Directors' Report for the year ended 31 December 2022

The Directors present their report with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2022.

The Directors' Report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies entitled to the small companies' exemption. Both the level of business and the year end financial position were in line with budgets and expectations.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The principal activity of the company in the year under review was that of a limited partner to Calderdale Schools Partnership. The limited partnership's principal activity during the year was the provision of design, construction and maintenance services including related financing arrangements for five schools, under a 25 year PFI concession arrangement with Calderdale Council.

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

The profit for the financial year of £10,000 (2021: £10,000) has been transferred to reserves.

Both the level of business and the year end financial positions were in line with budgets and expectations.

The Directors' Report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies entitled to the small companies' exemption.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

The company will continue to act as limited partner to Calderdale Schools Partnership.

DIVIDENDS

The Directors recommended the payment of an interim dividend of £29,000 (2021: £nil).

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES

The principal risk affecting the company is the performance of Calderdale Schools Partnership on the basis that the company derives its revenue from this entity. The immediate risk to the company of the limited partnership underperforming is a decline in revenues, and, longer term, the risk that the company cannot meet its liabilities as they fall due.

GOING CONCERN

The Company's ability to meet its debts as they fall due is dependent on the performance of the Company's interest in Calderdale Schools Partnership ("the Partnership"), for which this company is the Limited Partner. The Directors have reviewed the cash flow forecasts of the limited partnership covering a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements which indicate that, taking account of reasonably possible downsides, the limited partnership will have sufficient funds to meet its liabilities as they fall due for that period. Those forecasts are dependent on the underlying customer continuing to meet its obligations under the Project Agreement which are underwritten by The Borough Council of Calderdale.

The limited partnership's operating cash inflows are largely dependent on unitary charge receipts receivable from the local authority and the Directors expect these amounts to be received even in reasonably possible downside scenarios. The limited partnership continues to provide the asset in accordance with the contract and is available to be used. As a result, the Directors do not believe there is any likelihood of a material impact to the unitary payment.

The Directors have assessed the viability of the limited partnership's main sub-contractors and reviewed the contingency plans of the sub-contractors and are satisfied in their ability to provide the services in line with the contract without significant additional costs to the limited partnership, even in downside scenarios, due to the underlying contractual terms. To date, there has been no adverse impact on the services provided by the limited partnership or its sub-contractors. However, in the unlikely event of a subcontractor failure, the limited partnership has its own business continuity plans to ensure that service provision will continue.

The Directors believe the limited partnership has sufficient funding in place and expect the limited partnership to be in compliance with its debt covenants even in downside scenarios. Consequently, the Directors are confident that the limited partnership will have sufficient funds to continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due for at least 12 months from the date of approval of the financial statements.

Given the above, at the time of approving the financial statements, the Directors have a reasonable expectation that the Company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus, they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements of the Company.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with UK Accounting Standards, and are presented in pounds sterling which is the functional currency of the company. All amounts in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest £1,000.

Wellesley Barracks Limited is a limited company incorporated in England. The Registered Office is 3 More London Riverside, London, SEI 2AQ. The financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102 and the Companies Act 2006 for the year ended 31 December 2022.

Going concern

The Company's ability to meet its debts as they fall due is dependent on the performance of the Company's interest in Calderdale Schools Partnership ("the Partnership"), for which this company is the Limited Partner. The Directors have reviewed the cash flow forecasts of the limited partnership covering a period of at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements which indicate that, taking account of reasonably possible downsides, the limited partnership will have sufficient funds to meet its liabilities as they fall due for that period. Taxation

Taxation for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity.

Current or deferred taxation assets and liabilities are not discounted.

Current tax is recognised at the amount of tax payable using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred tax

Deferred taxation is recognised in respect of all timing differences which are differences between taxable profits and total comprehensive income that arise from the inclusion of income and expenses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in the financial statements except that:

Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that the Directors consider that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits.

Deferred tax is measured on an undiscounted basis at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the periods in which the timing differences reverse, based on tax rates and laws enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Equity dividend:

Equity dividends are recognised when they become legally payable. Interim equity dividends are recognised when paid. Final equity dividends are recognised when approved by the shareholders.

Investments

Investments are stated at cost less provision for any impairment in value.

Short term debtors and creditors

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income in the administrative expenses.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amount reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. There are no significant estimates or judgements in the preparation of these financial statements.

2. EMPLOYEES AND DIRECTORS

The company has no employees and hence there were no staff costs for the year ended 31 December 2022 (2021: £nil). The directors received no remuneration, fees or other benefits in the performance of their qualifying services in respect of their services to the company (2021: £nil).

3. OPERATING PROFIT

The audit fee is borne by Calderdale Schools Partnership.

4. INCOME FROM PARTICIPATING INTERESTS

Income from participating interests represents the company's share of the allocated results of the Calderdale Schools Partnership for the year.

Factors that may affect future tax charges

An increase in the UK corporation tax rate from 19% to 25% (effective from 1 April 2023) was substantively enacted on 24 May 2021, and the UK deferred tax liability as at 31 December 2022 has been calculated based on this rate. This will have a consequential effect on the company's future tax charge. Companies with profits of £50,000 or less will continue to be taxed at 19%, which is a new small profits rate. Where taxable profits are between £50,000 and £250,000, the higher 25% rate will apply but with a marginal relief applying as profits increase.
