STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is administered by a board of twelve trustees who meet quarterly the trustees are also members of the company/charity. The governing document of the charity is its *Memorandum and Articles of Association*. The day to day operations of the charity are delegated to the Chief Executive Officer and staff team. The Chief Executive Officer currently serves as Company Secretary.

The Trustee Board includes the Chief Fire Officers of the three Welsh Fire and Rescue Services and one representative from each of the three fire authorities in Wales. There are also six independent trustees who bring specific skills, knowledge and experience to the charity and represent the wider business, public and voluntary sectors.

In 2009 the charity adopted a "Governance Charter," which sets out the roles and responsibilities of trustees, clarifies the respective duties of the board and CEO of the charity and includes a Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Policy Trustees are encouraged to develop new skills and knowledge to support effective performance in their role, and an annual audit helps to identify particular areas of need

INVESTMENT POWERS

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment but only after obtaining advice from a financial specialist and having regard to the suitability of investments and the need for diversification

RISK

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The trustees have continued to monitor major strategic, business and operational risks facing the charity, with regular reports from the CEO that enable them to take steps to lessen any risks that are identified. Trustees receive quarterly management accounts of income and expenditure to inform decision making, and have adopted a reserves policy which governs how funds will be set aside for contingencies which have been identified through a thorough financial risk assessment.

In the light of the reduction in the organisation's core funding caused by the cessation of Welsh Government grant aid, as well as the difficult economic circumstances faced by its other major supporters, risk assessment has been very much to the forefront of the board's agendas over the last two years. As reported in last year's annual report, after careful consideration and having taken independent advice about its financial assumptions, trustees decided to restructure the organisation in April 2012. This report gives information about the progress made under the new structure.

RELATED PARTIES

The charity has a close relationship with the three Fire and Rescue Services and Fire Authorities of Wales, which nominate trustees to the board. A summary of those transactions may be found in the audited accounts. A Conflict of Interest policy is included in the Governance Charter to clarify accountability and appropriate decision-making with respect to related parties.

OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND PUBLIC BENEFIT

Wales Community Fire Safety Trust, also known as Atal Tân Cymru and Firebrake Wales, registration number 04556865, is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is also registered with the Charity Commission, number 100964.

As reported in last year's annual report, Firebrake Wales extended its charitable objects in April 2012 to incorporate wider support for the work of the Welsh Fire & Rescue Services to the benefit of the public. The objects now stand as noted below

- (i) to advance the education of the public in relation to all aspects of fire safety and fire prevention,
- (ii) to reduce or assist in the reduction in the number of fire related deaths and injuries, and
- (III) to provide equipment, facilities, advice and services which will promote safety and reduce accidents or dangers in and to Welsh communities

REVIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Organisational Development

The early part of 2012/13 saw the two remaining staff members in the new structure familiarising themselves with all aspects of work which had not previously fallen directly into their remit, and adapting systems and processes to suit the new structure. The financial and administrative requirements of the organisation are well within staff capabilities, although at times the work does create additional demands on time more usually spent on operational activities. This was particularly the case towards the end of the year when the charity began preparations to move out of its office base in Newport into alternative, more financially sustainable accommodation. The impact of this move had been considered as part of the board's decision to restructure the organisation, although the full financial benefit of the move will not be felt until 2013/14.

Nevertheless, by March 2013 it was apparent from a number of indicators that Firebrake is in a stronger position than it was twelve months ago

- · the charity has made significant progress on most work-streams,
- demand for its work and/or support has increased in the period,
- the new team has settled in well and is following a clear direction,
- good forecasting and financial management have led to a balanced budget,
- the charity's exposure to the Newport office lease commitment ends in September 2013

The strengthening of Firebrake's position can be attributed to a number of factors, including

- a restructure based on a more realistic economic framework for the charity (one which will be improved again by the office move in September 2013),
- the hard work of the staff team,
- the support of individual trustees and officers within the Welsh Fire & Rescue Services (FRSs),
- a move by the FRSs towards more all-Wales working, and the introduction of their National Issues Committee.
- a more overt emphasis on evaluation, particularly Results Based Accountability and other outcome based models

Operational Activities

In general the work that Firebrake does falls into either one of two broad categories

Direct public benefit

This work is more clearly 'public-facing' supporting the charity's first object, "to advance the education of the public in relation to all aspects of fire safety and fire prevention"

Indirect public benefit

Here the charity is more directly supporting the FRSs in *their* mission to improve the safety of Welsh citizens, supporting Firebrake's second object, "to reduce or assist in the reduction in the number of fire related deaths and injuries"

As part of the restructure it was accepted that the organisation's capacity to deliver directly to the public would be reduced, initially at least work in this area tends to be done on a reactive basis, and a reduced capacity makes it harder to realise its potential for wider value through extending local projects to become regional or national models. This will be a key area for consideration in moving the charity forward in the next few years.

