STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is administered by a Board of twelve Trustees who meet quarterly the Trustees are also members of the company/charity. The governing document of the charity is its *Memorandum and Articles of Association*. The day to day operations of the charity are delegated to the Chief Executive Officer and staff team. The Chief Executive Officer currently serves as Company Secretary.

The Trustee Board includes the Chief Fire Officers of the three Welsh Fire and Rescue Services and one representative from each of the three Fire Authorities in Wales. There are also six independent Trustees who bring specific skills, knowledge and experience to the charity and represent the wider business, public and voluntary sectors.

In 2009 the charity adopted a "Governance Charter," which sets out the roles and responsibilities of trustees, clarifies the respective duties of Board and CEO of the charity and includes a Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Policy Trustees are encouraged to develop new skills and knowledge to support effective performance in their role, and an annual Audit helps to identify particular areas of need. In response to a specific recruitment campaign carried out during the early part of 2011, four new independent Trustees were recruited during the course of the year.

INVESTMENT POWERS

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment but only after obtaining advice from a financial specialist and having regard to the suitability of investments and the need for diversification

RISK

The Trustees have continued to monitor major strategic, business and operational risks facing the charity, with regular reports to the Trustee Board that enable them to take steps to lessen any risks that are identified. Trustees receive quarterly management accounts of income and expenditure to inform decision making, and have adopted a reserves policy which governs how funds will be set aside for contingencies which have been identified through a thorough financial risk assessment.

In the light of the reduction in the organisation's core funding caused by the cessation of Welsh Government grant aid, as well as the difficult economic circumstances faced by its other major supporters, risk assessment was very much to the forefront of the Board's agendas. A number of options were explored in relation to securing a sustainable future for the organisation, including consideration of generating further independent income, looking into the possibility of formal collaborations with other organisations, and restructuring activities and staffing in line with predicted resources. After careful consideration, and having taken independent advice about its financial assumptions, it was decided to restructure the organisation. The charity took appropriate steps to introduce a new structure from April 2012. More details of the new structure are noted below.

RELATED PARTIES

The charity has a close relationship with the three Fire and Rescue Services and Fire Authorities of Wales, which nominate Trustees to the Board. A summary of those transactions may be found in the audited accounts. A Conflict of Interest policy is included in the Governance Charter to clarify accountability and appropriate decision-making with respect to related parties.

OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND PUBLIC BENEFIT

Wales Community Fire Safety Trust, also known as Atal Tân Cymru and Firebrake Wales, registration number 04556865, is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association It is also registered with the Charity Commission, number 100964

When it was set up, the Memorandum and Articles of Association stated that the charity had two objects, which are for the benefit of the people of Wales

- (i) to advance the education of the public in relation to all aspects of fire safety and fire prevention, and
- (ii) to reduce or assist in the reduction in the number of fire related deaths and injuries

There have been considerable changes in Community Fire Safety and Risk Reduction policies in the last ten years, and so Firebrake has kept its Objects under review. As a result — and in conjunction with the extended risk assessment exercise noted above — the Trustees took the decision to widen these Objects in order to extend the charity's role in support of fire safety to other aspects of the work of the Fire & Rescue Services, for example Road Safety This will not only provide additional support to valuable public services in these difficult economic times (hence improving public benefit), but should also make the charity itself more sustainable by opening it up to other avenues of support/and or resources. The intention is not to become a generalist community safety body, competing with similar existing organisations, perhaps to the detriment of all rather, it is to extend the particular skills, expertise, experience, and networks of a unique fire safety charity to the broader arena of Risk Reduction as covered by the Fire & Rescue Services in Wales

The appropriate steps were taken in accordance with charitable and company law and guidance, and as a result the following Objects were agreed by both the Charity Commission and Companies House in April 2012

- (i) to advance the education of the public in relation to all aspects of fire safety and fire prevention,
- (ii) to reduce or assist in the reduction in the number of fire related deaths and injuries, and
- to provide equipment, facilities, advice and services which will promote safety and reduce accidents or dangers in and to Welsh communities

REVIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Organisational Development

