STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 1985.

The Church was established under a trust deed dated 26 September 1984 as The Southport Community Church. This trust deed was superseded by a revised deed dated 15 April 1996 under the name of The Community Church in Southport & West Lancashire (1057579). This last trust is in the process of being closed down. In order to deal with expanding work and operation the new charitable trust has been opened "The Community Church in the North West of England" (1107226).

During the year there have been no changes made to the Trust Deed.

ORGANISATION

a) The Community Church is not an independent organisation but part of a network of churches in the UK and abroad known as "Ministries Without Borders". Support, guidance and oversight remains through our apostle Keri Jones who leads this grouping of churches and ministries. There is no legal financial obligation to be a part of this network.

Locally, the church is led by elders, approved by the apostle and set in place to represent him. The eldership team led by Geoffrey Grice includes, David Gregg, David Raynor and Stephen Smith. In the latter part of this financial year David Raynor laid down his eldership in the church although he continues as a trustee and in various aspects of ministry.

Other departments of the church are led by gifted volunteer members of the congregation who in turn report to the leadership team. The church employs an administrator, a part-time conference coordinator as well as a full time caretaker. We also have on staff for the current year a youth worker / administrator support worker. Various people head up areas of service like children's and youth work, hospitality, welcome teams and stewarding. All those working and servicing are church members and have either been CRB checked or are in the process of being checked.

- b) The church meets weekly on Sunday mornings at the Family Life Centre, Southport and then midweek the church gathers in smaller gatherings called "connect groups" around the region. The administration of the church and its activities is based at The Family Life Centre. In this base Amanda Carr is our Administrative Director (full-time), Paul Ashcroft is Site Caretaker (full time), Pam Grice is Conference Co-ordinator / Administrative Assistant (part-time), Kim Murden is the Families and Childrens Worker (part-time) and Ryan Williams is the Assistant Caretaker (part-time)
- c) The church has a membership of approximately 165 adults and children.

TRUSTEES TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

When there is a need to add to the number of trustees the following steps are taken:-

Prospective trustees are approached about the possibility and then the expectations, responsibilities and liabilities are explained. This is accompanied with the booklet from the Charity Commission giving detailed explanation about these matters.

During the duration of Trusteeship, there is a distribution of any relevant literature to trustees that the church receives from the charity commission. If there were any relevant seminars we become aware of, that would benefit the organisation, then we would resource the trustee to attend on our behalf giving feedback upon their return.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The object of the Community Church is to fulfill the aims and objectives contained in the Declaration of Trust and primarily include:

- a) To advance the Christian Faith in accordance with the Statement of Beliefs appearing in the Schedule contained within the Trust document. This activity is carried out in the County of Merseyside and in other parts of the United Kingdom or the world, as the Trustees may from time to time think fit.
- b) To relieve persons who are in conditions of need or hardship or who are aged or sick and to relieve distress caused thereby.
- c) To promote and fulfill such charitable purposes beneficial to the community.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The following details some of the actions and achievements that have taken place during this year to fulfill the objects of the trust.

The Family Life Centre continues to serve as a focal point for many of our midweek activities.

Supplementary information to the above list and additional activities undertaken to further support the aims of the Trust

- i. Our Big Picture Vision states... "we will be a church where Christ is at the centre, faith is an adventure and people are excited to be involved." During the course of the year we have hosted family gatherings for the church "Big Picture Evenings" to reinforce / remind and 'flesh out' this vision statement for the church.
- ii. During the year the church has continued to join with other congregations in the town for united prayer and hosts the weekly Tuesday morning meeting during one month in the year.
- iii. As part of our "One Church" commitment we continue to meet with the other evangelical churches on a quarterly basis with The Community Church hosting one of these events in October.
- iv. July saw us host a free Family Fun day aimed at blessing our community and encouraging young families to establish contact with the church over 250 people visited us that day.
- v. The church have been involved in July in an annual Bible Week family camp hosted at The Stafford County Showground. It is a gathering primarily for all those who look to apostles linked through our ministries without borders charity. Over 120 travelled down from the church. The church played a major part in creating and co-ordinating the Recreation programme during the week.
- vi. To assist in the development and smooth running of the church the elders met during the year with our deacons in the church. Bernie Charnock, Mike & Barbara Pratt who carry responsibility and oversight towards welcoming people, and the smooth running of our operations in particular on Sundays.
- vii. We have continued to market 'The Family Life Centre' as a conference destination trying to utilise spare capacity in the building to generate funds to support the maintenance and development of the building. Income generated plays a major part in us operating the centre and has increased this year by a small amount
- viii. We always look to include other speakers / ministries into the church and have welcomed in our apostle Keri Jones as well as Roger Aubrey leader of the All Nations Church Cardiff. We have also had ministry into the church from Ezekiel Shibemba (Oldham, All Nations Church) David Lavery (Wakefield Church), James Topliss (Living Word Church York Church) and Alfi Fabe (South Africa)
- ix. The 'Healing rooms ministry', previously headed up up by Ben and Maureen McMaster, is now being led by Bernie & Jan Charnock. It has continued to operate throughout the year with people coming to be prayed for healing each Saturday morning in the Family Life Centre.
- x. Kim Murden was our "part-time" (3 days a week) Families / Youth Worker during the course of the year she reduced down to 2 days per week. During the year Kim did an outstanding job overseeing the children's ministry in the church and leading our "Playaways" toddler group. The Youth is overseen by a team of volunteers headed up by Charlotte Campbell.
- xi. We have continued to be involved with the School of the Word 2 programme this is a bible study programme hosted at Living Rock Church. South Leicestershire its aim is to help equip leaders- present and future within our churches. This year Graham & Tracey Burke were supported in attending
- xii. Further decoration and repairs keep taking place throughout the buildings including a major refurbishment of the house on site that had a significant overhaul following the departure of long standing tenants. A new tenant (non-member of the church) moved in and the house continues to

