Under those Articles, the members of the Board of Directors/Trustees are elected at the first AGM and re-elected at each subsequent AGM.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

The Board of Trustees submit their annual report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2010. The Board of Trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in April 2006 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity.

### Structure, Governance & Management

4 Cancer Group is a charitable company limited by guarantee by Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 8 December 2001. The organisation was incorporated on 11 October 2001 and is registered with the Charity Commission.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association were updated on 16 December 2008 to provide a broader definition of respite days. The focus remains to provide water based respite activities for people and their families affected by cancer under the sub brand Sail 4 Cancer.

During the year ending 31 December 2011, the charity had four Trustees Graham Precey (Chair), Richard Groome, Andy Hayward and Hamish Oliphant Kim van Niekerk joined the Board in August 2010 Richard Groome stepped down as a Trustee in Sept 2010 as he took on the interim role of General Manager and to project manage the Panerai programme and George Davies yacht project

Richard Groome continues to be the sole director of the 4 Cancer Trading Company Ltd

The Operational Team consisted of three part time members of staff Julie Colquboun (Finance / Admin), Cathy Jenkins (Family Liaison / PR) and Sandrine Wallace (Project Management) Sandrine left the charity on 30 September 2010 We also benefited from Grants from the Vodafone Foundation World of Difference programme that funded Danielle Auld and Mariusz Wieremiewicz to run events and implement Salesforce

For 2011 we continue to seek a Finance Trustee and Healthcare / Respite Trustee to balance the skillset and support our strategic aims over the next 5 years

### **Objectives and Activities:**

- (1) To provide outdoor, leisure and other respite opportunities for cancer patients and their families living in the United Kingdom, so that their physical, mental, social and spiritual capacities may be improved
- (2) To relieve sickness among persons suffering from cancer by (a) financing treatment and associated care at institutions nationwide (b) promoting independent research into the prevention and treatment of cancer provided that all useful results are disseminated to the public

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010 (CONTINUED)

#### Achievements and Performance

The Trustee Board set a number of objectives and aims for 2010

- Continued growth in the number of respite days provided. The target being 1200 days.
- · Focus on good cash flow and financial management
- Upgrading of internal systems to enable better fundraising
- Increase fundraising income to £150k
- Develop relationships with new corporate and respite partners
- Realise gift of Marlyn yacht from George Davies

### **Performance against Objectives**

In 2010 we provided **1,643** respite days for people affected by cancer. This compares to **1,060** in 2009. This is an increase of **55%**.

We are extremely grateful to our travel providers Sail 4 Cancer works with a wide network of Respite Partners from across the sailing and travel industries. These include major tour operators such as Sunsail, LeBoat, Neilson, Center Parcs, DFDS Seaways and Fred Olsen Cruises. Sail 4 Cancer's respite breaks give families something to look forward to at the end of arduous treatment schedules or after a family member has died.

We continue to increase the provision of respite days in line with our objectives year on year

With the ongoing issues of insurance for cancer patients travelling abroad, even those in remission, respite alternatives needed to be found within the UK 2010 saw the first steps towards a relationship with Center Parcs. The feedback proved very positive

"Having a child with cancer is such a hard thing to live with day to day so the opportunity for my partner and I to enjoy a spa day was fantastic. Thank you so much to Sail 4 Cancer for making this possible."

#### Income

Income rose from £151k in 2009 to £272k in 2010 and was in fact our highest year of income ever. Our target was to bring in £150k. In 2011 our aim is to expand our respite days. Kim van Niekerk joining the Sail 4 Cancer Board will provide us with the skills to build a sustainable fundraising strategy and approach.

We increased our cost of charitable activities from £90k in 2009 to £158k in 2010 in line with our expansion of respite day provision

### George Davis - Donation

Our major donor for 2010 was retail entrepreneur George Davies who has long been associated with charitable giving. The team at Sail 4 Cancer were delighted when they were approached by Mr Davies regarding the donation of his 103ft super yacht Marlyn. Following consultation between Mr Davies and the Trustee Board it was felt that the greatest impact and benefit to Sail 4 Cancer's beneficiaries could be gained by selling the yacht. The project was completed thanks to the generous support of Tim and Derek Jarman and the team at Luke Brown Yachts, who worked incredibly hard to find a buyer in one of the toughest economic climates.

The £185,000 realised from the sale of Marlyn has been allocated to Sail 4 Cancer's 2011 respite activities, and will help provide over 1200 respite days for individuals and families living with cancer from across the UK

The timing of George's incredible donation was perfect, coming when more traditional sources of fundraising had dipped due to the current business climate. This gift will enable Sail 4 Cancer to continue with its growth plans and will have a direct impact on the lives of our beneficiaries.

### Panerai - Brand Franchising

Sail 4 Cancer was approached by the US subsidiary of the luxury watch manufacturer Panerai to be the official charity for the 2010 North American Panerai Classic Yachts Challenge, a highly-celebrated New England-based annual event. As part of this event, US cancer patients were taken sailing on some of the classic yachts, thereby introducing a new audience to the therapeutic values of taking cancer patients out onto the water. We are extremely grateful to Panerai for providing us with an introduction to franchising the Sail 4 Cancer brand in the USA.

### Hall of Fame

We are also extremely grateful to David Dingle CBE, Chief Executive Officer of Carnival UK who made Sail 4 Cancer the official charity of the 2010 Hall of Fame Travel Industry Awards. This resulted in funds and contacts which have helped hugely with our charitable aims.

