

Principal Activity

Share Jesus International's mission is to advance the Christian Faith

Statement of Faith

Share Jesus International (SJI) unites in mission with churches, church departments and Christian agencies which, acknowledging God's revelation in Christ, confess the Lord Jesus Christ as God and Saviour according to the Scriptures, and, in obedience to God's will and in the power of the Holy Spirit, commit themselves -

- To seek a deepening of their communion with Christ and with one another in the Church which is His body, and
- * To fulfil their mission to proclaim the Gospel by common witness and service in the world, to the glory of the one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit

Ten years on

SJI was founded in 2001 and can look back on the last decade with considerable thanks to God for his blessings

Today SJI is embracing the work of its **Emerging Culture** team in providing missional leadership training for young people. Central to this is the FRESH training programme for leaders aged between 15-21 years. Forty-seven young people have joined FRESH 2010/11 which includes three residential weekends that combine theological training with relevant, exciting experiences of leadership.

Athoughts magazine continues to grow and be used by young people and youth leaders to talk to others about Christ and to explore the relationship between culture and faith. With over 14,000 copies of /thoughts being distributed, we are very encouraged.

The /thoughts partners for 2011 will be Christian Aid, Cliff College, Kingsway and Release Potential. This gives us a great foundation of support, articles and finance which means printing costs for every edition are covered.

The Emerging Culture team worked with Wimbledon Methodist Church to deliver local youth work as part of SJI's internship programme

The 2010 **Pentecost Festival** focused on "God's heart for justice" and included a youth event, *Generate Justice*, which saw 250 young people take part in a day of action, campaigning for Justice issues in the heart of London

After the success of midweek events in 2009, these were repeated, with bigger venues and an impressive line up. Learning from previous years, we held just 4 big events at the weekend, all of which were high quality events and well attended.

Leicester Square and Embankment Gardens were again highlights on a Saturday afternoon filled with events run by London churches and organisations. Our key Speakers and performers were Shane Claiborne, Bill Johnson, Tim Vine, Tim Hughes, Reuben Morgan, and Dallas Willard. On Sunday we joined with the BBC and All Saints, Peckham to create the live Pentecost Service on BBC 1 on Pentecost Sunday with over 1 million viewers.

The use of modern music, the way you relate the Bible's messages to today's life and circumstances, the energy of the congregation was fabulous."

A fabulous evening was made complete when a passer-by heard our prayers outside Buckingham Palace, stopped to chat, and ended the tour by giving his life to Jesus! Amen!"

2011 will be the fourth Pentecost Festival. Christian Aid has agreed to become the first member of an embryo Festivals' Coalition which will seek to take on the Pentecost and Local festivals work that SJI has pioneered

SJI's Local Festivals' work has emerged from the Pentecost Festival experiences. In order to help local churches be at the centre of their communities SJI has delivered four training days and supported three local pilot festivals (with more on-site training) in Dronfield, Evesham and Raynes Park. A training manual is available. We are rolling this out nationally and started with a central London training event on November 24th supported by several denominations and attended by twenty five leaders. Plans for 2011 include a partnership with More than Gold, the Church's Olympic and Paralympic Games charity, to encourage local Festivals in connection with the 2012 games.

Andy Frost (Director) and Dave Bilbrough (Worship Leader) led SJI's national tour, Rediscovering Faith, timed to coincide with the publication of Andy Frost's new book, Losing Faith

"It was a really good evening Andy was absolutely SPOT ON with his message and many people have expressed their appreciation - honest, real, talking about real stuff."

Late in the year Andy was filming in Morocco. He presented seven short films that he had scripted and which have been produced by Big Book Media for Kingsway Communications. We hope that these videos will be a great resource for the Church. They are titled – Jesus the Hero, Wildman, Headliner, Wrestler, Underdog, Revolutionary and the Dreamer.

Share Creative is SJI's in-house design team and has the following three objectives

Providing quality branding, publicity, editorial and online material for SJI and its departments Providing the same services to external clients

Pioneering creative projects that engage people with faith through new technologies and ideas

Two of these projects were

The Natwivity

The Facebook and Twitter Nativity were followed by 10,000 people worldwide and engaged a whole new audience in the Christmas story. It also received a large amount of press exposure. This was run in partnership with the Evangelical Alliance.

