STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership (OISSP) is a registered charity and is also a company limited by guarantee. It is governed by the terms of its memorandum and articles of association.

The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the project director. The activity is overseen by the trustees and an advisory board, which in addition to the trustees, includes representatives from some of the schools who are involved in the charity's projects.

As at 31 August 2010, 39 schools in Oxfordshire, from both the state and independent sectors were signed up members in the charities project work. Every secondary school in the County has taken part in at least one activity during recent years. Partner organisations included

- Encouraging both maintained and independent schools to share their education, school and sporting facilities

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Securing our Future

In September 2009, the Oxfordshire Independent State Schools Partnership was awarded a sustainability grant amounting to £20,000 from the Department of Children, Schools and Families, DCSF (now the Department for Education) This enabled successful initiatives pioneered by the 'Securing our Future' programme to be extended for a further year, from September 2009 to August 2010

The project targets 12-18 year old students in state and independent schools throughout Oxfordshire It aims to raise students' standards, motivation and participation in science. The intention is to inspire and motivate young people through a programme of activities including science workshops and master-classes led by experts from Oxfordshire's pre-eminent research establishments and industry

The list of activities that the DCSF agreed to fund was as follows,

- 1) Events to celebrate the Oxfordshire Schools' Chemist, Biologist and Physicist of the Year, and an additional event aimed at the Year 9 Scientist of the Year
- 2) "Lifelab"- a careers web-site to connect students with locally employed STEM graduates
- Sustainable Development conferences
- 4) 16-19 Science Teachers' Conference
- 5) Café Theatre Project to promote language learning
- 5) Go4SET Year 9 technology project

Activities Completed Sept 2009- Aug 2010

Chemist of the Year (Nov 09)

(High achieving chemist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

Sponsored jointly with the Society of Chemical Industry this took place at the Department of Chemistry, University of Oxford on the 26th November 31 schools attended (19 state, 12 independent)

Biologist of the Year (Nov 09)

(High achieving biologist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

This annual and popular event took place at the University of Oxford Museum of Natural History on the 11th November 30 schools attended (18 state, 12 independent)

Physicist of the Year (Feb 10)

(High achieving physicist in Year 13 nominated by each school)

The Rutherford Appleton Laboratory hosted this award evening on the 11th February. For the first time the Ogden Trust sponsored this event. In addition to receiving a certificate and book token, the award winners were also eligible to apply for an Ogden Trust Undergraduate Science Scholarship of £1500 for 4 years. At least one financially disadvantaged Oxfordshire student was awarded this grant. 13 schools took part.

Year 9 Scientist of the Year (Oct 09)

Schools across Oxfordshire nominated their best Year 9 student (14yr old) for this award. It took place at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratories on the 20th October 2009. 43 schools attended. (24 state, 19 independent).

Life Lab

The Oxfordshire STEM careers website in partnership with Science Oxford. The website aims

- To encourage young people to consider studying Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) subjects beyond age 16,
- To raise awareness of the opportunities that studying STEM subjects presents by showcasing a breadth of career paths followed by local people who have studied STEM subjects, and" To raise the profile of local companies where STEM trained people work. With a national drive in the UK to increase students' awareness of careers in STEM, OISSP and Science Oxford asked. Oxfordshire teachers and careers advisors what was not currently being provided by existing careers resources.

By producing Life Lab, a web-based careers resource for 14-19 year olds which uses case studies of live, local people with a background in STEM, OISSP is able to show the breadth and variety of jobs and careers available to people who take these subjects beyond age 16. The Launch of Life Lab took place on the 5th May 2010 at Science Oxford and it is now on line at www scienceoxfordnext com/lifelab.

The 3rd + 4th Oxford Schools' Sustainability Conferences

These conferences involving seven independent and state schools, took place on the 10th November 2009 and the 3rd of March 2010. The schools discussed and shared a large number of environmental issues relevant to their own schools and the wider community. They have set up their own website at www paramundos com

16-19 Science Teachers' Conference March 2010

This took place at Headington School, Oxford Saturday 20th March 2010. The keynote lecture was given by Dr Sarah-Jane Blakemore speaking on 'The Teenage Brain'. Evaluation forms were collected from the participants indicating that this had been a successful event. Of the 35 participants 100% rated the event good or very good.

Café Theatre

(Cross-Curricular French and Drama Programme)

The Café-Theatre Project is a Modern Languages project and was launched by Oxford Brookes University and OISSP for Oxfordshire KS4 students and for PGCE MFL students at Oxford Brookes The aim of the project is to raise attainment in French through an intensive enrichment programme involving drama. Three Oxfordshire secondary schools took part, Cheney School, Wood Green School and the European School. Three professional actors from France led the drama workshops that culminated in two lively performances at The Old Fire Station Theatre in Oxford on 4th May. The enthusiasm and high standard of language skills that shown by the pupils was evident to all those enjoying the humour of the sketches in the audience. Go4SET

OISSP, Science Oxford and the Engineering Development Network (EDN) planned to stage this event during the 2009-2010 academic year but unfortunately the EDN were unable to organise it

Projects funded by OISSP reserve funds

OISSP Website Development

The website, www oissplorg, continues to be maintained and has grown to provide information on the diverse range of OISSP activities

Sciencebook

Seed funding has been made available for the prototyping of 'Sciencebook,' an online resource, being developed by OISSP currently with the support of The Smith School of Enterprise and the Environment (SSEE), University of Oxford Sciencebook will bring Oxfordshire's young people into contact with the cutting edge research and thinking of some of the world's most brilliant scientific minds and innovative companies which are tackling the challenges of sustainability, climate change and innovation

Sciencebook aims to enrich the experience of 14-19 year olds in science subjects and encourage them to pursue the study of STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics). It is intended that Sciencebook will be live early in 2011 and freely available to all 14-19 year olds in Oxfordshire.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

A successful bid to the DCSF for sustainability funding and a grant from The Barnsbury Trust allowed a continuation of OISSP 'Securing our Future' projects in 2009/10

Reserves Policy

Our policy is to apply for available grant income to support our objectives and to hold sufficient reserves to maintain the partnership for at least one year when such grants are not obtained. Such reserves are held within the OISSP Co-Operative Bank Current Account, in addition to those earmarked for specific ongoing projects.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees are aware of the constraints on external funding in the immediate future due to the current economic climate and the pressures on schools due to changing political objectives. In these circumstances they have decided to reduce the level of activity in the coming year to maintaining only some activities which are now well established such as the Chemist, Biologist and Physicist of the Year. In this way the OISSP can be held both solvent and available for further innovative work among the partners as and when the situation resolves.
