## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is administered by a Board of eleven Trustees who meet quarterly. The Trustees are also members of the company/charity. The governing document of the charity is its *Memorandum and Articles of Association*. The day to day operations of the charity are delegated to the Chief Executive Officer and staff team. The Chief Executive Officer currently serves as Company Secretary.

The Trustee Board includes the Chief Fire Officers of the three Fire & Rescue Services of Wales and one representative from each of the three Fire Authorities in Wales. There are also 5 additional Trustees who bring specific skills, knowledge and experience to the charity and represent the wider business, public and voluntary sectors.

Until this year, the *Articles of Association* included provision for two seats on the board to be reserved for representatives of the Welsh Assembly Government. Following discussion with the Welsh Assembly Government, the charity amended *Articles of Association* to remove this provision. The two Trustees who previously held these designated seats were re-elected at the same meeting to serve as Independent Trustees of the charity. This change has enabled the charity to convey a stronger sense of independence in governance to all stakeholders.

The charity has adopted a "Governance Charter," which sets out the roles and responsibilities of trustees, clarifies the respective duties of Board and CEO of the charity and includes a Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest Policy. The Charter is based on the principles of *Good Governance:* A Code for the Voluntary and Community Sector. In addition, each new Trustee receives an induction pact that includes the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, business plan and relevant guidance from Companies House on directorship and the Charity Commission on Trusteeship. Trustees are encouraged to develop new skills and knowledge to support effective performance in their role and funding is set aside for this purpose.

#### **INVESTMENT POWERS**

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the charity has the power to make any investment but only after obtaining advice from a financial specialist and having regard to the suitability of investments and the need for diversification.

#### **RISK**

The Trustees have continued to monitor major strategic, business and operational risks facing the charity. Systems are in place to assess risks with quarterly reports to the Trustee Board that enable them to take steps to lessen the risks. Trustees receive quarterly management accounts of income and expenditure to inform decision making. Trustees adopted a reserves policy which governs how funds will be set aside for contingencies which have been identified through a thorough an annual financial risk assessment process.

The charity is currently supported in the main through core grants from the three Fire Authorities and the Welsh Assembly Government as well as specific project grants from the Welsh Assembly Government. The Welsh Assembly Government core grant was reduced by 25% during the year and the Fire Flash (Home Fire Safety Promotion) grant reduced to £100,000. However, the charity plans to seek future funding from the Welsh Assembly Government, Fire Authorities and other public bodies to undertake community fire safety projects to achieve specific outcomes. In the year to come, the charity will also seek to diversify its funding base through securing grants and donations from private sector donations and charitable trust funding sources.

## **RELATED PARTIES**

The charity has a close relationship with the three Fire and Rescue Services and Fire Authorities of Wales, which nominate Trustees to the Board. A summary of those transactions may be found in the audited accounts. The charity has established a policy on Conflict of Interest to clarify accountability and appropriate decision-making with respect to related parties.

## **OBJECTIVES, ACTIVITIES AND PUBLIC BENEFIT**

Wales Community Fire Safety Trust, also known as Atal Tân Cymru and Firebrake Wales, registration number 04556865, is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is also registered with the Charity Commission, number 100964.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association state that the Charity has two objects, which are for the benefit of the people of Wales:

- (i) to advance the education of the public in relation to all aspects of fire safety and fire prevention and
- (ii) to reduce or assist in the reduction in the number of fire related deaths and injuries.

The Trustees have considered guidance from the Charity Commission on public benefit in all aspects of planning, review and development of the charity's activities and services. Atal Tân Cymru / Firebrake Wales has pursued its objects, mindful of the need to demonstrate public benefit, through a range of awareness-raising and educative initiatives including fire safety promotion projects, collecting, analysing and disseminating evidence from research, facilitating partnerships to promote a collaborative approach to fire prevention and encouraging evidence-based policy and practice to reduce the incidence of fire and the number of deaths and injuries in fires within communities. Further information on these activities can be found in the next section.

## **REVIEW OF DEVELOPMENTS, ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS**

The charity has continued to develop and clarify its vision, mission, goals, structure, decision-making processes, activities, operational policies and internal systems during the year with a view to ensuring continuous improvement in all activities and services.

During the year, the charity began to re-focus its work from public-facing, media-based campaigns to building partnerships with and between the Fire and Rescue Services and other organisations with an interest in community fire safety to support a strategic, cost-effective, evidence-based approach to fire prevention.

