We are pleased to present our report together with the independently examined financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2010

Legal and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, including the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company, established on 4 May 2005 and registered as a charity on 11 August 2005. The charity was established under a Memorandum, and Articles of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charity, and under which it is governed.

The charitable company acquired the assets, liabilities and activities of an incorporated charitable trust by the same name on 1 January 2006. The original trust, which had similar objects, was established on 10 February 1997.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 per member in the event of a winding up

Management and governance arrangements

The directors of the charitable company are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees

The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of three trustees and no maximum. The charity currently has a complement of eight trustees. Requirements for new trustees are identified and appointed by the remaining trustees. The chair of the Board of Trustees is responsible for the induction of new trustees, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, and the work of the charity.

Related parties

The Trust works with other charitable and not for profit organisations in the furtherance of its objectives Amongst these are the following

The Vincentian Millennium Partnership (VMP) The Trust refers clients to VMP for practical assistance. Sr Maureen Tinkler represents them in the Board of Trustees.

The charity makes use of volunteers, who assist in the provision of training courses, in undertaking research, and in assisting on cases. They are represented on the Board by Maev Sullivan and Tony Goodfellow.

Objectives and activities

The principal objects of the charity are

- the prevention and relief of poverty in the United Kingdom in a manner consistent with Christian ethics,
- providing assistance and services to individuals in need, providing advice, education, training and
 assistance on any issues relating to the relief of poverty to volunteers, other charities or
 organisations, undertaking, supporting and promulgating research into factors that contribute
 towards poverty and ways to mitigate them,

The main objectives for this year were

- To increase the number of vulnerable people/families in debt and in need of advice that we were able to help
- To increase the numbers we train to be McKenzie Friends who can then go on to help those in financial need and debt
- To provide support and training to other voluntary sector organisations to help them to support their own clients who face issues with debt and/or legal claims and to support their campaigning objectives when they support or complement our own
- To lobby effectively to persuade the government to act in the interest of the health and well being
 of the poorest citizens in the UK and their children

Procedures and policy for grant making

Our policy is to give a few small grants to families and individuals experiencing exceptional poverty beyond the scope of state benefits from our Relief of Poverty Fund, for which we raise money Grants are given at the discretion of the Chairman and/or the Chief Executive and the trustees are kept informed. In 2010, Z2K raised the sum of £1,500 from London Catalyst which is added to this fund and which is to be dispersed in accordance with that organisation's guidelines.

Activities, Achievements and performance

2010 was another year of significant progress in all three of our three areas of work, serving vulnerable people in debt, supporting other voluntary organisations and lobbying Parliament on poverty related issues

We are mindful of the public benefit tests for charities, and have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission

We started 104 cases in 2010 and continued working on 35 existing ones. We also advised 75 further clients by email or by telephone. The problems referred to us were mainly inability to pay council tax or fuel bills or rent, claims for repayment of overpaid benefit, difficulties with benefits of all kinds, particularly housing benefit and problems with excessively high interest rates being charged by home lenders.

In 2010 we received referrals from 5 MP's constituency offices, other charities, a GP's surgery and the Westminster NHS Psychological Therapies Unit and a greatly increasing number of referrals by word of mouth from past or existing clients. Ours is an enhanced McKenzie Friends service in that we provide a friend, either a member of staff or a volunteer, to go to court with a client but we then help with the underlying problems which lead to a summons being issued or threatened. We write letters and make telephone calls on behalf of clients but we also accompany them to court and, for example, the Housing Options office to ensure they are properly treated and have a clear understanding of what is happening. Very few other organisations are able to provide this very intensive help. Many of our clients come to us suffering from stress and depression which can be helped significantly by the help we provide.

In April we were able to recruit a volunteer co coordinator. This enabled us to put our recruitment of volunteers onto a far more effective footing. We have now developed policies and procedures which will increase effectiveness and reduce risk and lead us to be able to work with 45 active volunteers in 2010. These volunteers both act as McKenzie Friends to support our clients in helping them to resolve their problems and also support the employed staff with data processing, information classification, research and other essential tasks. Several of our beneficiaries have gone on to become volunteers.

The volunteer coordinator went on maternity leave in October which has slowed down the development of the volunteer programme but we have been very ably supported by one of our trustees, Maev Sullivan who has performed the role on a part time volunteer basis. We would not have been able to manage without her

We trained 137 people to be McKenzie Friends and to support the vulnerable to deal with arrears in essential household expenditure. Most of them were within community groups which are already in touch with the vulnerable who need help such as volunteers in the CAB in Plymouth. However we stopped running training courses for AVID as we had been doing previously because the training was unrelated to the specific service that we provide and was carried out by specialist immigration practitioners, not by our staff and because AVID had developed sufficient capability to deliver the training themselves.

Through the work of a volunteer intern who took a particular interest in this issue we developed better tools for helping those in difficulties with their electricity bills which lead to the setting up of a conference, which took place in early 2011 at which representatives of the domestic energy suppliers and the advice sector discussed how to help those in fuel poverty

Campaigning/lobbying.

Having raised the money to employ a parliamentary researcher for 2 years we recruited Ben Jenkins to perform this role from January 2011

Some of our campaigns, like the campaign for minimum income standards, need persistence over many years before they produce a change in policy. However we have watched with great satisfaction the progress of the London Living Wage during 2010 due to campaigning by London Citizens and the Trades Unions. The number of low paid workers receiving the living wage in London reached 10,000 in 2010. The Greater London Authority used minimum income standards research by Family Budget. Unit commissioned by Z2K to determine the adequacy of the living wage when setting the level.

