REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Structure, Governance & Management

The organisation is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. It is registered as The Auditory Verbal Centre and uses the working name, Auditory Verbal^{uk}. The members of the company are the same as its trustees. The company is established under a memorandum of association, which sets out the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its articles of association.

The board is responsible for oversight of the management of all the affairs of the charity. It seeks to ensure that all activities are within UK law and come within agreed charitable objectives. Our work includes setting strategic direction, agreeing the financial plan and ensuring that activities are carried out within agreed governance frameworks.

The charity is governed by its board of trustees who meet on average once every three months. These meetings comprise the trustees with the director and administrator in attendance. The meetings make decisions about the policies and strategic direction of the charity. The board delegates all other operational and management matters to the director. All decisions are recorded in the minutes of the meeting. We operate a separate remuneration committee, which meets to discuss matters of employment and remuneration policy.

The trustees seek to act independently and impartially with their sole interest being the furtherance of the charity's objects. In addition, all trustees have declared that there is nothing that, to their knowledge, could conflict with trustee independence before they were appointed as a trustee. Any potential conflict of interest must be declared in advance of any agenda item and, in such an event, an individual trustee may be excluded from the decision-making process.

Jacqueline Stokes, the director of Auditory Verbal^{UK}, is married to Stephen Woolgar a trustee The board has ensured that Professor Woolgar does not participate, nor influence in any way, decision making for any matters affecting his wife's terms and conditions of employment All such matters are governed by the remuneration committee Professor Woolgar is not a member of this committee

The trustees have considered the major risks to which the charity is exposed. These have been reviewed and a range of measures and systems are in place to manage them. Financial risk is mitigated by a multi-donor strategy, minimising reliance on one income stream. A system of monthly current and forecast financial reporting is in place and trustees review the data from this at trustee meetings. Policies on reserves and fundraising/administrative expenditure are in operation (see later in this report). Trustee and staff policies include child safeguarding measures and criminal records checks.

The trustees take into account the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and believe that the activities of Auditory Verbal^{UK (}AV^{UK}) are in line with that guidance

Safeguarding children at AV^{UK} takes a number of forms. We have written policies for parents and staff, based on mandatory government procedures and practice guidance. Day-to-day responsibility for ensuring policies and procedures are adhered to is shared between the Director and Family Liaison Officer. All staff are kept aware of their recording and reporting responsibilities through formal supervision and informal discussions. Any immediate safeguarding concerns are discussed with families at the earliest opportunity, and we use the six-monthly parent consultations to address any areas of potential concern. As part of liaison with local services, staff have contributed to Team around the Child meetings and worked with Children and Families Teams when requested by parents

The current AV Interns have received tailored safeguarding training as part of their diploma programme, and as an organisation we have accessed training through the Oxfordshire Local Safeguarding Children's Board We follow Safer Recruitment procedures for all staff, and will update these as the Vetting and Barring Scheme and Independent Safeguarding Authority registration are rolled out

Objectives & Activities

Our vision is to give all children who could benefit from auditory verbal therapy (AVT) the chance to be able to do so. We will achieve this goal by establishing systems of training to create more qualified AV therapists allied with the provision of direct services for children and their families.

Achievements & Performance

This year our achievements were formally acknowledged with a 2010 GlaxoSmithKline IMPACT Award for 'Excellence in Community Healthcare.' AV^{UK} was one of ten winning charities awarded this prestigious quality mark, following a thorough audit of our organisation's policies, planning documents and finances by the King's Fund, a leading independent healthcare organisation

Judges' comments "Auditory Verbal^{UK}'s work has a life-changing impact on people. It helps a large and diverse number of families and, as a result, hundreds of deaf children are able to live in a hearing world without the need for constant intervention. It has an impressive track record and is a worthy winner."

As planned in last year's annual report, the main focus of 2009/10 was to ensure the charity's long-term financial stability in a difficult economic climate. As the year progressed it became clear to the Director and trustees that a financial restructure would be the most prudent way to protect our core activity without diverting from our mission. We have now arrived at a more appropriate fee structure whereby every family contributes according to their means rather than receiving an automatic subsidy from the charity. We have sought individual funding from charitable trusts and community groups for those families who were not able to meet the additional cost.