generate income for the church.

- xiii. Our social media pages (facebook and twitter) continue to be developed helping us to grow in our connection with the community.
- xiv. We have hosted a number of creative events to reach out to people with the gospel including gifts of balloons to bless the neighbours, family services at Christmas, Easter, Mothers and Fathers Days
- xv. Kim Murden has continued to reach out to local families by hosting "Coffee & colouring" holiday activity for infant/junior age
- xvi. We have continued with our V.I.P. nights. These events are aimed at providing a special evening for the homeless, or poor and needy in the town. A special meal, entertainment, clothing and gifts of toiletries are provided for all our guests. A great team of volunteers headed up by Karl and Carol Vaughan organise this excellent event.
- xvii. Following the successful launch of "Sunday Night Live", hosted by us at Costa coffee on Central 13 in the town centre. We have continued to run quarterly events that include Live Music, free drinks for guests, a quiz and testimony time. We usually get around 15% of the attenders being "guests"
- xviii. We (Mike & Ali Rothwell) hosted a series of Family Film Nights during the year as a social/evangelistic opportunity
- xix. Kim Murden hosted a small scale, holiday club to check out demand and viability it went well thought single figure attendance.
- xx. Contagious Christianity Course was hosted again encouraging all those in the church to grow in confidence in sharing their faith story and be praying for their neighbours and friends. We trained up a couple of other church members to be the hosts for when we do the course next year.
- xxi. We placed a "wraparound" on the local newspaper at Christmas sharing the gospel and some great stories about what the church are involved in

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The need for reserves

There are a variety of reasons as to why the charity requires financial reserves.

- 1. As the Community Church owns a building facility The Family Life Centre there is a need to accumulate a fund that will contribute towards the ongoing repair, restoration and refurbishment of the Family Life Centre. Even at the completion of the phased approach these works, there will still be a need for an accumulation of funds for ongoing repairs.
- 2. The Church has a number of congregations in the region with the expressed objective of more in the future. As a result funds will be required to support the promotion, development and provide the necessary infrastructure for the work of these congregations to flourish.
- 3. In furthering the aims of the trust there may well be a need to purchase other facilities and resources and our desire to avoid loans and debt wherever possible.

Level of Reserves

On an ongoing basis the charity aims to have a minimum of one month anticipated expenditure in hand (this amounts to around £16,500 per month). The roof and fabric of the building will require significant sums over the course of time. A full schedule of works will be developed for the building but there may at times ne need for large amounts to repair and restore areas of this grade two listed building. Items that will need attending include Phase 2 roof repairs / window replacement / interior decoration / drainage and stonework restoration.

Maintaining Reserves

In anticipation of building demands, a set amount of income is set aside into reserves each month for building repairs and restoration. The charity will also aim to set aside finance to enable the other congregations to have access to funds where necessary.

Monitoring and Review

Through the administrator and treasurer, funds will be monitored and should there ever be an excessive amount of money being held it will be brought to the attention of the Trustees who will decide on any use of the available funds.

Risk Management

The Trustees have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks which the charity faces and confirm that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

Consolidation

In the opinion of the members of the committee, the company and its subsidiary undertakings comprise a small group. The company has therefore taken advantage of the exemption provided by Section 398 of the Charities Act 2011 not to prepare group accounts.

The directors do not consider the cost of preparing consolidated accounts justifiable and note 9 provides adequate details relating to the nature of the trading subsidairy.

Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the company is small.

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:
