Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2010

Objectives and activities

Objects

- 1 The relief of poverty, hardship and distress among partners, families, children and dependants of persons who have suffered a legal restriction of their liberty and who are detained at HM Prison, Leeds,
- 2 To relieve sickness and poor health and to promote health and health education among those detained at HM Prison, Leeds, their dependants and other family members and amongst people living in the Armley area of Leeds, by providing a healthy living centre and associated non-statutory facilities,
- 3 To promote other charitable purposes for the benefit of people living or working in the Armley area of Leeds

Activities undertaken for public benefit in relation to objects

The trustees have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit quidance published by the Commission

The company's overall aim remains the same, i.e. -

"To provide friendly and independent support, information and advice and healthy living activities for all communities associated with the Visitors Centre – families of prisoners, prisoners and ex-prisoners, prison staff and the local community. We aim to empower people and their families to make positive choices about their lives and lifestyle."

The public benefit from the work carried out at the Visitors Centre through Jigsaw trying to reduce re-offending for prisoners through strengthening family ties and relationships, as prisoners who keep family ties and contact whilst in prison are 6 times less like to re-offend on release. This has a direct benefit to the public both financially and socially

Achievements and performance

Armley Prison Visitors Centre has continued to provide an excellent service to its stakeholder with 42,325 people accessing the activities and services offered in the year. The Centre continues to provide a friendly, welcoming and pleasant facility, services offered included family days/visits, a tea bar facility, family support and a helpline, play provision as well as advice to families and visitors to HMP Leeds.

The contract to manage 2 health trainers was extended for an additional year by NHS Leeds which allowed Jigsaw to carry on delivering health work to families and the local community through one to one sessions addressing and changing their health behaviour through improving physical activity, healthy eating, weight lose etc

Jigsaw secured funding to provide deeper levels of family support to prisoners to address their needs around children and family issues from the department of schools, children and families (Safe Ground). This funding allowed Jigsaw to strengthen the relationship between themselves and HMP Leeds Offender Management Department. This was an area of weakness that was identified in the 2009 external evaluation carried out by Leeds Metropolitan University Some of the work carried out through this funding as now become part of Jigsaw's core work within HMP Leeds.

Jigsaw opened a second tea bar provision for legal visitors which has introduced another service that can generate income for Jigsaw to assist with sustainability of the project. This provision is staffed by a prisoner on behalf of Jigsaw.

Jigsaw opened a new refurbished play area within the visits hall at HMP Leeds, this has allowed Jigsaw to provide play provision on weekends and during school holidays this has been funded by the Yorkshire and Humberside Prison Service Area Office (HMP Leeds)

Jigsaw has been able to provide free fruit to children and families visiting HMP Leeds and provide cooking with dad family days through funding secured through Leeds City Council's Healthy Leeds funding stream

Jigsaw has been successful in securing funding from Porticus to deliver the 3 day accredited healthy relationship training courses for prisoners and their partners within HMP Leeds to strengthen relationships between the participants for when the prisoners are released

Jigsaw has continued to strengthen the relationship between itself and HMP Leeds and is now part of HMP Leeds delivery plan that is audited bi-annually by Her Majesty Chief Inspectors

Further development of the tea and coffee bar in the prison visits room has enabled the Centre to generate extra income to assist with the Centre's long term sustainability. The service has gone from strength to strength with a more extensive range of goods being sold during the year.

Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2010

Financial review

The financial year has been one of considerable progress and strengthening of reserves

The Management Committee and staff have had to recognise that the Centre had to become more sustainable and self reliant. It is achieving this by both generating commercial income, increasing the amount of money for the Service Level Agreement from HMP Leeds and reducing cost, whilst maintaining a continuing high level of Service delivery

Reserves policy

The Policy of the charity is to maintain free reserves of 6 months resources expended, this enables continuity of services delivered and maintain salaries for a 6 month period for employed positions in the event of end of grants restricted sources and possible reducing income from unrestricted sources. It also maintains the ability to meet our moral obligations and contractual agreements

This policy will be reviewed annually

At the year end of year the free reserves equalled 5 8 months of resources expended

£5,000 set up costs for Jigsaw Junction

£15,000 continuation of Family Support Worker role after end of funding

Plans for future periods

Having established a model which is both more sustainable and capable of delivering a high quality service we are developing plans to

- Open a catering area within HMP Leeds for staff
- Bringing partners into prison to be involved in resettlement meetings and strategic plans. This will allow
 Jigsaw to progress to another level of family support for prisoners and their partners.
- Develop a second 3 day accredited training course around domestic violence for prisoners at HMP Leeds
- Further enhance the delivery of core services in HMP Leeds
- Explore the possibility of delivering similar services in other prisons in surrounding areas
- Jigsaw has also secured external from Children in Need to fund a play specialist who helps dads learn how
 to engage with their children through play, this funding is for 3 years, this operates during school terms

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Armley Prison Visitors' Centre is a company limited by guarantee and is registered as a charity with the Charity

Armley Prison Visitors' Centre started to operate in April 2006 following the merger of an unincorporated association also known as Armley Prison Visitors' Centre and the Jigsaw Healthy Living Project. The unincorporated association was established in 1993 and registered as a charity in November 1995 (charity number 1051052). The Jigsaw Healthy Living Project was initially known as "a project of the Visitors Centre", legally accountable to HMP Leeds who acted as the lead agency for the project with the Big Lottery Fund.

Company status

The company is limited by guarantee and all members have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding-up. The number of guarantees at 31st March 2010 was 6

Governance

The Management Committee has adopted "The Good Governance Guide for Charitable Management Committees" as a focus for ensuring that Best Practices are in place regarding leadership, performance, delegation and integrity Discussions have taken place around these principles confirming a consistent understanding of our position across the organisation

Trustee selection methods

Trustees are elected by the members at the AGM Recruitment is addressed through a number of methods ~ word of mouth connections gained through existing Management Committee members, as a result of project activities and awareness days undertaken by staff and via contact with the local voluntary and business community

Induction and training of trustees

A suite of induction training exists allowing Trustees and co-opted representatives the opportunity to engage quickly and positively with the charity

Organisational structure

All Trustees sit on the Management Committee which meets every 6 weeks and is responsible for the operation and strategic direction of the charity. The Committee is underpinned by four Sub Groups – Finance & Funding, HR & Policies and Procedures, PR and Marketing, and Community Development – where a mix of Trustees, co-opted members and senior operational staff in the Centre come together to discuss relevant issues and form plans for the future

Day-to-day responsibility for the provision of services, management of staff and volunteers rests with the Manager of the Centre

Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 March 2010

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Report of the trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2010

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. They have been applied consistently during the year, and in the preceding year.

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005) and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

b Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity
- Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal

c Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement
 of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a
 specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to
 the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts. The HM Prison Leeds provides the use of the visitors centre and certain overheads such as heat, light and water to the charity free of charge. The value of these donations is not included in these accounts as it is not possible to quantify the value.
- . Investment income is included when receivable
- Incoming resources from chantable trading activity are accounted for when earned
- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance

d Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis when a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is included as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases, where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership remains with the lessor, are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they fall due

f Tangible fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Individual items costing less than £1,000 are not capitalised.
