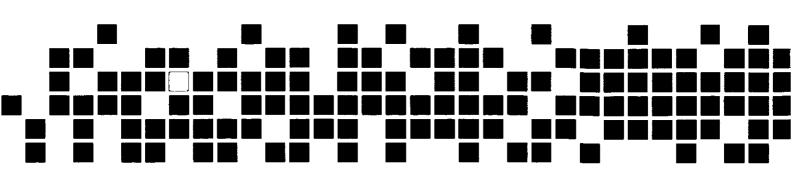

The charitable company is run by a group of directors, the Governing Council, who meet regularly for the purpose of maintaining its performance and making strategic decisions. They delegate management to the Federation Management Committee, comprising the Principals of the Member Bodies and the Secretaries of the three main academic awards (FdA/BA, BTh and MA), chaired by one of the Principals elected on a rotational basis

The trustees determine the general policy of the charity The day to day management is delegated to the Registrar, Rowena Small, who makes decisions with the guidance of the trustees as appropriate

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The Federation's objectives are to advance the Christian faith, to advance religious, ecumenical education in accordance with the doctrine and principles of the Christian faith, and to prepare men and women for ordained or lay ministry and service within the Christian churches

The Cambridge Theological Federation brings together the teaching and learning of nine institutes and courses through which people of different churches, including Anglican, Methodist, Orthodox, Reformed and Roman Catholic, train for various forms of Christian ministry and service — Its new Vision Statement, adopted in March 2010, states

The Cambridge Theological Federation exists to serve the mission of God in the world, as that mission is expressed and worked out in the life of the Church. Our vision is centred in the transforming love of Christ, who is the Wisdom of God, and this vision is given life by the transforming power of the Holy Spirit of God. The form and content of our endeavours, therefore, are rooted in the life of God, whose self-giving activity is the joy of the Church and the hope of the world.

Our vision for today grows out of the Great Commission, out of the Vision statement held by the Federation since the early 1990s (see Appendix 5), and out of the fundamental purposes of the Federation as stated in our Memorandum and Articles of Association

- the advancement of the Christian faith,
- the advancement of religious, ecumenical education in accordance with the doctrine and principles of the Christian faith,
- the preparation of men and women for ordained or lay ministry and service within the Christian churches

This vision is given shape by the nature and needs of the contemporary world for Christian leadership which is theologically and pastorally wise, mission oriented, and committed to collaborative ways of discerning the truth with love. Given our particular location in Cambridge, it is natural that the Federation should seek to develop a role in thought leadership in terms of the wider church, and to share the evolution of these ideas internally and externally. The Federation intends its member institutions to grow together in effectiveness in serving God's Kingdom across four key domains.

- Innovation and creativity for mission in today's world,
- · Excellence and accessibility in education and formation for Christian ministries and discipleship,
- Distinctive contribution to the Church's ecumenical endeavour,
- · Engagement with the world-wide Church and higher education in learning and scholarship

In the exercise of their powers to that end the Directors have paid due regard to the published guidance from the Charity Commission on the operation of the Public Benefit requirement under the Charities Act 2006 We believe that the Federation meets the requirement in the following ways

- by the provision of regular communal acts of worship to encourage and facilitate the practice of the Christian religion by those training for ministry and their families,
- by supporting the theological colleges which are members of the Federation in raising awareness of religious beliefs and practices,
- by providing education in accordance with the principles and practices of the Christian religion,
- by providing opportunities through Social Context Placements for members of the Federation to engage in prison, hospital and school chaplaincy work,
- by providing training for members of the Federation in pastoral and liturgical work, both within and beyond faith communities,
- by providing opportunities for continuing ministerial education for ministers across the eastern region, through both formal educational programmes and training offered for placement supervisors, academic tutors and others

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

In accordance with its objects, the Federation has continued its principal activity of providing theological education and training for students of its Member Bodies and others from the East Anglia region 655 students were registered with the Federation. The majority were studying for one or other of the awards listed below, but the total also includes exchange students visiting for one or more terms and others attending in-house courses run by the Federation's member institutions. Of those students engaged in full or part-time courses during the year the following completed the award for which they were registered.

A total of 26 students were registered for the Professional Doctorate in Practical Theology This part-time practice-based research-based degree is expected to take up to six years, so the first completions are anticipated in 2011-12

This was the first full year of operation of the new core curriculum for the FdA in Christian Theology and its corresponding BA, both validated by Anglia Ruskin University, and its implementation was monitored carefully In general, the new compulsory modules worked well for the majority of students, but the lack of flexibility created problems for certain groups, including those who are seeking to "top-up" theological training acquired elsewhere in order to fulfil the requirements for ordination. The BA Director will continue to monitor the use and effectiveness of this award, in consultation with the Directors of Studies and the Federation's Curriculum Development Committee.

The newly-agreed business plan for the Professional Doctorate in Practical Theology allowed the Federation to make the part-time post of Assistant Director of the MA permanent and thereby facilitated the admission of 11 students, bringing the total number on the award to 26 During the course of the year the MA Director entered into negotiations with the Divinity School of Chung Chi College, Chinese University of Hong Kong which resulted in the admission of a cohort of PrD students from the School in September 2011

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

The use of the Interim Funding Model as the basis for the Federation's budget in 2010-11 has resulted in a significant increase in income. This is because the Model derives the majority of the funds required to cover budgeted expenditure from the member Institutions of the Federation. The funding derived from external sources (primarily the two partner Universities) was applied to the costs incurred in those same member. Institutions to deliver the Federation's undergraduate awards. Implementation of the Funding Model was not without problems, as both the central committees and the member Institutions adjusted to this new way of looking at the Federation's financing, but it introduced a new level of transparency to the financial affairs which can only be welcomed. In particular, it made it possible to identify both income and expenditure relating to any given award, thus enabling the Federation to assess the financial viability of most areas of its work.

