STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the Project Director. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2009, 39 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors were signed up members in the charity's project work. Every secondary school in the County has taken part in at teast one activity during the year. Partner organisations included

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Securing our Future

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership was awarded a grant amounting to £163,863 over two years by the Department of Education and skills (now the Department of Children, Schools and Families, DCSF) in 2007 to set up and run the project 'Securing our future'. This project targets 12-18 year old students in state and independent schools throughout Oxfordshire. It aims to raise students' standards, motivation and participation in science. The focus is to inspire and motivate young people through a programme of activities including science workshops and master-classes led by experts from Oxfordshire's pre-eminent research establishments and industry.

From September 2008- August 2009 the second year of the project was implemented. The Project had already made a good start during the previous year (2007-2008). Initiatives pioneered that year were repeated. These included 'Young Scientist of the Year' events concentrating on Chemistry, Biology and Physics. During the year a large number of new activities took place as listed below. In particular a series of events were run building on the theme of Science and the Environment linked to the Earth from the Air Exhibition, which came to the Oxford Castle site from October to February. These included the schools' launch and subsidised school visits, workshops, and six related science cluster projects. Dissemination of the project, using videos showing many of the activities, took place at the Science Teachers' Festival in June and the Headteachers' consultation meeting in May. Oxford Brookes University completed an independent evaluation of the Securing our Future Project at the end of August and the results of this is to be distributed to all Oxfordshire Schools. Schools Energy Efficiency Project (SEEP-2)

The Schools Energy Efficiency Project (SEEP-2) ran from January 2008 to January 2009 The purpose of SEEP-2 was firstly to improve energy efficiency in 20 secondary schools in Oxfordshire and secondly to develop an effective methodology for turning energy efficiency advice for schools into actions leading to identifiable financial and environmental savings SEEP-2 was run by the Environmental Information Exchange (EiE) based at Oxford Brookes University The project delivered measurable savings of CO2 and costs for each school, and defined a successful method of transforming energy saving advice into every day practice in schools Additionally, SEEP-2 helped develop an ethos of energy efficiency and review within the schools that will result in savings well beyond the project

OISSP Website Development

The website, www oissplorg, is now professionally and attractively maintained and has grown in information and diversity as the OISSP has expanded its interests and activities. The web site is being maintained by RW-Designs based at Gosford Hill School

FINANCIAL REVIEW

2008/09 was the final year of significant DCSF financial support for OiSSP projects. Spending continued to be managed by the Project Co-ordinator and Project Administrator overseen by trustees, particularly the Chair and Hon. Treasurer: Cautious management of OiSSP funds in anticipation of a significant reduction in income allowed the 2008/09 objectives of the 'Securing our future' project to be met while retaining sufficient funding to continue the main features of this work in 2009/10 and beyond. It is hoped to secure sustainability funding from the DCSF to facilitate OISSP's transition to self-financing.

RESERVES POLICY

Our policy is to attract grant income from time to time to fulfil our objectives and to hold only sufficient reserves to maintain the partnership between projects. Such reserves are held within the OISSP Co-Operative Bank Current Account, in addition to those earmarked for specific ongoing projects.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

In June 2009 the Partnership organised a head teachers' consultation conference at University College, Oxford Head teachers were invited to consider future directions and sources of funding. The conference fully endorsed continuation of the current work to raise aspirations and attainment in science in so far as resources would allow OISSP is currently seeking funding from DCSF for a sustainability grant to continue the initiatives set up by the 'Securing our Future Project'. It has also been awarded a £12,000 grant from the Ogden Trust to develop Physics teaching in Oxfordshire Oxfordshire County Council also continues to express support for the work of the Partnership and to make facilities and venues available from time to time. The Partnership has decided to continue to employ the existing Project Director Tom Kempton and Administrator Pauline Rutter part time for a further two years in order to maintain activities, which have been so successful, introduced by the 'Securing our Future' Project.
