GOVERNING DOCUMENTS AND OBJECTS

Governing Document

The Looe Development Trust was incorporated by the Registrar of Companies for England and Wales as a Private Limited Company on 31st October 2001. It is a Company Limited by Guarantee and not having a Share Capital. The Company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and these are set out in accordance with the Companies Acts 1985 and 1989. The Memorandum of Association was signed and sealed on 5th July 2001, and the Articles of Association were signed and sealed on 19th October 2001.

Area of Benefit

The Charity is for the benefit of those living and / or working in the parish of Looe and contiguous parishes (hereinafter called "the Area of Benefit")

Objects of the Charity

- To advance education and learning, including training in skills relevant to securing employment to relieve financial need, hardship, distress and sickness among those living with the Area of Benefit
- 2 To preserve, protect and enhance in any way for the benefit of the public, amenities including the buildings or features of historic, architectural or natural interest within the Area of Benefit
- 3 To provide facilities for public recreation or other leisure time occupation in the interests of social welfare, with the object of improving the conditions of life for those living or working in the Area of Benefit
- 4 To advance any other charitable purpose or purposes for the benefit of those living or working in the Area of Benefit

Statement of Intention

The Charity will be non-party in politics, non-sectarian in religion and will not discriminate on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, ethnic or racial origin, sex, marital status, religion, political belief, or other opinion

Activities of the Charity

The Charity may do anything lawful that may be necessary in order to promote its Objects including the use of the following powers

- Subject to any consent required by law, to raise funds and borrow monies, invite and receive contributions from anyone through donations or subscriptions, or the running of a lottery or in any other way
- Subject to compliance with any statutory regulations, to undertake trading activities only in so far as the activities are exercised in the course of the actual carrying out of a primary Object of the Charity
- 3 Subject to any consents by law,
 - To purchase take on lease or in exchange or hire or otherwise acquire any land or property of any sort
 - To erect construct lay down enlarge alter maintain improve change and manage or contribute to or subsidise the erection construction and maintenance of any land property ways plant and machinery

GOVERNING DOCUMENTS AND OBJECTS (CONTINUED)

- To undertake any charitable trust or other charitable agency business, which may promote any or all of the Objectives of the Charity
- To establish, co-operate with support, or join with other charities, voluntary bodies and statutory authorities operating in furtherance of the Objects of similar charitable purposes and to exchange advice and information with them
- To purchase or otherwise acquire any of the property assets and liabilities of any of the charities voluntary bodies or statutory authorities with which the Charity is authorised to join and perform any of their engagements
- 7 To transfer any of the Charity's property, assets, liabilities and engagements to any of the charities voluntary bodies or statutory authorities with which the Charity is authorised to join
- To establish, promote, and otherwise assist any limited company or companies for the purpose of acquiring any property, or of furthering in any way the Objects of the Charity through trading, and to establish the same either as wholly owned subsidiaries of the Charity or jointly with other persons, companies and government departments or local authorities, and to finance the same if the Trustees see fit by way of secured loan or share subscription on commercial terms provided that the Charity shall seek professional advice before financing such companies
- To provide educational training, advisory counselling, consultancy, administrative, professional and technological support services in furtherance of the Objects of the Charity
- To promote, encourage or undertake research and disseminate the results of such
- To produce, print, publish, supply, sell or deal in anything in written, oral or visual media
- To open and operate bank accounts and other banking facilities and to draw, make, accept, endorse, negotiate, discount and execute promissory notes, bills of exchange, cheques and other negotiable instruments
- Subject to the provisions of clauses 6 and 7 hereof, to employ and pay employees, officers, servants and professional or other advisers, and to make all reasonable and necessary provision for the payment of pensions and superannuation to or on behalf of employees, officers and servants and their wives, husbands and other dependants
- To pay out of the funds of the Charity, all the expenses, costs and charges of and incidental to the formation and registration of the Charity

Use of Income and Property

The income of the Charity whencesoever derived, shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the Objects of the Charity and no part shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise by way of profit to any member of the Charity, and no Trustee appointed to any office of the Charity shall be paid by salary or fees, or receive any remuneration or other benefit in money or money's worth from the Charity, PROVIDED THAT nothing in this document shall prevent reasonable and proper payments made in good faith

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees, who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act, submit their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st March 2011. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in 2005 in preparing the annual report and financial statements of the charity

The charity was incorporated on 31st October 2001, and the relevant Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity are set out on pages 3 and 4 of the report

Review of activities and future developments

The Financial Statements for the year ended 31st March 2011, which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, Balance Sheet and related notes, are set out on pages 11 to 20. A summary of the financial results and the work of the charity are set out below

Trust publications

The trust publishes "Community News" for the Looe Town Forum and 1,500 copies of this bimonthly magazine are distributed to the local communities in Looe, Pelynt and Duloe as a 28-page publication, containing Looe Town Council News, also carries advertisements, which enables the magazine to be self-financing. The magazine is now also available online at http://looecommunitynews.com. The publication continues to be well received, with the deadline for copy being 2 weeks prior to the beginning of the publication months commencing in February each year.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

The Looe Enterprise Centre

(Supporting Object 1 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Looe Enterprise Centre is based at its premises at Enterprise House, Higher Market Street, East Looe The Centre offers computer training and computer-based training on a one-to-one or group basis, to meet the individual needs of the customer

The salaried Centre staff were made redundant in April 2009, due to lack funding. From July 2009 to October 2009 training was delivered by Enterprise Tamar at the Centre, to continue the benefit to the area. Enterprise Tamar went into administration, the Trust managed to recover half of the funds owed, in settlement, from the Administrator in this financial year.

Since April 2010 the Centre has re-opened for 3 days a week on a volunteer only basis Reduced manning during February to May lead to a reduction in opening to 2 days a week Financial assistance to maintain the Centre was made by Looe Town Council

The facilities offered at the Centre are training based, with business support directed to the Federation of Small Business. The centre has being actively marketed for personal IT based development and for business services and training as well as continuing to provide laminating, laser printing, Broadband internet access, e-mail facilities, colour photocopying, provision of a meeting room, loan equipment of a projector and public address and display equipment

Membership of the Centre has remained at £5 00 per annum. The two-hour season fees which were at £3 00 and Internet access fees per half hour at £1 50 for non-members and £1 00 for members have not been raised. Membership of the Enterprise Centre includes membership of Looe Development Trust. During the trading year the Centre again ran a range of successful Information Technology related computer-based courses and Food hygiene courses.

The Looe Harbour Winter Ferry

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

Looe Development Trust was able to find a ferryman to continue this winter service in 2010/11 External sources of Funds for this service were provided by the County Councilors for East and West Looe

The Looe Festival by the Sea 2010 & 11

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Festival was successfully delivered in June 2010 and in 2011 as an annual event. The Looe Festival by the Sea was a celebration of the maritime bounty of Looe, with popular food sampling and sailing during the festival. The Trust did not have an active role in the Festival in 2010, but remains as a fund holder. The festival helps promote Looe to visitors and locals alike, during a non-peak tourist period of June / July

Pirates and Buccaneers Days

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust continued to act as fund holder for the Looe Pirates and Buccaneers There are no longer any active members of this group, although the management is extant

The Looe Christmas Festive Lights

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust continued as the fund holder for this, held during the December and January festive season. Much new cable and low energy lighting has replaced the obsolete equipment. The Festive light is a well-established event supported by many local organisations, and adds to the ambiance and enjoyment of Looe by both locals and visitors alike.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Looe New Years Fireworks Display

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust again was the accounting body and fund holders for the privately raised funds for the Looe New Years Fireworks Display The Town Council were unable to finance the display, but continued to provided other support. A well-established event supported by many local organisations, enjoyed by both locals and visitors alike

The Looe Heritage Trail Guide & DVD

(Supporting Object 2 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Looe Heritage Trail was officially opened in May 2004 at the Looe Festival by the Sea. The DVD was launched for sale in spring 2005. Sales of the trail map and DVD have lessened. A friend of the Trust produces, supplies and sells the DVD and complimentary trail guide, which are sold through the local Tourist Information Centre and through local retail outlets. The project is an income generator for the Trust to help meet its ongoing operating costs.

The Skate Board Park at Looe (Planning)

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

At the request of the defunct Looe Youth Action Group Looe Development Trust has undertaken, where possible, to establish a skateboard park at Looe for the youth of the local area. This is in co-operation with Looe Town Council and Caradon District Council. Project estimates are up to £60,000 for the park. To date the fund stands at £6,927, which is made up of the money originally raised by the Youth Action Group and donations from East Looe Town Trust and the Town Council, together with collections and interest accrued. The West Looe Town Trust has pledged a further £2,000. The project has progressed with designs and a planning application made on a new site in the Millpool car park. Obtaining the car park spaces has been gained through considerable support from the two Looe Cornwall Councilors. The project is currently stalled due to unqualified statements by Cornwall Council Environmental Health, particularly those of one whom is a local resident and should not have commented on the assessment due to a publically perceived conflict of interest.

The Save a Penguin Redwing R149 project

(Supporting Object 3 and 4 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust is the fund holder for the maintenance fund for this successful Looe youth sailing training dinghy the R149 "Penguin"

The Looe Area Partnership

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The Trust has been the administrative fund holder the Looe Area Partnership (LAP), formed on completion of the Market and Coastal Towns Initiative process, under the auspices of the Looe Development Trust for the benefit of Looe and the contiguous parishes, to coordinate activities and priorities to the funding bodies within East Cornwall. Meetings of the LAP have been held over the past 2 years and have assisted in gaining Looe Council its quality Town accreditation. The Trust Chairman has Chaired the LAP for the last year. Having served its purpose during the transition of Cornwall to a unitary authority, public access to 'localism' is now through a community network manager, the LAP was suspended on 30 March 2011. The remaining minor funds of the LAP were for distribution by the Trust, at its discretion.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Amenity Centre

(Supporting Object 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

Trustees have continued to work hard progressing this project for a Youth / Amenity centre for Looe Agreement for use of the Lakeside Social Club site has been reached. Detailed Architects plans are developing and the planning application is approved. Cornwall Council reneged on the commitments made by Caradon District Council. A completely new draft lease has been issued, for which revised conditions are being sought.

