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MedEquip4Kids Chairman's Report 2007-2008

Review of Progress and Achievements

During the financial year to 31st March 2008 MedEquip4Kids has continued to demonstrate its commitment to improving the healthcare available through its support for a wide variety of projects. The charity has funded medical equipment and other facilities that benefit children of all ages in hospitals and through community healthcare projects.

We believe that the charity continues to build on its reputation for working in partnership with healthcare providers to ensure that every child has access to the most up to date and appropriate medical facilities when they fall ill or suffer injury and also to ensure that all children are treated in a child friendly environment.

It has been particularly pleasing this year to see that the charity has continued to support an increasingly diverse range of project types. This has been evident in the specialist children's units, schools and hospices that have been supported this year. We believe that the geographical spread of projects clearly demonstrates the charity's commitment to support projects right across the region.

We can report that the geographic expansion of the work of the charity has continued as planned, during 2007/8.

We have built upon the new partnerships established last year in Merseyside through our ongoing financial support for the re-development of Children's Services at Arrowe Park Hospital. We are also pleased to report that our commitment to fund projects in Merseyside has provided the opportunity for MedEquip4Kids to work in partnership with Whiston Hospital.

Community maternity and paediatric services in Staffordshire have benefitted from the delivery of new equipment that otherwise they would not have had access to. The scope of the charity's work has been further enhanced through its support for a project at Martin House Children's Hospice in Leeds.

We have also forged a number of new relationships through the funding of projects at Leighton Hospital in Crewe and Birtenshawe Hall School in Bolton.

The charity has continued to benefit many other paediatric healthcare projects through its longer established relationships with hospitals in the northwest. These include Fairfield Hospital, Stepping Hill Hospital, Royal Bolton Hospital and Trafford General.

The charity will continue to encourage applications for support from outside its core geographical area of the northwest and will look to further establish itself through project work and fundraising in Cumbria, Staffordshire and West Yorkshire. However, projects beyond these geographical boundaries will not be precluded and all applications will be given due consideration by the Board of Directors.

It remains an impossible task to calculate how many children have directly benefited from the projects funded by MedEquip4Kids this year. The Directors are confident though to suggest that an estimate of tens of thousands is not unreasonable and that the work of the charity continues to touch the lives of most families in our region.

Beneficiaries

The Directors would like to take this opportunity to highlight some of the projects supported by the charity this year.

Paediatric Care

A wide ranging variety of equipment and facilities has been donated to various hospitals. Multisensory and play equipment performs a vital role in hospitals when provided for young patients and their siblings. As well as providing specialised facilities such as multisensory rooms we have also delivered play and distraction therapy equipment on wards and in waiting areas at a number of hospitals to help pass the long hours that children spend in hospital or help to relieve the tension created by treatment and procedures. We are delighted, once again, to have been able to provide funds to ensure that children are treated in appropriately designed, child friendly areas that create a relaxing environment.

Maternity / Neonatal Unit

MedEquip4Kids continues to build on its proud record of supporting maternity and neonatal services at hospitals across the region. The charity has worked in partnership with units at Fairfield Hospital, Leighton Hospital, North Manchester General Hospital and Royal Bolton Hospital that have all received equipment this year that will enable them to continue to provide a first class service to patients and their families.

"If it was not for the state of the art life-saving equipment provided on the Neo-Natal Units, Callam and Luke would not be alive now. The equipment provided by MedEquip4Kids is the difference between life and death. These monitors show things such as the pulse rates and oxygen levels making it easier for the medical teams to see problems early and save lives." Community Nursing

MedEquip4Kids has continued to support community based nursing projects through providing Breast Pumps to improve post natal care and Suction Pumps that enable children with breathing difficulties to be treated at home and to live as normal a life as possible. The charity has also continued to support community based Paediatric Continence Services by working this year with Warrington Primary Care Trust.

"The Medela breast pump is a really welcome piece of equipment and will be put to good use by the breastfeeding mums who have pre-term or ill babies in Blackpool, Fylde and Wyre. Working with our Charity Partners

MedEquip4Kids has continued to work closely with the Theodora Children's Trust during 2007/8, and provided the £27k funding, necessary for the continued provision of the twice weekly visits of Clown Doctors at Pendlebury and Booth Hall Children's Hospitals.

The charity has further cemented its relationship with Arrowe Park Hospital in Birkenhead by continuing to provide funds for new children's facilities through the hospital's own charity, The Jelly Bean Appeal.

Martin House Children's Hospice in Leeds and Birtenshawe Hall School in Bolton are both new additions this year to the charity's portfolio of charity partners that have benefitted from the support of MedEquip4Kids. We are delighted to have been able to fund equipment that will enhance the facilities available for the care of terminally ill children and those with complex disabilities.

