#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the project director. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2008, 41 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors, were signed up members in the charity's project work.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

- Encouraging and supporting links and activities between maintained and independent schools for the benefit of students and teachers.
- Expanding the ability of students and teachers to share access and carry out educational and learning activities of all kinds whether intellectual, cultural, linguistic, recreational or sporting.
- Encouraging both maintained and independent schools to share their education, school and sporting facilities.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

#### Securing our Future

The Partnership was awarded a major grant amounting to £163,863 over two years by the Department of Children, Schools and Families, (DCSF) in 2007 to set up and run the project 'Securing our future'. 'Securing our future' aims to raise standards, motivation and participation in science by 12-18 year old students in state and independent schools in Oxfordshire.

Securing our future will equip young people with the key skills and competencies they need to enable them to make a positive contribution to the economy by:

- Demonstrating the value of Modern Foreign Languages (MFL) in Science and Maths through interaction with research and industry
- Working with clusters of Oxfordshire's secondary schools in both the maintained and independent sectors
- Working with other relevant bodies, such as The Oxford Trust and the Industrial Society.

The Project has now completed its first year, with one more year remaining.

Tom Kempton, Project Director was appointed in June 2007 and in March 2008 the Board appointed a part-time administrative assistant to the Project Director. The Trustees also gratefully acknowledge the very considerable infrastructure support that has been given to the Project by The Oxford Trust.

Evaluation is an essential aspect of the Project and an evaluator has been appointed from the Westminster Institute at Oxford Brookes University.

In July 2008 six Project Champions were appointed to develop and lead specific activities with school clusters, see paragraph on cluster activities below.

#### Schools Environmental Efficiency Study

OISSP has continued to partner with the Hamilton Trust and Oxford Brookes University to demonstrate the potential environmental, economic, and educational benefits of implementing energy saving actions in schools.

Using the Carbon Trust audits a series of energy saving actions were determined, implemented, and measured to highlight the savings possible in twenty schools across Oxfordshire. Elements of the study have been developed by one of the 'clusters' and linked to the curriculum to provide a practical learning opportunity for students.

#### OTHER ACTIVITIES

#### **OISSP Website Development**

The OISSP Website has been modernised and updated and is now professionally maintained by Oxford IT Solutions.

#### Scientist of the Year events

Awareness of science in the County's state and independent schools has been promoted through three schemes to identify and publicise outstanding science pupils in the County's schools; Chemist, Biologist, and Physicist of the year. Events were organised in partnership with the University of Oxford and the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory at which awards were made, and charismatic senior chemists, biologists and physicists gave stimulating addresses to an audience of teachers, parents and students from the participating schools.

#### **Teacher Training INSET**

In the area of training and CPD, we organised an International Baccalaureate Conference for teachers to assess the potential of this scheme to stimulate science and Modern Foreign Language (MFL) take-up in schools. A course for MFL teachers on applied languages was arranged in July with thirty teachers participating and courses for Science teachers were arranged to promote the new Applied Science GCSE and Triple Science.

#### Science at Work

In partnership with the Oxfordshire Education Business Partnership we arranged for 12 schools to take part in "Science at Work". The school is visited by employees and ambassadors from industry who talk to Year 9 students about the importance of Science in their jobs.

#### The Cluster Activities and the 'Earth from the Air' Exhibition

In June six Project Champions were appointed to develop and lead cluster projects due to start from September 2008 onwards. The cluster projects will involve groups of students from independent and state schools working on various scientific activities. They will also link to the Earth from the Air Exhibition, which has been booked for the Oxford Castle site from November 2008. It proved not to be possible to appoint all of the Project Champions from staff in school science departments by funding supply teachers as was envisaged in the original bid. Instead former science teachers who were linked to partner organisations were contracted.

These clusters, listed below, will all be presented at a special launch for schools in October, when the Earth from the Air exhibition is also to be opened for school visits.

"Securing our future" will promote this exhibition for secondary school students by paying for Year 8 students to visit and by providing resource material.

#### Oxfordshire Sustainability

Pupils will be encouraged to produce their own images (digital photographs) and will also be asked to research possible scientific solutions to noted environmental problems Seven schools will take part in this project. Each school will involve up to 12 students over two days. The project champion is John Cairns.

#### Energy models for Oxfordshire

Pupils will work on a large aerial map of South Oxfordshire looking at the effects of different energy supply strategies on the environment. This will take place in the Key Learning Centre and link to the Earth from the Air exhibition. The project champion is Claire Poulton of the Northmoor Trust.

#### Science and Health

Project champion Caroline Gregory (Cherwell School) has developed a cluster linked to the John Radcliffe and Churchill Hospitals. A pilot workshop focusing on the applications of physics in medicine, has already been successfully tried out at the Cherwell School. It is envisaged that a road show based on the pilot will eventually visit six independent and state secondary schools situated in Headington and the surrounding.

#### Science Engineering and Technology

This cluster is linked to a new project, Go4SET, developed by the Engineering Development Trust (EDT) to stimulate the interest of young people in Science Engineering and Technology. The cluster will focus on the supply and conservation of water in schools. The project champion is Alan Gibbons.

#### Science Innovation

This cluster, organised by Bridget Holligan and Jo Hodges at The Oxford Trust, will develop and run four "Science Innovation" days in four different host venues. These days will be for up to 60 KS4 pupils from eight OISSP schools. They will allow local entrepreneurs in Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) to share their experiences and expertise. Students will take part in workshops based on local industrial case studies and will explore issues related to the process of successfully commercialising scientific knowledge.

#### **Energy Conservation**

The schools in this cluster have participated in the Schools Energy Efficiency Project (SEEP-2) The energy action plan produced for schools taking part in this project, focuses on decisions that need to be made by management of a school. However these recommendations and prioritisations provide an excellent launch for a student energy project. The project champion is Lynn Hughes and 8 schools are involved.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

DfES grants funded some of the charity's activities.

The DfES project grants were managed by Oxfordshire County Council. Spending of these grants was overseen by the project co-ordinator and the trustees, through one of their number designated as the Treasurer. All other funds are held in a bank account in the name of the Charity, controlled by the project co-ordinator and the trustees.

#### **PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS**

It is planned to complete the evaluation of the 'Securing our Future Project' in August 2009 The Oxfordshire Independent and State Schools Partnership intends to seek further funding from DCSF to maintain partnership activities in Oxfordshire and eagerly anticipates notice from DCSF of the educational issues that the DCSF intends to support in the future.

#### **RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE TRUSTEES**