Therapy Funding Streams as at 31 March 2010

In April 2009 we had on our staff two Certified Auditory Verbal Therapists® and three fast-track Auditory Verbal Interns
Since then, one of our fast-track interns has achieved their certification and we have employed an additional experienced CertAVT® from New Zealand
This member of staff provided maternity cover for an existing CertAVT® from September and will remain in the charity's employment next year
We are therefore in the process of increasing our capacity to four CertAVT®s and two AVTs in training
The total staff at the end of this year comprises our Director, three Certified Auditory Verbal Therapists®, one Auditory Verbal Intern, a Family Liaison Officer, a Research Co-ordinator, a Development Officer, an Administration Manager and a Book-keeper
Four of these members of staff are part-time

This year we delivered direct auditory verbal therapy services to 96 deaf children and their families in 882 sessions. Our regular caseload comprised 55-60 families. As part of the habilitation package, we spent approximately 480 hours liaising and co-working with 192 professionals from the children's local support teams, and approximately 120 hours giving support and information over the telephone to families between sessions.

Our three year 'Reach Out' pilot project, which concluded this year, achieved excellent outcomes for the 20% of our overall clinical caseload who were from a low-income family, diagnosed as deaf via newborn hearing screening and under three years of age at the point of enquiry. Our experience of the 'Reach Out' project has highlighted the real need for high quality and effective parental engagement in health and education services. All of the 12 families who received a full bursary place demonstrated motivation and commitment to achieve the best for their child, they challenged the assumption that a programme requiring a high level of involvement is only suitable for 'motivated middle-class families'. We have demonstrated that there are legitimate obstacles for some families, and that in these cases a creative and individualised approach is necessary. The outcomes of the project will be published next year in a peer-reviewed research article and our learning shared with professionals in related fields.

This year, AV^{UK} was invited to become a member of the consortium which advises and supports the Communication Trust – an umbrella organisation, funded by the Department for Children, Schools and Families, which is focused on children with speech, language and communication needs. Through this partnership, AV^{UK} will contribute to the planning of the National Communication Year in 2011 and advise specifically on how best to meet the speech, language and communication needs of children with a hearing impairment. AV^{UK} continues to work closely alongside other national charities, in particular the Meningitis Trust and CICS (Cochlear Implanted Children's Support Group). One of our senior CertAVT®s was appointed 'Specialist Advisor for Hearing Impairment' to the Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists (RCSLT)

We are delighted to announce the appointment this year of AV^{UK}'s first patron, opera singer Janine Roebuck During her university training, Janine Roebuck became severely deaf and was told she could never hope to sing professionally. Through determination, passion and talent, she has become the world's only deaf mezzo-soprano and has achieved an international career.

Our advisory panel of six specialists in related fields was appointed this year. We are most grateful to the panel for offering additional guidance to our work

In June 2009 three families who have attended AV^{UK} organised a private reception at Sims Reed Gallery, Central London Thanks to the generosity of the organisers and their guests we were able to raise almost £12,000 for the charity and introduce new supporters to our work

Training tier one Fast-track training

Our first fast-track intern qualified as a Certified Auditory Verbal Therapist® this year after taking a qualification exam at the AG Bell Academy We now have two Auditory Verbal Interns on our fast-track scheme, a qualified Speech and Language Therapist and an experienced Paediatric Audiologist who is also our Research Co-ordinator Both interns are making excellent progress towards their certification and are beginning to take on a partial caseload under supervision

Training tier two Postgraduate Diploma in Auditory Verbal Therapy

Our postgraduate Diploma in Auditory Verbal Therapy, established in conjunction with Aston University, remains key to our training mission. In January 2009 our first cohort of Diploma students graduated, six of our second cohort of fourteen Certificate students embarked upon the Diploma year and a further six students, our third cohort, embarked upon their Certificate year.

Training tier three In-service training

AV^{UK} continues to work in close partnership with sensory services within local authorities, audiology centres and cochlear implant programmes across the UK and to share our specialist expertise. This year we delivered in-service training to Selwyn School, Newham and further training to North Tyneside Sensory Service as part of a longer term 'service transformation partnership' model. In-service training has proven extremely effective and is one of our preferred routes for raising the standard of provision for deaf children and their families.

Training tier four Conferences, lectures and short courses

AV^{UK} continues to have a national and international presence at conferences and special interest groups. This year we presented at a joint BATOD (British Association of Teachers of the Deaf) and RCSLT (Royal College of Speech and Language Therapists) conference on collaboration between speech and language therapists and teachers of the deaf, and at Manchester DEFF Conference on 'Developing Thinking and Listening in Young Children', we delivered a one day training course to speech and language therapists and teachers of the deaf in Denmark, contributed to the Mary Hare School teacher of the deaf training, collaborated with Phonak to present on their *i*-Learn training programme, and were invited to speak at the international Listening to Learn Conference. We also gave an introduction to auditory verbal therapy as a possible career route to final year speech and language therapy students at De Montfort University AV^{UK} continues to plan and co-run meetings of the AV SIG (Auditory Verbal Special Interest Group) which was held this year at AV^{UK} and Birmingham Children's Cochlear Implant Programme. AV^{UK}'s menu of short courses for parents and professionals in related fields included '101 Activities for Babies', 'Supporting Children in Mainstream School' and a course tailored to the needs of parents on our waiting list.

