Volunteers

A group of the charity's volunteers administer the operations of the charity alongside the two Artistic Directors, and Festival Producer and Concert Manager. This group constitutes the Management Committee. The Committee meets throughout the year, and also functions in the form of a series of smaller sub-groups who advise on detailed planning and policy issues to take to the full Committee. Many communications are done by email, as well as at the meetings of the members. There is also a Board of Trustees that meets quarterly and as necessary. The function of the Board of Trustees is the governance and oversight of the organization, together with the development of future strategy.

TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

The day to day management of the charity is delegated to a sub-group comprising the two artistic directors, the festival producer and the concerts manager

The events within the festival itself are run by a group of over 70 volunteers, acting under the guidance of the Management Committee These volunteers are mostly local people, many of them skilled amateur musicians, who bring to the organisation a wide range of abilities and who are united by their enthusiasm for and interest in the types of music presented in the festival

New Trustees, when appointed, receive information to brief them on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the activities of the Board of Trustees and the Management Committee and its decision-making processes, and details concerning the recent financial performance of the charity. They meet other Trustees and voluntary administrators involved in the day-to-day running of the charity. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate their roles within the charity. The Trustees and Management Committee actively review, on a regular basis, the major risks that the charity faces and have established rigorous systems and procedures to mitigate any significant risks identified.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objectives are

- To encourage, advance, develop and maintain public education in, appreciation of and involvement in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts by promoting periodically a series of public concerts, dramatic performances, exhibitions and other cultural events
- To promote and assist in the advancement of public and professional education by the provision of workshops, lectures and educational events in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts, particularly, but not exclusively, for younger people, and to encourage the giving of public performances by schools, music societies, choirs and other like organisations

The principal activities of Brighton Early Music Festival during the year ending January 2012 continued to achieve the charity's objectives through the organisation of an annual early music festival, involving concerts, dramatic performances and other cultural events, and through the provision of workshops for adults and schoolchildren and training opportunities for both professional and amateur musicians

The charity's aim to reach out to young people was also achieved by the workshop and performance opportunities as well as offering concession prices or free entrance to the festival for people aged under 25 and children aged under 12 respectively

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

- The festival maintained a strong media presence both at home and abroad, with recommendations in The Independent and performances from the festival broadcast on BBC Radio 3
- New audiences and new performance spaces an outdoor performance in Brighton's Jubilee Square before the festival and in two public spaces as part of the city-wide initiative to reach new audiences
- Significant development of the on-going ConcertMakers programme (experimenting with the
 concert format/seating and audience interaction and also exploring links with other art forms)
 3 new choreographed events commissioned
- Over 6,300 people attended events including 2,318 young people who attended the free event during White Night, the city-wide all night cultural festival
- The successful community singing programme has continued, involving the running of 3 choirs, including a community choir for people who have never sung before. All 3 choirs took part in performances alongside professional artists in the festival. Membership of all 3 choirs has been maintained at a consistent level there have been new opportunities for local people to join in Over 40 members of the BREMF Community Choir took part in a workshop to learn medieval music choruses in order to join professional ensemble Joglaresa in their festival performance. The production of the Fairy Queen involved 24 of BREMF Singers alongside top professionals 40 of the best amateur singers took part in the acclaimed Polyphony through Space performance (see ConcertMakers 3-5 below). In addition 80 people joined a public workshop to take part in a Scratch performance of Victoria's Requiem.

- Designed and commissioned by Brighton Early Music Festival Beggar's Opera Remix brought together 45 Year 11 music and drama students from Varidean and Blatchington Mill Schools working with director Susannah Waters, musical director John Hancorn and two young musicians selected from the festival's Early Music Live! Scheme Students developed their own response to the eighteenth century stage piece the Beggar's Opera
 - " the project was excellent and very worthwhile an intense and educational experience for myself as well as the students " Music Teacher, Varindean School

- eSTOMPie a major schools project designed by Brighton Early Music Festival brought together one of the brains behind West-End hit and Brighton born STOMP, Rob Arcari and leading medieval musicians, Tim Garside and Emily Askew, to create an exciting new take on estampies (medieval dances) 60 children from two primary schools took part in workshops leading to a family concert within the festival alongside the professionals

Continuing the young ensemble development programme, Early Music Live!, started in 2007, Bremf has