However, the charity made good progress against most of its work-streams during the year, with a noticeable emphasis on supporting and adding capacity to the FRSs, particularly through its involvement with the Chief Fire Officers' Association Wales (CFOA Wales) Some key examples of progress are noted below

Raising awareness and promoting collaboration

Raising awareness is a fundamental component in achieving Firebrake's mission of driving down deaths and injuries in fire by encouraging individuals and communities to share responsibility for their own fire safety. A good example of this is the work that the charity undertook with Flintshire County Council's Workforce Development Team

This work built on Firebrake's experience and expertise in working with support staff to raise their awareness of fire risk and safety, and build their confidence to apply this knowledge in support of the potentially 'at risk' people they work for/with. It also made use of the work undertaken by the charity's intern in 2012, which involved developing a range of approaches and materials for use with particular learners. Throughout the development, Firebrake kept in touch with relevant officers in North Wales FRS in order to ensure that it aligned with and enhanced their own approaches to Home Fire Safety awareness and education. After a number of meetings and informal presentations, a half-day session is now planned for Summer 2013, to be delivered to a range of Health & Social Care and housing staff. If successful the session could be adapted for those workers who support other 'at risk' groups, for example, vulnerable adults or the elderly. Ultimately this model could be rolled out to other local authorities where it could be adapted to target regional or local priority groups

Other work that began in 2012/13 was a liaison with Public Health Wales in relation to their involvement in alcohol and substance misuse work. Initiated by a discussion around The Burden of Injury in Wales (2012) report, work could involve awareness raising and training for both agencies and individuals, as well as building collaborative working arrangements between the FRSs, Public Health, and other organisations

Supporting an all-Wales perspective

The CFOA Wales Community Risk Reduction Committee - made up of a group of Senior FRS officers and the Welsh Government - has amongst its priorities the development of partnership co-operation in order to deliver Community Safety activities. To this end, and in line with the charity's vision, Firebrake was invited to join the Committee in January 2012, and has played an active part ever since. Work throughout the year has included

- A paper summarising the 2011 Census Statistics signposting the availability and nature of the data, as well as detailing its potential usefulness for the FRSs in Wales,
- Involvement in ongoing work looking at the economic cost of arson which led to a broader discussion of the need for a systematic approach to data collection for the purposes of reporting, monitoring and evaluating the work of the Welsh FRSs,
- A briefing paper on Reduced Intensity Propensity Cigarettes providing an update on the introduction of the Reference Standard and an analysis of the incidence and severity of smokers' materials fires in Wales.
- A Research Bulletin updating the Committee on various relevant research projects being undertaken by Fire and Rescue Services across the UK which are likely to have relevance and implications for Wales,

- A briefing paper on the major programmes and actions in Wales relating to the Families
 First programme, helping to inform a position statement from Welsh FRSs, influence
 practice, and improve collaborative working,
- A briefing paper on the impact of Carbon Monoxide poisoning in Wales helping to inform a strategic response by Welsh FRSs

Volunteering and Community Involvement

Firebrake believes that if lasting change is to be achieved, individuals and communities need to share responsibility for their own fire safety. While FRSs seek to educate and involve communities in the work that they do, as one of the emergency services their primary duty is to protect the public. However, Firebrake is well placed to encourage, support, or even challenge communities to take some responsibility for themselves, and to mobilise their resources whether as a community or as individual volunteers.

An example of this was the work done throughout 2012/13 in Maesteg and Caerau, Bridgend These communities were targeted because of the particularly high levels of deliberate fires in the neighbourhood, but initial attempts to recruit individual volunteers were not particularly successful. Firebrake then made contact with a local community project in Caerau, and late in 2012 delivered an awareness-raising session to a small group of Street Ambassadors and other interested individuals. Firebrake is now helping to develop tailored materials which aim to equip community members to become the "eyes and ears" for the FRS on the ground. A number of possible actions and activities were identified at the November session, which can be taken forward either individually or collaboratively by Firebrake, South Wales FRS, and the community itself. While the initial focus of the project was on deliberate fires, there have already been discussions about how it can be developed to include Home Fire Safety messages and/or support. Subject to available resources and priorities, this is also a project which could be replicated in other communities. At the time of writing this report (September 2013), Firebrake has just received a grant from GwirVol to help to take this work forward.