We also measure success by specific milestones achieved like having an amendment to a Bill tabled and discussed in a Public Bill Committee or the House of Lords, or a Parliamentary questions asked so we can show we are influencing the debate on large policy issues. We also join with other campaigning groups on certain issues so that contribute towards outcomes instead of being solely responsible.

Examples

In 2010 amendments were tabled by MPs and Peers, at Z2K's behest, to the Child Poverty Bill drawing attention to the risks to their health of their babies when mothers do not have a high enough income to buy a healthy diet before they conceive and while they are pregnant

We continued to campaign for Parliament to remove the power on the statute book, but not promulgated, for bailiffs to use force against the person while enforcing fines and civil debts

An appeal to the Information Commissioner, and then to the Information Tribunal asking the Ministry of Justice to release the full text of Magistrates' guidance to bailiffs about forcible entry into people's homes to enforce fines came to a head when Ministers relented just before the election in May 2010. The process of complaint had taken four years. Sharing this information with CAB, Advice UK and others led to the formation of the Advice Sector Enforcement Law Reform Group to talk to the Ministry of Justice about bailiff law convened by Z2K.

Jointly with others we secured a commitment in the Labour Party manifesto and now a parliamentary debate in a Private Members' Bill on a proposal to put a cap on the interest rates that can be charged by home lenders

Fundraising

We continue to derive most of our income from trusts and foundations. However although we did not hold a big fundraising event this year we managed to raise over £20,000 in fundraising from individuals or

corporate donors. We also started to charge more for the services and training we provide and this made a contribution of c £2,000 towards our income. We continue to work towards a more diverse funding ecology.

Financial Review

The charity received grants and donations totalling £170,903 in the year including £3,536 specifically for the relief of poverty fund. Income from fundraising was £2,059, and investment and other income amounted to £1,197, giving total incoming resources of £174,159.

Expenditure for the year totalled £177,478, giving net outgoing resources for the year of £3,319 Expenditure included £2,455 in direct relief of poverty grants, and amounts spent on charitable activities of £171,947

Total funds carried forward at 31 December 2010 amounted to £69,497

Resources expended have increased slightly over the previous year, reflecting the continuing growth and development in the Trust's work. The Trustees expect that this general trend will continue into the next financial year.

Principal funding sources

The charity is dependent upon donations from individual donors and institutions. A full list of grants and donations received is set out in Note 2 to the accounts

Investment policy

The charity's Memorandum of Association does not confer any specific rights or restrictions on us as trustees in respect of investing its funds. The funds received by the charity during the year under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment, other than to be placed on deposit with the charity's bankers.

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain an amount on general fund equivalent to three months' running expenses, although this is dependent on the level of donations received. At 31 December 2010, the charity held approximately 2.9 months' worth (2009. 4.7 months) of annual expenditure in unrestricted free reserves.

Future Plans

We will seek further referrals from more MPs, local councillors' surgeries, doctors' surgeries and other charities and NGOs who are in touch with the vulnerable

We will investigate whether we should apply for a contract to provide advice to those suffering from stress and depression as a result of debt as part of one of the local GP consortia

We have been approached by a Foundation which is interested in our mode of operation and which wishes to fund work on the prevention of homelessness. We are now looking to raise further funds from them to support a prevention of homelessness project which would involve

- employing a specialist caseworker who will work on helping those who may be evicted from accommodation on central London because of the recently introduced caps on housing benefit
- setting up a rent deposit guarantee scheme which will help those of our clients who are trapped in unsuitable or unaffordable accommodation by rent arrears to move into sustainable tenancies
- identifying cases of eviction because of the housing benefit caps which can be fought as test cases or used as a focus for public demonstrations

We are working with the charity LawWorks on a pilot scheme to put volunteer McKenzie Friends into Brent Magistrates Court to support those who come in facing summonses for council tax or small fines

When the volunteer co coordinator returns from maternity leave we will develop an even more effective method of recruiting and using volunteers so that we can deal more effectively with the increased work load that will flow from increased referrals,

We will campaign on and lobby to seek amendments to the government's plans for welfare reform and cuts to the voluntary sector so as to protect the interests of the poor and vulnerable

We will develop the Board of Trustees and an Advisory Council so that both can contribute towards developing the strategy for the Trust and can help it to achieve its strategic goals

We indeed to develop a communications strategy which involves

- raising our profile and improving the reach of our campaigning by utilising social media techniques
 including blogging to mobilise public support
- developing the website so that it becomes both a campaigning tool and provides greater support advice and information to our volunteers
- developing advice sheets and check lists which will help us to empower and support both our
 existing clients and other community groups to use self help to deal with debt and summonses
- identifying the most effective message and tactics to enable us to increase donations from individuals and corporates

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

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1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the previous year.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements comply with the requirements of applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005), and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2005 issued under the Charities Act 1993.

Fund accounting

Restricted donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular use

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable

Investment income is included when receivable

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. estimated usage, as set out in Note 3.

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets with a cost in excess of £50 are capitalised. Depreciation is calculated so as to write down to estimated residual value the cost of all other tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows.

Designated funds

The fixed asset fund represents the net book value of tangible fixed assets, and has been designated by the trustees to reflect the fact that these funds are not in a liquid form and so are not expendable funds

Restricted funds

The Relief of Poverty fund comprises donations received from individuals and organisations. The funds are used to defray the debts of the poorest and most vulnerable members of society, with a particular slant on arrears of housing costs. Direct donations to individuals are also occasionally made to relieve poverty.

The CEO, lawyer, voluinteer co-ordinator, volunteer program, administrator and office and premises funds were raised to fund those specific costs. Grants were received from Porticus, Trust for London, Tudor Trust, The Mercers Charitable Foundation, The John Ellerman Foundation and The Westminster Foundation respectively.
