# Trustees' Report

The Trustees, who are Directors for the purposes of company law, are pleased to present the annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2016. The report is a combined annual report containing a directors' report as required by company law. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with current statutory requirements, the Articles of Association, and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP FRS 102).

Reference and Administrative information, set out on Pages 1 and 2, forms part of this report.

#### Governance

Cornwall Women's Aid was incorporated as a Company Limited by Guarantee on 12 March 2003 and is regulated by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Company was registered with the Charity Commission on 27 October 2003. The Company is a Charity with the objects to provide relief of poverty, distress and suffering experienced by women and their children who have been abused in domestic situations.

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The Company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the Company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

The individuals listed on Page 1 served as Directors for the purposes of Company Law and Trustees for the purpose of Charity Law during the year.

The Trustees meet regularly and are responsible for the strategic direction of the Charity. The day to day running of the Charity is overseen by the General Manager. Trustees are elected at the Annual General Meeting and one-third shall retire from office by rotation. Decisions are made based on a majority of votes.

The Trustees are an experienced and cohesive group. We seek to recruit Trustees with particular skills and interests. New Trustees complete a training programme.

The major risks to which the Charity is exposed, as identified by the Trustees, have been reviewed and systems or procedures have been established to manage those risks.

#### Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

# **Objectives**

The Charity's objects are to provide for the relief of poverty, distress and suffering experienced by women and their children who have been abused; physically, psychologically, sexually or financially.

In furtherance to these objectives West Cornwall Women's Aid (WCWA) will:

- Promote the protection of women and children at risk of abuse or harm through policy and practice
- Ensure the **prevention** of interpersonal and gender based abuse in the short and long term through public awareness and education of children as well as through an effective legal framework
- Develop the provision of effective services to meet the needs of all abused women and children
  - Encourage a greater understanding of the nature of abusive relationships within the family and partner
- relationships; the detrimental effects this has on victims and their families and its consequent impact on a wide range of services
- Ensure there is a range of quality services available to protect and support victims and survivors including help for children in abusive households

#### **Activities**

In determining activities Trustees have given due regard to the Charities Commission guidance on Public Benefit. Our activities deliver public benefit as follows:

- Exchange and analysis of information relating to domestic abuse and sexual violence (DASV) with the agencies represented at the Cornwall Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Delivery Group; feeding into Cornwall Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Strategic Implementation Group, MARAC Steering Group and Domestic Homicide Review Panel.
- Work with the Cornwall Community Safety Partnership for Safer Towns to target persistent problem areas and work with communities and partners to develop sustainable solutions.

## Objectives:

Reduce crime and anti-social behaviour in line with Cornwall priorities

Generate more first time reports of domestic abuse through increasing awareness

Promote the zero tolerance to hate crime message and support third party reporting

Improve the local environment, reducing fear of crime and increasing satisfaction of local residents with their area as a place to live

- Representation at monthly MARAC's (for high risk clients) for West Cornwall
- Provide information to raise awareness of DASV and its impacts to the public
- Provide Refuge accommodation for up to 11 women and 16 children.
- Operate a Helpline for women in abusive relationships or households in West Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly
- Provide an Outreach service for women at risk assessed venues across West Cornwall
- · Provide a free Counselling service
- Provide and facilitate a rolling group work programme, therapeutic groups, support groups and peer led groups for women who have experienced DASV including childhood abuse

#### Achievements and Performance - Who used and benefited from our services

#### **Refuge Services**

We continue to provide Refuge accommodation for up to 11 women and 16 children. Service provision for 2015/16 as follows:

- Total number of women accommodated: 41
- Total number of children accommodated: 45
- Total number in Resettlement support: 17 women 14 children
- Length of stay: 20 24 weeks plus transitional resettlement support into the community
- Sample of referring agencies: Self-Referrals, National Women's Aid, Specialist DASV Providers including IDVAs, Police, Addiction Agencies, Housing Providers, Social Care and Health services

#### Community Services - Helpline, Outreach, Counselling and Group Work

These services are provided by specifically trained volunteers to women living in West Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly. Counsellors are at Diploma or Degree level. Community Services are key interventions for the early intervention, prevention and protection of women and children. Sustainable community support is provided to develop safety plans and prevent the breakdown of family structures.

We have run one Volunteer Training Programme this year seeking new recruits for Helpline, Outreach and Refuge services. Our Training Programme is 9 weeks, followed by a period of shadowing experienced staff before final assessment. The programme includes Understanding and Recognising Domestic Abuse and its Impacts, Risk Assessments, Safeguarding, Equality and Diversity, Inclusion and Family Law.

#### Service User and Community Connection

The reports provided by service users on Empowerment Stars (tool used to collect changes) have demonstrated the benefits of receiving long term services. We know the effects of abuse are so detrimental to women and their families. The management of day to day tasks can be seriously compromised and so far reaching that women need additional time to recover and re-learn important skills that keep them and their families safe. The road to recovery often involves working through feelings of guilt and shame, low self-esteem and lack of confidence. Our work is designed to take full account of the possible stages a woman may face whilst she recovers.

During this reporting year we have completed 145 service user reviews; of these:

105 women have reported reduced suicide ideation and isolation.

97 women have reported improvement in their mental health with reduced feelings of depression and anxiety.

60 women have report increased empowerment which has improved management of day to day tasks.

126 women have reported more protective behaviours and better risk management for themselves and their families

- 41 women have shown increased awareness and knowledge of available opportunities in the community through volunteering and education.
- 50 women have shown improved skills in budgeting and debt management.
- 27 women are in education and voluntary work.

16 women are in work.

WCWA service users, staff and volunteers formed part of consultation groups to influence how organisations respond to DASV and to inform the Cornwall DASV Needs Assessment produced in November 2015.

WCWA was a lead DASV agency in the development of Cornwall Housing DASV referral pathway launched in May 2016.

# Trustees' Report

At a strategic level we have contributed to the Drug, Alcohol and DASV Protocol 2016 for Cornwall; we are identified in protocol in the service directory for specialist support pathways

Many domestic abuse and sexual violence victims and survivors present with additional support needs eg. drug/alcohol misuse. In order to provide the optimum support to all women we have accessed training from local addiction agencies to gain a better understanding of drugs and alcohol, including risk levels and functionality. Where possible we want to remove potential barriers for abuse victims to access our services. We are at the formulative stages of developing a partnership with Bosence Farm rehabilitation and detox centre. We are developing a 2 way referral pathway and staff from both organisations are shadowing staff on duty. Front line staff have received training on drug and alcohol use and risk management

WCWA delivered training and promotional presentations to GP surgeries, IDVA service, mental health, social care and leaving care teams and jobcentres. We are now the lead DASV provider at quarterly multi-agency meetings with YMCA and Cudrose Royal Naval Base.

WCWA has provided one to one consultation sessions for women identified as victims at a local Children's Centre.

WCWA had a significant presence at a Reclaim the Night event in Penzance to mark the end of National DASV week in November 2015. The candlelight procession was the first of its kind in our locality.

WCWA had a promotional stall at Mazey Day cultural festival in Penzance attracting over 15,000 people.

WCWA has increased its profile and accessibility via social media.

As a member of National Women's Aid we are up to date and involved in campaigning to influence government policy on the issues that matter, often resulting in legislative change: coercive and controlling behaviour being made a crime in 2015.

Public awareness raising about the vital role charities play in providing specialist support services to abuse victims and survivors is essential and the fact that charities often work with the most marginalised groups including disabled, BAMER and LGBT and complex needs victims. There is clear evidence that these groups are reluctant to report to statutory services but do engage with charity and voluntary agencies.

#### **Developments**

At the annual Cornwall Volunteer Awards in November 2015 a WCWA volunteer won the Community Safety Volunteer of the Year award and another volunteer won Volunteer of the Year award for Personal Development, this volunteer also won the prestigious Volunteer of the Year 2015 award.

WCWA achieved the National Women's Aid Quality Mark for service provision in September 2015. This evidences that we provide a high quality of service to women and children whose lives have been affected by DASV. The assessments are set against the following:

# Trustees' Report

In this reporting period we have started to deliver building self-esteem courses in Camborne, an area of multiple deprivation. The erosion of esteem and loss of identity can have far reaching impacts physically and mentally and can severely limit life chances. These courses are a growth in WCWA provision.

We also now deliver a specialist course for new service users on Managing the Effects of Abuse. This is a 6 weekly programme. The focus is based on the principles of cognitive behaviour therapy, educating service users about domestic abuse, cycles and its impacts and developing coping skills.

In responding to an increase in abuse and sexual attacks with young people in Penzance we are now offering drop in sessions for students attending Penwith College. This intervention is now also providing a referral route into our counselling service.

Through the Big Lottery Building Capabilities programme we commissioned a local company to design a new and secure database. The new database is now operational and collects additional information e.g. it has the ability to track serial perpetrators and enable more sophisticated data reporting to a range of audiences, including funders, Cornwall Council DASV Strategic Lead, DASV Providers, Police and National Women's Aid

With the support of Lloyds Bank Foundation England and Wales Enhance Programme we are now building a new website.

Our aim is to create a user friendly website and one which we can edit and update. We are currently working on the site construction, this should be completed in October 2016. The site can be accessed for referrals and contact details. The website is a vital medium as a point of contact for victim and survivors and a point of reference and consultation for professionals. It is also an effective publicity and recruitment tool.

#### Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities (including Income and Expenditure Account) on Page 13 shows an excess of income over expenditure for the year of £15,052 (2015: £19,101). Total reserves held at the year-end are £138,831 (2015: £123,779). Total reserves have increased this year. Free reserves not represented by Fixed Assets or Restricted Funds but including Designated Funds are £67,387 (2015: £70,099) and will be built up to cover three months expenditure which is in line with the reserves policy.

#### Policy on reserves

The Charity Commission recommends an amount not less than the equivalent of 3 months' expenditure is kept in free reserves and this is also the reserves policy of West Comwall Women's Aid.

The Trustees have established, by reference to anticipated costs that may be incurred in the future, that designated reserves are required for future redundancy costs, should they be required, and capital costs. The level of designated funds at the year-end was £63,960 (2015: £63,960) and these are detailed at Note 19.

#### Principal funding sources

The principle funding sources are from CSPD, Big Lottery and other Grant providers. The corresponding expenditure of this income is made in accordance with the contract or grant agreement.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

West Cornwall Women's Aid meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

#### Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

There are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern.

#### Transition to FRS 102

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

No restatement of comparative items in the balance sheet or statement of financial activities has been required.

#### Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

#### **Donations and legacies**

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

#### Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

#### Deferred income

Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods and is released to incoming resources in the period for which, it has been received. Such income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the Charity has unconditional entitlement.

#### Donated services and facilities

In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the time provided by general volunteers is not recognised. More information about volunteers contributions is included in the trustees' report.

#### Investment income

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

#### Charitable activities

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

#### Other income

Material incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the statement of financial activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

# Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the appliable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

#### Raising funds

Costs of generating funds are the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

#### Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

## Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

#### Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

#### **Taxation**

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £250.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

#### Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

#### **Trade creditors**

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the Charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustee's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the Charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds are resources set aside for specific purposes at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2016

#### Operating leases

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged in the statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

#### Financial instruments

#### Classification

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments.

## Recognition and measurement

Basic financial assets and liabilities are initially measured at transaction price (including transaction costs) and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Financial assets and liabilities are only offset in the statement of financial position when, and only when there exists a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and the Charity intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Financial assets are derecognised when and only when a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire or are settled, b) the Charity transfers to another party substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset, or c) the Charity, despite having retained some, but not all, significant risks and rewards of ownership, has transferred control of the asset to another party.

Financial liabilities are derecognised only when the obligation specified in the contract is discharged, cancelled or expires.

The Big Lottery Fund Community Services Project is a multi-year grant that provides for the expenditure of the grant to be for future periods. The income in respect of future periods has therefore not been included in the current year accounts. The grant is a 5 year grant to May 2020 to receive around £100,000 per year.

The Big Lottery Fund Volunteer Programme Project is a multi-year grant that provides for the expenditure of the grant to be for future periods. The income in respect of future periods has therefore not been included in the current year accounts. The grant is a 5 year grant to 2017 to receive around £54,000 per year.

The CSPD contract provides for the expenditure of the contract to be for future periods. The income in respect of future periods has therefore not been included in the current year accounts. The contract is a 2 year contract to 2017 to receive around £180,000 per year.

The CSPD Children in Refuge contract provides for the expenditure of the contract to be for future periods. The income in respect of future periods has therefore not been included in the current year accounts. The contract is a 2 year contract to 2017 to receive around £16,500 per year.

During the year the charity was awarded a grant from Lloyds Bank Foundation England and Wales for a Counselling Supervision and Management Project. This is a multi-year grant that provides for the expenditure of the grant to be for future periods. The income in respect of future periods has therefore not been included in the current year accounts. The grant is a 2 year grant to July 2017 to receive around £25,000 per year.

The specific purposes for which the funds are to be applied are as follows:

#### Unrestricted funds:

The Capital Reserve is a deposit towards the cost of purchasing a property if required in the future.

The Liquidation Reserve is a contingency fund to pay outstanding bills and redundancy costs should the Charity discontinue.

The Furniture Reserve is no longer required.

#### Restricted funds:

The CSPD Contract (previously known as Supporting People) is to cover refuge provision, support and resettlement costs.

The Henry Smith Charity has provided a grant to fund core running costs, part salary of the General Manager and a Funding Processor and also to top up the hours of a Group Development Officer.

BBC Children in Need has funded Children's Workers In Refuge, including outreach.

CSPD provided funds for supporting children in the refuge.

The Big Lottery Fund has provided funds for the Volunteer Programme.

The Big Lottery Fund Grant has provided funds for the Community Services Project - Helpline, Outreach, Counselling and Group Work.

Lloyds Bank Foundation England and Wales has provided funds for the Counselling Project, with the funding for the supervision and management of counsellors.

All other grants were given for specific activities and projects.

Balances were sufficient to enable each fund to be applied in accordance with any restrictions.
