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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

KIM Inspire is driven by an ethos that is based upon a recovery re-enablement model which provides a pathway to community integration. KIM provides innovative support via community based group work that is creative and responsive to the needs of people who experience common mental health issues, severe and enduring mental illness, and those who have diverse needs.

KIM's Objectives;

I. Assisting in the care, support and recovery of persons aged 16 years and over, experiencing, or who have experienced, mental health problems and enduring mental illness of any description by the provision of facilities for education and recreation.

II. The provision of work experience and training for persons, aged 16 years and over, so as to develop skills that will enable them to find employment.

What KIM does;

Our Vision

Enable women, men and young people to improve their mental health and fulfil their potential by making positive changes to their lives.

Our Mission Statement

KIM supports people to improve mental health, coping strategies, social networks and opportunities for training, volunteering, employment and community integration.

KIM was established in 2002 to offer a gender specific service to women who were struggling with mental illness and common mental health problems. We offer group activities in both the hospital and the community for people suffering from enduring mental illness such as schizophrenia, bi polar disorder and personality disorders and more common mental health problems including depression, anxiety, stress and panic attacks.

For the individuals we work with, many daily tasks are very daunting i.e. going to the supermarket or taking public transport, resulting in a lack of social interaction, loss of self belief, poor personal care and unhealthy diet, all of which further reinforces low mood, loneliness and despair. Childhood sexual and physical abuse is also prevalent and the effects of this trauma reach far into adulthood. We also work with individuals whose physical ill health impacts on their mental well being.

KIM has worked in the psychiatric unit of Wrexham Maelor hospital since 2006 and offers a weekly group to patients' which forms a link to KIM's community groups for ongoing support on discharge.

Until March 2015 KIM held the Ministry of Justice contract to work across North Wales with female ex-offenders which ended with the restructuring of probation services. This gave the organisation experience of working across a larger geographical area and specialising in supporting the needs of those involved in the criminal justice system.

Since November 2014 KIM's services have been developed further to include support for men and young people 16 -24 years. KIM4HIM was developed and has been facilitated by 4 male social work students, one of which we have since employed with no dedicated resources. In January 2018, four year funding was agreed for this project to provide a full mens service across the Flintshire community and a weekly hospital group at the Heddfan unit of Wrexham Maelor hospital.

Objectives and aims

Also in late 2014, KIM established a service for young people. KimBetweeners is an innovative project offering confidence building activities, reducing isolation and helping young people up to the age of 24 develop a more positive and motivated mind set. Outcomes include moving into or re-engaging with education, employment or training after long periods of disengagement or insecure engagement due to mental ill health.

KIMs Recovery Approach

We also offer a selection of activities to the local community as a whole such as the KIM Community Choir, Community Gardening and Cooking groups and the Friday pop up cafe, offering social integration opportunities for individuals and reducing mental health stigma locally.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

During the year ended 31 March 2019, KIM Inspire received 138 new referrals for its group work in the Flintshire community with 158 individual women accessing KIM's service over the period. KIM provided 450 group work or activity places.

Over this period, the Flintshire Kim 4 Her project has gone from strength to strength. Referrals are constant and are received from a range of agencies both statutory and non-statutory in Flintshire.

KIM continues to provide a professional, supportive, empathic and non-judgemental service to identify the specific needs of women in Flintshire focusing on progression and individual needs. We strive to provide a consistent successful service creating a context and environment that encourages the effective participation of the women referred.

The overall aim being the support of women suffering poor mental health to build a more positive life, improve life skills while working on improving their confidence and self-esteem, the positive effects benefiting both the women we support, their children, families and the community at large.

We offer the service in various community venues throughout the county, which is crucial to the success of the service in geographically rural areas where isolation is a concern for vulnerable women.

Groups were held in Mold, Holywell, Buckley and Connah's Quay. The groups offer women an opportunity to learn new life skills from crafts, cooking, physical activities such as yoga and creative writing. In addition specific groups on goal setting, motivation and improving confidence and self esteem.

Active Inclusion cooking groups have been running weekly giving individuals an unique opportunity to learn about the catering trade, have hands on experience of working in a catering kitchen and helping out at catering events. An opportunity also to gain a Level 2 qualification in Food Hygiene. These groups have focussed in helping people improve their skills and improve their physical and mental health; building confidence, social and practical skills through working together in a fun and safe environment.

At KIM we also offer a unique opportunity for individuals to gain a qualification in Welsh Language and Culture and we are proud at KIM that 36 men and women have achieved a Level 1 qualification in Welsh Language and Culture and looking ahead we aim to offer a Level 2 qualification. The Welsh Government has by now a long term vision and that is to see the Welsh Language thriving. This vision focused on that by 2050 a million people will be able to speak Welsh and KIM are playing their part in this vision.