Research and Policy

There is a wealth of fire safety research, incident statistics and strategies produced each year in Wales, the UK and internationally. Firebrake is actively involved in several areas of ongoing research and data analysis both to promote a better understanding of the risk factors for fire, fire injury and death, and to support the application of this knowledge to improve its own and FRS activities. During 2012/13 work in this area has included

- Collaboration with Swansea University to contribute to and update the 'Fire Safety' areas
 of both the Injury Observatory of Britain and Ireland (IOBI) and the Collaboration for
 Accident Prevention and Injury Control (CAPIC) websites. These new websites are due to
 go live in April 2013,
- Work for the all-Wales FRS Home Fire Safety work-stream to explore how additional insight/trends can be gained (and then applied) from the analysis of data captured by the FRSs for reports such as 'Fire Related – Fatality or Serious Injury Report',
- Work both to influence the nature of the wider publication of data, and its provision in the most useful formats for informing various projects/groups,
- A response to the UK Statistics Authority assessment of Welsh Government's National Statistics, and participation in the Welsh Government's own Welsh Fire Statistics Consultation process The latest Welsh Government Fire Statistics Bulletin¹ includes reference to Firebrake's use of their data,
- Liaison with Weish Government to enable incident data to be presented at a geographical level that is both recognisable by and meaningful to Welsh citizens and their communities

Local/Regional Support

Whilst recognising the benefits of being an all-Wales organisation, Firebrake understands that the FRSs may also benefit from specific regional support from the charity, whether to supplement local resource requirements or to take advantage of particular skills and expertise. During 2012/13 Firebrake continued to support individual FRS activities, including

- North Wales FRS Home Fire Safety Toolkit during 2011/12 Firebrake had worked with Noth Wales FRS to produce and support the Toolkit which contains a suite of materials to enable health and social care practitioners to support the fire safety needs of their clients Work continued into 2012/13, with Firebrake leading an independent evaluation over the summer,
- Rhyl South West / Rhyl West Home Fire Safety Project having previously undertaken a
 Community Profile to inform this project, Firebrake was involved in a launch/consultation
 meeting in July 2012, and has continued to support other members in the delivery of
 identified actions
- Referrals Firebrake continues to take on-line referrals for the Home Fire Safety Check on an all-Wales basis

LOOKING FORWARD

The restructure undertaken in April 2012 involved some difficult choices for the charity. One year on, the evidence suggests that in terms of the emphasis and focus of the work, and the maintenance of relevant skills and experience within the staff team to deliver it, the right choices were made. Moreover, the restructure has also delivered a more streamlined and sustainable organisation that is in a good position to move forward.

Financially the position should improve again during 2013/14 once the liability for the office premises in Newport cease. However, until that time the Trustees consider it prudent to retain the current structure and work-plan which have served the charity well in the last year. A review will be undertaken early in 2014 with a view to preparing a new Business Case to carry Firebrake forward beyond April 2014. It is hoped that this will allow the charity to refocus some of its capacity onto more proactive and public-facing work, redressing the balance between indirect and direct public benefit noted above.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year, the charity made a deficit on its unrestricted funds of £18,552. This deficit has been set against the charity's Activities & services designated fund as agreed by the Board of Trustees.

Unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2013 were £125,095 Free reserves excluding designated funds and fixed assets amounted to £4,927

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

Cash Flow Statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small

Charitable Trading Activities

This includes all costs relating to the furtherance of the charity's objectives as stated in the trustees report

Income Receivable

- Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are due
- Donations and voluntary income are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received
- Investment income is credited to income when it is actually received

Fund Accounting

Funds held by the company are either

- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the company without further specified purpose and are available as general funds
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the board of directors for particular purposes
- Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund

Resources Expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to the activity

Direct charitable activity costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out of Headquarters, and include costs incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)**

Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are initially recorded at cost

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset, as follows

Equipment

- 25%-33 33% straight line

Fixtures & fittings

- 25%-33 33% straight line

Leasehold property improvements

- 10% straight line

Operating Lease Agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

Governance Costs

This includes all costs relating to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements

Pension Costs

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities

Irrecoverable VAT

The charity qualifies for partial exemption for VAT purposes The irrecoverable VAT is written back to the income and expenditure account in the year to which it relates