Easter(LIVE)

Similar to the Natwivity, this project won 2 awards at the Jerusalem Awards and was a finalist in the Premier New Media Awards. It was featured in the Telegraph on Easter Saturday. The 2011 project is currently running where we've invited anyone and everyone to participate in creating their own Easter Passion Play online Easter(LIVE) partners include Worldview Media, Evangelical Alliance and individuals.

SJI continues to produce Resources for the Church. The latest has been ManMade, designed to help teenage boys mark their transition into manhood. It combines practical activities and discussion starters within a biblical framework, unpacking six core values based on the life of Jesus. Work has started on a sister publication, MissUnderstood, with publication set for 2011.

FRESH is a leadership training course for young people aged 15-21 SJI partners with organisations who give an amount of money in return for a presence and input into the whole year of training

The Future for \$JI

As 2010 closed, SJI's Trustees were thankful to God for the achievements of the year and mindful that the organisation was going through a period of transition, having again used some of its reserves in pursuit of its mission. Together with the Director and other stakeholders, the Trustees will consider the future path for the organisation by means of an AwayDay consultation, prayer and discussion at their meetings.

Appreciation for Staff and Volunteers

The Trustees would like to place on record their appreciation for the staff and volunteers who have served with S.II

Financial Review

Income received was £393,035 which was an increase on £8,365 in the year before. Much of this was in the form of grants, which offset the decrease in donations, as well as an increase in income from charitable activities.

The Trustees wish to express their thanks towards SJI's donors. Overall a surplus of £5,144 (2009 deficit of £51,959) was incurred in the year. The deficit incurred in 2009 was addressed by a programme of staff redundancies and other cost cutting. However, reliance on income from grants does leave SJI more exposed to the economic climate and the financial outlook for 2011 is uncertain, meaning that SJI needs to secure more consistent funding, especially from individuals and churches.

Reserves policy

The Trustees' policy is to ensure that reserves are sufficient for three months expenditure at current costs However, it has not been possible to build up reserves to this level during 2010

As at 31st December 2010 the reserves carried forward of £59,004 included £667 of fixed assets (leaving £58,337) This represented approximately 2 months' expenditure

Public benefit

SJI's Trustees agree that the organisation's work is in line with the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit

For example, SJI trains young people to become leaders in situations where their churches will benefit local communities. There is no similar provision that provides training for young people who belong to smaller organisations which are not large enough to do this for themselves. SJI's Festival work brings together a range of organisations, most of them charities themselves, and gives them a platform upon which they can provide their own 'public benefit' activities.

Risk Management

Control systems

SJI's Trustees have the overall responsibility for ensuring that there are appropriate control systems, financial and otherwise, which provide reasonable assurance of

efficient and effective operation, protection against unauthorised use or disposition of assets, maintenance of proper records with the provision of reliable financial information, compliance with relevant legislation and regulation

During 2010 improvements were made to the budget and cash flow planning and management systems

Risk Factors

The Trustees consider that risk falls into two overall areas - finance and infrastructure (income, expenditure, buildings, equipment, ICT and security), and personnel and operational issues (youth work, recruitment, training, health and safety, management systems, employment issues, child protection and confidentiality)

The Trustees have mitigated the finance and infrastructure risks by

ensuring there is no over-reliance on any one funding source or fixed term income, ensuring systems exist to combat the threat of computer viruses and loss of information, ensuring appropriate insurances are in place for buildings and staff

The Trustees have mitigated the personnel and operational risks by

maintaining appropriate insurance,
 having appropriate policies and training to cover employment and health and safety legislation,
 and child protection and confidentiality - all staff are required to be familiar with these policies

Employment

The Trustees are grateful to the staff and volunteers who work for SJI. The success of the Charity relies on their expertise and energy

The Charity is committed to a policy of equal opportunity in its employment practices. It is the Charity's policy to offer equal opportunity to persons applying for vacancies from all sections of the community, regardless of race, colour, ethnic or national origins, mantal status, age, gender, sexual orientations, disability or religious beliefs and having regard to their aptitudes and abilities in relation to the positions for which they apply. Appropriate training and implementation of best practice is used to ensure we do not discriminate in making employment decisions.

