The trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020.

INTRODUCTION

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities Statement of Recommended Practice, applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the financial reporting standard applicable in the UK (FRS 102).

The Charity's full name is Chilli Studios (Newcastle and Gateshead Arts Studio) Limited, within this report it will be referred to as just 'Chilli Studios'.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Chilli Studios is a company limited by guarantee (number 05028177), incorporated on 28 January 2004, and is governed by its articles. It is also a registered charity (number 1116957).

Our board at 31 March 2020 consists of 8 trustees with 2 having joined in September 2019. These trustees have strong representation from professionals working in key areas; within Disability, Education, Senior Management, Grants Management, Psychiatry, Service User Involvement, Influencing Mental Health Policy and Best Practice, Safeguarding and Arts Development.

Members of the Board recognise they cannot be experts in all areas of activity and regularly consider what skills may be valuable to add to the existing mix of knowledge and skills. Where a vacancy arises the Board and staff use existing networks to identify potential new trustees. Prospective trustees are invited to visit the studios to understand our vision and values and to establish if they wish to join the Board.

REFERENCE AND ADMINISTRATION DETAILS

Reference and administrative details are set out on page 1 and form part of this report.

OBJECTIVES OF THE CHARITY

To advance the education of the public, in particular persons suffering from the effects of mental illness and mental health problems, living in Newcastle and Gateshead through the use and promotion of art and artistic and creative activities.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the Charity.

The Charity Commission in its "Charities and Public Benefit" Guidance states that there are two key principles to be met in order to show that an organisation's aims are for the public benefit: first there must be an identifiable benefit and, secondly, that the benefit must be to the public or to a section of the public. The trustees are satisfied that the aims and objectives of the charity, and the activities reported on above to achieve those aims, meet these principles.

STRATEGIC REPORT

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES, DEVELOPMENTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Our service

Chilli Studios delivers services to those who are, or are at risk of experiencing diagnosed mental health problems, and those who experience other forms of social exclusion within their communities.

Our Aim is: Improving Mental Health through Creativity.

Our project objectives will be:

- To widely promote our service and engage new members, supporting social inclusion
- To use creative participation as an intervention to prevent deterioration
- To develop members involvement in activities that support recovery
- To signpost and support members to achieve goals within realistic timeframes

Overview

Since April 2019 Chilli Studios has been extremely vibrant with regular referrals and significant creative activity.

The year saw the rejuvenation of the board's membership, with new accomplished trustee's Dr Victoria Armstrong and Toby Brandon joining Chilli's board.

Over the year, we started investigating how to develop tools for recording and managing organizational relationships, outputs and outcomes. This began with a partnership with Power to Change around a new digital tool called Twine. Though initially helpful, we felt our needs were broader, and we took up an opportunity to move to a more comprehensive CRM system called Lamplight, this system is still in development.

Our general studio activity till March 2020 was very active, and in November 2019 our major Heads & Tales project concluded, creating a people's archive for the North East. It brought together many partners to learn, share and influence how mental health history is recorded and perceived. www.headntales.uk/

In January 2020, the new Inclusion and Support worker (ISW) started in the post, along with our new Therapeutic enabler (TE). This post has been designed to support members, who have already progressed to volunteering, and now have the skills required, to help us in further improving the wellbeing of our membership.

A significant part of our work remains around prevention, with the relationship and trust built through involvement in creative activity, enabling members to open up when a personal crisis hits. This allows us to work together at finding solutions/ additional help when it is most needed, offering immediate practical assistance as well as signposting support.

In February 2020, our trading platform Chilli Bizarre closed following an in-depth examination of long-term viability and possible new opportunities. The Café had suffered from the setting up of a

donation-based food café, by our landlords in the same building. This unforeseen event made trading unviable.

Recent training opportunities focused around business, leadership and developing entrepreneurial skills had significantly increased the appetite within the team. With this improved business knowledge and the support from our board, staff got together to review the café and consider all possibilities. This included closure, expansion, changing location and a complete change of business. We conducted PESTLE and SWOT analysis of the ideas and began to get a more precise focus of the different directions we all felt were most suitable and profitable. The final decision was yet to be decided by April 2020.

Since the pandemic our service, like so many, had to change drastically in a very short space of time. I contacted all our valued supporters to confirm our plans for day service closure mid-March 2020. Thankfully we received confirmation of acceptance from everyone. We then swiftly created a new online offer of virtual workshops and forums, which has engaged all of our salaried workers and freelance staff. Our 'Invitation to provide' form enabled freelancers to describe their possible offer. This process created a rich diversity of creative sessions, based on what members have shown interest in, as well as matching the freelancers' skills, equipment and personal circumstances. This model has continued with various new offers developing many with the support of our peer volunteers.

Heads and Tales

Concluding this year, the project achieved impressive outcomes over its 18 months. In total it ran 405 activity sessions to over 1000 participants with 239 guest speakers. It had support from 308 volunteers and delivered activities that engaged an audience of over 7000.

Following last year's success, Chilli Studio reengaged with partners North East Wilds to deliver a further ten-week programme, with more planned.

