#### Structure Governance and Management

Media Standards Trust is a a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 20 July 2005. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the charitable company being wound up each of the Members is required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10. The trust registered with the Charity Commission on 7 April 2006.

#### **Trustees**

The trustees named on page 1 have served during the year Appointment of trustees is governed by the Trust Deed

#### Organisational structure

The trustees meet on a quarterly basis. The day to day running of the trust is delegated to the director who is responsible for ensuring that the charitable company delivers the services specified.

#### Related parties

There were no related parties to the charity in the year

#### Aims and organisation

The Trust is established to promote and advance the education of the public in the understanding and knowledge of the media in a modern society and to promote for the public benefit of ethical standards of conduct including high standards of balance, fairness, accuracy, integrity and professionalism and compliance with the law by all those engaged in or responsible for the media in the UK and elsewhere

The Trust operates nationally and has employed two full time employees for the full year in addition to freelancers and professional support

#### **Review of Activities**

Over the course of 2009 the Media Standards Trust moved significantly forward in its aim to foster high standards of news on behalf of the public. Under our three guiding principles of quality, transparency and accountability in news, the Trust focused its attention on four key projects review of press self-regulation, the transparency initiative, journalisted, and the Orwell Prize. We also began a series of keynote talks at the British Academy on why journalism matters.

#### Review of press self-regulation

We published a report ('A More Accountable Press') in February 2009. The report was critical of the current system of press self-regulation (particularly the PCC), and especially of its lack of transparency, lack of accountability, and poor governance. The report received considerable media attention and was attacked by the then chair of the PCC.

Also in February 2009 the Culture, Media and Sport Select Committee began an inquiry into press standards, privacy and libel

In July 2009 The Guardian newspaper published reports alleging widespread privacy intrusions by the News of the World that had not been addressed by the self-regulatory system

In August 2009 the (new) PCC Chair, Baroness Buscombe, announced that it would be launching its first major 'independent' review into transparency, accountability and governance

The Media Standards Trust made its submission to the review, including 28 recommendations for reform of the current system of press self-regulation, in January 2010

Since the publication of the MST's reports and the CMS report the PCC has already sought to make changes to its governance. This includes more frequent communication, revision of the way in which it records and publishes statistics, and more timely release of information about complaints. It has also clarified its advice on how to make a complaint. It has tried to give clearer guidance about past rulings as a guide to complainants (previously only accessible to newspapers). It says it will act in accordance with the spirit of the Freedom of Information Act.

The process of reform, and our commitment to it, continued in 2010

#### The transparency initiative

In the first stage of the transparency initiative we sought to find ways in which to make the provenance of news more transparent on the web – who wrote it, who published it, when it was published, how it was changed etc – and then to disseminate those methodologies amongst news organizations and journalists

We developed hNews, a microformat for news, working in the later stages with the Associated Press. We launched hNews at a Media Standards Trust / Web Science Trust news 'unconference' in July 2009. This included the development and launch of a website — <a href="https://www.valueaddednews.org">www.valueaddednews.org</a> — to explain what hNews is. The draft microformat immediately received considerable attention, particularly in the US. In November 2009 hNews was accepted by the microformat community. The specification is now hosted at <a href="https://www.microformats.org/wiki/hnews">www.microformats.org/wiki/hnews</a>.

By the end of 2009 hNews had been adopted by the Associated Press, by some of AoL's news outlets, and by over 200 US news sites, as well as the technology providers Saxotech and TownNews This meant there were, by the end of the year, thousands of news articles on the internet marked up with hNews

We will continue to promote and disseminate hNews, and explain how it, and other, methodologies promote transparent news. However, the specific grants for this project – from the MacArthur Foundation and the Knight Foundation – ended in 2010.

#### **Journalisted**

Journalisted com continued to grow and evolve over the course of 2009. We improved the search engine profile for individual journalists, introduced more biographical information for journalists, and evolved the look of the site to improve navigation.

New features were introduced to add further context to each journalist and article. For example, we added a 'journalists who write similar articles' feature to enable people to compare coverage between journalists. Similarly, we added a 'similar articles' feature so that people can read other articles on the same topic by other journalists and outlets.

We also started using journalisted to analyse content, for example trying to substantiate the claim in Private Eye that The Daily Telegraph invented bylines to use beneath news agency copy (including, Oliver Clive, Austin Peters, and Dan Harbles)

By the end of 2009 we had indexed over 20,000 UK journalists writing for the national press and the BBC, and over 2 million articles. About 125,000 unique users were visiting the site every month

#### The Orwell Prize

2009 saw a record number of entries for the Book Prize and Journalism Prize, and the inauguration of a Blog Prize, marking the launch of the Orwell Diaries blog (http://orwelldiaries.wordpress.com) 198 books, 63 journalists and 83 bloggers entered. The two original prizes had a dedicated jury for the first time, with Ian Jack and Ferdinand Mount longlisting the Book Prize, and Jenny Abramsky and Geoffrey Wheatcroft longlisting the Journalism Prize and the Blog Prize. The juries then merged to decide on the shortlists and winners.

