STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association, and is a company limited by guarantee. The Company registration number is 05514023. As a Charity we are also governed by the provisions of the Charities Act 2016. Our Charity registration number is 1111085.

Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. A review of the major risks has been carried out and no additional actions found necessary.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objects of the Society, in the governing Memorandum, are:

- " to secure the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of general public amenity or historic or public interest in the area of benefit or adjacent areas;
- " to educate the public in the geography, history, natural history and architecture of the area of benefit;
- " to preserve the character of the area of benefit as a thriving community;

to promote a high standard of planning and architecture in or affecting the area of benefit and to oppose any inappropriate developments;

- " to represent the views of the members to local and other authorities.
- " to help foster community spirit by arranging lectures, social events and other appropriate activities.

The trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

These objectives have been achieved largely through the work of the committees; Planning, Community Services, Local History, Meetings & Social and Walks and the Natural Environment committee. Information on the Society's activities has been publicised through the Newsletter, the Website and social media.

Methods used to recruit and appoint new charity trustees.

The trustee directors may at any time co-opt a member who is qualified to be appointed as an Ordinary Trustee Director to take office until the next AGM, upon which, if elected at the AGM may serve for a period of three years. A retiring Trustee Director who remains qualified may stand for re-election at an AGM. Officers of the society (Chairman, Deputy Chairman, Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer) are elected by members at the AGM.

The Community Services Committee maintains close contacts with Solihull M.B.C., the Police, Public Transport providers, and the Airport to ensure that the views of the Society are heard in all relevant areas. Several projects including a litter pick, a tidy up of raised flowerbeds in the Precinct along with Lodge Road, Station road and The Knot garden were carried out by Society volunteers working with Neighbourhood Services (SMBC).

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30th September 2016

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Local History Committee manages the Society's collection of documents, artefacts and photographs (over 4000 photos, the earliest dated 1859) of local interest, helps people from all over the world with their family history enquiries and arranges regular exhibitions of local interest in the Local History Centre in Knowle Library. In the past it has arranged much bigger exhibitions such as the very successful three day WW1 exhibition in 2014 to commemorate the start of that war. As a direct result of this exhibition it was successful in securing a Commonwealth War Grave for a boy soldier from Knowle who had been in an unmarked grave in Rugby for almost one hundred years. The headstone was finally erected in October 2016. There are stewards on duty every Saturday morning 10am -12.30pm and, if this time is not convenient appointments can be made to suit.

The Meetings & Social and Walks Committee arranged a well-supported programme of talks and walks throughout the year. Our involvement with arrangements for the switching on of the Christmas Lights in the High Street was again well supported and widely appreciated.

The Planning Committee had a busy year continuing to monitor the progress of a number of significant planning applications. Regular contact is maintained with the Council's Planning Department and representations made when appropriate. The Trustee Directors are also grateful for the advice and assistance given to the Society by the local Councillors on planning and other matters. The Committee in association with as the Knowle, Dorridge and Bentley Heath Neighbourhood Forum will produce a neighbourhood plan which will sit under the Solihull Local Plan and influence any developments in the villages.

The major project of the Natural Environment Committee has been the Bulb Planting Project with the second planting having taken place in October & November 2016, and will continue in 2017.

The Village Greens Project. The Society continued its attempt to register three areas of the previous route of the now abandoned Knowle Relief Road as 'Town & Village Greens'. This was carried out under the leadership of Leighton Jones as a stand-alone project. Solihull Council reviewed the applications and agreed that they have merit. Partial success was achieved and two of the three areas will be registered as Town & Village Greens.

Community and Business

Trustee Directors have attended the Knowle Business Social Gatherings (which have been organised by PSL Solicitors to develop links between businesses in Knowle) to engage and understand the needs of the business community. They have also offered support to the Knowle High Street Partnership Forum in looking at ways to promote and enhance Knowle as trading destination. They also disseminate information of general interest, e.g. new businesses setting up in the village.

Knowle Society provides the Christmas Tree each year and works with other local volunteers to assist with events such as the Christmas Lights switch on and the Knowle Fun Run.

The volunteers who ensure the library stays open on Saturday afternoon are members of the Society and this service is organised by the Society.

Financial results for the Year

The year ending September 30th 2016 has been a busy year with significant expenditure on the Village Greens application totalling £15,412. The cost was borne from the Village Greens donation fund of £2,665 with the remainder taken from the general fund. This resulted in a reduction of the Society reserves to £26,157 by 30th September 2016.

Income from subscriptions was down from last year reflecting the lower membership count.

Other expenditure during the year was fairly conservative with no significant changes from the previous year.

The Queen's 90th birthday event organised by the Local History Committee proved very successful with the costs more than covered by the proceeds. This resulted in an excess of £1,460 which was donated to The Knowle Village Hall Restoration Fund.

The Society was delighted and honoured to receive the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service presented by David H Bradnock MBE JP DL FBHI, Deputy Lieutenant for the West Midlands, Chairman & Lieutenancy Ambassador for Solihull.

Financial aims for the forthcoming year

The forthcoming year should see a period of stability with only a small payment remaining for settling the costs of village greens application. There should be a strengthening of the balance sheet by the end of the accounting year 30th September 2017.

The aim is to keep a healthy reserve of funds throughout 2017, having budgeted for our expected costs over the next accounting year.

Membership

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30th September 2016

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Membership on 30th September 2016 stood at 3282; a reduction of 120 on the previous year, mostly arising from deaths or members moving away.

Reserves Policy

The Reserves Policy of the Society is that sufficient funds are retained to cover a minimum of one year's normal expenditure. The end of year balance was comfortably above that level.

Full set of accounts

The full set of accounts will be available in due course by request from the Treasurer, on the Society's website or at the AGM in February 2017.

Gifts in Kind

The Trustee Directors and many other volunteers give freely their time and expertise. It is not considered meaningful to place an accurate value on this gift.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The Knowle Society

I report on the accounts for the year ended 30th September 2016 set out on pages six to ten.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. Incoming resources

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.