STAFFING

During this period, we have retained the following staff team:

The Studio Manager is the founder of the service. They have 26 years' experience of community development, housing support and studio management. Their role is to lead in responding to Members' direction as well as management of staff, sustainability, promotion/networking, recruitment, reporting to the board, funders and stakeholders as well as leading in all operational aspects including Chilli Bizarre.

The Arts Coordinator has a BA in multimedia and a Masters in cultural management with 14 years' experience within the voluntary sector. They report to the studio manager and lead on the entire creative program among other vital areas maintain such as policies, procedures, equality and diversity and support.

The Charity Officer (Company Secretary) has an MBA in business management and a BA honours degree in glass and ceramics as well as 20 years of managing a large care and support organisation working primarily with people with mental health issues and learning and physical disabilities. Their role is administration and supporting the Studio Manager is in compliance with our charity governance requirements.

Community Engagement Manager has been employed within the organisation for over eight years as a sessional artist before becoming charged with managing the café, Chilli Bizarre. A key part of their role is to engage the local community in our work and develop our commercial aspect. At the end of the year, their role was reviewed and is due to change.

We regularly contract five freelance professional Artists in Arts Music and Creative Writing.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Results

The results of the charity's financial position at the end of this year are shown in the attached financial statements.

The year has seen an improvement in the financial health of the charity with vital non restricted income begin protected by an increase in charitable grant aid available for both core and project related costs. This has therefore meant that our unrestricted funds have increased from £56,411 at April 2019 to £65,282 at March 2020.

Reserves

Reserves are that part of the charity's unrestricted funds that are freely available to spend on any of the charity's purposes. They exclude restricted income funds.

The trustees have considered the need for reserves to be maintained by the charity. The Charity does not have recurring obligations, other than the need to govern itself. The trustees have concluded therefore that an appropriate reserves policy is to hold at all times a minimum amount equivalent to one year's governance costs in the prior accounting year.

Going concern

The trustees are satisfied that the charity is able to operate for the foreseeable future, on the basis of support for the charity. The going concern basis of accounting is therefore appropriate.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of 'Chilli Studios (Newcastle and Gateshead Arts Studio) Limited' for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the charity trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK (FRS 102), charities SORP (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Chilli Studios (Newcastle and Gateshead Arts Studio) Limited is a Charitable Company limited by Guarantee, registered in England. The charity meets the definition of public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost of transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

In accordance with FRS 102 (as revised by Update Bulletin 1) the charity has not presented a statement of cash flows, as the charity is small.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is also the functional currency of the Charitable Company. The monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} , except where otherwise indicated.

Going concern

Financial Reporting Standard 102 requires, if appropriate, the charity's financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis, which means that the charity is able to operate for the foreseeable future on the basis of known and reasonable projected resources. There are no material uncertainties in respect of the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. Although the nature of donations and grants can be difficult to forecast, the trustees believe there is sufficient support to the charity to enable the charity to continue to meet its liabilities as they fall due. As a result the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate.

Income

Income is recognised in the period in which the charitable company has entitlement to the funds, any conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and grants

Income from donations and grants, including capital grants, is included in income when these are receivable, except as follows:

- When the donors specify that donations and grants given to the charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods.
- When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met.
- When donors specify that donations and grants, including capital grants, are for particular restricted purposes, which do not amount to pre-conditions regarding entitlement, this income is included in income of restricted funds when receivable.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Income from charitable activities

Income from charitable activities is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities as received.

Investment income

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Expenditure

Expenditure is all considered as expenditure on charitable activities. Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party; it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of VAT. They include:

- Charitable expenditure which comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its
 activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of resources.

Employee benefits

The costs of short-term employee benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense, unless these costs are required to be capitalised as an intangible or tangible fixed asset.

Certain employees are entitled to carry forward unused holiday entitlement at the reporting date. The cost of any unused entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are required.

Retirement benefits

For defined contribution schemes the amount charged to income and expenditure is the contributions payable in the year. Differences between contributions payable in the year and contributions actually paid are shown as either accruals or prepayments.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes. The trustees carefully monitor the application of these funds in accordance with the restriction placed upon them.

Unrestricted funds

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expended at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Financial instruments

All of the charity's financial assets and financial liabilities qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes deposits held at call with banks.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of all funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectation of future events that are believed to be reasonable under circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The charity makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results.

13. Retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme for all qualifying employees in the United Kingdom. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity in an independently administered fund. The contributions payable by the charity expensed to income and expenditure amounted to £3681 (2019: £3791). There were no outstanding amounts payable at the year end.

14. Legal status of charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity.

15. Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within Section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or Section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects. No tax charges have arisen in the charity.

16. Volunteer Time

The charity places great value on the contributions that volunteers make to the organisation. We benefited greatly, not only from the considerable time, energy and expertise given by the Board of Trustees, but other volunteers as well. Last year the studio benefited from 27 volunteers being engaged in the service.

17. Related Party Transactions

During the year amounts totalling £400.00 (2019: £1204) were paid to N. Stavropoulou, a trustee for her work as an Artist in Residence on the Heads and Tales project. This appointment was agreed by the Board independently of Ms Stavropoulou.