The delay in the project caused by Cornwall Council contracts not acting on approved instructions from Caradon Council has resulted in a 2 year plus delay in the project. Two large donations have now been lost (one, luckily, to another project in the area), another bid (ENTRUST) will have to be re-submitted. Additional funding sources have been investigated and new bids may only be made when the transfer of the lease is complete. An offer has been received from County Youth Services as well as an invitation to progress a bid to RDPE. The Trust has received substantial support for this project and financial offers (actual and in kind) from a number of local organisations including. West Looe Town Trust and previously Viridor Funding from the County Youth Services has been offered although greatly reduced than originally offered. Cornwall Council has surveyed the existing structure and low grade asbestos was present, this has now been removed. Additional funding is required to secure the construction, fitting out and initial running costs. It is now possible to have the facility available by late 2011 subject to Cornwall Council resolving the issues of the lease and then receipt of funding.

Looe Environmental Heat and Power (Anaerobic Digester)

(Supporting Object 4 of the Trust as detailed above)

The trust has continued to pursue the feasibility of an anaerobic digester plant for Looe. The proposal was for an anaerobic digester (with no noxious emissions). Initial feasibility study reports were completed in September 2008 with funding from SWRDA. The report was very positive for the success of a brown field site in West Looe. The funding of a full study is required and is being pursued through Cornwall Council and SWRDA. The town and the industries in the area produce a significant amount of highly suitable waste that is currently not utilised. The project has the potential to regenerate a sizable neighbouring brown field site within Looe and is being considered in these plans, creating employment and income for the Trust's area of benefit.

The Nelson Sculpture Project

(Supporting Objects 2, 3 & 4 of the Trust as detailed above)

A booklet (ISBN 978-0-9559645-1-0) and brochure on sea life and the life sized bronze sculpture of Nelson the one-eyed Grey Seal, which was unveiled by Sir Robin Knox-Johnston MBE on 28 May 2008, was published by the Trust in 2009 and is sold as an income generator. The Looe Harbour Commissioners care for and are to provide the sculpture's lighting

Lanreath Play Area Association

(Supporting Object 1 and 3 of the Trust as detailed above)

The project has successfully provided a play area adjacent to Lanreath village Community Centre. Assistance and guidance has been provided by a Trustee to the project team. In addition to these activities the Trust has been involved over the year with the Town Council and Cornwall Council. The trust has also provided help and assistance to many local organisations with help in finding funding for various projects. I e. Crabbing leaflet fund holder, Loce Rowing Club fund raising, Polperro Festival fund raising.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Future Developments and Commitments

Other projects have been considered by The Looe Development Trust during this reporting period, some have not gained support others have been given assistance and for others their feasibility was to be further investigated

The Trust's principal monetary concern remains that of the sustainability of the Enterprise Centre (Looe IT Centre). The Centre's running costs have been funded from the Trust's development fund, which is largely exhausted. Funds have also been granted by Looe Town Council and the Local Area Partnership for Looe. The Centre has been open for over a year as a volunteer only run Centre. It continued to offer term continuity to the Community and maintained a benefit to the area. The biggest liability of the Centre is the remaining lease on the photocopier / printer to Xerox Finance.

During the reporting year the volunteer staff have made considerable efforts to keep the Centre open. It is to their credit that the Centre continued to provide support meeting objective 1 of the Trust.

Funding from local resources for the future of the Centre and for the Amenity Centre as a hub for local services have proved harder to guarantee during this time of financial austerity and cutbacks

Statement of Benefit

Looe Development Trust continued to provide benefit, in accordance with its objectives, during the 2010/11 reporting year. The Trustees, its officers and volunteers have provided a tangible improvement to the local community of Looe and its contiguous parishes with the realisation of two projects, and have plans in place to continue this into 2011/12 and beyond

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of Accounting:

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005 and the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

The company has availed itself of Paragraph 3(3) of schedule 4 of the Companies Act and adapted the Companies Act formats to reflect the special nature of the company's activities

The company has used resource classifications to suit its particular circumstances within the Statement of Financial Activities in accordance with Appendix 5, paragraph 5 3 1, of SORP 2005

(b) Legal Status of the Company:

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member.

(c) Fund accounting:

General funds are unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity, and which have not been designated for other purposes

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors, or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund

(d) Incoming resources:

All incoming resources are included in the SOFA when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution, or the legacy being received.

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity and the amount actually realised

Resources expended: (e)

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred

Expenditure has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources

Direct costs of generating funds are those incurred directly in carrying out the income generating activities of the charity, and do not include the costs of disseminating information in support of the charitable activities. Support costs are those incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

Taxation: (f)

The charity's activities are exempt from Value Added Tax Irrecoverable VAT is not separately analysed and is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred

Operating leases: (g)

The charity classifies the lease of equipment as operating leases, title to the equipment remains with the lessor and leasing costs are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease

(h) Tangible fixed assets:

Tangible fixed assets costing more than £100 are capitalised and included at cost, including any incidental expenses of acquisition

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life