As noted above, much work was done during the year in relation to risk assessment and sustainability, resulting in a new structure for the charity

The required consultation and planning for restructure were carried out in an open and inclusive way amongst the staff group, and all were involved in considering possible ways forward. Ultimately the shape of the new structure was determined on the basis of the expected work streams going forward plus the necessity to ensure that the organisation and its resources (including staff) are properly governed and managed. All four existing posts were considered to be at risk of redundancy, but under the new structure two posts were offered as suitable alternatives. As a result Kate Slowinski and Kathryn Eveleigh were made redundant, while the remaining two members of staff, Helen Prior and Richard Hall, took up the part-time posts of Chief Executive Officer and Policy and Research Manager. At the time of production of these accounts (August 2012) the new structure seems to be working very well.

Indicative Business Plan

Throughout this period, staff also began to work against the new Indicative Business Plan which was approved by Trustees in May 2011

In the latter part of 2010/11, Firebrake had taken the opportunity to review its work and restate its position in support of Community Fire Safety, once more ensuring a good fit with its statutory partners that will bring both good value for money, and appropriate and effective responses to public need. The resulting Plan, "Fire Safety – Make the Connection" sets out the charity's Outcomes and Operating Principles, as well as outlining a number of Workstreams that will guide its activities going forward. Some key examples of progress during 2011/12 are noted below

Raising awareness and promoting collaboration

People's actions, inactions, and reactions in relation to fire are extremely significant – right through from its ignition to its consequences. Existing ongoing contact within communities and between organisations and individuals can be the key to recognising those most at risk, and by working together their safety can be improved. In June 2011 Firebrake held an event for Health and Social Care practitioners in order to promote these messages.

The purpose of the half-day event was to increase knowledge and awareness of fire risk amongst those who work with or support individuals in a health or social care situation—36 delegates from 13 different organisations across North Wales came together in the Catrin Finch Centre at Glyndŵr University, Wrexham to hear three external speakers, and take part in two practical workshops—Participants were encouraged to develop and share ideas on how the learning from the event could be practically applied within the workplace in order to improve the fire safety of their clients/service users

Supporting an all-Wales perspective

Arson and fire related crime have always been considered to be a partnership challenge, and in response an all-Wales Joint Arson Group (JAG) was formed in 2005. The Group is made up of key Welsh agencies, sending out clear messages about the need to take collective responsibility for this community problem that can only be dealt with successfully through a collaborative approach. In 2007 JAG worked alongside the Welsh Government to produce a Wales. Arson Reduction Strategy (WARS), and has been a fundamental part of its development and delivery. Firebrake has been a key member of the Group since its inception.

2011/12 saw the Charity extend its function within JAG, taking a lead on drawing together the information and drafting a Review of the original WARS, collecting and compiling information for and drafting a new Strategy for 2012 onwards, and managing the stakeholder consultation process for the new Strategy Firebrake were also able to provide assistance to the Group in helping to align the new Strategy with some of the Welsh Government's higher level strategies, as well as making the Group aware of areas of best practice being adopted elsewhere

Volunteering and Community Involvement

Throughout the year Firebrake began to explore a number of volunteering models which could encourage individuals to support the work of the Fire and Rescue Services in their own communities. Funding has been sought to develop a Wales Community Fire Safety Volunteer Scheme, but unfortunately none has been received to date. However, in conjunction with South Wales Fire and Rescue Service and other partners, the Charity is looking to run a small-scale pilot in specific local communities within the Borough of Bridgend.

Further north, in Rhyl, Firebrake continued to work in partnership with the Fire Service and local community groups to tackle problems of fire safety in their area 2011/12 saw the Charity undertake the first part of this partnership project, the production of a Community Profile more details are given under the section on Research below. This is an exciting and innovative project that has the capacity to be adapted for other community consultation/engagement work and which could certainly be rolled out throughout Wales.