A special thank you is due to Life for a Life for their continued support in printing the charity's newsletter free of charge.

MedEquip4Kids collaborated with the radio station Key 103's charity, Manchester Kids to facilitate the delivery of Christmas presents to children on the wards at Pendlebury Children's Hospital.

Generating Funds

MedEquip4Kids does not receive any funding from statutory sources and remains wholly reliant on the generosity of its supporters for the voluntary donations that enable the charity to continue to support such a wide variety of projects.

The recruitment and retention of fundraisers in a very competitive third sector proves to be a perpetual challenge for the charity. Despite this the charity's team continues to demonstrate their experience of and capability in a diverse range of fundraising techniques that test their capacity for handling huge numbers of individual donations each year.

The Directors maintain that MedEquip4Kids is best served through the utilisation of a wide variety of sources of voluntary income. They are also satisfied that this approach to raising funds offers the charity the greatest protection against adverse external influences both financial and otherwise.

Corporate Partnerships

Improved brand awareness continues to help to ensure that MedEquip4Kids is able to attract support from some of the regions foremost businesses. Although difficult to measure it has been evident that the charity has experienced an increase in the number of people approaching the charity to volunteer their support. The website continues to play a significant role in informing new supporters about the work of the charity and the ways in which they can become involved.

Sponsorbank have made a significant financial contribution that has helped to underpin the changes being made to the charity's Schools Programme.

The Directors would like to take this opportunity to thank Barclays Bank, DLP, Arch Payroll and Life for a Life for their support of the charity through pro bono work and gifts in kind.

Charity of the Year

The charity is continuing to work with the Formation Group (Proactive Sports Management). They are part way through their commitment to support the charity for two years. With the charity's help they are committed to raising £30k from a variety of fundraising activities including their annual golf day.

MedEquip4Kids has further developed its relationship with Balfour Beatty and following the joint charity of the year status in 2007, MedEquip4Kids has been selected as the sole beneficiary of its fundraising efforts for 2008.

Staff at the CIS and Cooperative Wholesale Services have chosen MedEquip4Kids as their charity of the year for 2008 and will raise funds through a variety of fundraising activities that will take place throughout the year.

Company Staff Fundraising

MedEquip4Kids has benefited once again this year from the support of many companies and their employees through their organisation of and participation in a wide variety of fundraising activities. Those companies include Deloitte, CIS, Royal Bank of Scotland, Pets at Home, Royal & Sun Alliance, and Barclays.

Support from the Business Community

The success of the charity's events and other fundraising activities has relied on the support and cooperation of many businesses both large and small. Of particular note are Slattery's Pattissiers in Whitefield, The Body Temple Gym in Rossendale, Costco in Chadderton and the Radisson Edwardian Hotel in Manchester.

Community Funding Partnerships

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the individuals and groups that have chosen to support the charity this year. These include Leigh Townswomen's Guild, Trimquest UK, Healthsure, Tikka Restaurant (Whitefield), Mostonians FC, Heywood Ladies Choir, and Bolton Netball League. We are grateful to all those that encourage their workplace colleagues to join in fundraising activities or choose to participate in fundraising events where they spend their leisure time. These include pubs, sports and social clubs, gyms, churches and community groups.

Thanks also to the management at the Lowry Outlet Mall, the Trafford Centre, the Millgate Shopping Centre, Birchwood Shopping Centre and Merseyway for allowing us to undertake charity collections.

MedEquip4Kids continues to use its knowledge and expertise of working with the NHS to seek partnership funding from other Trusts and Philanthropic bodies for projects that it has identified as appropriate. The support that the charity has received from a variety of organisations this year has proved vital in funding a variety of projects.

Once again this year the charity has been happy to share its expertise and experience of using Challenge Events for the purpose of fundraising with other charities. The British Red Cross, NCH, Kidscan, The Together Trust, The New Children's Hospital Appeal, Galloway's Society for the Blind and Diabetes UK benefited from fundraising through events established by MedEquip4Kids.

The charity has continued to work in partnership with four other children's charities including Barnardos and Childline through the Let's Trek for Children brand with participants trekking in Peru. The success of this partnership has led MedEquip4Kids to enter into in a new collaboration with north west based charities CAFT, Bolton Lads and Girls Club and the Youth Federation (Cheshire).

A Christmas Santa Dash fundraising event saw the charity working with RNIB and KIDSCAN.

We have also, as previously mentioned continued to work with The Theodora Children's Trust to fund the Clown Doctor project at Booth Hall and Pendlebury Children's Hospitals.

Individual Donors

Following a year of review, during 2006/7 the charity has once again committed to reinvest some funds in the recruitment and development of individual donors. The Director's continue to believe that these donors will help to provide the foundation for the long-term future of the charity. We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those individuals that have chosen to support the work of MedEquip4Kids.