KIM Inspire has received 66 new referrals for its group work within Wrexham, with 113 individual women accessing KIM's Wrexham service. KIM in Wrexham provided 254 group work or activity places.

During the period, we have secured office space in Wrexham which has been paramount in the growth of the service.

Whilst securing the office space is a great development, it is becoming clear very quickly that KIM's Wrexham Service will out-grow the venue soon. We have identified that future venues will need to give opportunities to create differences to individuals branching out to other community based activities and groups that are not only outside of KIM but are non-mental health related.

Charitable activities

Two individuals have made the transition from client to Group Volunteer, one of which has now secured a mental health degree placement at Glyndwr.

The Wrexham womens service has also been able to accommodate an individual to complete their university PGCE placement.

A stand alone group now meets arranging their own activities and is currently focusing on the special baby unit at the Maelor, making clothing for premature babies. They are also looking and planning ahead with thoughts of Christmas crafts and a Christmas fundraiser.

Funding for the Wrexham service through the Henry Smith Charity comes to an end 31 July 2019 and KIM is hoping to secure continuation funding with Henry Smith to develop and expand the service over the next 3 years to include a Mens Service.

The gender specific Men's project received 102 new referrals during the period with 120 men engaging with the service.

The men's group has continued to grow and be well received by individuals, professionals and funders. The groups have been co-produced and have provided a whole spectrum of opportunities for men to engage via activity and talking. Our work in Flintshire revolves around 2 locations: Holywell and Connah's Quay.

The men have increased their formal and informal volunteer footprint at KIM. For example, the garden at the Hub is maintained by a new men's group that they wanted to start on their own. Other men have started their own 'Inner Geek' for all hobbies and passions pertaining to 'geekiness'. Both of these groups are 'light touch' from KIM staff and provide a step for individuals between our core mental health group and full non-KIM community based activities.

KIM 4 Him continue to support Glyndwr University by providing 3 men to the 'Outside In' group. This group works alongside social work students to promote the interests and voice of individuals that access services. The men receive a small payment from the University for their support furthermore, 2 of the men are now attending the University on a weekly basis to complete a mental health training course alongside the social work students.

KIM 4 Him have been at the forefront of new marketing and social media contact at KIM. Our 'Scrapbook Blog' has received plaudits from the project funder.

KIM 4 Him has been selected by the Lottery (funder) as one of the top 25 services funded in their 25 years of funding. The Lottery have been up to interview and video beneficiaries and invited staff to a celebration event at the Senedd to promote the work of men's mental health.

KIM 4 Him has been piloted in Wrexham with a small grant from the Lottery. Engagement with men has been via mixed community groups on a Thursday. Further funding to continue this project is being sought.

There are now gender specific sessions for both men and women in the Heddfan Unit of Wrexham Maelor hospital. During the year, 77 individuals accessed 79 KIM sessions in the Wrexham Hospital, totalling 584 support hours.

The youth project continued to grow in size and reputation across Flintshire and received referrals from a broad range of sources; social services, NHS including CAMHS and adolescent hospitals, other third sector organisations, schools, colleges, DWP and of course self-referrals.

New referrals for the period totalled 87, of which 60 translated into young people directly accessing services. This is in addition to young people already accessing KIM youth services to strengthen their mental health, or who have adopted a mentoring/volunteering role with groups. Young people engaging have reported increasing confidence and enjoyment in activities both at KIM and beyond, many have increased attendance at school or college, others have secured jobs and/or places at university or college.

The range of activities young people engaged with includes social games groups in 2 locations, lunchtime school support, comic drawing, tennis and badminton sessions, a pilot youth led LGBTQ+ social support group, community drama and 121 sessions where needed. In addition, there were also 3 theatre/cinema visits, Easter and Halloween activities, a comprehensive summer programme including an art course, treasure trails, bowling and days out.

The project also supported 3 young people in successfully completing work experience from school or college, worked in collaboration with 2 other youth projects to promote wellbeing of young people beyond the organisation and to provide an exit route for those young people into community activities, and participated in 3 mental health and wellbeing events with young people's direct involvement.

Lastly, during this period the youth project secured a further 3 years funding from Children in Need, including the addition of a part time group support worker, and was featured on BBC Radio 4 and Radio Wales as part of The Listening Project.

From April 2018, we began looking at volunteering from a different perspective. The funding provided by Steve Morgan Foundation for the eVOLution project has enabled us identify aspects of volunteering that previous went unrecorded. This is because each person is seen as volunteering in some capacity and these outcomes are logged on the database as evidence of that individual's journey.

We continue to have groups in the community, which are supported by volunteers who have the bespoke training provided within the Volunteering and Community Development and Mental Health and Wellbeing qualifications but in addition to this, volunteering opportunities arise organically in every aspect of the organisation.

