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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016)

Objectives and activities

The charity was formed on 15 March 2004. The charity's objective is to establish an Emmaus Community in Merseyside. The charity is affiliated to the Emmaus movement in the UK.

After frustrating delays in achieving the handover of the completed building at 1 School Lane Seaforth we finally received the keys on 24 May 2016. We welcomed our first Companions just two weeks later on 6 June 2016. Our first Companions (6) were drawn from across the Emmaus network in the UK which enabled us to draw on and benefit from the knowledge and experience available. After the initial settling in period, we have gradually increased Companions numbers through referrals from the Local Authority system and from other local networks and organisations. Our aim is to be full by the end of March 2018 at the latest. Our Business Plan indicates that we will require working capital during the period until the accommodation is fully occupied and until the Retail Superstore and any other social enterprise activities generate sufficient income to ensure ongoing sustainability. Our Fundraising strategy is based on such circumstances and progress to date is encouraging.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance

Our thanks to The Henry Smith Charity for their support for the Community Manager post for the first three year period. We were also successful in securing grant aid from the Steve Morgan Foundation towards the Support Worker post also for a three year period.

We have continued to benefit from a number of co-operative working arrangements with other organisations which work to our mutual benefit. The Beech Group and Liverpool One both continue to provide valuable sources of useful furniture and other goods which we can save from being disposed of to landfill. Our partnership with Veolia Environmental Services enables us to operate two Re Use Shops at Household Waste Recycling Centres in Irlam Road, Bootle and Cheadle Avenue, Old Swan, Liverpool. At both these sites we can divert usable unwanted goods from being sent to landfill and generate income from subsequent sales.

The trading at the Superstore has continued to show a slow but steady improvement. There is a continuing need to ensure that our advertising and marketing activities are effective in reaching potential customers and encourages them to visit the store. We are grateful for the funding from the Merseyside Recycling and Waste Authority to run Up Cycling training courses to enable us to give new life to tired furniture and other goods that might not otherwise be saleable. Up cycling provides the opportunity to transform the goods and give them a new life. This new line certainly seems attractive to customers.

Our work has also included developing the open space areas around the Community building. The Participation Garden has been created and securely fenced. The first poly tunnel has been erected to enable Companions to benefit from the produce of their own endeavours. Grant aid from the Burbo Bank Extension Fund has been most helpful in creating this resource. We have also begun the restoration of the public open space which has enabled us to put the Ride on Mower donated by Cammell Laird to regular good use.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (CONTINUED)(INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

We benefitted significantly from being the nominated charity of The Anne Duchess of Westminster Trust Charity Race Day event at Bangor on Dee in November 2016. Not only did we raise over £30,000 but we raised our profile and made some important links.

The two Tasks Groups on Accommodation Support and Social Enterprise are becoming increasingly active and providing a valuable opportunities to examine and discuss issues, opportunities and ideas in some depth prior consideration by the Board. The Government has announced changes to the financing arrangements for Supported Housing which would have a detrimental effect on Emmaus communities across the country. We are working with Emmaus UK and other colleagues to take full benefit of the opportunity for consultation which has been available. In addition the introduction of Universal Credit as presently proposed would further constrain the way in which Emmaus Communities are able to provide the support and training opportunities which Companions need.

The Board has continued to meet regularly throughout the year to ensure effective strategic management and direction of the many works involved in operating the social enterprise activities and providing accommodation and other support for Companions.

Financial review

During the year income totalled £237,313 (2016: £144,660) of which £129,444 was for restricted purposes, including the provision of the Emmaus Community. Expenditure amounted to £211,311 (2016: £125,056), of which £112,003 was spent out of restricted income, resulting in a total surplus for the year of £26,002.

A fixed asset fund has been created to hold the assets which, although unrestricted, are not free reserves. The balance on the fixed asset reserve at 31 March 2017 is £88,621. The balance of unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2017 was £31,897 (2016: £53,715).

At the current time the charity is looking to maximise its income to achieve its objectives of funding the running of the Emmaus Community.

The community is now up and running with a reserves policy of the charity being that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use will be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six months' expenditure. The Trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. The unrestricted reserves are mainly earned from the furniture stores run by the Community. The surpluses are used as contributions to the running of the Emmaus Community. At 31 March 2017 the unrestricted funds represented approximately four months worth of Community expenditure based on the 2017 results. As the number of Community companions increase expenditure is expected to increase.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF EMMAUS MERSEYSIDE

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017, which are set out on pages 5 to 18.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Emmaus Merseyside is a private company limited by guarantee and registered charity. The registered office is 11th Floor, The Plaza, 100 Old Hall Street, Liverpool, L3 9QJ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include the revaluation of freehold properties and to include investment properties and certain financial instruments at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Endowment funds are subject to specific conditions by donors that the capital must be maintained by the charity.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Turnover is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes.

1.5 Resources expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered and are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

Over property lease period - 3 years

Motor vehicles

25% NBV

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument, apart from concessionary loans, is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments, apart from concessionary loans, are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Concessionary loans received are initially measured at amounts received with the amount in subsequent years being adjusted to reflect any accrued interest payable.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
