We are pleased to present our report together with the independently examined financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2009

Legal and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, including the Statement of Recommended Practice Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005)

#### Structure, Governance and Management

## Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company, established on 4 May 2005 and registered as a charity on 11 August 2005. The charity was established under a Memorandum, and Articles of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charity, and under which it is governed.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 per member in the event of a winding up

#### Management and governance arrangements

The directors of the charitable company are its trustees for the purpose of charity law and throughout this report are collectively referred to as the Trustees

The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of three trustees and no maximum. The charity currently has a complement of eight trustees. Requirements for new trustees are identified and appointed by the remaining trustees. The chair of the Board of Trustees is responsible for the induction of new trustees, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, and the work of the charity

#### Related parties

The Trust works with other charitable and not for profit organisations in the furtherance of its objectives Amongst these are the following

The Vincentian Millennium Partnership (VMP) The organisation runs some McKenzie Friends courses jointly with VMP Sr Maureen Tinkler represents them in the Board of Trustees

The charity makes use of volunteers, who assist in the provision of training course, in undertaking research, and in assisting on cases. They are represented on the Board by Maev Sullivan and Tony Goodfellow.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

The principal objects of the charity were as at December 2009

- The relief of financial need of people throughout the world who, by virtue of their circumstances, are in debt, in need of advice or are deprived of housing, food, heating, clothing and any other necessities required for healthy living, in collaboration with them
- The advancement of the education of the public, particularly but not exclusively, by promoting or
  assisting in the promotion of research or study into the religious philosophy of the Christian
  religion and its spiritual traditions in contemporary society particularly as far as its teachings reflect
  or are relevant in the context of the social political and economic circumstances of nations
  throughout the world and to publish the useful results of such research
- The advancement of the Christian religion

The main objectives for this year were

- To increase the number of vulnerable people/families we are able to help, who are in debt and in need of advice
- To increase the number of volunteers we train to be McKenzie Friends who can then go on to help those in financial need and debt
- To make progress towards persuading the government to adopt policies which would help to relieve poverty
- To lobby effectively to persuade the government to act in the interest of the mental and physical health and well being of the poorest citizens in the UK and their children

#### **Procedures and Policy for Grant-making**

Our policy is to give a few small grants to families and individuals experiencing exceptional poverty beyond the scope of state benefits from our Relief of Poverty Fund, for which we raise money. Grants are given at the Chairman's discretion and the trustees are kept informed.

#### Activities, Achievements and Performance

2009 was another year of significant progress in all three of our three areas of work, serving vulnerable people in debt, training McKenzie Friends and lobbying Parliament on poverty related issues

We are mindful of the new public benefit tests for charities, and have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission

We started 66 cases in 2009 and resolved 29 cases. The problems referred to us were mainly inability to pay council tax or fuel bills or rent, claims for repayment of overpaid benefit, difficulties with benefits of all kinds, particularly housing benefit and problems with excessively high interest rates being charged by home lenders.

In 2009 we received referrals from 3 MP's constituency offices, Magistrates courts help desks, other charities and word of mouth from past clients. We provide an enhanced McKenzie Friends service in that we provide a friend, either a member of staff or a volunteer, to go to court with a client but we then help with the underlying problems which will lead to a summons being issued. We will write letters and make telephone calls on behalf of clients but we also accompany them to, for example, the Housing Benefit office to ensure they are properly treated and have a clear understanding of what is happening. Very few other organizations provide this very intensive help

Our volunteers both act as McKenzie Friends to support our clients in helping them to resolve their problems and also support the employed staff with data processing, information classification, research and other essential tasks. Several of our beneficiaries have gone on to become volunteers

In the course of 2009 we developed a relationship with an NHS surgery in Tottenham which is now referring to us patients who were attending the surgery with complaints of stress and depression caused by debt or other financial worries. Many of our clients come to us clearly suffering from depression and are transformed by the very personal help that we provide

We trained 174 people to be McKenzie Friends Most of them were within community groups which are already in touch with those in need including groups of Barnados' volunteers, magistrates courts help desks, Devon & Cornwall Probation Service, St Vincent De Paul Society (Maidenhead) and Huddersfield Law Society We also trained students at 2 law schools who are interested in volunteering as McKenzie

Friends to help those in financial need. We are now working with these law schools and with another charity, LawWorks on a long term project to provide a duty McKenzie Friend scheme in all Magistrates. Courts in London so that unrepresented litigants can have the help and advice which is currently completely lacking. We also ran 2 McKenzie Friends training courses with the Association for Visitors in Detention for volunteers assisting detainees on bail applications. This work helps to spread the knowledge of the useful concept of a McKenzie Friend.

We campaigned/lobbied on the following issues

- Affordable credit. In this connection we complained to FSA on behalf of a client who borrowed an
  inappropriate and unaffordable amount at an unaffordable rate of interest from Provident PLC
  Eventually Provident wrote off any further interest owing but for technical reasons we were unable
  to obtain a ruling from the FSA. We also submitted comments on the Consumer White Paper
  which dealt with this issue amongst others.
- Powers of bailiffs We continued our argument with the Information Commissioner's office seeking the release of HMCS Magistrates Courts Guidance Search and Entry Powers After formal exchange of submissions the case was listed for full hearing on March 1st 2010 but shortly before the date of this report the Ministry of Justice released the full guidance so as to avoid a hearing We also continued to participate in the Enforcement Law Reform group set up by MoJ as part of a consultation on the regulation of bailiffs/court enforcement officers. We also persuaded Karen Buck MP to introduce a private members bill seeking the regulation of bailiffs and help her to draft her speech. The bill went to second reading.
- Welfare Reform lobbying on the welfare reform bill lasted all year. We put down several different
  amendments to the provisions dealing with sanctions which amount to a deduction from benefit
  payments. We also supported an amendment tabled by Lord Northbourne aiming to safeguard the
  well-being of children when regulations are made which was accepted.
- Child Poverty Bill we also lobbied all year on this bill putting together a coalition of academics who produced evidence about the inability of a young mother to afford a healthy diet when living on benefits of whatever kind and the resultant damage to children's mental and physical health caused by poor maternal nutrition both before and during pregnancy. Relevant amendments were sponsored by the trust and debated in the House of Commons and the House of Lords. The issue has been passed from the Department of Work and Pensions to the Department of Health, without any proper answer ever being provided, and from there to the Scientific Advisory Committee on Nutrition who are due to report in 2010.

#### Fundraising

We continue to derive most of our income from trusts and foundations but in 2009 we embarked on a campaign to raise funds from individuals. We joined a sponsored walk which was raising money for legal charities and held a fundraising quiz. The target was £20,000 for these events and we in fact raised, net of costs, £ 31,000

#### **Financial Review**

The charity received grants and donations totalling £164,048 in the year including £2,343 specifically for the relief of poverty fund. Income from fundraising was £40,360, and investment and other income amounted to £3,576, giving total incoming resources of £207,984.

Expenditure for the year totalled £168,430, giving net incoming resources for the year of £39,554 Expenditure included £2,969 in direct relief of poverty grants Expenditure includes amounts spent on charitable activities of £156,816

Total funds carried forward at 31 December 2008 amounted to £72,816

Incoming resources and resources expended have increased considerably over the previous year, reflecting the continuing growth and development in the Trust's work. The Trustees expect that this general trend will continue into the next financial year, albeit with lesser growth in 2010.

#### Principal funding sources

The charity is dependent upon donations from individual donors and institutions. A full list of grants and donations received is set out in Note 2 to the accounts

#### Investment policy

The charity's Memorandum of Association does not confer any specific rights or restrictions on us as trustees in respect of investing its funds. The funds received by the charity during the year under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment, other than to be placed on deposit with the charity's bankers.

#### Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain an amount on general fund equivalent to three months' running expenses, although this is dependent on the level of donations received. At 31 December 2009, the charity held approximately 4.7 months' worth (2008 2.5 months) of annual expenditure in unrestricted reserves. The Trustees have retained additional reserves at 31 December 2009, as currently one staff member's post is not fully funded for 2010.

#### **Future Plans**

We have raised the money to employ a volunteer co coordinator for whom we are currently recruiting Once we have someone in place we aim to double the number of volunteers with whom we work and to deploy them more effectively so that we can service at least double the number of beneficiaries

We will seek referrals from more MPs, local councillors' surgeries, doctors' surgeries and other charities and NGOs who are in touch with the vulnerable

We are now looking to raise further funds so that we can employ a parliamentary researcher which will help us to lobby the new government which will take power in May 2010 on minimum income standards with particular reference to the problem of poor maternal nutrition, the provision of affordable credit for the financially excluded and the regulation of bailiffs as well as other specific issues affecting those with whom we work that may come up in the course of the year

We will continue to train volunteers in community groups outside London. Once the volunteer co-ordinator is in place we propose to develop better relationships with the groups we train to ensure that they feel equipped to go on to help vulnerable debtors and that they share their experiences with us so that we build up a community of McKenzie Friends who exchange knowledge and experience

#### Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

Charity law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which show a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- · select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently,
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent,
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departure disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial

statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### 1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the previous year.

#### Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements comply with the requirements of applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice. Accounting and Reporting by Charities (issued in March 2005), and the Charities (Accounts and Reports). Regulations 2005 issued under the Charities Act 1993.

#### Fund accounting

Restricted donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular use

#### Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable

Investment income is included when receivable

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes VAT which cannot be recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the costs linked to the strategic management of the charity

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. estimated usage, as set out in Note 3.

#### Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Assets with a cost in excess of £50 are capitalised. Depreciation is calculated so as to write down to estimated residual value the cost of all other tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows.

#### Designated funds

## **Restricted funds**

The Relief of Poverty fund comprises donations received from individuals and organisations. The funds are used to defray the debts of the poorest and most vulnerable members of society, with a particular slant on arrears of housing costs. Direct donations to individuals are also occasionally made to relieve poverty.

The CEO, lawyer, administrator and office and premises funds were raised to fund those specific costs. Grants were received from Porticus, The City Parochial Foundation, The John Ellerman Foundation and The Westminster Foundation respectively.
