The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The day-to-day operations are delegated to the DangerPoint employees at the centre and more strategic decisions are discussed at the full board meetings or subgroups of the Trustees. The agenda at quarterly meetings contains the risk register, funding and operational plans, policies and procedures, health and safety, and the charity's financial situation as well as any other news or events.

#### WHAT WILL YOU FIND AT DANGERPOINT?

DangerPoint contains life-like scenarios such as a street scene, road crossing, car, water scene, railway, house, shop and much more. These scenarios enable us to deliver practical, interactive, scenario-based education to children and adults in safety, citizenship, and life skills. Our scenarios allow visitors to consider risky situations and learn how to deal with them in a controlled and supervised environment, impossible to replicate in a classroom environment. A layered approach to learning is employed where trained 'Danger Ranger' guides tour small groups of children and support their interpretation of the centre through a three-and-a-half-hour visit.

DangerPoint has several different programmes developed for different ages and abilities:

- DangerPoint Core programme -Key stages 1 & 2
- The Point -Key Stages 3 & 4
- DangerPoint Extra Additional Learning Needs Programme
- DangerPoint + Personal safety for older people
- Danger Detective Quest Open to the public
- ActionPoint Tour adapted specifically for climate change

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities STATISTICS

Between April 2022 and March 2023, 7437 visitors were educated at the centre which gives a total of 109,258 visitors attending the Centre since opening in October 2005.

Schools have continued to book visits in advance, some 6 months ahead, which is further in advance than last year. DangerPoint had a waiting list of schools that we couldn't fit in, to approach in case of unavoidable cancellations. The schools' feedback has been excellent again with many very impressed with the new additions and improvements to the scenarios. We recommend watching the Pupil and Teacher feedback videos, the links are available in the student placement section.

#### FUNDING

Overall, there was an increase in the total incoming funding due to receiving 40% more grants than the previous year. Income generation was up 17% from the previous year but still not quite on par with Pre pandemic levels. Out of all the income generation streams, 'hire of meeting rooms' has had a very low uptake, which could be due to a shift to more virtual or online training rather than companies hiring out rooms. Corporate support was slightly higher than the previous year due to one company's sponsorship being carried forward from the previous year. Local Authority support was the same as previous years for educational visits.

The total outgoing expenditure increased, mainly due to expected higher utility and maintenance costs. There was a planned programme of maintenance work carried out due to the inability to continue with these during lockdowns. Heating costs (LPG) have risen this year, however the electricity contract with Drax energy is in place until October 2023 so this cost should remain static until then. Business rates will be re-introduced from April 2023 but the charity will benefit from the 50% reduction in rates relief available.

#### **DEVELOPMENTS/EVENTS 2022-23**

#### **FUNDRAISING EVENTS:**

During the year Abergele Golf Club hosted a "Bush Tucker Fun day" based on the I'm a celebrity theme. Groups of golfers paid for tickets to attend the event and had different challenges around the course. They also had a raffle and an evening award event where all proceeds were donated to DangerPoint. They raised £2053 during the event.

DangerPoint hosted a Community Fair in February. There were 16 stalls including, refreshments, tombola, arts & crafts, fudge, jewellery, and Marshall from Paw Patrol was on hand for photo opportunities. The local businesses made donations of cash, tombola and raffle prizes. A total of 117 people attended and £256 was raised for DangerPoint.

#### **MARKETING AND MEDIA:**

During 2022-2023 DangerPoint resumed the Google AdWords campaigns and to date, a total of £56,066 has been spent via the grant with a total of 647,926 impressions being generated.

#### **SAFETY CENTRE ALLIANCE:**

DangerPoint has continued its membership and voluntary participation in the Safety Centre Alliance (SCA) this year. During 2022-23 we visited Bristol's "LifeSkills" to see the updates they had undertaken and hosted one SCA meeting at DangerPoint. DangerPoint are continuing to work in partnership with some of the other Safety Centres to undertake a joint funding bid from the Gas Safe Trust.

#### **TRAINING DAYS**

A number of training days were held throughout the year. Parc Adfer came to visit DangerPoint in November and asked us to become 'critical friends' for when they open their visitor centre at the waste recovery plant. The Rangers went to visit their visitor centre as part of their training on "Reduce, Re-use and Recycle" for the new Action Point tour. The Rangers also learnt about the dangers of vaping for children and saw examples of vapes that were clearly aimed at children.

The Centre was hired out by St Johns Ambulance for a scenario training day with their Badgers & Cadets. They set up different first aid situations throughout the various scenarios in the centre which the children and young people then had to assess and provide 'first aid care' in.

