STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Charity is controlled by its governing document, the Memorandum and Articles incorporated on 8 November 2004 and amended by Special Resolution on 7 February 2005.

The charity was registered on 2 March 2005.

The Trustees have had regard to the Charity Commissions guidance on public benefit.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Staff development, Administration and Financial Management

Seedbed remains committed to ensure that it is a responsible employer, ensuring the ongoing development and administrative support of its core staff members.

During 2014 Seedbed saw the increased involvement of Victoria Ward from two to four days per week. Vicky has a background in various Christian community works; and in-depth knowledge and experience of working with people struggling with substance abuse and homelessness issues.

Marijke Hoek has also increased her involvement from three day to four days. In part, this is due to her increased responsibilities and oversight within the Fellowship programme (see below). Marijke also hold a Phd in theology, which contributes and strengthens Seedbed's reflective Christian practice.

Alongside these developments Andy Smithyman has reduced his hours from four days to two days per week. Whilst remaining committed to the development of localities, in which he is involved, Andy's is setting aside time to pursue his writing career; and family commitments.

The Trust has also supported two staff members, Tim Jones and Tim Rawe. to complete Master programmes. Both have produced final dissertations addressing key issues of learning development within Seedbed. These will be appropriately made available throughout the net-work over the next twelve months.

2014 also saw the departure of Gaz Kashier, to pursue his work within the area of Child Sex Trafficking. Gaz worked with the Trust for over seven years and will be missed by all his col-leagues.

Finally in terms of administrative and financial management there is very little change. Seedbed continues to use Dropbox as its cloud provider, which ensures complete access and transparency to all its work, for its core employees. 2014 saw an underspend on the previous two years, which was anticipated due to the initiation of Spearhead programmes in 2013. It is envisaged that this will readjust itself by the end of 2016, with the full implementation of these programmes; increase budget spends in specific areas (i.e Tower Hamlets; Southampton; and Brighton); and potential opening of new localities in the West Midlands in 2016.

Risk management

The Trustees trusteeshave a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

Financial review

Reserves policy

The Trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ("the free reserves") held by the charity should be at least three months of the resources expended. At this level the Trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding while they consider how the funding could be replaced or activities changed.

As at the year end the free reserves stood at £7,921,554 (2013: £6,465,132).

Strategic direction

Seedbed Christian Community Trust has been operational for over ten years. During this time, it has been underpinned by the belief that when God looks at a particular town, city or borough (locality), He only sees one church in that locality because He only has one body. This is a foundational value and is based on Jesus' work on the cross. Therefore, unity is a given.

Seedbed's core aim has been to facilitate people who want to work together across their community in terms of Christian proclamation, action and mission. Further still, the Trust's work always seeks to develop in response to the changing picture on the ground, exploring new opportunities and areas of innovation. Thus, after ten years of engagement, the Trustees have felt it appropriate to review Seedbed's impact and direction.

1. analysis of activities

1 a) Analysis of the last ten years indicates that the Trust has supported three main types of activities. These are:

- i. Christian proclamation
- ii. Christian social action
- iii. Kingdom mission

i. Christian proclamation

This represents individuals and partner organisations who engage in direct Christian proclamation, on an entirely non-coercive and invitational basis (i.e. may include Christian evangelism and mission events). Over the past ten years Seedbed has supported 670 projects representing 22% of its work.

ii. Christian social action

This represents individuals and partner organisations who engage in community activities from a clear Christian perspective. These relationships deliver activities which are seen as advancing wider Christian values and actions (e.g. feeding the poor, loving your neighbour, etc.) and are capable of impacting the public in a beneficial way. Over the past ten years Seedbed has supported 1,806 projects representing 56% of its work.

iii. Kingdom mission

This represents individuals and partner organisations who are not working from a acknowledged Christian perspective, with whom the Seedbed central staff team have developed intentional relationships. Over the past ten years Seedbed has supported 587 projects representing 19% of its work. These relationships operate on the axis of:

- i.) activities which are seen as advancing wider Christian values and actions (e.g. feeding the poor, loving your neighbour etc.) which are capable of impacting the public in a beneficial way.
- ii.) opportunities in which the Seedbed central staff team can dialogue/demonstrate/proclaim the Christian gospel, on an entirely non-coercive and invitational basis.

1b) Impact and Direction

The direction and impact of Seedbed's is best understood as dynamic, contingent and reflective (see section 2 Operational Activities and Learning Culture). Nonetheless, it is also important to ensure that the Trust remains true to its values and charitable objective.

The three categories set out above represent the creative tension found within 21st Christian community mission. Seedbed continues to support activities which can be understood as holding the more 'traditional' expression of Christian proclamation, whilst also ensuring its locality networks and core staff members, are released to forage for fresh expressions of impact within wider Christian social action and Kingdom mission.

However, the important point is that all of these activities have a distinct set of connections; and all contribute to the ongoing strategic direction of the Trust. In fact, developmentally, these categories feed into one another, each offering continual experience, challenge and critique.