This shift was prompted by an evaluation of the Fire Flash project, which showed that its campaigns had little effect on public awareness or actions related to fire risk. In addition, the planned reduction in the Fire Flash Grant from the Welsh Assembly Government in 2009 would not sustain the same type or level of work. Finally, evidence emerging from studies of fire prevention activities and recommendations in the *Fire and Rescue National Framework for Wales* pointed to the importance of working in partnership, promoting the most effective models for fire safety initiatives and using evidence from research and evaluation to inform developments in practice and policy.

## **Development of the Organisation**

Trustees met quarterly during the year and business was conducted following agreed agendas which were circulated in advance along with reports and supporting documents. Minutes and follow-up reports were disseminated promptly after meetings to ensure efficient implementation of decisions. The CEO and staff maintained effective communication with the Board between meetings through email, postal correspondence and phone to ensure Trustees were regularly informed of developments and consulted on relevant issues between Board meetings.

During the year, terms and conditions of employment, job specifications and remuneration and policies related to employment were reviewed and revised in line with good practice. Performance appraisals were conducted for staff and learning needs were identified, both of which informed the development of individual work programmes and learning and development plans.

A new staffing structure was introduced late in the financial year to take account of emerging challenges and opportunities as well as the newly-clarified strategic direction of the Charity. The post of "Projects and Events Officer" was revised to become the "Projects and Partnerships Coordinator," reflecting the changing requirements of that role. The post of "Policy and Research Coordinator was established in February to take on responsibility for collecting, analysing, conducting and disseminating research to inform evidence-based public policy and fire prevention practice. A single role of "Central Services Co-ordinator" was developed to work with the CEO in day to day coordination of administration, premises, policies and procedures, meetings and financial management.

The charity continues to review and update its business plan on an annual basis to take account of changes within the external environment and opportunities for extending its remit and furthering its objectives. The charity completed a review of internal policies and procedures and devised a plan for continuous review and development to ensure systems and processes for governance, employment and service-delivery are in keeping with good practice and relevant legislation.

The commitment to quality and continuous improvement will continue in future to ensure the organisation maintains a firm base on which to build its activities and services. The charity will also focus on attracting new sources of income in order to sustain and develop its work.

## Partnerships and Projects

The charity was particularly successful in bringing together decision-makers and practitioners across the public, private and voluntary sector to share ideas and forge cohesive strategies aimed at reducing the incidence of fire, thereby delivering benefits to communities throughout Wales.

The Strategic Group, comprised of Fire & Rescue Service lead officers for Community Safety and representatives of the Fire & Rescue Service Communications practitioners group and Fire Services Branch of the Welsh Assembly Government ensures that the charity's priorities and activities are in keeping with wider community safety policy in Wales. The Strategic Group held responsibility for overseeing the planning, delivery and evaluation of fire safety initiatives supported by the Welsh Assembly Government Fire Flash (Home Fire Safety Promotion) grant during the year.

Atal Tân / Firebrake has provided facilitation support and/or been an active participant in forums including the Joint Arson Group, Fire & Rescue Service Equalities Practitioners Forum, Fire & Rescue Service Youth Engagement Forum, Wales Council for Voluntary Action Research Network and the Wales Tobacco Control Alliance. This work has resulted in sharing of good practice between partners as well as a co-ordinated, cost-effective approach to preventative work which in turn will be of benefit to the public.

During the year, the charity embarked on a pioneering Smoke Free Living initiative in partnership with ASH Wales and the Fire & Rescue Services, starting with a pilot phase in Mid & West Wales. The project provides risk reduction information to households where someone smokes in an effort to reduce the risks of smoking to health, children, the environment and fire safety. Evaluation of the pilot phase demonstrated a positive effect in encouraging safer behaviours and lessons learned will be incorporated into the extension of the project throughout Wales later in 2009.

Atal Tân / Firebrake entered a partnership with Care & Repair Cymru, the co-ordinating and support agency for the 22 separate Care & Repair agencies in Wales. The charities work together with the Fire & Rescue Services to ensure information, support and Home Fire Safety Checks are extended to some of the most vulnerable older people in Wales with the aim of engaging with them to reduce their risks of fire in the home.