- brokered broadcasts (including two first broadcasts) for four ensembles on BBC Radio 3,
- arranged reviews of performances in the classical music press Classical Music came to review one of our young ensembles, Galan, who performed during the festival. The reviewer was so impressed with the standard of their performance "back of the net! One of the most exciting young groups on the scene I have heard for a while. Where did you find them?!"
- brokered relationships between the ensembles and other promoters Newbury Spring Festival have to date booked four ensembles from the scheme
- · Supported ensembles by providing training on
 - promotion and working with promoters
 - delivering and devising education work
 - · creating innovative programmes, including encouraging cross-genre work

Below are details of five successful "events with a difference" which fall within Brighton Early Music Festival's on-going ConcertMakers strand to explore where it is possible to take the concert experience and format, funded by Arts Council England and The Foyle Foundation

1 WHITE NIGHT

Since 2008 Brighton Early Music Festival has promoted a free event to attract younger audiences as part of both the Festival and the annual city-wide White Night all-night cultural festival The aim is to reach audiences, particularly young people who don't normally access the arts Although many other art forms are represented at White Night, most are relatively popularist in approach and Brighton Early Music Festival is the only organisation which regularly champions classical music For White Night 2011, chairs were removed from St Bartholomew's Church to create a wonderful empty space and lighting designers were commissioned to create a "chill out" space, enhancing the stunning architecture of the church 5 young ensembles on the Early Music Live! young ensemble scheme performed a wide range of early repertoire from Renaissance polyphony to a classical wind quintet Performances ran from 9pm to 12 45am and were attended by a total of 2318 people - a big increase on last year's 981 people The musicians performed all over the building, sometimes moving pied piper-like through the crowds and drawing them to the next new performance focus point The audience could sit on chairs at the edges of the church or on the floor. chorus was the festival's leading amateur choir, the BREMF Singers and the orchestra, led by Alison Bury, was the festival's own professional orchestra, comprising leading names in the world of period performance as section leaders and young players from the festival's Early Music Live! Scheme Despite the considerable challenges in putting together this complex event the performance was a great success

- A music drama based on the novel Sacred Hearts by Sarah Dunant with Sarah Dunant, Niamh Cusack and Deborah Findlay actors, award-winning ensemble Musica Secreta and female vocal ensemble Celestial Sirens, acclaimed director Nick Renton and musical directors Deborah Roberts and Laurie Stras Powerful emotions meet political intrigue when a young girl is forcibly enclosed in a convent in 1540s Ferrara The drama was combined with evocative music by Josquin, Palestrina and Rore, as it would have been sung in convents
- 4 Polyphony through Space explored the spatial effects of vocal music through live performances of two extraordinary 40 part motets Tallis' Spem in Alium and Striggio's Ecce Beatam Lucem alongside works by Josquin, Brumel, Gombert and Sheppard Inspired by Janet Cardiff's hugely popular installation. The Forty Part Motet, which 38,000 people experienced earlier this year at Brighton's Fabrica Gallery, this event attempted to create a sense of "live surround sound". The audience was encouraged to wander around the singers and experience the piece up close and from different perspectives.
- Vision celebrated the life, music and sometimes startlingly graphic and apocalyptic visions of the extraordinary medieval abbess Hildegard von Bingen. Vision brought together Hildegard's extraordinary music performed by medieval ensemble. The Telling and vocal ensemble Celestial Sirens, with a new commission from South East Dance Associate Artist and Jerwood Award winning choreographer. Ben Wright of dance company bgroup, stunning contemporary dancer/singer Nuno Silva and a new play by Clare Norburn.

Summary

In a difficult financial climate and within the context of much uncertainty about the arts, Brighton Early Music festival was able to stage ambitious and successful performances that continue to draw audiences from outside the traditional classical music scene. Once again all this has been achieved due to the wonderful dedication and motivation of the core group of volunteers who run everything with the Artistic Directors and the Concerts Manager. From 2012 BREMF will have the benefit of a Festival Producer, recruited to allow more time for the Artistic Directors to maintain other commitments.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Festival celebrates 10 years in 2012 Plans for the 2012 season include the most ambitious event to date, a performance of the Florentine Intermedii which will include aerial dance, a full renaissance 'orchestra' in a spectacular setting as well as choral virtuosity

Over the past ten years the understanding of the performance of Baroque music has become more mainstream, so over the next few years BREMF, whilst maintaining its significant presence in this area, will explore more Mediaeval. Renaissance and also early Classical music, as always working with young artists and presenting performances in an unusual context which will continue to challenge existing orthodoxy

As ever BREMF will continue its renowned education activities, nurturing of young artists and working within the community