Structure, Governance and Management

SJI is registered with the Charity Commission and is a Company limited by guarantee. It has a Christian foundation that is expressed in Trustee, staff and public meetings, with prayer, worship and teaching as appropriate.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the Charity, with operational control delegated to the Director who attends the Board meetings. The Director manages Team Leaders who are responsible for the day-to-day work of SJI.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees (who are also directors of Share Jesus for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) Company law requires trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the chantable company and of the incoming/outgoing resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the chantable company for that period In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures
 disclosed and explained in the financial statements,
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregulanties.

In so far as the trustees are aware

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's independent examiner is unaware, and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any
 relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information

Independent Examiner's Report to the Members of Share Jesus

I report on the accounts of Share Jesus for the year ended 31 December 2010, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, Balance Sheet and related notes

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner

1 Accounting Policies

a) Basis of accounting

The Financial Statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Revised 2005), the Charities Act 1993 and under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable accounting standards

b) Grants

Grants are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) on an accruals basis following the satisfaction of any pre-conditions

c) Other income and gifts in kind

All other income except grants are recognised in the accounts on a received basis. For donations made under the gift aid scheme, the gift aid is recognised in the year in which the claim is submitted. Gifts in kind are valued at their value to the charitable company.

d) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis

e) Capitalisation

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis

f) Depreciation

Provision for depreciation of fixed assets held for use by the charitable company is made at annual rates calculated to spread the cost of each asset over its expected useful life

Equipment	33% on cost
Furniture and Fittings	25% on cost
Motor Vehicles	33% on cost

g) Stock

Current stock is valued at cost. No value is assigned to non current stock

h) Taxation

No provision for taxation is included in the accounts as the chantable company is entitled to exemption from tax afforded by Section 505 of the Income and Corporation Taxes Act 1988

i) Cashflow

The chantable company qualifies as a small company and therefore in accordance with FRS1, no cashflow statement is required

j) <u>Transfer between funds</u>

This represents a transfer from Unrestneted Funds to meet the shortfall in some Restneted Funds

k) Governance costs

These comprise expenditure relating to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

Explanation of Designated Fund

This Fund represents the commercial design work carried out as Share Creative to raise funds for the charity

Explanation of Restricted Funds

Local festivals relates to funds given specifically for the encouragement of festival work by groups of churches in local communities

Myraynespark refers to the local festival held in Raynes Park, London, SW20

Emerging Culture is the youth arm of Share Jesus which publishes a free youth magazine. A transfer has been made out of general funds to meet the shortfall

The Pentecost Festival is a Christian Festival in central London with hundreds of free events and high impact performances. It is a cross-generational, multi-cultural celebration of the Church's creativity and compassion

Darren Quinnell was an employee of Share Jesus until August 2009 Part of his responsibility was to raise income towards his salary from amongst his own supporter base. The income was paid into the Share Jesus accounts. Subsequent to his departure from the Share Jesus payroll, funds designated for him continue to be passed through the Share Jesus account and are paid to him on a monthly basis on production of an invoice from him. This arrangement will cease in 2011.

The Director of One Rock, Mark Williamson was until March 2009 employed by Share Jesus' American partner ILI History Makers—His salary was paid through the Share Jesus salaries account using money supplied by ILI History Makers—Mark Williamson was responsible for raising support for his salary costs from amongst his supporters. The income from supporters was paid into the Share Jesus accounts—Subsequent to Mark Williamson's departure from ILI History Makers he founded One Rock—One Rock has no corporate links with Share Jesus—Income designated for him from his supporters continues to be passed through the Share Jesus account and is paid to him on a monthly basis on production of an invoice from him—One Rock now has its own bank account and is seeking Charitable Status—When this has been achieved all income for his support will be channelled through the One Rock account and cease to pass through Share Jesus

Ithoughts is a magazine for teens, twenties and students. It comes out four times a year. We have four partners who pay a yearly fee in return for space in the magazine. This covers printing every edition of /thoughts in the year. We also have an additional five or six organisations that advertise in specific editions, this money is to pay for the postage of each /thoughts edition.
