STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the project director. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2009, 39 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors were signed up members in the charities project work. Every secondary school in the County has taken part in at least one activity during recent years. Partner organisations included

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

- Encouraging and supporting links and activities between maintained and independent schools for the benefit of students and teachers
- Expanding the ability of students and teachers to share access and carry out educational and learning activities of all kinds whether intellectual, cultural, linguistic, recreational or sporting
- Encouraging both maintained and independent schools to share their education, school and sporting facilities

The trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's publications and guidance on Public Benefit

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Since September 2010, the Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership has not been awarded any further grants from the Department for Education. It has managed to maintain a programme of activities using OISSP reserve funds, and the contributions of partners involved in the events. This has enabled the many successful aspects of the former 'Securing our Future' programme to be extended.

The Securing the Future project targets 12-18 year old students in state and independent schools throughout Oxfordshire. It aims to raise students' standards, motivation and participation in science. The focus is to inspire and motivate young people through a programme of activities including science workshops, and master-classes led by experts from Oxfordshire's pre-eminent research establishments and industry.

The lists of activities that have taken place are as follows,

Chemist of the Year 18th Nov 2010

(High achieving chemist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

Sponsored jointly with the Society of Chemical Industry this took place at the Department of Chemistry, University of Oxford 31 schools attended (20 state, 11 independent)

Biologist of the Year 11th Nov 2010

(High achieving biologist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

This annual and popular event took place at the University of Oxford Museum of Natural History on the 11th November. The TV producer Dr George McGavin gave the lecture and awarded the prizes. 30 schools attended (18 state, 12 independent).

Physicist of the Year 11th Feb 2011

(High achieving physicist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

The Rutherford Appleton Laboratory hosted this award evening, and it was sponsored by The Ogden Trust. In addition to receiving a certificate and book token, the award winners were also eligible to apply for an Ogden Trust Undergraduate Science Scholarship of £1500 for 4 years. Four financially disadvantaged Oxfordshire students were subsequently awarded this grant. 13 schools took part.

Year 9 Scientist of the Year, 20thOct 10

Schools across Oxfordshire nominated their best Year 9 student (14yr old) for this award. It took place at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratories. 43 schools attended. (24 state, 19 independent)

5th + 6th Oxford Schools Sustainability Conferences

These conferences involving seven independent and state schools, took place on Weds 17th November 2010 at Oxford University Museum of Natural History, and on the 9th February 2011 at Oxford High School The schools discussed and shared a large number of environmental issues relevant to their own schools and the wider community

County Science Day 29th March 2011

This annual event had previously organised by the Science Advisory Team Oxfordshire County Council OISSP has now agreed to co-ordinate the day 12 teams of Year 7 pupils from independent and state schools competed in quizzes, team building exercises, and building toy racers. They heard about careers in science and were involved in an absorbing demonstration lecture.

Oxfordshire Science Teachers Conference 16th June 2011

80 delegates attended this popular event at Oxford University Museum of Natural History. There was a reception and buffet with ten scientific organisations putting on displays Talks included telescopes, Sciencebook, OISSP projects, and the Science Game Show. There were tours of the University Telescope and Museum. The 'Strolling Players' put on a science drama for schools, and finally Prof. Gina Rippon gave a stimulating lecture on the differences between boys' and girls' brains.

Sciencebook www sciencebook org uk

Sciencebook has been a successful OISSP spin out initiative from the SOF Programme. Since 2010 the Sciencebook online resource has been forging new avenues for STEM engagement with young people and their wider networks. Activities have included events, competitions and rich media content focused on the STEM of climate change, sustainability and innovation. This resource and activities have been promoted and made freely available to all 54 Oxfordshire secondary level schools.

Key achievements include

- Sciencebook Launch Event at Science Oxford on 11th January 2011 with key note speaker Professor Sir David King, University of Oxford, Smith School of Enterprise and the Environment and attended by an audience of STEM teachers, researchers and company representatives
- Volume 1 complete and online at www sciencebook org uk with six chapters inspired by leading researchers from the Smith School of Enterprise and the Environment, World Forum for Enterprise and the Environment
- Sixth formers from Oxfordshire Schools, Fitzharry's School, St Birinus School and Cokethorpe school attended the World Forum of Enterprise and the Environment, June 2010 at the historic Oxford Union. They had the unique opportunity to hear presentations by President Mikhail Gorbachev (former President of the Soviet Union and founding President of Green Cross International) and Dr Janez Potonik (European Commissioner for the Environment)
- In March 2011 and March 2012 Sciencebook linked with the new national project 'Climate Week' to run an online schools competition, with winning entries from three Oxfordshire Schools in 2011 and more expected in 2012
- Email, website and newsletter updates and presentations at the Oxford Schools Sustainability Conference 2011 and Oxfordshire Science Teachers Conference 2011, have helped to promote this initiative
- "Funding received from the Natural Environmental Research Council (NERC) has supported the development of Volume 2 www sciecebook org uk 'Eyes in the Sky' and an event for March 2012 in partnership with NERC and the International Space Innovation Centre Speakers include Poppy Leeder (NERC Communications), Physicist Vicki Smith (Space Geodesy Facility/ NERC), Dr Christopher Davis (Reader in Space & Atmospheric Physics (Reading University), Dr Jon Blower (Technical Director, Reading e-Science Centre) and Jeremy Curtis (Head of Education UK Space Agency) A guest list of 80 includes STEM teachers, STEM Ambassadors, scientists, researchers, company representatives and young people

FINANCIAL REVIEW

As indicated in its annual report last year, the OISSP has operated at a low maintenance level during 2011, to give time to test whether further partnership activity and related funding would emerge following major changes in the education and political systems. As regrettably, no indication of further funding occurred, the Trustees of OISSP resolved in February 2012 to proceed to an orderly restructuring of the Trust in order to secure the continuation of its legacy products.

The close co-operation and working relationship between OISSP and Science Oxford (The Oxford Trust) over the course of the Securing our Future Project (2007 - 2011) makes Science Oxford the natural partner to continue with certain science events and activities developed by the OISSP. The net assets of OISSP should be transferred to The Oxford Trust from April 2012 to allow The Oxford Trust to integrate OISSP's activities supporting science in secondary schools of all types in Oxfordshire into the work of The Oxford Trust. The Oxford Trust would use this funding to support a programme of events to promote and celebrate school science in Oxfordshire, developing the current OISSP model.

Other partners and staff have also shown great enthusiasm and a strong desire to build on the Sciencebook project, which was pioneered by the OISSP and demonstrated to be a useful platform to promote the science associated with sustainable environmental issues to schools and the public Consequently, work is in progress to rename and reshape OISSP as an educational charity The Sciencebook Trust, whose primary aim is to inspire and support engagement and learning activities of young people and their wider networks around the STEM embedded within the themes of climate change, sustainability and innovation. The current chairman and trustees of OISSP are handing over the goodwill, intellectual property, and legal and administrative structures to new trustees of The Sciencebook Trust from 30th April 2012.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are aware of the constraints on external funding in the immediate future due to the current economic climate and the pressures on schools due to changing political objectives. In these circumstances they have decided to reduce the level of activity in the coming year to maintaining only some activities which are now well established such as the Chemist, Biologist and Physicist of the Year. In this way the OISSP can be held both solvent and available for further innovative work among the partners as and when the situation resolves.