In addition to the changes mentioned above, the Resources Committee also changed the way in which its financial reports were presented. Previously, many sources of income had been presented "net", this was deemed to be less than satisfactory as it did not give a true picture of the financial commitments of the Federation. Where possible, all income is now shown as gross figures with the corresponding deductions and/or top-slicing included in expenditure. Although it is recognized that this makes comparisons with previous years more difficult, the Federation believes it is a more useful way of depicting its position.

The Federation is grateful to the Laing Foundation for a further, and final, instalment of the Strategic Review grant. This will be used in 2011/12 to fund the extension of the current President's term of office by secondment from ERMC.

Continued attention to the collection of debts has resulted in a significant fall in the number of debtors at year end. It is anticipated that all debts will be collected by 31 December 2011. The increase in the amounts falling due within one year is due in part to the inclusion of MA fees paid in advance (£11,700). This was not recognized in previous years. Another significant element is the first instalment of funding from Anglia Ruskin University for the 2011-12 financial year, which is paid in August

The Federation adopted its first formal Reserves Policy on 27 June 2011 The policy states

The Federation's income is derived primarily from stable sources being member institutions and university partners. It is anticipated that reasonable notice of withdrawal or reductions of funding will be received, giving the Trustees the opportunity to consider and respond to such change. It is not considered necessary or appropriate to hold reserves against such changes. In the event of a significant reduction in funding relating to a given award, the Federation would seek to transfer the students enrolled on that award to another HEI in order that their studies may continue. The Trustees have agreed to maintain an operating reserve for the following purposes

- to enable financing of unforeseen short term funding issues
- · to cover cash-flow disruptions
- · to meet the Federation's statutory liabilities
- to allow sufficient time to alternative arrangements to be made for students on award which are at risk of discontinuation

The Trustees believe a reserve equal to three months' expenditure will be sufficient for this purpose. The Trustees may establish additional reserves to meet future needs/projects from time to time. The reserves will be monitored annually by reference to the annual reports and accounts and adjusted as necessary through the budget for the ensuing year. This Reserve Policy was adopted by the Trustees in 2011 and will be reviewed at least every five years.

The Federation also prepared its first Risk Register, which will be updated annually

#### PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Federation will be the subject of an inspection by the Churches' Quality in Formation Panel in November 2011. This wide-ranging inspection will consider all aspects of the life and work of the Federation and will assess its fitness to deliver ministerial training. A considerable portion of the latter half of the 2010-11 academic year was spent in the production of the briefing documents for the various inspection teams and it is anticipated that this will continue to demand considerable resources of time and energy through the first half of the 2011-12 academic year. Once the Report is published, which is expected to be in March 2012, the Management Committee and Governing Council will be involved in preparing and implementing an Action Plan based upon its recommendations.

In the context of the continuing implementation of the recommendations of the Strategic Review, the Governing Council began discussion of its own composition. A Federation-wide consultation highlighted a number of matters on which greater clarity was required, so a working party, chaired by Dame Mary Tanner, has been established to consider in more detail the role and purpose of the Governing Council. It is expected that the working party will report back to the Governing Council towards the end of the 2011-12 academic year.

It was anticipated that the new Giving and Receiving Model would replace the Interim Funding Model as the basis on which the Federation's budget was constructed for the 2011-12 financial year. In the event the Model was not suitable for this purpose, but it is expected that it will be used to inform some of the Federation's planning in future years, particularly in relation to changes in its award structures and the introduction of new awards.

As the impact of Lord Browne of Madingley's Report "Securing a Sustainable Future for Higher Education" is assimilated by its partner universities, the Federation expects to continue to work closely with them and with its sponsoring churches to find the optimal outcome for theological education in Cambridge This will be further impacted by changes to the way in which the Church of England both funds and organises theological education

#### RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees (who are also the directors of the Cambridge Theological Federation for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice)

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to

select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,

observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP,

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,

state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements,

prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware

there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware, and

the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2011

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008)

The Federation, along with its members, currently faces many uncertainties and its future course depends upon decisions yet to be made by its members, university partners, the parent churches, and not least the government. One of several possible outcomes could be that the Federation ceases to exist as an independent charity. The Trustees do not think this is the most likely outcome and accordingly these accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis and do not reflect the accounting entries that would need to be made if that scenario were to come about

#### Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The aim and use of restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts

#### Incoming resources

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in furtherance of the charity's objectives and represents the cost of goods and services and ancillary trading costs that have been incurred in charitable activities. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirement of the charity and include accountancy fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

#### Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Assets costing over £500 and having an expected life greater than one year are capitalised

#### 1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Office equipment

- 25% reducing balance

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items

#### Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

#### Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company. The annual contributions payable are charged to the statement of financial activities.

#### Value added tax

As the Federation's activities are classified as exempt or non-business activities for the purposes of value added tax, the Federation is unable to reclaim the value added tax which it incurs on its purchases Expenditure in these financial statements is therefore shown inclusive of value added tax
