YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2009

Introduction

The last year has been one of continued progress - with particular success for the CHRT's key long term Llanelly House project - though the Trust continued to pursue a range of other important heritage projects. The year also saw the establishment of CHRT Ventures Limited – a not for profit arms length trading company of the Trust that was initially established to pursue a number of long term publishing activities. Its first venture was to acquire Carmarthenshire Life Community Magazine and begin its development as the County's pre-eminent community publication.

PROJECTS

Llanelly House: The Llanelly House project itself continued through Stage 1 of project development – from August 2008 onwards. This involved major professional input and support from the professional design team, a number of new community development staff and active involvement of existing CHRT personnel. Key events during the year included:

- a full Stage 2 application to the Heritage Lottery Fund to release the £3.44m 70% grant to a project now costed at just over £6m. This was approved in June 2009
- a full EU Convergence funding application for £2m+
- a number of successful and ongoing bids for funding from Cadw, WAG and a range of private benefactors
- development of a whole range of key community and professional support organisations including a local social inclusion group and a community partnership, as well as a Llanelly House Project Team (chaired by Lynn Davies) generously supported by a number of senior County Council managers
- further development of a very positive working relationship with the County Council who offered to take on the community and heritage use of the middle floor of the restored House

The Big Picture: following on from the success story of 2007/08, the Project moved into Stage 3 and was supported by members of the CHRT team – particularly Cheryl Kitt – to work with groups of special needs pupils at a number of primary and secondary schools across Carmarthenshire and West Wales. Big Picture 3 will work with these young people to take forward their interest in the landscape and develop it into a series of photographic exhibitions of their work. The project is generously supported by the Countryside Council for Wales and a major funding application has been prepared by Cheryl Kitt for over £50,000 funding from the Big Lottery. A decision is due in late July 2009.

Gelli Aur – Golden Grove: the Trust was approached towards the end of the year with a view to partnering in the acquisition and restoration of this fine Tywi Valley house and grounds and its possible development as a centre for modern art

Gwili Railway – the CHRT has been approached to provide fund raising and project management services from summer 2009 to secure the development of a £5m tourism railway station at Carmarthen North

Financial Performance

Our turnover and financial activity increased somewhat on the previous year, turnover being an estimated £290,000 (£94,000 in 2008). This was matched with a number of major charitable donations in relation to Llanelly House previously received and generous grant support from the Heritage Lottery Fund and Llanelli Town Council.

As always, we received excellent support from our accountants – L H Phillips & Co. of Carmarthen and our VAT advisor – Alun Mathias of VAT Capital. During the year we were joined by a new book keeper – Andrea Jones of Winning Figures – who greatly helped in the transition to a more rigorous management accounting process. The HLF funded Stage I development work was also supported by the Town Council's Financial Manager Gary Jones. Both are offering vital services as we begin to see a significant growth in turnover as the Llanelly House project gets underway. This area of activity is likely to see further development in the very near future.

Membership

We had previously reported on the resignation of the Rt Hon Lord Dynevor – received with great sadness – and this loss was compounded early in 2009 by the sad news of Richard's passing. His dedication and commitment to the CHRT was but one of a great number of contributions that he made to Wales and the arts over many, many years. We mourn his passing and recall with affection his great contribution to Wales, its history and culture.

We began the New Year with three new and talented members – Claire Deacon, Robert Pugh and Simon Wardle – who have made a remarkable contribution to the Trust during a period of exciting growth. We also welcomed Cllr Carl Lucas and Lynn Davies – Leader and Town Clerk of Llanelli Town Council respectively. They accepted the offer to become active – and vocal – observers and have enhanced our meetings whilst strengthening the considerable bonds between the CHRT and the Town Council.

Staffing

The period saw the employment of Lisa Bancroft and Estelle Evans on the Llanelly House Community Team from October 2008. Their work played a key part in getting the HLF Stage 2 application for Llanelly House off the ground and building deep and meaningful community partnerships at all levels. We continued to work with Cheryl Kitt as a regular freelance member of the team and benefited from her assistance in the Big Picture Project.

The Trust's Secretary – Robert Parker – continued his work as Chief Executive Officer on a project funded basis and stepped in at short notice to take on the role of 'more than full time' Project Manager for the Llanelly House project.

We also saw the transfer of the Llanelly House professional design team from Llanelli Town Council to the CHRT in August of 2008. This dedicated team have been together since 2000 in one form or other under the careful guidance of the Project Director – William Wilkins – no stranger to our ranks and the original inspiration for the Llanelly House project. Their contribution to the success of the HLF Stage 2 bid was very considerable indeed.

During the year the Trust reaffirmed its commitment to achieving IiP status as soon as the Llanelly House project was secured. CHRT Ventures Limited made a similar commitment.

Registered office

In Autumn 2008, the Trust relocated from the Kings Head, Llandeilo (its home for the first five years of its existence) and established a new registered office and operating base in Llanelli at the Foothold Centre in Stebonheath.

Personal

I would again express my sincere appreciation to my vice chair -J C Williams MBE - for his support, for taking the Chair on my occasional absences and for chairing the hard working Executive

Remuneration Committee and CHRT Ventures Limited. I would also thank all my fellow Trustees for their enthusiastic commitment. The various partners also played a crucial role during the year —

particularly Llanelli Town Council, the National Trust (for whom I have the honour of acting as Chair in Wales), Trinity University College and Carmarthenshire County Council. All have provided essential resources, support and advice throughout the year.

Finally, 2009 onwards will be a most exciting and enervating year for the Trust - with the Llanelly House project under way and other exciting schemes in early development. We look forward with great anticipation.


