We are pleased to present our report together with the independently examined financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2012

Legal and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, including the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005).

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company, established on 4 May 2005 and registered as a charity on 11 August 2005. The charity was established under a Memorandum, and Articles of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charity, and under which it is governed.

The charitable company acquired the assets, liabilities and activities of an incorporated charitable trust by the same name on 1 January 2006. The original trust, which had similar objects, was established on 10 February 1997.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 per member in the event of a winding up

Management and governance arrangements

The directors of the charitable company are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees

The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of three trustees and no maximum. The charity currently has a complement of seven trustees. Requirements for new trustees are identified and appointed by the remaining trustees. The Chair of the Board of Trustees is responsible for the induction of new trustees, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, and the work of the charity.

Related parties

Z2K works with other charitable and not for profit organisations in the furtherance of its objectives Amongst these are the following

The St Vincent de Paul Society (SVP) The Trust refers clients to SVP for practical assistance. Siobhan Garibaldi represents SVP on the Board of Trustees.

It also works with Nucleus Legal Advice Centre on the basis of mutual referrals

The charity makes use of volunteers, who assist in the provision of training courses, in undertaking research, and in assisting on cases. They are represented on the Board by Maev Sullivan and Tony Goodfellow.

Objectives and Activities

The principal objects of the charity are

- the prevention and relief of poverty in the United Kingdom in a manner consistent with Christian ethics,
- providing assistance and services to individuals in need, providing advice, education, training and
 assistance on any issues relating to the relief of poverty to volunteers, other charities or
 organisations, undertaking, supporting and promulgating research into factors that contribute
 towards poverty and ways to mitigate them.

The main objectives for this year were

- To increase the number of vulnerable people/families in London in debt and in need of advice that we were able to help particularly by recruiting and training more volunteers
- To provide support and training to other voluntary sector organisations to help them to support
 their own clients who face issues with debt and/or legal claims and to support their campaigning
 objectives when they support or complement our own
- To set up and run a new service which will offer advice and support to those affected by housing benefit caps
- To lobby effectively to persuade the government to act in the interest of the health and well being
 of the poorest citizens in the UK and their children

Procedures and policy for grant making

Our policy is to give a few small grants to families and individuals experiencing exceptional poverty beyond the scope of state benefits from our Relief of Poverty Fund, for which we raise money. Grants are given at the discretion of the Chairman and/or the Chief Executive and the trustees are kept informed. In 2012, Z2K raised the sum of £1,500 from London Catalyst which is added to this fund and which is being dispersed in accordance with that organisation's guidelines.

Activities, Achievements and Performance

2012 was another year of growth in our three areas of work serving those on low incomes in debt, training and supporting other organisations in the voluntary sector and lobbying and campaigning on poverty related issues

We are mindful of the public benefit tests for charities, and have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission

Casework service

Our service to debtors involves intensive support including offering help in Courts and Tribunals as non-legal supporters known as McKenzie Friends. We increased the numbers we helped in person to 645 new clients in addition to an existing caseload at the beginning of the year. We were able to increase the volume of cases because we were able to raise increased sums to support our casework as well as by recruiting more volunteers.

The major new issue which our casework service now deals with is appeals to the Social Security Tribunals from decisions of DWP including, in particular, appeals against work capability assessments in which many who are suffering from disabling illnesses are found fit for work. These appeals are time consuming as they involve preparing detailed submissions followed by representation but we had a 95% success rate and the need for this help is ever increasing.

We also ran a new project called NextDoorPlus which has helped deal with the impact of the changes to housing benefit announced in the Emergency Budget This help was delivered by giving telephone advice through a helpline, offering specific training to Community groups including, in particular to parents groups in local schools and by offering specific and detailed case work to over 300 households

The funds raised for the NextDoor project included funds to set up a private rented sector access scheme within which we support those threatened with homelessness who are not entitled to help with housing from their local authority. We have a fund, which supports the giving of deposit guarantees, and we develop relationships with landlords in the hope of persuading them to accept housing benefit claimants.

Advice and support to voluntary sector

Our role of supporting other voluntary sector organisations took the form of offering training to such organisations, which was tailored to their needs. This included offering specific training on

- Housing benefit caps
- Fuel poverty
- The benefits system
- Council tax
- Bailiffs

We trained and supported 48 organisations including other advice agencies e.g. Nucleus Legal Advice Centre, voluntary agencies like Westminster Homestart and a large number of parents groups in schools

We also set up and ran a conference jointly with Save the Children and Child Poverty Action Group on the barriers to employment in London. We brought together representatives of local authorities, voluntary agencies and employability groups to discuss strategies to deal with the specific problems in London which prevent our clients from helping themselves out of poverty by moving into employment. Our contribution dealt with the impacts of welfare reform on in and out of work incomes.