Schools Programme - Get Active with Pip

The MedEquip4Kids Schools Programme has undergone a thorough review and as a result has been refocused to become a dedicated Child Health Education Programme delivering a message to children and their parents that highlights the advantages to be gained from adoption of a healthy lifestyle. The programme will be used to encourage children to eat healthily and to take regular exercise.

We believe that our position as a leading children's healthcare charity provides us with an opportunity to influence the lifestyle decisions of families and that Influencing children in this way will deliver multiple benefits to our community. Children will benefit through improved general health. Schools will benefit through improved attendance levels and greater levels of academic attainment. The health service will benefit in the short term through reducing the demand on paediatric services and in the longer term through reducing the demand on adult services.

We continue to be grateful for the funds donated to MedEquip4Kids through the schools Programme. These donations are used to fund healthcare projects in the local community.

Shares Donations

The charity continues to hold a small selection of shares that have been donated to the charity. It is our intention to offer these shares for sale when the charity's finance committee consider the market conditions to be favourable.

Should any supporters wish to dispose of any small shareholdings, the charity would be very happy to receive these.

Web Site

We have continued to invest further in the development of the charity's web site. This investment has been both in terms of financial and time, necessary for ensuring that the web site remains up to date and user friendly. Evidence shows that increasing numbers of the charity's supporters utilise the website facilities to register for events, purchase tickets and to make donations online.

Fixed Assets

Details of movements in fixed assets are shown in note 9 to the financial statements. Fixed assets are used for the management of the charity.

Investment Policy and Returns

Under the trust deed the charity has the power to make any investment which the trustees see fit. The trustees have considered the most appropriate policy for investing funds and have found that placing funds on deposit meet their requirements given the secure nature and accessibility of the funds. The trustees consider the return to be reasonable given the low risk nature of the deposits. However, this overall low risk policy is subject to periodic review.

Donated investments are held until any "lock in" has lapsed and then realised at an appropriate time.

Information Technology

The company continues to invest in technology suitable to improve its performance in the charity sector.

Review of the Result and Reserves Policy

The trustees consider that the results set out in the attached accounts are satisfactory. They are of the opinion that the balance on the reserves are sufficient to meet any future commitments under the terms of funding.

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level which covers current commitments under the terms of their funding.

Statutory Requirements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities, the Companies Act and the governing document.

Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks that the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reviews to be carried out so that necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

Description of Organisation

The charity is run by a team of volunteer trustees who manage the direction and policies of the charity. The day to day management is run by the director of fundraising who is supported by a team of fundraising and administrative staff and volunteers.

Financial Review

It is disappointing that incoming resources were lower this year by £59,674. This is due to a more competitive environment.

Overhead and collection costs increased by 6.5% as the charity invested much effort to increase incoming resources. This and the efforts of our dedicated staff has resulted in a substantial increase to incoming resources subsequent to the year end and the trustees expect an increase of over 20% to incoming resources in the current year.

Funds are available to permit the charity to continue in operation in the medium to long term and to continue to fund worthwhile projects. (see chairman's report).

Arrangements are in hand to continue to raise funds to finance the charities activities and projects.

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities SORP (March 2005), applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 1985.

1.2 Incoming Resources

 Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or

through the terms of an appeal.

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Grants and investment income are reflected in the accounts when receivable.

Grants which relate to a specified future period are deferred.

Donations, gifts and other income are reflected in the accounts when received.

1.3 Resources Expended

All expenditure other than that capitalised has been reflected in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis.

Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure includes those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

1.4 Valuation, Capitalisation and Depreciation of Fixed Assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The costs of minor additions or those costing below £500 are not capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures and Fittings
Office Equipment

15% on cost 25% on cost

1.5 Taxation

The organisation is exempt from income tax by reason of its charitable status.

Income tax suffered on investment income is reclaimed in full.

The organisation is not registered for value added tax but can claim exemption from certain purchases (see note 3).

1.6 Investments

Investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date.

1.7 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

2 DONATIONS IN KIND

The amounts shown of £1,169 (2007: £2,109) were valued by the Director of Administration. Please refer to Note 17 below.

3 SAVINGS ACHIEVED (BENEFITS CONFERRED BY CHARITABLE STATUS)

As a result of its charitable status, the charity has achieved savings on the buying of medical equipment for the hospitals at discounts/donations for £9,724 (2007: £15,321) net of VAT estimated by the Director of Fundraising.

Other benefits brought about by the charity which were not included in the Statement of Financial Activities were savings achieved on its obtaining Value Added Tax exemption on the purchase of medical equipment and building costs. The amount saved as calculated by the Director of Fundraising was £17,729 (2007: £31,733)
