STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, having no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £1

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association

The trustees are elected from and by the membership at the Annual General Meeting Trustee training is provided as and when required

Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charitable company is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES (INCORPORATING PUBLIC BENEFIT)

The objects of the charity are,

a) the relief of people with a learning disability in particular by provision of help and support for them and their families, dependents and carers, and to prevent learning disabilities for the public benefit and to advance religion amongst persons with learning disability,

b) To provide and assist in the provision of facilities for the recreation or other leisure time occupation for people who have the need thereof by reason of learning disability with the object of improving their conditions of life

The Trustees have reviewed the guidance issued by the Charity Commission in relation to Public benefit and consider that they fulfil the requirement through the objects and activities of the charity

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Notable achievements have included

- The development and fundraising for the Grace Little Children's Centre Over the year volunteers and staff have worked incredibly hard to raise around £500,000 to plan and build the centre Building work was almost complete at the end of the financial year. When complete the centre will have hi tech moving and handling equipment, suitable for the needs of the most profoundly disabled young people. There will be 4 en-suite bedrooms for overnight stays in the residential wing. In the activity wing, which will be open to non residents, there will be a sensory room, soft play, IT and arts and crafts area. The centre will be for young people with learning and /or physical disabilities aged up to 25.
- Continuing growth in children's services, the year has also seen a continuous growth in all
 children's services, especially in the areas of community support and holiday and leisure
 activities
- Continuing growth in outreach, we have continued to attach new clients and extend the number of hours worked with existing clients
- Training is a high priority, as we need to provide clients with a quality safe experience. This year the staff team received over 500 certificates from 60 different relevant training courses.
- California House had its first inspection by the Care Quality Commission and was scored as fully compliant with the standards in all aspects
- Catering project at Heysham Gardens, we have been asked to provide a catering service at an
 extra care complex run by Eden Housing Clients cook and serve food to residents one day a
 week

California House Residential respite care for adults with learning disabilities. The house has 5 guest bedrooms, 2 are fully accessible for those with profound physical disabilities. The house is open 365 days a year. This year we have been successful in re-negotiating our contract with social services so as to fund all 5 beds. Highlights this year have been the installation of the accessible kitchen and the good CQC report.

Community Support Adults We provide services for adults in the community. This is a total of over 390 hours per week. Services provided can be very varied – from helping someone to go shopping, through supporting people to do leisure activities, to spending entire days with clients supporting all of their daily activities.

Supported Living We supply 24 hour support in the community for 4 young women. This work has grown out of the community support service — clients stay with us as a care provider rather than moving on to new providers when they leave the family home. In the financial year one client has left and we have successfully integrated another young lady into the service.

Children's services We have a range of services funded in a variety of ways some of which we have been providing for in excess of 25 years

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011

Present services are:

Children's Community Support We support young people in the community whilst their parents take a break. We either care of the children at home or take them out into the community to do an activity. This service has grown considerably in the present year and we now provide in excess of 97 hours per week from this service.

Activators Club and Holiday Play Schemes We are commissioned by Cumbria PCT to provide short term non residential care for disabled children. Activators club operates from 10 to 4 on Saturdays and at the moment is based at Newtown Road school and provides a service for up to 14 children a week. The club also offers a play scheme during school holidays. The Activators club is now so successful children have to attend on a 3 weekly rota, the demand is so high

Children's Holiday Breaks We have again received a generous grant from BBC Children in Need to organise 6 holiday breaks for young people

Short Breaks Cumbria County Council have extended the funding for what was in the past called Aiming High We now provide an additional 8 holidays for young people, Monday sports club, Sunday activity days and home sitting for over 60 young people from this fund

North Cumbria Autism Family Support Project We host a project jointly funded by CAMHS and CCC 2 part time support workers work across the whole of the north of Cumbria supporting families with children on the autistic spectrum, the workers advise, educate, signpost. They have a caseload of over 280. There have been concerns throughout the year around funding for this project and we have had to operate on short term contracts, but the future now seem certain for the next 12 months.

Carlisle Active Carlisle Active is a volunteering programme which provides leisure activities for adults with learning disabilities. Volunteers support the adults to do activities of their own choice in the community. There is a monthly formal activity — often fell walking or an arts workshop. There is also a bowling club which meets on Fridays. Between formal meetings volunteers meet with the service user they have befriended and do one to one activities, shopping, swimming. There is a part time paid service manager. The service has been running for around 10 years and is presently entirely funded by the Northern Rock Foundation.

Holidays We provide 3/4 day holidays a year for up to 40 adults a year. The holidaymakers are supported by volunteers. There is a part time paid manager. This service has been provided for over 30 years.

The Shop We have now opened the opportunities shop in St Cuthbert's lane where we not only sell second-hand goods but items created by people with learning disabilities. We also provide a work experience scheme at the shop and at our warehouse in St John's Street for 13 people. The economic situation has made trading more difficult at the shop than expected.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The financial constraints indicated from national and local government make it difficult to plan services ahead, however we have been pleased to generate a sound income for the year and increase our overall operating income by £94,352 excluding specific donations for the Grace Little Centre Cumbria County Council contracts are still the major funding source and, because of uncertainty and the expected the constraints on local authority funding, we continue to look at diversification of our income from other sources including direct fundraising and a variety of grants

Reserves policy

The policy of the charity is to maintain enough reserves to maintain continued operations for 3 months. Reserves are monitored by the trustees bi-monthly

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The trustees meet annually with senior managers for a strategic planning day to plan the year ahead They look at likely risks and opportunities. This is in addition to their bi-monthly trustees meeting which monitors activities and plans,

Planning priorities include

- Development of the Grace Little Centre to include both residential and non-residential activities. The centre will need to gain OFSTED registration status
- Development of community day services This is a new area of work which will allow us to offer a new service to small groups of clients wanting to do community based activities
- Develop new ways of working to combat funding cuts and reduced opportunities This would include joint working and consortia bids
- Encourage more clients to buy our services on direct payments which will allow us to be more flexible and less dependent on contracts from Cumbria County council
- We will seek to renew existing contracts and seek new ones by being fully involved in tender offers in our area by Cumbria County Council and others

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom Accounting Standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income

Donations, grants and investment income are accounted for on a receipts basis, gross of income tax where applicable. Income is deferred when the donor has imposed conditions that specify the time period in which the expenditure must take place.

Legacies are included in the Statement of Financial Activities where the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy

Turnover in respect of shop sales is recognised at point of sale

Fund accounting

General funds are those unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees, in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity, and which have not been designated for other purposes

Restricted funds are funds that are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements

Resources expended

Expenditure (VAT inclusive) has been charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis

Charitable expenditure comprises costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be directly allocated to such activities and costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include audit fees

All costs have been allocated between expenditure categories in proportion to the usage that the Trustees deem appropriate for that particular charitable activity

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 30TH SEPTEMBER 2011

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost Fixed asset expenditure of £500 or less is not capitalised in the accounts

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows

Freehold property - 2% reducing balance Fixtures, fittings and equipment - 25% reducing balance Motor vehicles - 25% reducing balance

No depreciation was charged on leasehold property as the building was not complete at the year end date

Operating lease agreements

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against profits on a straight line basis over the period of the lease

Pension costs

The company contributes towards the individual personal pension schemes for employees The annual contributions payable are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for, according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as either financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its habilities.