Volunteers over this period have accessed the accredited Welsh Language and Culture course and gained certificates in Mental Health First Aid, Emergency First Aid, Food Hygiene and Train the Trainer. One of our volunteers has completed a university module alongside student social workers due to his contribution to Outside In, a service user participation group. In this period, a KIM volunteer became a colleague as she is now a Group Support Worker for KIMBetweeners and also contributes to supporting our Active Inclusion project.

The volunteers continue to make a significant contribution to all aspects of KIM and provide support that makes a very real enhancement to the service KIM offers.

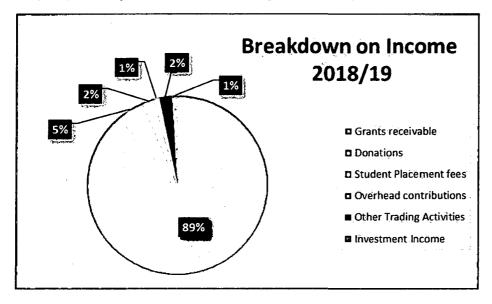

Principal funding sources

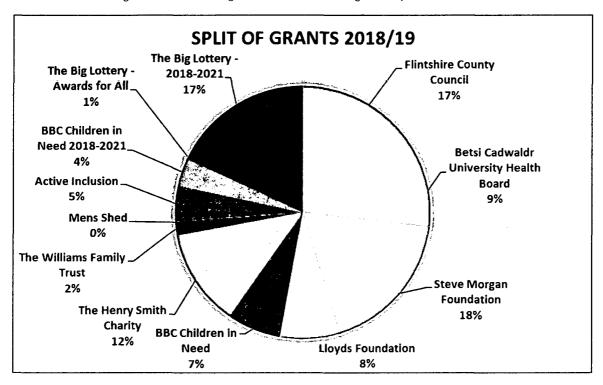
The principle funding sources for the charity during the year were split as follows:

Investment policy and objectives

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are few funds for long term investment. In addition to the Bank current account, the Charity also operates an instant access deposit account with HSBC and a high interest deposit account with Santander.

Reserves policy

KIM Inspire's reserves are generated from unrestricted sources i.e. payment for services, fundraising, room hire and donations, and are reviewed annually. The Board of Trustees have reviewed the Reserves policy. Ideally, to meet all potential financial commitments over a period of up to 6 months in the event of a loss of funding, unrestricted reserves should be £94,000. The level of unrestricted reserves at year end was below this however the Trustees have agreed and accepted that the risk is mitigated by the spread of income received and the very low likelihood that all funding would be lost at once.. This year the Trustees have agreed that Designated Reserves should remain at the current levels as follows: Replacement heating system £3,500; Redundancy costs £7,000 and the Garden Wall replacement £3,000.

STATEMENT FROM THE CHAIR OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES AND FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The directors of the company are also the charity's trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as trustees. Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, one third of the trustees are subject to retirement by rotation at each Annual General Meeting, after which they may be re-elected, if the resulting vacancy is not filled.

The Board of Trustees seeks to ensure that the needs of its beneficiary groups are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. To enhance the potential pool of trustees, the charity has sought to identify existing and previous KIM Inspire users of the service who would be willing to become members of the Board and use their own experience to assist the charity.

The more traditional business and managerial skills are well represented on the Board of Trustees. In an effort to maintain this broad skill mix, members of the Board are requested to provide a list of their skills (and update it each year) and in the event of particular skills being lost due to retirements, individuals are approached to offer themselves for election to the Board.

Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Board has five members from a variety of professional backgrounds and, in line with Welsh Government directives and includes significant user of services and previous user of services representation. The Board meets on a bi-monthly basis to discuss current and future work, financial and funding issues and other relevant general matters.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day-to-day responsibility for the provision of the services rests with the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). The CEO is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met, and she has responsibility for the day-to-day operational management of the charity including budgetary control, individual supervision of the staff team and also ensuring that the team continues to develop their skills and working practices in line with good practice.

The paid staff of KIM comprises: Chief Executive Officer (full time); Director of Operations (full time); Director of Finance (part time); Volunteer Development Manager (full time); Community Co-Ordinator Flintshire (full time); Youth Service Manager (part time); Youth Service Group Support Worker (part time); Community Co-Ordinator Wrexham (part time); Group Support Worker Mens Service Flintshire (part time) and Admin Officer (part time).

The paid staff meet regularly to plan the work. Volunteers meet every 6-8 weeks to plan work and participate in on-going training and supervision. Supervision of paid staff takes place on a 6 weekly basis throughout the year. KIM Inspire held its annual consultation event, in which individuals and stakeholders are invited to discuss the past and current work of the charity, the effectiveness of the charity in relation to mental health and to plan for future work/ developments.