Research - Targeting and Understanding Risk Factors

Recognising a serious issue with fires in Rhyl West and Rhyl South West, North Wales Fire and Rescue Service (NWFRS) has been proactively targeting these two communities, stepping-up activities to promote and deliver free Home Fire Safety Checks in the area. In 2010/11 they decided to approach partner organisations to develop a project that would better engage with these communities, and Firebrake has been an ever-present member of the resulting Project Management Group (PMG) since its inception. The project aims to improve home fire safety in Rhyl South West and Rhyl West by improving the skills, capacity and efficacy of these communities to recognise and prioritise their fire risk, and support their local Fire and Rescue Service in managing it.

Firebrake helped to define this work at an early stage helping to set up and determine the parameters of the PMG, liaising with the Welsh Government Communities Directorate to keep them informed of progress, drawing up the overall Project Plan and timetable. During 2011/12 the Charity managed and conducted primary fire safety research in the area, training community members within partner organisations in survey skills to enable them to be directly involved in the research. Firebrake also collected and collated relevant secondary research, which along with the findings of the Community Survey informed the writing of the Community Profile, the agreed output of this first phase of the Project. In this work the Charity was able to bring a level of expertise in relation to research, data analysis and consultation methods that the PMG would not otherwise have had the resulting Community Profile provides clear recommendations for further action, and will be a resource that could be used to inform a variety of audiences both within and outside of NWFRS.

Local/Regional Support

Alongside its other work Firebrake tries to respond to requests to support particular pieces of work which are being undertaken on a local or regional basis. One example during 2011/12 was work undertaken by Mid & West Wales Fire and Rescue Service in relation to their Fire and Mental Health Partnership Project. Another was with the Corporate Communications Team in North Wales where, in response to earlier research undertaken both by Firebrake and others, it was decided to develop a Home Fire Safety Toolkit.

The Toolkit, containing a suite of materials to enable health and social care practitioners to support the fire safety needs of their clients, was designed both to raise fire safety awareness, and to serve as permanent fire safety reminders for clients. Firebrake's key role was in ensuring that the Toolkit, as well as the individual content materials, reflected the feedback of both their primary audience (practitioners) and secondary audience (clients and service users). This involved applying market research and new product development principles and techniques to maximise uptake, usage and effectiveness once again the Charity's understanding of public consultation and focus group techniques, as well as its knowledge of the target audience and the likely communication barriers involved were invaluable. The collaboration has led to the production of a Toolkit which not only looks professional but which is tailored specifically to the needs of those who will use it and who will be influenced by it, and one which in time will prove to make a real difference to improving the fire safety of the target group

LOOKING FORWARD

As noted above, at the time of the production of these accounts (August 2012), the new structure seems to be working well. During 2011/12 the Trustees of the organisation, supported by its staff, undertook a serious review of the Charity's position, and took some difficult decisions about its future direction. As a result, Firebrake is now operating well within its financial limitations, and is focusing its work very clearly against agreed priorities and needs. Looking forward the Charity understands that it is still operating in a financially and politically volatile climate, but the Trustees believe that they have taken all possible steps to put Firebrake in the best position to ride out these difficult times and move forward on a more sustainable basis.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year, the charity made a deficit on its unrestricted funds of £51,115. This deficit has been set against the charity's Activities & services designated fund as agreed by the Board of Trustees.

Unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2012 were £143,647 Free reserves excluding designated funds and fixed assets amounted to £11,347

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

Cash Flow Statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

Charitable trading activities

This includes all costs relating to the furtherance of the Charity's objectives as stated in the Trustees report

Income Receivable

- Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are due
- Donations and voluntary income are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received
- Investment income is credited to income when it is actually received

Funds Accounting

Funds held by the company are either

- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the company without further specified purpose and are available as general funds
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the board of directors for particular purposes
- Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund

Resources Expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to the activity

Direct charitable activity costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out of Headquarters, and include costs incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are initially recorded at cost

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset, as follows

Equipment - 25%-33 33% straight line Fixtures & Fittings - 25%-33 33% straight line Leasehold property improvements - 10% straight line

Operating Lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

Governance Costs

This includes all costs relating to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

Pension Costs

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities.

Irrecoverable VAT

The Charity qualifies for partial exemption for VAT purposes. The irrecoverable VAT is written back to the income and expenditure account in the year to which it relates.
