Governing Document

ViTaL Partnerships Limited is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 14 July 2004. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. Membership of the charity is at the discretion of the trustees.

Appointment of Trustees

At each Annual General Meeting one third of Trustees retire from office. Retiring trustees may be reappointed. New trustees must be recommended by trustees or be proposed by members.

Trustees have been appointed on the basis of the relevant expertise that they can bring to the board. All trustees have professional experience in management and leadership in various sectors of education, including primary, secondary, tertiary and professional qualifications.

Organisation

The Board of Trustees, which must be three or more, administers the charity. The Board meets at least three times per annum and more frequently if new opportunities arise or policy decisions are made. Two of the trustees have been given executive responsibilities to manage the day to day operations of the charity in conjunction with the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees. Other trustees provide support based on their professional expertise as necessary. To facilitate effective operations, the trustees are supported by an executive team who are actively involved in delivering the services of the charity.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

Risk management

The major risks to which the charity is exposed have been reviewed and systems established to mitigate those risks. A key element in the management of financial risk has been the setting up of a reserves policy and its regular review by trustees.

Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are to advance the education and skills of the general public in all areas relating to learning, values and citizenship.

The charity has the general aim of developing professional learning that enhances lifelong learning, change and development in individuals, organisations and communities by providing services at the interface of research, policy, practice and enterprise. It has worked during the year in close partnership with the graduate School of Education at the University of Bristol, together with a number of schools and local education authorities, especially in the Bristol area and the west of England.

The major areas of activity for the company to date have been in projects that support schools and universities in identifying and evaluating their own core values, and in promoting learner-centred cultures through the application of the ideas and practices of 'learning power' developed at the University of Bristol.

Specifically this has involved designing and managing school-based and school-inspired Values Development and ELLI (Learning Power) Research and Development projects with the support of the University of Bristol, providing the school-based training, consultations, evidence-gathering, data-analysis, oral feed-back and report-writing. Through the ELLI R&D programme especially, students, practitioners and researchers learn together. In this way, ViTaL forges links between research, policy and practice in education: making research practical and accessible to teachers, bringing evidence of resulting good practice back into the academy; disseminating findings and building a case for influencing policy, by demonstrating the positive impact of life-enhancing values of teaching, learning and shared educational, political and social goals (e.g. 'Every Child Matters'). In support of this work and of the professionals engaged in it, ViTaL has also developed the 'Courage to Be...' project, offering facilitated residential programmes for personal and professional renewal and revitalisation.

During the year from September 2007 to August 2008, ViTaL has brought three significant ELLI R&D projects towards their conclusion, one in a secondary school in Cumbria (the Parkview Project), one with a consortium of fourteen Higher Education Institutions (the ELLI in HE Project) and one supporting the University of Bristol in researching the underlying causes of underachievement, with five schools in Bedfordshire (the Bedfordshire Underachievement Project).

The Parkview project, with a projected budget of over £10,000 over fifteen months, involved training a core group of ten 'ELLI Champions'; five further visits to the school to maintain momentum and gather qualitative data; liaison with project leadership in the school to offer continual support and advice; commissioning data analysis from the University of Bristol and preparing to write and publish the report on findings: 'Learning in the Outdoor Dimension'.

The ELLI in HE Project has been one of the larger-scale projects that ViTaL has managed, with a total budget of £36,000 over fifteen months. During the year in question, additional two-day training events were commissioned by the Universities of Surrey, Northumbria and Gloucestershire and the then North-East Wales Institute of Higher Education (now Glendower University). ViTaL was invited to contribute to a workshop on ELLI at the CRA (Centre for Recording Achievement) Annual Conference in Manchester in November 2007 and was involved in interim dissemination workshops, research support workshops at University of Bristol and qualitative data gathering visits to the Universities of Northumbria, Sunderland, Gloucestershire and Bedfordshire.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES (CONTINUED)

ViTaL's involvement in the Bedfordshire Underachievement Project was as 'sub-contractor' to the University of Bristol, providing project management support, liaising with the schools, managing and delivering a programme of interventions, principally through a nine-visit programme of mentoring for an identified sub-sample of eighteen underachieving students in three schools, and in reporting on behalf of the project to the Board of Trustees of the Bedford Charity, the principal funders.

During the year in question, ViTaL has also extended its sphere of influence and furthered its objectives in a variety of ways, such as by:

- making a significant improvement to its communications strategy by developing a new web presence in www.vitalhub.net, a project funded by the Gordon Cook Foundation
- winning a significant grant of £50,000 over three years from the Waterside Trust for the 'Courage to Be...' project; contributing to day conferences hosted by the Trust for the group of successful projects all devoted to 'Developing Ethical Leadership' and devising and starting to implement a costed activity schedule to test the market feasibility of the project on a regional and national scale
- becoming one of the Trust Partners in a new Schools Trust (the Worle and Westhaven Trust in Weston-super-Mare) and supporting the visioning and consultation process
- being represented on conference platforms, (e.g. at the CRA Conference), at launches of a new publication on education leadership and of the ViTaLhub, at the University of Bristol; at Headteacher conferences and at a National Conference on Values Education which ViTaL helped to plan and delivered in partnership with another charitable social enterprise 'Heads, Teachers, Industry' (HTI)
- running one-off training for ELLI research and development projects in individual schools, such as Henleaze Primary School, in Bristol and Sharnbrook Upper School near Bedford.

This project-related activity has been led by Tim Small, as an independent consultant now under contract to ViTaL as Head of Research and Development, supported by Sue Woodhead who has been employed by ViTaL on a part time basis as Programmes Manager.

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity at the end of the financial year and of its surplus or deficit for the financial year. In doing so the trustees are required to:

- · Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · Make sound judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue to operate.

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enables them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part VII of the Companies Act 1985 relating to small companies.

NOTES TO THE UNAUDITED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS AT 31 AUGUST 2008

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Accounting Convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2007). The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

1.2 Taxation

The company is a registered charity and its income is exempt from taxation.

1.3 Fund Accounting

Income which can only be used for restricted purposes, and its related expenditure, is accounted for as restricted funds. Income which has been set aside for specific purposes, and its related expenditure, is treated as designated funds. All other income and expenditure is accounted for as general funds.

1.4 Income

Donations are accounted for when received. Funds given for the following financial year are treated as income in advance. All other income is accounted for when receivable.

2. LEGAL STATUS

ViTaL Partnerships Limited is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £10.