Induction and training of new trustees

Most trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity, being either current or previous users of the charity's service, or current volunteers with the charity. All new trustees are invited and encouraged to attend training to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates, and cover:

- 1. The obligations of Board of Trustees members.
- 2. The main documents which set out the operational framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles.
- 3. Resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest published accounts.
- 4. Future plans and objectives.

A Trustee Induction Pack has also been prepared drawing information from the various Charity Commission publications signposted through the Commissions guide "The Essential Trustee". This is distributed to all new trustees along with the Memorandum and Articles, the latest financial statements and any other documentation considered relevant to enable members to best fulfil their role as trustee.

Potential trustees are invited to attend 3 trustee meetings following which they are interviewed by two members of the existing board to ensure suitability for the position. If successful, the individual is co-opted onto the Trustee board until the next Annual General Meeting.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Related parties - Strategic Partnerships, national policy and direction

In so far as it is complementary to the charity's objects, the charity is guided by both local and national policy. KIM works to a model of utilising community resources to encourage social integration and co-production in order to provide our service. The Social Services and Well-Being Act (Wales) 2014 has highlighted this approach as the way forward. We also endeavour to address the inequality and stigma for people who have mental illness in line with the Welsh Governments' 10-year strategy 'Together for Mental Health' implemented in 2012 and the Mental Health (Wales) Measure, 2010.

Representatives of the charity participate in mental health and voluntary sector network meetings. The charity has close links with local organisations such as Flintshire Local Voluntary Council, Flintshire Advocacy Project, Groundworks, the Community Mental Health teams and the Drug and Alcohol Teams. Such partnerships prove invaluable to the charity in establishing improved links and referral processes within the community and in identifying relevant policy developments and prospective funding.

Risk management

The Board of Trustees, along with all members of staff, hold an Annual Planning Meeting, to discuss KIM Inspire's current and future service provision and direction.

Risk Assessments of the charity and of specific projects and activities are carried out as appropriate. A risk register has been established, which is updated at least annually. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces.

Significant external risks to funding have led to the development of a strategic plan, which will allow for the diversification of funding and activities. Internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects.

Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers, individuals and visitors to the offices and venues used by the charity. All members of staff, volunteers and members of the Management Committee who may have significant contact with individuals are required to undergo appropriate DBS checks. Risk assessments are received prior to any involvement with KIM Inspire to ensure individuals are appropriate for our services and vice versa.

All policies and procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

In order to assess and strengthen KIM Inspire's governance and management structures, the charity utilises the services of an independent employment service to oversee the organisations employment and health and safety policies and practices.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property - 4% on cost

Plant and machinery - 25% on cost and 20% on cost

Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost
Computer equipment - 25% on cost

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company pays an employer's contribution into the employees own stakeholder pension schemes. Contributions payable by the charitable company are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Investments

Shares in the subsidiary company are shown at cost.

Restricted funds are funds which have been received by the charity for a particular purpose or project.

Flintshire County Council relates to the main revenue grant received for activities in Flintshire and is subject to a 3 year Service Level Agreement.

Betsi Cadwaldr University Health Board relates to a grant received towards the cost of general expenditure of the project in Flintshire and in the Adult Mental Health unit at Wrexham Maelor hospital.

Lloyds Foundation relates the Flintshire Community groupwork project and the associated costs of providing a Community Co-ordinator, expenses and training.

Steve Morgan Foundation relates to a grant received towards the costs of the eVOLution project.

BBC Children in Need relates to a grant received towards the costs of the Youth Project.

KIM Community Choir relates to funds received from fundraising and donations to operate the KIM Community Choir.

The Henry Smith Charity relates to a grant towards the cost of operating the women's community service in Wrexham.

Mens Sheds relates to a grant received from Tesco of £2,000 and £750 from Flintshire Community Chest towards the Holywell and District Mens Shed.

The Williams Family Trust relates to a grant received to purchase new IT equipment.

BBC Children in Need (2018-2021) relates to a grant received to continue and expand the Youth Project

The Big Lottery - Awards for All relates to a grant received to launch a pilot mens project in Wrexham.

The Big Lottery 2018-2021 relates to a grant received for the Mens Service in Flintshire and in the Heddfan unit of Wrexham Maelor hospital.

Active Inclusion relates to funding from the European Social Fund for an 'Include' project to move individuals closer to the job market.

Catering Kitchen relates to the income and expenditure of the catering kitchen project.

The Big Lottery - Capital Fund relates to a funding received to purchase the land and buildings known as The Hub, Park Lane, Holywell, CH8 7UR and for the initial refurbishment and development of the building for use by KIM Inspire.

Designated Fund the Trustees have agreed that Designated funds should continue in place to cover the following: Replacement heating system £3,500; Redundancy costs £7,000; and Garden wall replacement £3,000.
