ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charity Overview

The Bren Project obtained charitable status on the 12th October 2005. Our mission is to support and inspire people with disabilities and those at disadvantage to experience and enter the world of work. We do this by providing individuals with unequalled supported work experience placements coupled with ongoing support. We began our active project work in September 2007. The Bren Project has a particular expertise in assisting people with learning disabilities and our priority geographical area is Cheshire.

Chair of Trustees Report

In many respects 2008 has been a landmark year for The Bren Project. For the first time we ran two very successful projects aimed directly at the needs of individuals in the sector. 'Your Turn' supported 10 adults with learning disabilities currently accessing no other employment support. The 'Moving On Project' focused on a similar number of younger clients facing the transition from special education to work. Arriving at this point has been incredibly satisfying for all involved in the short history of the charity.

Success of this kind has only been possible through the hard work of our dedicated team and the funding of our kind sponsors. At the beginning of the year our small team of paid employees was realigned to include a full time Charity Manager, a part time Project Co-ordinator and a part time Funding and Development Officer. Over the months we have also augmented our team of trained sessional Job Coaches, now located at a number of points around the county. The Trustee board remains an active and committed group who have welcomed the excellent service feedback received from beneficiaries, parents, carers, employers and other agencies.

In the spring of 2008 we moved into a modest new office base at Dee House in Chester. This development served to raise the profile of the charity significantly and has been instrumental in our progress towards the delivery of quality service.

Further evidence of our growing role within the sector has been the increased number of network partners that we have attracted; voluntary sector agencies, supported living providers, schools and colleges and employers. We continue to foster these extremely positive relationships, and in 2009 intend to extend them further.

Our business plan is continuously honed to take the organisation forward and we are about to take advantage of voluntary sector consultancy to further develop elements of our strategy. Throughout the year we have continued to attract funding from a variety of sources including a number of high profile trusts and foundations. For this we are incredibly grateful, however, we recognise that 2009 is likely to be a financially challenging year for all and realise that we need to work hard to secure and develop the terrific service that we have initiated. Nevertheless, we approach next year from a position of greater strength.

Charity Managers Report 2008	

2008 was our first full year of project delivery. As with any fledgling organisation we faced some challenges but, I'm pleased to say, we overcame them to deliver 2 very successful projects. 2009 is about building on the foundations we have established. As well as increasing our Beneficiary numbers by 50% we will seek to improve further across the board, our systems and service to offer an ever better experience for our Beneficiaries in 2009.

During 2008 we:

- Established a small, talented staff team with the skills and experience to develop the organisation and deliver quality projects to our beneficiaries. The team now comprises a full time Charity Manager who also maintains a caseload of beneficiaries, a part-time Project Co-ordinator and a part-time Funding and Development Officer.
- Moved in to our new office base at Dee House in Chester. The benefits of having an office base have been immense and helped raise our profile and given us a presence in our operating area.
- Continued to develop our operating policies and procedures and we now have a Policies and Procedures Manual. We are working towards accreditation with the Youth Federation to ensure that we have appropriate procedures in place in terms of 'Safeguarding children and young people'. The initial assessment went well and we should receive accreditation by April 2009.
- Continued to fine tune and streamline our comprehensive project administrative procedures. This included establishing appropriate evaluation systems to help us assess the impact our project is having on our beneficiaries and provides opportunities for all parties involved to suggest improvements to the programme. In 2009 the emphasis will be on developing further our individual action planning process and associated measuring of progress to help us gauge more effectively the 'distance travelled' by our project beneficiaries.