#### **FIRESAFE**

We continued to work in partnership with North Wales Fire & Rescue Service to deliver the FireSafe programme during 2022-2023. During the period up until March 2023, 37 young people were referred for assessment as to their suitability for the FireSafe intervention which were be split into the following categories:

Completed - 22 Non-compliant Parent- 1 Non-compliant Child- 4 On course- 8 Unsuitable- 2

#### **IMPROVEMENTS 2022-23**

#### **TOYOTA CAR**

We were extremely grateful to receive a donated Toyota Hybrid car from the Toyota Manufacturing UK Charitable Trust. The previous car was over 16 years old and had begun to look very tatty.

Julie and Cat attended a training course at the Toyota Academy in Derby as part of the T&Cs for the hybrid car donation. We learned how to power down a hybrid car and how to keep it maintained. The Rangers script was updated to include an element regarding pedestrian safety with regard hearing hybrid/ electric vehicles. Electric and hybrid vehicles have either very little or no sound travelling at speeds higher than 20 miles an hour so it is important that children are aware that they might not always be able to hear cars coming when they are crossing roads. A new sound effect that emulates an electric/hybrid vehicle will be added with funding from Toyota Trust to ensure the scenario is as realistic as possible.

#### COUNTRYSIDE SCENARIO

The vinyl graphics in the countryside had been peeling and coming away from the glass. New graphics have been installed with an image of Talacre beach complete with the lighthouse and Gwynt y Môr wind farm. The images were kindly provided by Robin Rowe, a volunteer from the Cheshire Wildlife Trust.

#### **BUS SCENARIO**

The life-size wall graphic has been installed and the pavement moved so that some of the characters from the 'guess who' can now be seen as life-size with more of their back story becoming apparent. This will encourage further discussions to be had around equality diversity & inclusivity. Arriva has also replaced some of the flooring and installed bus seats.

#### TRAIN SCENARIO

The outside of the train was rewrapped in Transport for Wales branding. We have also installed some tactile flooring to the train scenario to incorporate further messaging about inclusivity within the different scenarios where relevant. This was installed by additional funded sourced by Network Rail.

#### **INTERACTIVE HOB**

With thanks to funding through Wales & West Utilities Vulnerability and Carbon Monoxide Allowance (VCMA) fund, we have updated the hob in the kitchen to make it more interactive. The Rangers can now 'turn it on' and a blue 'flame' will appear under the pan which will then turn to orange to simulate that there could be carbon monoxide present and the appliance should be switched off and checked by a registered engineer.

#### REBRANDING

During 2022, DangerPoint went through a rebranding exercise and through consultation with schools, Trustees and staff, had a new logo and brand guidelines created. We replaced all of the signs around the centre with the new branding as well as updating staff uniforms, Social media channels and our website.

#### **ACTIONPOINT TOUR**

During 2022-2023, with thanks to funding from Together from your Planet, we launched a new tour called 'ActionPoInt'. The aim of the tour is to take the children on a sustainability journey throughout the scenarios within the centre, focusing on climate change and the small changes that can make a big difference to our planet.

What will you learn from an ActionPoint tour?

- How we can be more sustainable (in the house, whilst travelling etc)?
- What is recycling and how can we reduce rubbish?
- Where does our food come from?
- What is biodiversity?
- Climate change & the impact on the planet.

The tour was initially part of a pilot project under the funding received and we hope to source further funding to continue delivering going forward.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Reserves policy

The reserves that we have set aside provide financial stability and the means for the development of our educational activities. We intend to maintain our reserves at a level which is at least equivalent to covering unforeseen operational and/or maintenance costs, between 20% and 30% of annual operating expenditure. This will ensure that there is sufficient cash flow for instances when perhaps Grants or invoices are not received on time or when expected. The amount of Unrestricted funds or reserves held at any one time can be seen on the Budget/cash flow spreadsheet which is shared with Trustees on a monthly basis. The Board regularly reviews the amount of reserves that are required to ensure that they are adequate to fulfil our continuing obligations.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The trustees continue to assess the major risks to which the company is exposed as part of the strategic plan of the Charity. Risks identified will be regularly reviewed and systems to mitigate such risks will be implemented

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Charitable activities

Grant income is recognised in the statement of financial activities in accordance with the terms of the grant. At the end of the financial year any grant underspend is repayable and an accrual for this amount is included in the accounts.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Donated goods

Goods, facilities and services donated to the charity are recognised in the accounts as income and expenditure. Donated goods, facilities and services are measured at market value.
