REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2005

The trustees who are also the directors of the charity for the purposes of Company Law, present their report along with the financial statements for the charity for the twelve months ending 31 December 2005. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 6 and comply with the charities constitution and applicable law.

Constitution and objectives

The 999 Club and Lady Florence Trust is registered in England as a company limited by guarantee (No. 4238295) and registered as a charity (No. 1091077).

The charities objectives are governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted in February 2002.

The objects of the charity are:

- The relief of poverty by the provision of an advice and counselling service.
- The advancement of education and the provision of facilities for recreation and other leisure-time occupation for people who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

Review of activities

The 999 Club and Lady Florence Trust operates three centres in the London Borough of Lewisham. These 999 Centres offer informal help, advice and referrals on any problem or problems. The Centres are open to any and all regardless of their age, colour, creed, disablement, or problem. Many people lack communication skills making it both difficult and intimidating to access the help their require. The staff at the 999 Club help and support the users through their personal problems and in their dealings with other agencies. The 999 Club manages the Lady Florence Hall in Deptford, the primary use of this facility is for local community groups, and is available for hire by them. As a corporate trustee to the Lady Florence Institute the 999 Club provides administration support for that charity as well as management for its freehold property and assets.

Outcomes

In the year 2005 we had some 66,300 user visits. We resolved approximately 1,000 advocacy cases, where our users need assistance in a range of bureaucratic problems. In our specialist nursery we have had up to 9 children at any one time. In any one week of our 1,300 user visits spread across the three centres, 63 of those visits would be of people with acute alcoholic problems, 68 of those would be of people suffering drug addiction and 78 of those visits would be of people with grave mental health problems. All these people are referred on as necessary. The vast majority of people who come to us are hungry and we calculate that last year we served 40,765 meals.

Financial review

The results for the year are shown on page 4. The deficit for the year was £163,117 which when deducted from the funds brought forward of £425,914 gives a figure of £262,797 for funds carried forward at 31 December 2005.

Reserves policy

It is the aspiration of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds, which are the free reserves of the charity, at a level which equates to approximately six months expenditure. At this level the trustees feel that they could continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding. In that event it would obviously be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or the activities changed.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2005

Investment policy

The charity has a policy of keeping liquids funds in short term deposits that can be accessed readily. The charity has active treasury management in place to maximise the return on assets held.

Risk management

The trustees have examined the major strategic and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

Related parties

The 999 Club and Lady Florence Trust is the sole corporate trustee of the Lady Florence Institute (Registered Charity 312816) which holds the freehold of the property known as 21 Deptford Broadway and Lady Florence Courtyard.

Trustees' responsibilities

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charities incoming resources and application of resources during the year and of its state of affairs at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,

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- state whether applicable Accounting Standards and Statements of Recommended Practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the charity's assets and taking responsible steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and breaches of law and regulation.

We also report to you if, in our opinion, the Trustees' Annual Report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the charity has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding trustees' remuneration and transactions with the charity is not disclosed.

We read the Trustees' Annual Report and consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements within it or material inconsistencies with the financial statements.

Basis of audit opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland) issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the judgements made by the Directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charity's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the charity's state of affairs as at 31 December 2005 and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including its income and expenditure, for the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2005

1. Accounting Policies

a. Accounting basis

These financial statements are prepared under the historical accounting rules and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in October 2000, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

b. Company status

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named in the financial statements. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

b. Donations, legacies and other voluntary income

All voluntary income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is received unless it is restricted income and has been received specifically in respect of expenditure to be included in a future accounting period in which case it is deferred.

Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to that category. Where costs cannot be directly allocated to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Salary costs have been allocated on basis of time spent.

d. Fundraising and publicity

All expenses relating to fundraising and publicity are charged to this heading.

e. Management and administration

These costs relate to the management of the organisation. They include expenses of trustees' meetings, audit fees, office costs and other management costs.

f. Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Deptford extension costs are depreciated over 10 years. Other capitalised refurbishment costs are depreciated over the length of the lease. Furniture, equipment and minibuses are depreciated over five to seven years.

g. Restricted income funds

These balances represent voluntary income or grants which have been received for the purposes set out in Note 11. The application of these funds is restricted by the expressed wishes of the donor or the terms of the grant.

h. Pension Scheme

The charity has arranged a defined contribution pension scheme for members of staff. The assets of this scheme are held separately from those of the charity, being invested with an insurance company. Pension costs charged in the Statement of Financial Activities represent the contributions payable by the charity in the year.
