Achievements and Performance of the Charity

Objectives and activities

The strategies to achieve the charity's objectives are to promote song through concerts and educational programmes for all sectors of the community, to educate and involve young people in the arts, to celebrate a diversity of cultures through presentations by, and with, artists of different cultural backgrounds, and to programme a broad range of arts work, including talks, residencies, recordings and workshops

The Oxford Lieder Festival 2011

The tenth Oxford Lieder Festival was a triumph, with the most ambitious and exciting programme to date, it attracted more visitors than ever before, had a wider range of events, and offered the chance of active participation to more people than ever. The 34 concerts and wide-ranging talks, workshops and master-classes attracted around 4,000 visitors over the Festival's 16 days, welcomed some 90 performers and 20 speakers, and involved more than 100 active participants in its educational events

At the core of the Festival remained its world-class series of concerts, featuring well-established artists – including our patron, Sir Thomas Allen – alongside rising stars of the music world, being given a high-profile platform. We had our first foray into orchestral song, with the dynamic Aurora Orchestra, and continued our partnership with the leading music colleges, offering recital opportunities to their most promising students. Each evening concert was preceded by a free talk. Other star turns included Dame Felicity Lott, Sarah Connolly, Wolfgang Holzmair, Birgid Steinberger, Florian Boesch, Roderick Williams and James Gilchrist.

The middle weekend of the Festival was devoted to the songs and musicians of Sweden, and featured concerts given by Anna Larsson, Miah Persson, Susanna Andersson and others, as well as a lunch hosted by the Swedish Ambassador and a screening of *The Magic Flute* introduced by its star, the legendary baritone Håkan Hagegård, who also gave a master class for Music Faculty students. Oxford Lieder already had strong links with a number of Swedish artists and it is hoped that this weekend may lead to an Oxford Lieder-curated weekend of song in Sweden in 2013.

Composer in Residence

For the first time this year, the Festival featured a composer-in residence, Charlotte Bray We commissioned her substantial new song cycle, Sonnets and Love Poems, premiered by Roderick Williams and Andrew West on 27 October 2011 in the Holywell Music Room, funded by the Fidelio Trust and PRS for Music Foundation 'Women Make Music' Her works also featured in three other concerts, including one by James Gilchrist, Anna Tilbrook and the Barbirolli Quartet performing her cycle Verre de Venise Charlotte also co-led a workshop for student composers, one of our collaborative projects with Oxford University's Faculty of Music

Future plans

The Composer-in-Residence project was both an excellent platform for a rising young composer and also a good way of drawing a cautious audience into new music, offering them interaction with the composer and a chance to attune themselves to that composer's style. We hope to run a similar scheme in future years. A major new song cycle has also been commissioned from Robert Saxton, to be premiered in 2013.

Schools Project

The Festival now has a well-established series of workshops in Oxfordshire schools, this year for Marlborough Secondary School, Woodstock, William Fletcher Primary, Yarnton and Woodstock Primary School Children in Years 6, 12 and 13 worked with our experienced facilitators to create their own song cycle, with music and words written by the young people involved. They performed their works at a free public concert in the Jacqueline du Pré Music Building, Oxford, an exciting event for the children that also featured on the regional BBC TV news. The project is planned in close consultation with the County Music Service.

Future plans

These workshops are an integral part of the Festival and the format works extremely well. A similar project is certain to take place at the 2012 Festival. We will also expand our work aimed at children with two specifically designed concerts, devised and led by pianist and narrator Dominic Harlan.

Master Course

The Master Course, a five-day residential course for advanced singer-pianist duos was lead by Dame Felicity Palmer, with guest tutors Julius Drake, Roger Vignoles and Anna Larsson. The students are given the chance to completely immerse themselves in song during the day and attend the evening recitals. Feedback was universally positive from the students, and there was a good turnout of observers at the public classes. Additional coaching was offered by Sholto Kynoch and Fiona Dobie. At the end of the course, the students gave a concert, showcasing the best of their work. The standard was extremely high and attracted a large and enthusiastic audience.

The master course in 2012 will be led by renowned Austrian baritone Wolfgang Holzmair, with guest tutors again including Julius Drake and Roger Vignoles Feedback was received after the last course that students would appreciate another day on the course, so in 2012 the course will run for six days

The Oxford Lieder Young Artist Platform

Thanks to increased funding, the Oxford Lieder Scholarship – awarded to an outstanding young singer for the past three years – has been transformed into a more ambitious project, the Oxford Lieder Young Artist Platform With input from two new sponsors, Oxford Lieder now has a pot of £3,000 which will be used to subsidise concerts at music clubs around the country given by young duos, selected by Oxford Lieder at public auditions. At our auditions in April, lan and Jennifer Partridge adjudicated the first set of auditions and selected two young duos from an exceptional field to be our "ambassadors" of song Soprano Sonia Grané and pianist Edwige Herchenroder were awarded the main prize, with recitals also awarded to baritone Victor Sicard and pianist Anna Cardona. As Oxford Lieder subsidises 50% of the fees paid by music clubs, the total value of the award is in fact now £6,000, with ten concerts given around the country. The benefit in financial terms, experience and exposure to the winners is clear, but it will also encourage music clubs that often do not include any song recitals in their programmes to change this approach. A further £1,000 has already been committed for the 2012 award

Other education events at the Festival

In conjunction with the Faculty of Music, soprano Sophie Daneman gave a master class for current music students, and Charlotte Bray (Composer in Residence) led a workshop for student composers. Free talks before every evening concert continue to be popular, with much positive feedback on a wider-than-ever range of engaging speakers. A "Bring and Sing" and a master class led by Henry Herford offered opportunities for amateur musicians to be involved in the Festival, and the popularity of this was such that it will be built on in future years. Soprano Fiona Dobie once again ran a "Singing for All" workshop, open to singers of all levels, and this was another resounding and popular success.

Oxford Lieder Live

In 2010 we began recording what will be the first-ever complete recording of the songs of Hugo Wolf Recorded live at Festival concerts and released in association with Stone Records, the series so far has been exceptionally well received, with glowing reviews in the Observer, BBC Music Magazine, Gramophone Magazine and numerous online review sites. Volume 3 was recorded as part of the Oxford Lieder Spring Series (the *Italienisches Liederbuch* with Mark Stone and Geraldine McGreevy), and Volume 4 (with Mary Bevan and Quirijn de Lang) was recorded at the Festival. Volume 4 included, remarkably, no fewer than 12 world-premiere recordings. The pianist for the series is Oxford Lieder's artistic director, Sholto Kynoch.

Future plans

The Wolf series will be completed at the end of 2013, running to eleven discs in total. There are plans to record and release various other concert on Oxford Lieder Live, including the complete Britten "Canticles" with tenor Daniel Norman in February 2013

The Oxford Music Network

Oxford Lieder continued to collaborate fully as a member of the Oxford Music Network, a partnership of six professional music organisations, in sharing resources and jointly marketing our artistic programmes

We are indebted to The Foyle Foundation and several other trusts who together provided major support to the music and education programme of the 2011 Oxford Lieder Festival, to the Kathleen Ferrier Memorial Scholarship Fund for their continued collaboration, and to generous individuals for vital donations to our work. The strength of this support led to an outstanding 10th anniversary year of activity. It ensures we can plan more work of excellence and distinction in future

General future plans

Building on the success of 2011, the next three years are going to be exceptionally exciting for Oxford Lieder The 2012 Festival will be another feast of song, with another impressive line-up of artists and musical focuses on English song and, in his anniversary year, Debussy In 2013, as part of the year-long "Britten in Oxford" project, devised by conductor Nicholas Cleobury, Oxford Lieder will programme the complete songs of Britten over the course of the year, beginning with the "Canticles" in February

The Schubert Project - "Transforming Oxford into 1820s Vienna"

We are already working in earnest towards the 2014 Festival when we will programme the first-ever live performance of the complete songs of Franz Schubert. Alongside this ambitious programme, we are programming orchestral, opera and chamber music performances, and jointly promoting art, theatre and more that Schubert himself might have experienced. Festival-goers will have the chance not only to hear the complete songs of this remarkable composer, but also to immerse themselves in the culture that he would have experienced himself. The sixteen-day Festival will feature more than 50 performances and will be a huge challenge, both logistically and financially. It will be a major European event and one that will have enormous long-term benefit for the Festival.

The Trustees remain wholly committed to ensuring excellence in all the programmes and initiatives of Oxford Lieder, and in so doing to maintain the financial viability of the charity to deliver that goal. Oxford Lieder has made good progress in its first ten years in recruiting and retaining loyal supporters who pledge their support over time, in developing the Education & Outreach Programme and in building a strong reputation which draws in rising audience numbers—The new Oxford Lieder Young Artists Platform scheme is now set up to provide subsidy to national music clubs to engage outstanding musicians selected by Oxford Lieder, and revive interest in song repertoire

The Trustees are mindful of the challenging economic climate, and will ensure that future budgeting makes realistic projections about income levels, and contains expenditure to the minimum which is necessary to deliver high standards. We will monitor the marketing and impact of Oxford Lieder so that as many as possible of those who enjoy top quality singing and music making are made aware of the richness of what is on offer, and are drawn in to attend events. The Trustees are confident that Oxford Lieder will continue to develop greatly over the coming years on a sound financial platform.

Structure, Governance and Management

Nature of the Governing Document and constitution of the charity

Oxford Lieder Limited is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 20 June 2005. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission. Anyone over the age of 18 can become a member of the Company and there are currently 4 members each of whom agrees to contribute up to £10 in the event of the charity winding up.

