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#### **CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT**

Whilst it gives me pleasure to report on the first accounts of Bristol Rovers (1883) Limited, I am however saddened to witness another poor season of results on the field of play.

With the appointment of Ray Graydon as Manager and Director Of Football, his brief was to bring much needed stability to the club and rebuild for the future. Ray released 9 players and initially brought in 7, and following a record number of season ticket sales, expectations were high for a good campaign.

A poor start did not help our cause and the season slowly developed into another disappointing fight against relegation. It was only with the last minute signings of Ijah Anderson and in particular Andy Rammel, who scored some vital goals for us, that we were able to secure our Football League status during the first season in which two clubs were relegated to the Football Conference. We send our best wishes to our old rivals Shrewsbury and Exeter and wish them a speedy return to the Football League.

Yet again, it has been a difficult year to control finances, particularly when the team is not performing well, however, as always our fans have been very supportive with their attendance, and also by joining the new Supporters Club Shareholding Scheme, which funded the signing of Andy Rammel and was instrumental in helping the club maintain its league status. My Board would like to thank The Supporters Club so much for their wonderful support and for launching this valuable scheme, which in time will give you, our supporters, two main Board directors and a major say in the running of the football club.

As I reported last year, the demise of the transfer market has had a very marked impact on trading patterns. We have always been very successful in the trading of players to cover our losses in previous years and we are now dealing with the reality of trading within our means without having cash windfalls to balance the books. We are fortunate we still have money due to us from the transfers of Nathan Ellington and Bobby Zamora but I suspect it will be a rare occurrence that we will be able to rely on such funds in the future.

It is an ongoing process to make sure our supporters and shareholders are fully aware of the difficulty we face in trading within our means. We cannot gamble on success to the extent we did before the demise of the transfer market and it is important our annual accounts and cash flow position are fully understood by everyone and that you understand the financial limitations your Board operate under.

My Directors understand that most supporters are only interested in the results of the team, but we also have a stadium to finance and believe it is vitally important for the long term future of our football club that this asset is protected.

The accounts for the year show a disappointing result with a loss of £703,614. This was much worse than originally budgeted due, as I have mentioned above, to the need to preserve the Football League status of the club, which resulted in our playing squad being expanded to bring in much needed quality. This meant that with our lack of overdraft facilities the Directors injected loans to the value of over £400,000 in the year. The Board has instituted further reviews into all areas of the Club to further reduce day to day running costs and ensure as much of the Club's revenues are spent on the pitch not off it.

On a more positive note I would like to congratulate Bristol Rovers Ladies Team on their success in retaining their premiership status and also for yet again reaching the semi-finals of the Women's FA Cup. I would also like to report that we will be putting in a planning application next month to redevelop The Memorial Stadium, subject to funding from the Football Foundation.

Finally I would again like to thank my Board of Directors, for their help and support during another difficult year, and of course our superb supporters who have again been magnificent in their support of the team. Lastly I should like to thank our shareholders for their support during these difficult times, and we must all pull together to achieve a more successful future.

### Principal activities

The principal activities of the group are that of a professional football league club and the operation of a sports stadium.

#### **Business review**

The company was incorporated on 1 August 2002.

The Chairman's statement includes a review of the development of the business during the year, its position at the year end and likely future developments.

There was a loss for the year after taxation and minority interests amounting to £703,614 (2002: £608,402). The directors do not recommend payment of a dividend and the loss has therefore been deducted from reserves.

# REPORT OF THE INDEPENDENT AUDITORS TO THE MEMBERS OF BRISTOL ROVERS (1883) LIMITED

We have audited the financial statements of Bristol Rovers (1883) Limited for the year ended 30 June 2003 which comprise the principal accounting policies, the consolidated profit and loss account, the balance sheets, the consolidated cash flow statement and notes 1 to 30. These financial statements have been prepared under the accounting policies set out therein.

This report is made solely to the company's members, as a body, in accordance with Section 235 of the Companies Act 1985. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the company's members those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the company and the company's members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

### Respective responsibilities of directors and auditors

The directors' responsibilities for preparing the directors' report and the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom law and accounting standards are set out in the statement of directors' responsibilities.

Our responsibility is to audit the financial statements in accordance with relevant legal and regulatory requirements and United Kingdom auditing standards.

We report to you our opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view and are properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985. We also report to you if, in our opinion, the directors' report is not consistent with the financial statements, if the group has not kept proper accounting records, if we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit, or if information specified by law regarding directors' remuneration and transactions with the group is not disclosed.

We read other information contained in the annual report, and consider whether it is consistent with the audited financial statements. This information comprises only the directors' report and the chairman's statement. We consider the implications for our report if we become aware of any apparent misstatements or material inconsistencies with the financial statements. Our responsibilities do not extend to any other information.

### Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with United Kingdom auditing standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the directors in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the group's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

### Basis of opinion (continued)

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

### Fundamental uncertainty - going concern

In forming our opinion, we have considered the adequacy of the disclosures made in the financial statements concerning the basis of preparation.

The financial statements have been prepared under the going concern basis, the validity of which depends on the directors successfully implementing their plans to reduce costs and raise further funds from non-operating sources. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that would result from a failure to achieve these objectives. Details of the circumstances relating to this fundamental uncertainty are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. Our opinion is not qualified in this respect.

### **Opinion**

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state affairs of the company and the group as at 30 June 2003 and of the loss of the group for the year then ended and have been properly prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 1985.

#### PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost convention (see note 1).

The principal accounting policies of the group are set out below and are unchanged from the previous year.

#### BASIS OF CONSOLIDATION

The group financial statements consolidate those of the company and of its subsidiary undertakings drawn up to 30 June 2003. Profits or losses on intra-group transactions are eliminated in full. On acquisition of a subsidiary, all of the subsidiary's assets and liabilities which exist at the date of acquisition are recorded at their fair value reflecting their condition at that date.

Goodwill on consolidation, representing the excess of the fair value of the consideration given over the fair values of the identifiable net assets acquired, is capitalised and is amortised on a straight line basis over its estimated useful economic life.

On 22 April 2003 Bristol Rovers (1883) Limited acquired the entire share capital of Bristol Rovers Football Club Limited by way of a share exchange. The transaction qualifies as a group reconstruction within the meaning of Financial Reporting Standard 6, and has been accounted for using the merger accounting method. Accordingly, the financial information for the current period and comparatives have been presented as if Bristol Rovers Football Club Limited had been owned by Bristol Rovers (1883) Limited throughout the current and prior periods.

### TURNOVER

Turnover is the total amount receivable by the group for goods supplied and services provided, excluding VAT and trade discounts.

#### DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is calculated to write down the cost or valuation less the estimated residual value of all tangible fixed assets, other than freehold land and buildings, by equal annual instalments over their expected useful lives. The rates generally applicable are:

Motor vehicles - 20% to 33%
Plant and machinery - 10% to 20%
Computer equipment - 33%
Freehold improvements - 5% to 33%

No depreciation is provided on freehold properties as it is the group's policy to maintain these assets in a continual state of sound repair. The useful economic lives of these assets are thus so long and residual values so high that any depreciation would not be material. Residual values are based on prices prevailing at the date of acquisition or subsequent valuation. Provision is made in the profit and loss account for any permanent diminution in value.

#### INTANGIBLE FIXED ASSETS

The group capitalises as an intangible asset the element of a player's transfer fee which relates to his registration together with associated costs and amortises that element over the period of his contract including any subsequent agreed extensions. No provision is made for the value of players developed within the group.

#### **STOCKS**

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

#### DEFERRED TAXATION

Deferred tax is recognised on all timing differences where the transactions or events that give the group an obligation to pay more tax in the future, or a right to pay less tax in the future, have occurred by the balance sheet date. Deferred tax assets are recognised when it is more likely than not that they will be recovered. Deferred tax is measured using rates of tax that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

#### LEASED ASSETS

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their expected useful lives. The interest element of the leasing payments represents a constant proportion of the capital balance outstanding and is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease.

All other leases are regarded as operating leases and the payments made under them are charged to the profit and loss account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

### **EMPLOYEES' CONTRACTS**

Provision is made for all liabilities in respect of employees' contracts signed before the balance sheet date.

#### **GRANTS**

Grants in respect of capital expenditure are credited to a deferred income account and are released to the profit and loss account by equal annual instalments over the expected useful lives of the relevant assets.

Grants of a revenue nature are credited to the profit and loss account in the same period as the related expenditure.

### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### 1 BASIS OF PREPARATION OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis which assumes that the company and its subsidiaries will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

During the year, the group incurred a loss after taxation and minority interests of £703,614. The profit attributable to the company was £21,818. At the balance sheet date the balance sheet of the subsidiary company, Bristol Rovers Football Club Limited, showed that current liabilities exceeded current assets by £1,494,106. The subsidiary has no bank overdraft facilities and further losses are indicated for the year ending 30 June 2004.

The directors continue to implement a series of measures to reduce costs and as in previous years, expect to realise further funds from non-operating sources. The directors consider that on this basis it is appropriate to prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis. The validity of the going concern assumption depends on the group's ability to reduce its cost base and realise such further funds. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that would result from a failure to achieve sufficient cost reductions and raise the necessary further funds.

#### 2 TURNOVER AND LOSS ON ORDINARY ACTIVITIES BEFORE TAXATION

The turnover and loss before taxation are attributable to the running of a professional football league club and the operation of a sports stadium.