Campaigning and lobbying

2012 working against the damaging impacts of welfare reform

The year was dominated by lobbying for specific amendments to the Welfare Reform Act and the Localism Act. The main achievements were

- Arranging a joint seminar/ lobby at which numerous anti-poverty charities had a meeting with the welfare minister Lord Freud to explain their concerns to him in detail
- Obtaining a statement from Lord Freud in Parliament confirming that JobCentePlus officials must use legal principles of reasonableness when making decisions about welfare conditionality.

We also continued to lobby on the regulation of bailiffs, which eventually lead to the Ministry of Justice producing some draft regulations, which continue to be debated

Financial Review

After adjusting for deferred income the charity received grants and donations totalling £337,024 (2011 £242,053) in the year including £4,070 (2011 £1,214) specifically for the relief of poverty fund. Income from fundraising was £25,525 (2011 £29,638), and investment and other income amounted to £1,272 (2011 £2,735), giving total incoming resources of £363,821 (2011 £274,426)

Expenditure for the year totalled £342,031 (2011 £242,283), giving net incoming resources for the year of £21,790 (2011 £32,143) Expenditure included £2,803 (2011 £2,207) in direct relief of poverty grants, and amounts spent on charitable activities of £319,907 (2011 £219,278)

Total funds carried forward at 31 December 2012 amounted to £123,430 (2011 £101,640), of which £54,036 (2011 £83,565) were unrestricted free funds

Resources expended have increased over the previous year, reflecting the continuing growth and development in the Trust's work. The Trustees expect that this general trend will continue into the next financial year.

Principal funding sources

The charity is dependent upon donations from individual donors and institutions. A full list of grants and donations received is set out in Note 2 to the accounts

Investment policy

The charity's Memorandum of Association does not confer any specific rights or restrictions on us as trustees in respect of investing its funds. The funds received by the charity during the year under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment, other than to be placed on deposit with the charity's bankers

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain an amount on general fund equivalent to three months' running expenses, although this is dependent on the level of donations received. At 31 December 2012, the charity held approximately 2.4 months' worth (2011) 4.1 months) of annual expenditure in unrestricted free reserves

Future Plans

In the course of 2013 we will be doing more work that helps to prevent our clients getting into debt which involves ensuring they receive the benefits to which they are entitled and that they do not fall into rent arrears

We will continue to devote more resources to supporting those who are refused Employment and Support Allowance because they have failed the Work Capability Assessment We provide McKenzie Friend support for appeal hearings through the Tribunal system. Cuts to legal aid and to the advice sector generally mean there is less help available elsewhere for this kind of work

We have, jointly with Westminster CAB and Westminster Home Start, applied to the Big Lottery for funds to set up a project, which will build on our NextDoor work and assist households, which have to move as a result of caps to find sustainable tenancies and schools etc., in their new localities

Our campaigning will continue to try to mitigate the impact on the poorest of welfare reform We will also continue to press the Ministry of Justice on enforcement law reform

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departure disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities

Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the previous year

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements comply with the requirements of applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005), and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the Charities Act 2011

Fund accounting

Restricted donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the chanty

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular use

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable

Investment income is included when receivable

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. estimated usage, as set out in Note 3

Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets with a cost in excess of £50 are capitalised Depreciation is calculated so as to write down to estimated residual value the cost of all other tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows

Designated funds

The fixed asset fund represents the net book value of tangible fixed assets, and has been designated by the trustees to reflect the fact that these funds are not in a liquid form and so are not expendable funds

Restricted funds

The Relief of Poverty fund comprises donations received from individuals and organisations. The funds are used to defray the debts of the poorest and most vulnerable members of society, with a particular slant on arrears of housing costs. Direct donations to individuals are also occasionally made to relieve poverty.

The CEO, lawyer, volunteer co-ordinator, volunteer program, administrator and office and premises funds were raised to fund those specific costs. Grants were received from Porticus, Trust for London, Tudor Trust, The Mercers Charitable Foundation, The John Ellerman Foundation and The Westminster Foundation respectively.