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- Developed a growing network of partners (voluntary sector agencies/supported living providers/schools and colleges/employers). We continue to forge really positive relationships with the Bank of America, Springfield School, Carr Gomm, Petty Pool and West Cheshire College. During 2009 we will be partnering with 2 special schools based in Chester, Dorin Park and Dee Banks as well as our existing network of partners including the new West Cheshire College LEAP Project. The local Connexions service is also now aware of the service we are providing and they have supported us with a small grant. The charity has also developed links with a wide range of Cheshire-based employers who are keen to support both projects.
- We are now members of:
 - 1. Learning Together Cheshire and Warrington
 - 2 NCVO
 - 3. BASE (British Association of Supported Employment)
 - 4. Affiliated to the Youth Federation
- Have recruited, inducted and trained a competent pool of sessional Job Coaches to provide the essential 1:1 support for our beneficiaries at the workplace. We held our first training session in June, focusing on Health and Safety and Risk Assessment. We continue to CRB check all our new recruits. In December 2008 we hosted our first Job Coach Review Session to obtain feedback from the Job Coaches on all aspects of the role and our support service. This feedback will help us improve and fine tune our service delivery in 2009.
- Developed our charity website. Our Chair of Trustees continues to update
 and improve our charity website www.brenproject.org.uk. This has helped us
 promote the charity and disseminate our activities to interested parties as well
 as advertise for Trustee and Job Coach vacancies.
- Fundraising. We continue to attract funds in to the charity, from a variety of sources including a number of high profile trusts and foundations. Major contributions during 2008 included grants from the St James' Place Foundation, the Four Acre Trust and the Westminster Foundation. We heard in November 2008 that we were one of the few organisations in Cheshire to be selected to benefit from consultancy support through the THRIVE Programme. BCT Regenesis, a specialist provider of support for the voluntary sector, will work with us during 2009 to improve our organisations performance, increase our ability to deliver social benefit and help us move towards financial stability. Following a vigorous self assessment process facilitated by BCT Regenesis we have agreed to focus this support on helping us develop a Fundraising Strategy and also help us market and promote the charity more effectively. During 2009 we will be looking to diversify our income streams by submitting an application to the Big Lottery Fund as well as securing funds from some appropriate statutory sources.

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Project Developments

We ran two projects during 2008:

The Your Turn Project

This project supported 10 individuals with learning disabilities that were accessing no other employment support.

The Moving On Project

This project targeted the younger age group, those at a special school or college, and helped with their transition from education in to work. As for the Your Turn Project we supported 10 individuals.

Project Achievements

We are pleased to report that we achieved the majority of our project aims during 2008:

- We registered all 20 beneficiaries
- 17 of the 20 beneficiaries undertook a work placement in a real work setting supported on a 1:1 basis by a Job Coach. The 3 other beneficiaries were all profiled, had a personal action plan in place and a work placement set up ready to start. However, due to family/home issues, these 3 placements did not commence.
- All 17 beneficiaries that started a placement completed the full 8 week programme.
- 2 placements were extended beyond the 8 weeks.
- 1 beneficiary received travel training to enable them to get to and from the workplace independently.
- A full range of placements were organised in a wide-range of vocational choice areas to meet the needs, aspirations and preferences of each individual.
- Our evaluation highlighted high levels of satisfaction from beneficiaries, referral agencies, parents and carers and employers. All post placement evaluation forms received rated our service as either good or excellent.
- In terms of specific outcomes for our beneficiaries:
 - 2 Job offers from employers.
 - 2 long-term voluntary placements.
 - All beneficiaries achieved soft outcomes i.e. in terms of increased confidence, self esteem, independence etc.
- Both projects ran to budget.

Our Plans for 2009

In 2009 we will build on our achievements and provide an enhanced service for our beneficiaries. We will work with 30 beneficiaries. This number will include 25 new referral places and 5 second placements for selected 2008 beneficiaries that showed real potential to achieve paid employment with further support.

I believe we are better placed to provide a quality service than we were at this stage last year, as of 31st December 08:

- We have a more settled and experienced staff team in place.
- All of our beneficiary files are prepared for 2009.
- We have already received 15 referrals from partner agencies and can get to work straight away (we could fill all 30 places available immediately, highlighting the high demand for places and need for the service)
- We have a pool of experienced Job Coaches already in place to support individuals.
- We have an established office base to work from, much more appropriate than home-working.
- We have a strong network of employers and partners all with a desire to help us deliver our service.

2009 will be an exciting and challenging year for the Bren Project as we continue to develop whilst increasing the quality and quantity of placements for disabled people in Cheshire.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the financial reporting standards for smaller entities (effective January 2007) and the requirements of the statements of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Incoming resources
