STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the project co-ordinator. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2006 36 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors, were participating in the charity's project work.

Partner organisations included:

- Oxfordshire County Council Schools Development Service (provision of office space and other in-kind support);
- Oxfordshire County Council Music Service (delivery of partnership activities);
- Oxford Inspires (promotion of projects).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

- Encouraging and supporting links and activities between maintained and independent schools for the benefit of students and teachers.
- Expanding the ability of students and teachers to share access and carry out educational and learning activities of all kinds whether intellectual, cultural, linguistic, recreational or sporting.
- Encouraging both maintained and independent schools to share their education, school and sporting facilities.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Learning through Creativity

The year under review was the final year of the Partnership's DfES-funded 'Learning through Creativity' project. The OISSP was fortunate to be able to employ Karen Marshall as Project Manager for the duration of the project.

This project identified students from both the maintained and independent schools sectors who were talented or who had the potential to develop talents in the performing or visual arts and provided opportunities for them to explore and develop these talents through extra curriculum activities.

It also contributed to the continued professional development of teachers' skills through working alongside professional artists and each other. 26 schools and over 350 pupils were involved in this project.

The aims of the project were defined at its outset to be:

- to provide opportunities for young people to explore and develop their talents in creativity to identify talented or potentially talented pupils;
- to provide the opportunity for groups of young people and teachers from differing backgrounds to work in partnership on talent lead projects selected and managed by them and designed to have impact on the local and wider community;
- to raise the attainment of talented and underachieving pupils and improve motivation and engagement with learning; and
- to focus on continued professional development for teachers.

The Westminster Department of Education of Oxford Brookes University evaluated the project. The evaluation process included the distribution of a questionaire to participating schools inviting comments on how far the Project had met its aims and objectives. Comments from the report include: "The Learning Through Creativity funding allowed the clusters of independent and state schools to contract artists to work with them on projects leading to performances. About 6 months after the performances of 2005 we surveyed school staff and professional artists about these summative performances. We deliberately chose to distribute the questionnaire a few months after the euphoria of the first few days after performances in the clusters to prompt a more circumspect analysis."

"All teachers wanted to continue networking, sharing resources and ideas. Two teachers drew attention to plans for the schools to work together on examination courses. Several teachers reported that their own involvement in work of this nature had allowed them to re-explore their own abilities as artist/teacher practitioners. The project had allowed a re-balancing of the importance of artistic process and artistic product. Similarly, the project allowed pupils extended opportunities to experiment and expand."

The final paragraph of the evaluation says:

"Finally, perhaps the most telling testimonies to the Learning Through Creativity project comes from its pupils as this example from a Year 9 pupil demonstrates - 'I suppose it's weird to say that this project has helped me see the difference between admire and inspire and it seems so trivial but it's true.'

'Learning through Creativity' was the fourth special project that the partnership has successfully managed with DfES funding. The 'Key Skills Project' (1999-2001) focussed on communication, problem solving and working with others. It involved 46 schools, organised into 3 regional clusters. The 'Young Citizen's Charter Project' (2001-2002) involved 6 schools focusing on citizenship; one practical outcome was the 'Young Citizens Charter', which is an interactive web based resource for students and teachers available at www.youngcitizenscharter.org. Students and teachers also engaged in school swaps giving them insights into different forms of education to their own. The 'Young Solutions Project' (2002-2003) also focused on the theme of Citizenship and involved 18 schools.

Schools Environmental Efficiency Study

OISSP has sponsored a pilot project, with Oxford Brookes University, to demonstrate the potential environmental, economic, and educational benefits of implementing energy saving actions in schools.

This pilot project will engage two schools, one from the maintained sector and one Independent school to help increase energy efficiency. A series of energy saving actions will be determined, implemented, and measured to highlight the ease of savings possible in schools across Oxfordshire. The actions are intended to be applicable to a wide range of schools. The project elements will be linked to the school's curriculum to provide a practical learning opportunity for students.

The project ran for 5 months during the period covered by this report. The next stage will be to roll out the lessons learnt into the wider cohort of Oxfordshire schools.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

OISSP Website Development

The OISSP Website has been developed and maintained by students from the State maintained St Birinus School, Didcot and the Independent School of St Helen & St Katharine, Abingdon, with support from their teachers and can be visited at www.oissp.org. The scope of the website will grow in information and diversity as the OISSP expands its interests.

OISSP Strategic Planning

The OISSP is in negotiations with the local LSC regarding potential funding for 14-19 education provision and is looking at ways of enhancing the delivery of this through collaboration and the sharing of resources and good practice. Other collaborative initiatives are also being looked into by the strategy group.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

DfES grants funded some of the charity's activities.

The DfES project grants were managed by Oxfordshire County Council. Spending of these grants was overseen by the project co-ordinator and the trustees, through one of their number designated as the Treasurer. All other funds are held in a bank account in the name of the Charity, controlled by the project co-ordinator and the trustees.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

OISSP will seek funding from DfES for a major collaborative project to address the Government's strategic priorities to improve the take up of both science and Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) at GCSE level.

'Securing Our Future', the title of our next proposed project, will draw and build on the good practices developed in previous work whilst continuing to develop and deepen existing partnerships and establish new partnerships for the benefit of all children and teachers in Oxfordshire. Participation in the next phase of the ISSP programme will provide a unique opportunity for the regional educational community to work together on an issue of common importance and need, that is to raise standards of attainment and motivation of pupils in science, mathematics and modern foreign languages. If approved, the project will draw on the principles of 'Every Child Matters', focusing on the need to equip all children with the skills and motivation to help them enjoy and achieve, make a positive contribution and achieve economic well being.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting
