STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Zacchaeus Trust 2000 Trust is a company limited by guarantee established on 4 May 2005 and registered as a charity on 11 August 2005. The charitable company acquired the assets, liabilities and activities of an incorporated charitable trust by the same name on 1 January 2006. The original trust, which had similar objectives, was established on 10 February 1997.

The charity was established under a Memorandum, and Articles of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charity. The Memorandum of Association was amended 19 September 2007 and 4 June 2008 and then a special resolution was passed 2 June 2010 which deleted the Memorandum of Association of the company and the amended Articles of Association are now the charity's governing document.

The company is limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of members is limited to £1 per member in the event of a winding up.

Appointment of new Trustees

The Articles of Association provide for a minimum of three trustees and no maximum. The charity currently has a complement of seven trustees. Requirements for new trustees are identified and appointed by the remaining trustees.

Trustee recruitment and induction

Trustees are recruited through advertisement, professional, personal and member contacts. We aim to recruit people whose skills the Board have identified as needed. The Trustees endeavour to ensure there is a balance of skills, which reflects the ethos, and values of the charity. The Chair of the Board of Trustees is responsible for the induction of new trustees, which involves awareness of a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document, and the work of the charity.

New trustees undergo an orientation session to brief them on their legal obligations under the charity and company law, the content of the governing documents, the committee and the decision-making processes, the business plan and recent financial performance of the charity.

Governance and Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees meets a minimum of four times a year, including an annual Away Day where the strategic direction of the charity is discussed. The Board is responsible for governing the affairs of The Zacchaeus Trust 2000 Trust. The Board agrees the strategic direction to ensure the organisation fulfils its objectives. It takes overall responsibility for ensuring that the financial, legal and contractual obligations of the charity are met and that there are satisfactory systems and controls in place. The Board receives regular reports from the Treasurer and Chief Executive Officer, who oversee the finances of the organisation. The Chief Executive Officer attends all Board meetings.

Management

Day to day management and decision making of the charity is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer who works closely with the Senior Management Team to fulfil the Charity's objectives and ensure the smooth and effective running of the organisation. The Senior Management Team is supported by a dedicated and multi-skilled staff team who are passionate about working with disadvantaged communities and achieving successful outcomes for individual clients as well as longer-term policy change for wider communities. The Chief Executive Officer reports to the Chair and the Board.

Pay policy for senior management team

The senior management team comprise the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the charity on a day-to-day basis.

The pay of the senior staff, and indeed all staff, is reviewed annually. The trustees benchmark salaries against pay levels in other comparable charities.

Related parties and co-operation with other organisations

None of our trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work as Trustees.

The charity works with other charitable and not for profit organisations in the furtherance of its objectives. Any connection between a trustee or senior manager of the Charity with service user, external contractor or suppler of services is disclosed to the full board of trustees in the same way as any other contractual relationship with a related party. Furthermore, all trustees complete an annual declaration of interests form.

All related party transactions are managed in accordance with the charity's conflicts of interest policy. All transactions and activities involving organisations in which a trustee may have an interest are conducted at arm's length and in accordance with the charity's financial and procurement procedures. Total payments made to trustees are shown in note 12.

Siobhan Garibaldi, a Trustee, is also president of the London chapter of the catholic charity, St Vincent De Paul Society (SVP). There have been occasions when the Trust refers clients to SVP for practical assistance, but the decision to provide financial and non-financial transactions is independent of Siobhan. In 2015, the Trust, Z2K (as the main applicant) and St Vincent's Family Project (SVFS) made a joint grant application for the project, Advice at St Vincent's Family Project (SVFS). In 2015, £2475 from the grant received was paid to SVFS. In the current year, there was no collaboration with SVFS.

Emma Lough, a Trustee, also provided training services for the charity. During the year ended December 2016, payments of a total of £700 were made.

Use of volunteers

Z2K is grateful to all its volunteers, who assist with tribunals, research and office work. Our diverse range of volunteers have a variety of interests and reasons for wanting to support Z2K - from gaining experience at the start of their careers to using their wealth of experience and knowledge to meeting the needs of our communities. All our volunteers add value to our work and make a real difference to our clients and communities. Our volunteers are supported and overseen by the Volunteer Manager and managed in accordance with the Volunteers policy. We retained our Investing in Volunteers quality accreditation in 2016. Volunteers are reimbursed for travel and lunch subsistence.

Volunteering is one of Z2K's organisational values. This is expressed as: "Volunteering to do this work is enriching for the volunteers, raises consciousness about the nature of poverty in the UK and breaks down barriers between poor and vulnerable people and those who are more fortunate."

Due to the size of the charity, staff and volunteers work closely together and many of the existing staff originally began as volunteers. Volunteers assist with welfare benefit and housing issues, as well as undertaking research and representing clients at tribunals. Volunteers are recruited on a rolling basis. Our volunteers are made up of law and social work students, volunteers from within law firms and also retirees.

Procedures and policy for grant making

Our policy is to give a few small grants to families and individuals experiencing exceptional poverty, beyond the scope of state benefits, from our Relief of Poverty Fund, for which we raise money. Grants are given at the discretion of the Chief Executive according to the Relief of Poverty grant criteria. The register of grants is reported to the trustees at every Board meeting. This totalled £1,978 in the year ended December 2016.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The principal objects of the charity are:

- the prevention and relief of poverty in the United Kingdom in a manner consistent with Christian ethics;
- providing assistance and services to individuals in need; providing advice, education, training and assistance on any issues
 relating to the relief of poverty to volunteers, other charities or organisations; undertaking, supporting and promulgating
 research into factors that contribute towards poverty and ways to mitigate them;

The main objectives for this year were:

- To increase the number of vulnerable people/families in London in debt and in need of advice that we were able to help particularly by recruiting and training more volunteers;
- To increase the number of clients with appeals against decisions by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) whom
 we were able to represent;
- To increase the success rate of our Tribunals appeal service;
- To continue to run the service called NextDoor Private Rented Sector Access Scheme (NextDoor PRS) which helps those
 who are homeless or insecurely housed, and not entitled to statutory help to access accommodation in the private rented
 sector;
- To lobby effectively to persuade the government to act in the best interest of the incomes, health and well being of the
 poorest citizens in the UK and their children;
- To lobby and campaign at local level to improve local council tax support schemes in individual Boroughs.

Public Benefit

We have reviewed the Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in our planning of activities. We believe that we have complied with this; and seek to demonstrate this within this report.

CHARITABLE ACTIVITES IN 2016

2016 was a further period of consolidation in our two main service areas of work: serving those on low incomes through our casework service, and lobbying and campaigning on poverty related issues. We changed to focus of our training work and worked with another charity called Pro Bono Community to provide training to potential volunteers from city law firms, which proved to be a good source of income.

We developed our NextDoor PRS project so that we worked with an independent charity called Humanity Homes to set up a supported hostel for homeless under 35's who need support before they can move on into independent living. We housed and supported four homeless young people in the pilot year of this project and helped to stabilise their lives.

We set up a project called Right First Time, which built on the work we had previously done in the Big Lottery funded Reform Advice in Westminster project by using complaints to try to improve systems within statutory services so as to reduce the numbers seeking advice as a result of avoidable errors.

We also started participating in a new Big Lottery funded project called Stepping Stones in which we are partnering with South West London Law Centres, BPP Law School, The Catherine Low Settlement and the Ace of Spades Project to develop volunteering amongst students, deliver advice services and to track the outcomes over a 5 year period.

We are mindful of the public benefit tests for charities, and have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Advice services

Our services involve intensive support on welfare benefit and housing issues including offering representation on appeals in Tribunals as non-legal supporters. In 2016 we saw the numbers of new cases increase to 1573. Many of our cases straddle more than one year.

The most pressing issue now facing our casework service is assistance with appeals to the Social Security Tribunals regarding decisions of the DWP. These include, in particular, appeals against Work Capability Assessments, in which many who are suffering from disabling illnesses are found fit for work or not entitled to disability benefits, and wish to appeal. We conducted 223 such Appeals and had a 79% success rate. These appeals are time consuming as they involve preparing detailed submissions followed by representation. The need for this help is ever increasing especially as there are very few others who do this work.

We recovered £1.7 million increased income for our clients in the year and saved 241 households from homelessness. We also achieved the write off of £120,000 of debt.

We are conscious that we have not been reaching certain types of clients, particularly those with sanctions and so have been anxious to deliver more outreach services, particularly in connection with food banks to attract the hard to reach so in conjunction with Cardinal Hume Centre and Westminster Chapel Food bank we set up a further drop in advice centre at St Gabriel's Hall in Pimlico.

We have also worked with law schools at two Universities to set up form filling clinics to help those who need sickness related benefits to fill out the complex forms required.

Campaigning and lobbying

The main focus of Z2K's campaigning in 2014 has been on the abolition of Council Tax Benefit and the effects of replacing it with local council tax support schemes. In July 2016, in partnership with the Child Poverty Action Group, we published our third report on council tax support schemes in London called Still Too Poor to Pay—a detailed piece of research into the Council Tax Support schemes adopted in London's 32 boroughs in their third year of "localisation" and the impact of the charges on disabled, unemployed and low paid households.

We held two events, one for Parliamentarians and one for local Councillors to publicise the findings and to disseminate information about best practice. We also campaigned locally against proposed increases in the Minimum Payment charges in Tower Hamlets, Waltham Forest, Redbridge and Richmond upon Thames. In Tower Hamlets, we collected a petition of local residents, most of who were directly affected, and successfully persuaded the administration not to change the 100 % support it currently offered. In Waltham Forest we persuaded the Council not to increase its charge and in Redbridge they agreed not to increase minimum payments for disabled residents.

The total impact of these changes has been to save those on the lowest incomes from having to pay a total of £6,300,000.

Campaigning and lobbying

We have also been trying to challenge the inappropriate use of bed and breakfast accommodation for homeless families. We were part of a coalition, which persuaded the Children's Commissioner to write to the worst offending London Boroughs.

The lower benefit cap come in October 2016 and we are building up data and case studies on the impact of our clients with a view to encouraging the House of Lords to support a further increase in DHP funding and to persuade Labour to adopt the policy of opposing the cap.

We also continued to work with the Ministry of Justice and others on the reform of enforcement by bailiffs.

Other Projects

Our NextDoor PRS project supports those in a private rented sector access scheme, who are threatened with homelessness and are not entitled to help with housing from their local authority. We have a fund, which supports the giving of deposit guarantees, and we have developed relationships with landlords in the hope of persuading them to accept housing benefit claimants. By end 2016 we had placed 221 homeless clients into sustainable tenancies.

We have now developed this work so as to help the vulnerable under 35's with some support needs and have in conjunction with a separate, independent charity, Humanity Homes, have set up a small hostel in Ealing which has provided life transforming support for the transition to independent living for a small group of young homeless men.

The funding for the Big Lottery funded project on which we worked with Westminster CAB and Migrant's Resource Centre called Reform Advice in Westminster came to an end in 2015 and we produced an excellent report out of it. Building on that work we raised the funds for a more ambitious project called Right First Time in which we continue to run a service, which pursues complaints about poor service and process against the benefits department of Westminster City Council, DWP and other agencies with a view to persuading them to improve their systems to reduce the need for clients to seek advice. We take up complaints on behalf of our own clients and those of other advice agencies in Westminster. We are achieving good results with the individual complaints but are still struggling to persuade the delivery agencies to engage with the issues. However we have already achieved some small changes in the way DWP and Westminster City Council deal with claimants.

The Stepping Stones project increases our casework capacity, utilises our training expertise and enables us to help to develop an evidence base for the effect of timely support and advice on changing lives.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Statements

The financial statements, including the notes, have been prepared in compliance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" 2015 (FRS 102). The analysis of income and expenditure reflects the classification of activities, together with costs relating to administration.

Statement of Financial Activities

The Statement of Financial Activities is shown on page 12, with a more detailed analysis of income and expenditure within the notes to the financial statements. The total income for the year was £513,547 (2015: £522,798), the majority of which is received from grant giving bodies – £449,547 (2015: £422,950). Total income decreased by 2%. The decrease is mainly due to a fall in training income from £27,000 to £17,900 and fall in the number of individual donations and legacies. Also, in 2016, fundraising income reached £20,529 (2015: £39,726); within the previous year's fundraising was a Quiz Night, which raised a total of £18,838. No such event took place this year. £4,759 was received this year from DWP Access to Work to enable the charity to purchase specialist equipment for the charity's staff.

The total expenditure for the year was £486,929 (2015: £454,154). Expenditure has increased again over the previous year, reflecting the growth in the size of the staff team from 13 (2015) to 15 (2016) and continuing growth in the scale of the Trust's work.

Principal funding sources

The charity is dependent upon grants and donations from individual donors, trusts and foundations. A full list of grants and donations received is set out in note 4 to the accounts.

Balance Sheet

The above result led to a surplus of £26,618 (2015: £68,644), which has resulted in a combined fund balance of £229,454 (2015: £202,836) at the year-end. An analysis of the funds can be found in note 20, with the movements with each fund detailed in note 21.

Future Outlook

Whilst the fundraising landscape is becoming ever more challenging as funds for advice services are generally being reduced, the charity maintains a strong financial position with cash reserves at year-end of £387,170 (2015: £415,920). Furthermore the Trustees have approved a robust plan for the generation of funds to enable the full delivery of our 2017 strategy.

Investment policy and objectives

The charity's Articles of Association does not confer any specific rights or restrictions on us as trustees in respect of investing its funds. The funds received by the charity during the year under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment, other than to be placed on deposit with the charity's bankers.

Reserves Policy

The trustees aim to maintain an amount on general fund equivalent to three months' running expenses. This target is regularly reviewed by trustees against the current risks faced by the organisation. At 31 December 2016, the charity held approximately 5 months' worth (2015: 5 months) of total projected annual expenditure in unrestricted free reserves. The Trustees has reviewed the current level of reserves against the target and concluded that the level of reserves held is acceptable. This will continue to be monitored.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to the operation and finances of the charity. The trustees are satisfied that the charity is taking the action necessary to mitigate its exposure to these risks. A formal risk register is reviewed at least annually by the Trustees. The Trustees are satisfied that systems are in place to monitor and manage exposure to major risks.

The charity operates planning and budgeting systems within an annual budget approved by the Trustees. Any significant changes are subject to Trustees' approval. Comparison of actual performance to approved budgets is undertaken on a quarterly basis.

Plans for the future

In the course of 2017 we will be doing more work to help prevent our clients getting into debt, which involves ensuring they receive the benefits to which they are entitled and that they do not fall into rent arrears.

We will continue to devote more resources to Appeals against sickness benefit decision and hope to persuade more law firms to work with us to provide volunteers for this project.

We will continue to develop our outreach services including by working with Universities to set up more form filling clinics.

The next stage of the Stepping Stones project will involve providing training to community groups and offering our clients a more wrap around service of general support once the acute crisis phase of their cases have been resolved.

Our campaigning will continue to try to mitigate the impact of welfare reform on the housing needs of the poorest. In particular we will continue to try to persuade local authorities not to pass on the cuts to funding of council tax support onto those least able to pay.

We are preparing a report on the impact of the benefit assessment process on our clients who seek sickness and disability related benefits in the hope of achieving improvements in the process.

We will also continue to work with the Ministry of Justice on enforcement law reform.

The trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the charitable company's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE ZACCHAEUS 2000 TRUST

I report on the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2016 set out on pages 12 to 24.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees (who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a qualified member of the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under Section 145 of the 2011 Act;
- to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under Section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act; and
- to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of the independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and the seeking of explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and, consequently, no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Independent examiner's statement

In connection with my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

- (1) which gives me reasonable cause to believe that, in any material respect, the requirements

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (SORP FRS102) issued on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The address of the registered office is given in the reference and administrative details on page 2. The nature of the Charity's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Trustees' report.

The Zacchaeus 2000 Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

1.2 Transition to FRS 102

The charity adopted SORP (FRS 102) in the current year and an explanation of how transition to SORP (FRS 102) has affected the reported financial position and performance is given in note 24.

There were no subsequent restatement of items has been required in making the transition to FRS 102. The transition date was 1 January 2015.

1.3 Judgement and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the charity is required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underling assumptions are reviewed on an on-going basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

1.4 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. When such designation are made by the Trustees, the aim and use of each designated fund will be set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds whose use is restricted to specific purposes according to the grant terms of the specific restrictions imposed by the donor. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements. Restricted donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity.

1.5 Incoming recognition

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Legacies entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that the probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Charity that the distribution is made, or when a distribution is received from the estate.

Fundraising activities include events and trading activities are reported gross in the Statement of Financial Activities, before any related costs are deducted from the gross proceeds.

Donations, grants and other income are included as income when received. Interest includes all amounts received to 31 December 2016.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES – continued

1.6 Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenses including support costs and governance costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure headings having regard to the nature of the expenditure.

1.7 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The Trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements and consider these sufficient for the Charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

1.8 Volunteers and donated services

A certain amount of time is expended on the charity's activities, which is donated free of charge. It is not possible to quantify the value of time given and accordingly it is neither recorded as donated income nor as an expense in the accounts.

1.9 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or else, for gifts-in-kind, at a reasonable estimate of their open market value on receipt.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

- 25% on cost

1.10 Financial instruments

The charity only has financial instruments of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

1.11 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account, as well as cash in hand held by charity at the year end.

1.12 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are recognised at the invoiced cost prepaid.

1.13 Creditors and Provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the Charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

1.14 Taxation

The Charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010. Accordingly it is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income and capital gains received to the extent that such income or gains are applied to exclusively charitable purposes. No provision for taxation has been made in these financial statements.

Unrestricted funds

The charity holds unrestricted funds for its general expenditure and some of the grant funding received is to support the core activities of the charity. The transfer of £120,454 from the general fund the various restricted funds is to support the various charitable activities that the charity undertakes.

Restricted funds:

The Relief of Poverty fund comprises donations received from individuals and organisations. The funds are used to defray the debts of the poorest and most vulnerable members of society. Direct donations to individuals are also occasionally made to relieve poverty.

Grant funding was received again this year from various grant funders (detailed in note 4 to the accounts) to help fund various staffing posts within the specific project, which the charity undertakes. Funding was received this year for a Caseworker post, "Right First Time" from Esmee Fairbairn. Also grant funding from The Rank Foundation was received which enabled the Casework team to expand. Grants were also received from Strand Parishes Trust, The London Community Foundation and Ward Funding from the City of Westminster to assist with the Outreach Advice Schemes.

Grants were also received this year from Oak Foundation, The Northmoor Trust, London Legal Support Trust Funds, Westminster Foundation and The Cornwell Charitable Trust for general core costs and also City Bridge Trust and Lloyds Bank plc to assist in the funding of the caseworkers and administrators salaries respectively. A further grant was received from London Legal Support Trust Funds to assist with the purchase of small office equipment.