Financial Review

Trustees seek to maximise funds spent in the direct furtherance of the charity's objects and keep the proportion of charitable funds spent on administration and fundraising to a prudent minimum level commensurate with the effective and professional operation of the charity and its future sustainability

This year shows income exceeding expenditure by £121,596 66. This is mainly due to the receipt of unrestricted funds ahead of planned expenditure in the forthcoming year.

We distinguish in both our management and publicly reported financial accounts between restricted and unrestricted funds. Restricted funds are those earmarked by the donor's wishes for specific use. We apply these funds solely for the purposes for which they are intended by the donor.

In the event of the charity carrying funds forward at the end of the financial year, the Board of Trustees similarly distinguishes between restricted and unrestricted carry forward. The level of restricted funds carried forward varies from year to year in accordance with the amount of restricted funds raised and the planned timing of their expenditure. The level of unrestricted funds carried forward each year is reviewed each year by the Board of Trustees by considering our current and future commitments and the financial risks associated with our various income streams, expenditure types and balance sheet items. The Trustees seek to build a minimum level of unrestricted reserves that will be sufficient to protect the charity's programme of work from unexpected variances in income and to allow time for financial restructuring in the event of a major downturn in income.

At 31 March 2010, restricted funds carried forward amounted to £120,695 31, unrestricted funds carried forward amounted to £175,444 78. This £175,444 78 is equivalent to about 40% of the charity's projected 12 month unrestricted expenditure. The Trustees consider this level to be consistent with the policy of protecting our programme of work and allowing for development opportunities described above.

Plans for Future Periods

In 2010/2011 we will raise our profile through the opportunities presented by winning a GlaxoSmithKline IMPACT Award With the additional PR and media benefits, our goal is to widen our supporter base and raise awareness of the importance of providing high quality early intervention alongside hearing assistive technology

It is our hope that this 'IMPACT Year' will bring us closer towards our goal of increasing our capacity and making a step up in our development. Next year the professionals taking the postgraduate Diploma in Auditory Verbal Therapy will become AV^{UK} interns, they will be employed by local authorities in the UK and mentored by staff at AV^{UK}

We aim to increase our therapy caseload from September At this point we will have two CertAVT®s taking a full-time caseload, our Director and one CertAVT® taking a partial caseload and two fast-track interns taking partial caseloads under supervision. Our caseload is likely to be in the region of 70 families.

We aim to continue to reduce financial and geographical barriers to access. We will fundraise to support low-income families through our family bursary fund and assist families where appropriate through the SEN statement process to secure funding for their auditory verbal therapy programme from their local authorities.

We will continue to prioritise our partnership work with local authorities, audiology centres and cochlear implant programmes so that families of deaf children receive high quality and collaborative intervention closer to home. Our advice and support to the Communication Trust via their consortium will ensure that the speech, language and communication needs of children with hearing impairment are taken into account for the National Communication Year in 2011.

We aim to publish two peer-reviewed journal articles next year, the first on the outcomes of our Reach Out project for low-income families, and the second on the sequellae of cytomegalovirus We also plan to work towards evidencing the overall cost benefit of auditory verbal therapy as an early intervention method

We will be improving our training facilities by transforming the unit next door to our centre into a dedicated training suite. We have taken on a short-term lease so that we can evaluate the effectiveness of the project and reassess our priorities at the end of the year.

Responsibilities of the Directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of the incoming resources and the application of resources, for the year then ended

In preparing those financial statements, which give a true and fair view, the directors should follow best practice and

• prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charitable company will continue on that basis

The directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006

The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2010

1 Accounting policies

The financial statements are prepared under the historic cost convention and include the results of the charity's operations which are described in the Trustees' Report and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice ("SORP") issued in March 2005 and applicable accounting standards

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts, and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers is not included

Grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable

Incoming resources from direct services to families and investments are included when receivable

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred and include irrecoverable VAT

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However the cost of overall direction and administration on each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned based on an estimate of staff time attributable to each activity.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, which in all cases with the exception of the leasehold improvements is estimated at 4 years Leasehold improvements have been depreciated over the term of the lease

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specific purpose and are available as general funds

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees Total pension costs for the period amounted to £15,917 67 (2009 £14 000 13)

Going concern This year, the unrestricted funds carried forward amounted to £175,444 78 which is equivalent to about 40% of the charity's projected 12 month unrestricted expenditure (please see Financial Review p7). The trustees, as members of the company, consider this level to be consistent with our reserves policy and therefore are confident that the company remains a going concern. AV UK 's operations are expected to continue for the foreseeable future