### Our "Tireless" supporters

We continue to be extremely grateful to corporate supporters including TUI Marine (Sunsail and LeBoat), Clipper Ventures, Neilson Employees overseas, The Vodafone World of Difference campaign and White Stuff for their generous financial support in 2010

We continue to be amazed at the generosity and support we receive from within the sailing fraternity. Thank you to all those people who have supported the charity by taking part in crazy sailing events and other extreme sports to raise money in the memory of loved ones that they have lost to cancer. You know who you are! Our flagship event 'Tea by The Sea' continues to innovate and provide sailing clubs around the UK with a simple way of supporting our cause.

### Efficiency and improved fundraising

Danielle Auld spent many hours researching databases and managed to obtain a free not-for-profit license of Salesforce. She adapted this to the needs of the charity and it has proved especially useful in the administration of beneficiaries and also sailing clubs and other fundraisers. With an increasing number of beneficiaries undertaking ever more varied respite opportunities, a database system had become vital in order to safeguard the charity's efficiency, whilst enabling those dealing with beneficiaries to maintain a personal touch with everyone. Salesforce has fulfilled this requirement.

### Feedback from beneficiaries:

As a respite charity first and foremost, we are ultimately judged on our ability to provide quality respite. The feedback from these days remains very positive. All recipients are encouraged to complete an online questionnaire and to share their experiences. This enables us to feedback to provider companies as well as to monitor whether we have the right sort of respite available. Testimonials from 2010 include.

### **Forward Looking Statements**

Sail 4 Cancer was founded in 2001 and has grown organically to become an established provider of respite activities for cancer patients and their families from across the UK. In 2009 the decision was made to change the name of the registered charity to the 4 Cancer Group which would allow the development of other fundraising initiatives e.g. Ski 4 Cancer.

2011 brings an important milestone for the charity and marks our 10<sup>th</sup> year as a respite provider – a significant achievement for a small charity

### Key strategic operational objectives by the year 2016

To be a successful charity in 2016, we believe that we should be performing at the following level

- Develop a fundraising model which achieves an annual income of £1 75m (based on an average respite day costing £100 + 30% operating cost model)
- Provide respite activities for 1000 cancer patients / families every year. This equates to 14,000 respite
  days per year across multiple platforms (sailing, cruising, shore based holidays and spa / weekend
  breaks). Metric is 1000 patients x 2 8 (average group size) x 5 (average number of days).

### 2011 / 2012 Objectives

For 2011 / 2012 we therefore are looking to develop the following step changes in performance

- · Deliver 2500 respite days
- · Secure revenues of £250,000+ per annum
- Maintain percentage spent on non charitable activities at 30% or less
- Deliver externally funded and credible primary and secondary research into the medical value of respite which proves the positive impact to our beneficiary's health
- Test respite services with beneficiaries in new areas in line with future developments of the 4 Cancer Group
- Develop a plan for the provision of bereavement services and a metric to means test our services

### Our Values and Focus around Respite Provision

During this financial year, the Board also went back to basics and reflected on what we had learnt about respite provision in the first 10 years of operation. We also felt that it was important that we provided funders with a clear idea of how we operate and what's important to the organisation in the provision of consistent respite to people affected by cancer.

### Why are we here?

- A cure for cancer not yet found
- In our experience there is a need for respite services outside of the NHS
- Provide beneficiaries with the energy to keep fighting
- Provision of memories for people in difficult situations, including after bereavement
- 298,000 people per year diagnosed with cancer each year in the UK

### What do we want to be famous for?

- · As a consistent, proven provider of quality respite care
- Provision of respite for the entire family group
- Providing respite for all ages and demographics

### Who benefits from our services?

- Anyone affected by cancer, including the family group and care providers
- People currently living with any form of cancer

We will continue to uphold these values in our decision making and approach

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

#### 1 STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" revised 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006.

### b) Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis

### c) Fund Accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Board of Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designed for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds subject to specific restricted conditions imposed by donors

### d) Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are generally recognised on a receivable basis and are reported gross of related expenditure, when the charity is legally entitled to the income and where the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

### e) Resources expended

Resources expended are accounted for on an accruals basis and gross of any related income. They are classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

- · Costs of generating voluntary income includes relevant fundraising and publicity costs
- Costs of charitable activities comprise direct expenditure. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.
- Governance costs include those costs, such as independent examiners' fees, associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

### f) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases except computer equipment and software is estimated at 5 years. The useful life of computer equipment and software is estimated to be 2 years.

### g) Stock

Stocks have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value on bases and methods applied consistently

### 11 REMUNERATION OF TRUSTEES

During the year, payments totalling £17,100 (2009 £NIL) were made to Consistency Consulting Ltd, a company wholly owned by Richard Groome, a trustee until September 2010 Appropriate authorisation for these payments was obtained from the Charity Commission and the Board approved this remuneration having satisfied themselves that it did not represent a conflict of interest and provided best value for the charity. The funds were used to finalise the Panerai and Marlyn projects on behalf of the charity which concluded on the 31<sup>st</sup> December 2010. No other trustees received any remuneration during the year (2009 £NIL)

Expenses reimbursed to trustees during the year amounted to £2,055 (2009 £3,798) These are included in costs of charitable activities as they relate to attendance and assistance at events

### 12 RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During 2008, the charity lent £10,990 to 4 Cancer Limited to enable it to purchase stock in its first period of trading. The company is a wholly owned subsidiary of 4 Cancer Group.

At 31 December 2010 a balance of £5,575 (2009 £5,575) was due to 4 Cancer Group from its wholly owned subsidiary 4 Cancer Limited