The Book Prize was won by Andrew Brown, for Fishing in Utopia Sweden & The Future That Disappeared (Granta), while the Journalism Prize went to Patrick Cockburn for articles published by The Independent and the London Review of Books The Blog Prize was won by 'Jack Night', a pseudonymous police officer who was later 'outed' by The Times in a landmark High Court judgement. The judges also awarded a Special Prize for Lifetime Achievement to Tony Judt, who had been shortlisted for his book, Reappraisals

The Prize's online presence has also grown – in addition to theorwellprize coluk, http://orwelldiaries.wordpress.com and the YouTube Channel (youtube com/theorwellprize), we launched a twitter feed (@TheOrwellPrize). The Orwell Diaries blog, which live-blogs Orwell's diary entries from 1938-42, 70 years after they were written, was nominated for a Webby Award. The Prize's YouTube Channel continued to grow, with video from the many political debates organised by the Prize across the UK, including a whole strand of events at the Sunday Times Oxford Literary Festival and (for the first time) two events at the Buxton Festival.

Also in 2009 we reformed the governance of the Prize We established an Orwell Prize Council as a single governing body for the Prize The council is chaired by Sir David Bell and has members drawn from the boards of the Media Standards Trust, Orwell Trust and Political Quarterly The Media Standards Trust now runs the Orwell Prize on behalf of the Orwell Council

#### **Events**

In the summer of 2009 we hosted two keynote lectures at the British Academy under the title 'Why journalism matters'. The first was given by Lionel Barber, editor of the Financial Times, and the second by Alan Rusbridger, editor of The Guardian. Both events were attended by leading figures from within and outside the media. They are available to view on the Media Standards Trust's Youtube channel.

The Orwell Prize organised more than a dozen debates, interviews and screenings on journalism and political writing

#### Plans for 2010

Many of the issues that the Media Standards Trust was set up to help address have, over the last year, become more acute rather than less. Questions such as how people work out what to trust in an age of information abundance, how to provide better provenance and context to news, what people can do if news is inaccurate, misrepresentative or grossly intrusive, and how we sustain quality, public interest news in a era of such revolutionary media change.

We plan to enhance our current initiatives considerably in 2010 in order to help address these questions

Making journalists more transparent and accountable

We aim to make journalisted com the place people will go if they want to find out more about a UK journalist and what they write about. To do this we intend to open the site up to journalists to add information to their profiles, and enable journalists outside the national press and BBC to create their own profile on journalists. We also aim to integrate more information from elsewhere on the web about articles and journalists, to give people greater context.

At the same time we want to make better use of the information already available on journalisted (including over 20,000 UK journalists and over 2 million references to articles) For example, analysing articles on a regular basis to make more transparent what journalists and news organisations are - and are not - covering

Providing provenance for news on the web

We will evolve and help to disseminate hNews, the news microformat we developed with the Associated Press. This will include enabling people to integrate it to existing open publishing platforms (such as WordPress), and developing use cases so people understand its benefits in making news on the web more transparent.

In parallel to the dissemination of hNews we will explore the value of linked data for news - particularly how it can make the provenance of news more transparent

Exploring and debating contemporary issues in news and politics

We will continue to build on our increasing number and range of events to discuss critical issues in politics and media - particularly through the Orwell Prize (that we run on behalf of

the Orwell Council) This means organising debates and discussions around current political issues with journalists, writers and politicians

We aim to conduct in-depth research on international reporting in the UK press, with the intention of publishing a study on the changing nature of foreign correspondence by the end of 2010

Making the existing systems of self-regulation more effective for the public

We will continue to push for reform of the current system of press self-regulation to make it more effective on behalf of the public. This will include publishing our own recommendations for how to change the current system, in addition to working with press, parliamentarians and the public to make reform happen

Understanding how to sustain local public interest news and information

The Media Standards Trust will explore ways to address the deepening crisis in the long term provision of quality public interest news and information at a local level

As a not-for-profit independent charity we rely, for all our work, on the generous support of charitable foundations and donations from organisations and individuals

We are very grateful to all those who have provided us with support in 2009, including, the MacArthur Foundation, the Knight Foundation, the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation, the Gatsby Foundation, the Joseph Rowntree Charitable Trust and the R and S Cohen Foundation

This financial assistance has made a huge difference to us. But, of course, the progress we have made would also not have been possible without the total commitment, hard work and imagination of the very small team that runs things.

#### Trustees' Responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the charitable company as at the balance sheet date and of its incoming resources and application of resources, including income and expenditure for the financial year. In preparing these statements, the trustees should

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- Make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- State whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any
  material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the company will continue on that basis

The trustees are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees, who are also the directors of Media Standards Trust for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 43 of the Charities Act 1993, the 1993 Act, and that an independent examination is needed. The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination being a FCCA.

#### NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2009

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006 and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective april 2008)

#### 1 2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charitable company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

#### 1.3 Resources expended

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the expenditure to which it relates.

Governance costs include accountancy and independent examination fees

#### 1 4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Assets with a value of £1,000 or less are written off in the year of purchase. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows.

25% on cost

#### 1.5 Pensions

The charity makes a contribution of 5% of gross salary into a personal pension plan for the director. It has no further financial liabilities regarding pensions

#### 1.6 Accumulated funds

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are those which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
