bible Commentary (SABC) and the Arabic Contemporary Commentary (ACC) and articles and commentaries have been provisionally commissioned for the Latin American Contemporary Bible Commentary (LACBC). Within the Global Christian Library (GCL) publication has included a French translation and Arabic translations with two new titles planned for publication in 2009 including English and Arabic editions.

Langham Preaching

During the financial year 07/08 Langham Preaching has extended the programme to over 30 countries, with the launch of new country programmes in several parts of Africa, Asia, Europe, the Caribbean and Latin America, and the sustained development of the three-level programme in many parts of the world. We have been actively exploring the development of the work in a further 19 countries, which we hope will take root during the coming year.

As in previous years, there has been growing evidence of the increased indigenization of the programme, with regional networks established in several countries, and preaching clubs multiplying around the world. The facilitators' team has increased to over 40 trainers from different continents, and our partnership with a range of organizations, churches, and seminaries has continued to increase.

The involvement of Langham Partnership International (LPI) members – such as Australia in the work in the Pacific, and Hong Kong in the launch of the China project – has been a welcome development during the past year. We have also sustained a growth path using specific projects, such as the Chiangmai School of Biblical Preaching, reaching Thailand, Cambodia and Myanmar, and the Pacific project, reaching Vanuatu, PNG and the Solomon Islands. We have extended our reach in Latin America through the work of Igor Amestegui, and have consolidated efforts in Africa through an all-Africa Consultation.

The training of local facilitators has developed in several countries, leading to local level 1 training through national initiative and at little or no financial cost to the programme. This aspect of indigenous local ministry will be a growing dimension in our work.

The need to strengthen the small staff team has been a priority, and we have worked towards the appointment of a part-time Project Manager, and also an Associate Director, who will take up their responsibilities in the next financial year.

We are especially grateful for the supportive work of the staff and Board of LPUKI during the financial year which, in fellowship with other LPI members, has enabled the programme to continue to grow.

Achievements and Performance

During the year a Finance Officer was recruited giving LPUKI even greater control and strength in this crucial area of the ministry. Langham Partnership continues to enjoy a good reputation with funders.

Reserves policy

The general reserves held are considered to be the prudent minimum to ensure that the work of the Langham Partnership (UKI) continues in an ordered manner from year to year, even when donations may fluctuate downwards. A new policy has been approved that will allow Langham Partnership to maintain a minimum level of operations, strategic, and Scholars programme reserves, and also free up some old reserves for the purpose of ministry. The Trustees have decided that it is more appropriate to classify the Travel Fund and the Scholarship Reserve Fund as Designated Funds instead of Restricted and Endowment Funds, and therefore a prior year adjustment has been made to correctly classify these funds as client designations.

Principal sources of funding

Churches are a small but valuable income source and one which remains a valuable source for reaching key donors. The majority of income comes through Trusts and Individuals but fast growth amongst Individual donors makes this portion of our income the largest.

Investment policy

The directors have the power to make any investments, which they think fit. They have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds that includes specialist unit trusts designed for the charity sector.

Plans for the Future

The expansion of the supporter base to an ever younger audience is crucial for the long term development of LPUKI. This key area of development will be tested in 08-09. The recruitment of long term Langham Partners remains key to the continued strong growth of the organisation. This form of recruitment will be further developed in 08-09.

Directors' Responsibilities

The directors are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of affairs of the company and of the surplus or deficit of the company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and the company and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and the company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF THE LANGHAM PARTNERSHIP (UK & IRELAND)

We have audited the financial statements of The Langham Partnership (UK & Ireland) for the year ended 30th June 2008 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the charitable company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charitable company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE 2008

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention (as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets) and are prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards.

The company has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from producing a cash flow statement, on the grounds that it is a small company.

Incoming resources

Donations, grants and other forms of voluntary income are recognised in the period in which the
company is legally entitled to its receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable
certainty. Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the income is
recognised. Legacies are included on a receivable basis and when the value can be measured with
sufficient reliability.

Gifts in kind donated for distribution are included at valuation and recognised as income when they are distributed to the projects. Gifts donated for resale are included as income when they are sold.

- Activities in furtherance of the charity's objects includes income from book sales and is included in the period in which it is receivable.
- Investments are included in the balance sheet at their market value on that date. Unrealised
 revaluation gains are included in the Statement of Financial Activities. Investment income is
 credited to the income and expenditure account, and is inclusive of any income tax recoverable
 thereon.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay. Expenditure has been classified under the headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

- Grants payable are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding
 obligation on the charity.
- Cost of generating funds includes all expenditure in relation to obtaining funding for the company to meet its charitable aims.
- Costs of activities in furtherance of the charity's objects includes all expenditure directly related to furthering the objects of the charity.
- Governance costs comprise the costs of running the company, including strategic planning for its future development, external audit and other costs of complying with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs are allocated to each of the above categories on the basis of an estimate of time spent by the relevant staff members, and resources utilised.

Resources expended include attributable VAT that cannot be recovered.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE 2008 (continued)

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset evenly over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

20% to 25% on cost

Freehold land is not depreciated. No depreciation is charged on freehold buildings as they are maintained to such a high standard, which prolongs their useful life and enhances their residual value (based on prices prevailing at the time of acquisition) and accordingly any depreciation charge arising is considered to be immaterial.

Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Realised and unrealised gains or losses for the period are accounted for through the Statement of Financial Activities.

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of costs and net realisable value.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme, the assets of which are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund. Contributions are charged to the statement of financial activities for the period in which they are payable to the scheme.

Operating leases

Rentals payable for assets held under operating leases are charged as they fall due.

Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the net movement in funds.

Funds

Unrestricted funds represent the funds of the company that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use, and are available for application to the general purposes of the company. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the company are also unrestricted. Designations are shown as a transfer from undesignated to designated funds.

Restricted funds are those amounts given for specific purposes, which may be declared by the donor or with their authority. Endowment funds represent a restricted capital fund, whose income is restricted.

2 TAXATION

The company exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

The Travel Fund is to be used to help scholars with international travel, especially those who have graduated through the Langham Research Scholarship Scheme.

The Scholarship Reserve Fund comprises a combination of investments held to provide income for the Scholarship Fund and to guarantee continuing payments to scholars in progress.

The Scholarship Fund provides grants to strengthen theological leadership in the Developing world. PhD scholars research biblical, theological and related subjects, largely in the UK, with relevance to their home countries.

The Speed to Need fund provides resources for medical emergencies in Africa.

The Hookses Fund arose from a gift of a freehold property to the charity for its use and ministry.

The Ministry Support Fund is for the furtherance of the specific aspects of the ministry of the charity.

The Preaching Seminars Fund is to facilitate the improvement of biblical preaching through seminars and consultations held in different parts of the world.

The Global Christian Library Fund are funds received towards the provision of a new series of books providing inter-cultural exposition and application of the Christian faith. These are distributed through our literature programme.

The Grant Programme fund represents donations given towards specific programmes run by Langham Literature and are used to fund the costs of running each programme.