The methods adopted for the recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The members attending the annual meeting elect trustees to serve for a term of three years. The trustees have the power to co-opt further members to assist them in their work. Co-opted members may serve for a period of up to three years.

The policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of trustees.

New trustees are briefed on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the decision making processes, and the recent financial performance of the charity

The organisational structure of the charity and how decisions are made.

The board of trustees, which can have up to 10 members and at least 5 members at any one time, administers the charity. The board meets approximately quarterly. The Artistic Director and the administrators and development officer have delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the trustees, for operational matters including finance, employment and artistic performance related activity.

The major risks to which the charity is exposed, and reviews and systems to mutigate risks

The trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises

- •a regular review of the risks the charity may face,
- the establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified in the plan, and
- the implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise

The Trustees have kept risk under review, and the most significant risk to the charity continues to be shortfall in income from the Festival and from voluntary income. To manage this risk the Trustees have put in place a robust budget and fundraising programme. It also has a reserves policy, which is regularly reviewed by trustees

The review has also identified a few minor risks and has confirmed its procedures to address these. These include a procedure for the management of cash takings from events, and the setting of a reserves policy and its regular review by trustees.

Fundraising targets have been set for the coming year to continue to reduce this deficit. The Trust has adequate cash in hand to support its activities during 2011, pending the rectification of the reserves.

Financial Review

Policies on reserves

The trustees have established the level of reserves (that is those funds that are freely available) that the charity ought to have This is set at the amount sufficient to pay for the administration costs of the operation for a period of three months

The actual unrestricted reserve at 30th November 2011 amounted to £11,301. On the basis of the governance costs for the year ended 30th November 2011 the trustees would wish to maintain the unrestricted reserve at a minimum level of £5,000.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The board of trustees is satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund

Transactions and Financial position

The accounts are set out on pages 13 to 22. The accounts have been prepared implementing the 2005 Revision of the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued by the Charities Commission for England and Wales (revised in June 2008) and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) As stated in the introduction to this report, the trustees consider the financial performance by the charity during the year to have been satisfactory

The Statement of Financial Activities shows a net income of resources for the year of a revenue nature of £14052 There were no other incoming or outgoing resources

The total reserves at the year end stand at £43,978 (2010 £29,926)

Free unrestricted liquid reserves amounted to £11,301 (2010 (£1,480))

Share Capital

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital

Report of the Independent Examiner to the trustees on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 30 November 2011

I report on the financial statements of the Charity on pages 13 to 14 for the year ended 30th November 2011 which have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 (the Act) and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective April 2008, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, effective April 2005 as modified in June 2008, (The SORP), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out 15 and 16

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As described on page 10, the Charity's trustees, who are also the directors of the company for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements

The trustees are satisfied that the audit requirement of Section 144(1) of the Act does not apply and that the accounts do not require an audit in accordance with Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and that no member or members have requested an audit pursuant to section 476 of the Companies Act 2006, and that there is no requirement in the governing document or constitution of the Charity for the conducting of an audit As a consequence, the trustees have elected that the financial statements be subject to independent examination

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law, or otherwise, and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to -

Accounting policies Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective April 2008, and all other applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, (revised June 2008) (The SORP) The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the Companies Act 2006, and include the results of the charity's operations which are described in the Trustees' Report, all of which are continuing

Insofar as the SORP requires compliance with specific Financial Reporting Standards other than the FRSSE then the specific Financial Reporting Standards have been followed where their requirements differ from those of the FRSSE

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention. The charity is entirely dependent on continuing grant and as a consequence the going concern basis is also dependent on its continuing.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis deferred as described below where appropriate

Except as described under the 'Deferred Income' accounting policy all grants, including grants for the purchase of fixed assets, are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable

Investment Income

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on a receivable basis

Deferred income

In accordance with the SORP grants received in advance and specified by the donor as relating to specific accounting periods or alternatively which are subject to conditions which are still to be met, and which are outside the control of the charity or where it is uncertain whether the conditions can or will be met, are deferred on an accruals basis to the period to which they relate. Such deferrals are shown in the notes to the accounts and the sums involved are shown as creditors in the accounts

Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles, modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in the SORP

Resources Expended

The policy for including items within the relevant activity categories of resources expended is expenditure is recognised when liability is incurred Contractual arrangements and performance related grants are recognised as goods or services are supplied Other grants payments are recognised when a constructive obligation arises that result in the payment being unavoidable

In particular the policy for including items within costs of generating funds, charitable activities and governance costs is

Costs of generating funds

Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income

Charitable activities

Charitable activities include expenditure associated with staging of concerts, stage productions and educational programmes and include both the direct costs and support costs related to those activities

Governance costs

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements

Allocation of costs within types of resources expended

Costs of charitable activities are allocated directly

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds structure policy

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully the monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above