In summary, within the current period of time, which is witnessing increasing fallout from the financial crisis of 2008 and harsh cutbacks to many frontline services, Seedbed works seems more and more relevant. Our approach to support individuals and projects at a grassroots level, continues to bring faith, hope and love in communities throughout the UK.

2. operational activities and leaning culture

During 2014 Seedbed has worked in fifty locations within the UK.

2b. Modes of Engagement

Over the past ten years the Trust has developed three core methods of engaging within all of these activities:

- i. Distribution of resources
- ii. Development of relational networks
- iii. Creation of shared learning spaces

i. Distribution of resources

Seedbed's primary method of distributing resources has been via small core teams in each locality. Each of these core teams consist of approximately six to eight Christian volunteers; and are often supported with a paid administration coordinator. Core teams identify and develop relationships with individuals and projects within localities that are socially active; or hold the desire to become active. Following the development of relationships (varies within localities but normally involves face-to-face visits and written material support), individuals/projects are invited to apply for funding (maximum of £5,000 per year and maximum of three years).

Additionally and in alignment with the Spearhead activities (see 2c. below), the Trust now offers larger grants £15,000-£30,000, via its Spearhead Programmes. The distribution of these grants are all overseen by the Trustees/central staff team supported by joint decision making processes; and represent majority of its Kingdom Mission activities (see 1a.iii above). Currently, this accounts for 10% of the Trust's overall budget. The relationships fostered within this category have resulted in the Trust being involved with creative partners; grass-roots journalism and film-making; community organisers; and social justice issues.

ii. Development of relational networks

Once core team's have begun to support individuals/projects, they are encouraged and supported to develop relational networks with others who have received resources (past and pre-sent) within a particular locality. The way in which this takes place changes from location to location, but often involves: websites; written material; peer meetings; meals and gatherings. Alongside these activities members of Seedbed central team undertake a series of direct project visits within localities. These visits not only act as an ongoing 'keeping in touch' with supported projects, but also offer opportunities to cross-fertilise experience and relationships of similar schemes in other parts of the network.

iii. Creation of shared learning spaces

Finally, Seedbed offers individuals/projects a variety of wider learning opportunities. These may take place in a particular locality, within regions, or across the entire Seedbed network. These learning spaces are often shaped by the emerging needs and desires of the network, however they often result in:

- o Further connections between locality core teams
- o Shared learning and skills via workshops which are often conducted by locality representatives
- o Communication and challenge of the direction of Seedbed (i.e. in light of the develop-ing austerity context with the LIK)
 - o The creation of opportunities for theological reflection

All the work discussed in this section is supported by a small central staff team, based in various locations throughout England. Furthermore, it is important to note that activities 1b and 1c are opportunities for individuals and organisational representatives to come together from all three types of activities (Christian proclamation, Christian social action and Kingdom mission), thus strengthening the Trust's ongoing objective to advance the Christian religion.

2c. Responding to the changing world and its challenges.

During the past two years Seedbed has sought to diversify activities within its Christian social involvement via the implementation of the Spearhead Programmes (see Trustee Report 2013-14). These developments are a direct result of ensuring the Trust continues to respond to the changing world and its emerging challenges.

Spearhead includes three key operational activities:

- i. Fellowship programme
- ii. Themed partnership programme
- iii. Research programme
- i. Fellowship programme

In 2014-15 the Fellowship Programme supported ten individuals for three day per week. There were two fellowship cohorts each consisting of five people. The scheme involved three residential learning spaces, in which the fellows gathered together to share experience, challenges and encouragement. Additionally, throughout the year, each fellow was offered one-to-one mentoring support from the Seedbed central staff team.

ii. Themed partnership programme

In 2014-15 the Trust supported and developed two themed partnerships. The first was The Grange, based in Suffolk, which is a therapeutic learning centre for asylum seekers and refugees who have experienced torture or war atrocities in their country of birth. The second was Metal, an arts based organisation working in Liverpool, Peterborough, and South End, which involved engaging with issues such as spirituality; social justice; public engagement and community participation.

iii. Research programme

In 2014-15 the Trust supported a 12 month research study into the effectiveness of (Christian) grassroots community initiatives, with consideration to how this learning could be shared within the wider Seedbed network upon completion.

GOING CONCERN

In 2014 donations of £5,300,000 (2013 - £3,300,000) were received by the charity from a single donor. The Trustees have no reason to believe that this donor will not continue to support the charity and therefore these accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. In giving this assurance they have considered a period in excess of twelve months.

TRUSTEES RESPONSIBILITY STATEMENT

- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditors are aware of that information.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. In adopting this accounting policy the Trustees (who are also directors) have considered the value of donations which the charity is likely to receive, and for which they have no reasons to believe that the charity will not receive. They have considered a period exceeding twelve months from the date of this report.

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company does not operate a pension scheme. Contributions payable are made into the employees' personal pension schemes and are charged to the profit & loss account in the period to which they relate.

The charity has made commitments to existing projects to continue contributing monthly/quarterly payments during 2015 which amount to £591,670. As at 31 December 2013 the commitments payable during 2014 amounted to £455,166.

14. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

During the year grants of £155,000 (2013: £300,000) were given to Leeds Christian Community Trust, of which Mr M Love is also a Trustee.