In the year to come, the charity plans to develop further partnerships with organisation with the goal of reducing the incidence of fires in communities throughout Wales. Partnerships will specifically focus on work with organisations that work for and with people who are most at risk of death or injury in fire, those who are hardest to reach with conventional fire safety information and those most resistant to adopting safer behaviours. Initiatives will promote the ethos of working with communities to ensure they are involved in service planning, delivery and evaluation and so that individuals can make informed choices about fire safety.

## **Policy and Research**

During the year, the charity increased its use of research to promote an evidence-based and cost effective approach to community fire safety in Wales. Information gained from fire incidence data, existing research in Wales and beyond, through evaluation of existing practice and completion of new studies was shared with partners, the public and decision-makers in the Fire & Rescue Services and Welsh Assembly Government.

The charity developed stronger links with the academic and research communities and with Communities and Local Government in England in order to explore opportunities for collaboration and better use of qualitative and quantitative data in order to support better targeting of resources and use of methods most likely to achieve a reduction in fire risks in communities throughout Wales.

Atal Tân / Firebrake co-ordinated a survey of 1000 people in Wales to assess their knowledge, attitudes and behaviour with respect to fire safety. Results will be combined with evidence from incidence data and other research to produce a comprehensive report of latest evidence to inform the development of new initiatives, formation of partnerships and fire safety campaign activities. The charity plans to repeat the study annually in order to measure broad changes in public awareness of fire safety year on year.

As part of the partnership with Care & Repair, Atal Tân / Firebrake conducted a study of the 22 Care & Repair agencies to document their existing work with the Fire and Rescue Services, assess their capacity and willingness for extending this and provide recommendations for expanding, improving and sustaining partnerships to reduce the risks of fire for vulnerable people over 60. The charity will facilitate a working group of Fire and Rescue Service and Care and Repair staff to take forward recommendations from the report, share learning between individual delivery partnerships and monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of project outcomes.

All activities and services were subject to robust monitoring and evaluation to identify outcomes and implications for future initiatives and policy. For example, findings from the Smoke Free Homes pilot evaluation will be used both to improve future implementation of the project and to inform the development of other effective partnerships and fire prevention initiatives in the future.

During the year, the charity maintained close liaison with senior officials in the Welsh Assembly Government to promote the incorporation of evidence from research and evaluation into the ongoing development of effective Wales-wide policy on community fire safety.

In the year to come, Atal Tân / Firebrake will explore further opportunities for conducting, collecting, analysing and disseminating research to promote cost-effective, evidence-based fire prevention practice across Wales.

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

During the year, the charity made a surplus on its unrestricted funds of £13,819 which when added to the accumulated surplus brought forward from last year leaves an accumulated surplus carried forward of £220,344. The Trustees have designated a significant proportion of this surplus for activities to be delivered in the coming year or for contingencies identified through the risk assessment within its Reserves Policy.

A full analysis of the incoming and outgoing resources for each restricted fund is shown in note 16 of the statutory accounts.

The Trust wishes to thank the Welsh Assembly Government and the Fire and Rescue Authorities for their continued support and interest in the charity.

#### **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES**

The Charities Act requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended.

In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- (1) select suitable accounting policies, as described on page 14, and then apply them on a consistent basis;
- (2) make judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable; and
- (3) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time, the financial position of the Charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. The Trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.

## Notes To The Financial Statements Year Ended 31 March 2009

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 1985..

#### **Cash Flow Statement**

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements, on the grounds that the charity is small.

#### Charitable trading activities

This includes all costs relating to the furtherance of the Charity's objectives as stated in the Trustees report.

#### Income Receivable

- Grants receivable are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are
  due.
- Donations and voluntary income are credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are received.
- Investment income is credited to income when it is actually received.

#### **Funds Accounting**

Funds held by the company are either:

- Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the
  objects of the company without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.
- Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the board of directors for particular purposes.
- Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund.

#### Resources Expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to the activity.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out of Headquarters. Management and administration costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### **Fixed Assets**

Fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset, as follows:

Equipment - 25%-33.33% straight line Fixtures & Fittings - 25%-33.33% straight line

Leasehold property improvements - 10% straight line

## 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### **Operating Lease agreements**

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lesser are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### **Governance Costs**

This includes all costs relating to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

#### Pension Costs

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities.

#### Irrecoverable VAT

The Charity qualifies for partial exemption for VAT purposes. The irrecoverable VAT is written back to the income and expenditure account in the year to which it relates.
